# Saturday Morning Changing Looks

By BOB THOMAS

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — To those interested in presenting better television entertainment for children, this has been the season of "Open Sesame."

Nothing has hit the field of children's programming with the impact of "Sesame Street," the highly original show for preschoolers that has been educational television's biggest hit. It combines animation and live action to teach the alphabet and other basics.

"Because of its success, producers now have a much better chance of selling quality shows to the networks," says Norman Prescott, head of the Filmmation production company.

"Before 'Sesame Street,' there wasn't a chance of interesting the networks in anything besides pure entertainment. I know, because I tried."

Filmmation is a new giant in the animation field. Founded in 1965 by Prescott, Lou Scheimer and Hal Sutherland, the company grew so fast that it was wooed for a merger by several acquisitive corporations. Filmmation chose to align with Teleprompter because of the promise it held in future cable television.

The quick rise of Filmmation was due to the fast expansion and rapid change of television programming for Saturday morning.

"Saturday morning programming was a hit-and-miss affair until about four years ago," Prescott said. "It had been the garbage pail of the networks:

anything swept off the network nighttime might be dropped in Saturday morning.

"Then about 1965, CBS became conscious of the fact that from 9 1/2 to 10 per cent of its total revenue from television programming was coming from Saturday morning—about \$46 million."

That's when CBS became more aggressive in shows for kids, and the other networks followed suit. Alas, in the battle for ratings the shows became more and more violent. Filmmation entered the field with a new cartoon version of "Superman," which Scheimer described as "the least maligned of the action shows."

With the killings of Martin Luther King Jr. and Robert F. Kennedy and the nation's revolution against violence, the networks scrambled to tone down the violence.

"Fortunately, we were sitting with a property in the new mold — 'Archie,'" said Prescott. "It became the most successful show on Saturday morning. And I'm sure we never would have sold it if there hadn't been an anti-violence wave."

Not only did Filmmation hit the jackpot with the "Archie" show, it also spawned a music enterprise for the company, including a record, "Sugar, Sugar," which reportedly sold six million copies worldwide.

Next season Filmmation will have two other shows on the networks: "The Jerry Lewis

## 'Allonsi' Cries Elliot Ness

PAPEETE, Tahiti (AP) — Robert Stack straps on his shoulder holster, checks his automatic and says to his fellow crime fighters: "Allonsi!"

What is Elliott Ness doing in Tahiti? The fact is that "The Untouchables"—the French-language version—has proved to be one of the most popular attractions on Tahitian television. Other American hits have been "Bonanza" and "The Invaders."

The tourist visitor, overwhelmed by the physical attractions of French Polynesia, might consider television as superfluous as snowshoes. But the natives appear to love it.

Tahitian television, which began in 1964, is now received by 7,500 home sets. That's not much by U.S. standards, but the number is remarkable when you realize that the signal extends only to Papeete's population: 30,000 and its closest environs, plus the opposite shore of Ball-Hai—like Morea, 12 miles away.

Consider also the small earnings of most Tahitians and the cost of television sets—\$200 to \$300. How do the natives manage to become set owners?

"Very simple," says Jean Suhas, a former Paris journalist who directs the television operation. "In many cases three families will have homes on the same communal property. So they put their money together and buy a set they all can watch."

Americans would find the local television schedule spare—it's 3 1/2 hours on weekends and 4 1/2 on weeknights, starting at 6:30. Three times a week, lessons in English, French, science and other education subjects

are offered for the youthful audience.

The nightly schedule begins with a half-hour of cartoons and serials for the small fry, then the news. Then come variety shows and series, some from the United States but the bulk from France. From 15 to 18 per cent of all programming is of local origin.

Tahitian television is operated by the French government-owned ORTF. Mon dieu, no commercials!

"This country pays nothing for television," director Suhas remarked proudly. "All expenses are paid by the French government. We do allow one hour and 50 minutes of commercials on the radio, which broadcasts 10 hours a day; but I ship that income right back to Paris."

The Tahitian television plant looks like that of any small-city station in the United States—except that some of the personnel scurrying around before the evening's telecast wear bathing suits and sandals. The main activity is in the news room.

Four newsmen and one cameraman assemble the news, 25 per cent of it local. The world happenings are collected from a French news agency and short wave radio from America, Australia and France. Each plane from Paris brings a new supply of news film.

"Our system for newscasts is not the same as in America," said Suhas. "The news is reported on-camera only by journalists who are responsible for the news, not by those who merely read it."

The most popular programs for Tahitians? American Western movies.

### TALK AND TALK

"I like being interviewed," says Ariene Golenka, featured on "Mayberry R.F.D." on the CBS Television Network. "I love to talk and talk and talk."

WASHINGTON (AP) — Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell, elated by mass arrests stemming from what he called "the biggest operation of its kind," hints federal agents are planning more attacks on organized trafficking in narcotics.

Mitchell indicated more is to come in announcing Sunday that 190 persons, mostly Cuban refugees, had been named in complaints or warrants as part of what officials said was a ring controlling most of the heroin traffic in the United States.

The Justice Department said early today 137 persons had been arrested in 10 cities as part of Operation Eagle, the code name for a six-month undercover investigation that culminated in weekend raids across the nation.

Two of those arrested were critically wounded by federal agents—one in New York, the other in Miami.

While personally disclosing developments at a swiftly called news conference Sunday, Mitchell gave much of the credit for Operation Eagle to legal wiretap provisions.

He also pointed to the shooting incidents as fresh support for his stand that Congress should pass President Nixon's anticrime proposal providing no-knock entry. "It would have been a great help to us," he said.

The attorney general said the two wounded men were among three men who "resisted when agents announced their presence." Agents shot one man in his home after they said he aimed his weapon at them. The other man was shot in a car by
