



Lee Throws His Support To Duffey

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — Former Mayor Richard C. Lee of New Haven in his first formal tie to the Senatorial campaign of Joseph Duffey, has been listed as a member of the group calling itself "New Haven Democrats for Duffey."

The group's formation was announced Friday by Duffey aides here. Lee's name is one of six in a list of "founding members."

Lee then passed up the voting at the convention, sending his alternate, Sirabella-nominated Duffey, to face two opponents in the Aug. 19 primary.

Red Bloc Bankers Capitalists

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet bloc's new international investment bank is authorized to do business with Western countries.

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Things As Well As People: Now and then the fundamental long range problem for our economy—as different as it is from the fluctuating emergencies of inflation and employment—is the need to manipulate our way out of—can be spotted, lurking just behind the scenes.

Other policy experts in "Washington" think that it will take a military success for Hanoi itself, not for us, to bring Hanoi into a negotiating mood.

It gets rather complicated. But it comes down, in the end, to a consistent judgment that each side wants to negotiate not from failure, but from success, not from weakness, but from strength.

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### What Nations Negotiate From

We also notice, in the news, that "Washington" is now speculating that the North Vietnamese will soon be attempting to score some headlines with some raids on big city targets in Vietnam, or some kind of expensive move in Cambodia, all designed to demonstrate that the American operation in Cambodia has not succeeded in doing very much damage to the North Vietnamese war effort.

In such a case, after some such successful show of strength, this brand of Washington theory continues, perhaps Hanoi might be ready to shift toward more serious peace talks.

So we have two different Washington views on what may lead Hanoi toward seriousness at Paris.

The President thinks that a military success he claims for us may be the thing that will put Hanoi in a negotiating mood.

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### Wonders of the Universe

A Zero Cost Exploration

By DR. I. M. LEVITT The Fels Planetarium of the Franklin Institute that magnificently brilliant object seen in the western sky after sunset is the planet Venus. About once every 19 months it becomes a brilliant evening star. Currently, it is moving farther east of the sun and on Sept. 1 will be at its greatest distance from the sun. It will become brighter on Oct. 6 — about 10,000 times brighter than the faintest star we can see with the naked eye.

Previous probes have indicated that the Venusian atmosphere has a high carbon dioxide content and less than 1.5 percent of water and oxygen. Both carbon dioxide and water vapor have been detected spectroscopically. However, when Mariner 2 flew behind Venus in 1967, the signals transmitted to the earth had to travel through successive layers of the planet's atmosphere. As a consequence of the absorption, astronomers deduced the presence of mercury, sulfur dioxide and mercuric bromide. As the signals passed through lower layers of the atmosphere, the mercury bromide was deduced. One possible reason for the presence of these mercury compounds is that, with a surface temperature of 800 degrees F., mercury would evaporate as water does on the earth. When these reached an altitude with sufficiently low temperature, the mercury vapors would condense as clouds, creating a series of technicolor cloud layers.

With a surface temperature of 800 degrees F., there is a possibility that violent atmospheric motions are present which can circulate surface materials to high levels. Can we detect these materials? Why should there be regions on Venus which permit high radar reflectivity? Is Venus a mountainous planet? These are some of the questions scientists ask.

Some of these questions may be susceptible to resolution using imaging devices on the Pioneer. Let us hope we can provide the guidance to make the 1973 Pioneer yield maximum results.

One additional factor: you, on earth, should be intensely interested in a planet with high carbon dioxide content. We have in the past few decades increased the carbon dioxide content of the earth's atmosphere about 15 percent. Without a halt to this pollution, we may be building up carbon dioxide in the point where the greenhouse effect will affect the earth with a vengeance. Perhaps by using Venus as a model we can predict the consequences to the earth of this continued increase in carbon dioxide.

It seems a pity that neither the United States nor the Soviet Union had a television camera in their Venus flybys. We are familiar with the dramatic photographs of Mars taken by the Mariners from which we discovered the unique nature of the Martian surface. The absence of these cameras on Venus probes has created a serious gap in our information. When the upcoming Pioneer spacecraft passes Venus to acquire the gravitational mask instrumentation and cameras may be used to provide a visual closeup of the planet. I am not aware of any compelling reasons why this cannot be done. Despite the success of Mariner 2 and 3, and the success of the upcoming Pioneer, Venus is a mystery still. We discovered Venus was recently found to be rotating slower than the time it takes it to revolve around the sun; that is, it is longer than its year. Thus, it spins clockwise which is counter to the spin direction of the other planets and most of the planet moons. However, this discovery was a radar detection and it would be a vital sighting confirm this theory?!

# U.S. Individual Taxpayers Ask IRS

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

**Q** I don't think the agent who examined my return was right in disallowing a lot of my deductions. Is there anyone else at IRS I can talk to about this?  
**A** You may request a district conference to discuss the disputed deductions. The way to do this is described on the notice you received explaining the proposed adjustments to your tax. The conference provides you with an independent review of the items in question since the person representing IRS at the conference is independent of the office that examined your return.

**Q** My wife has stopped taking social security tax from my pay. Why?  
**A** Employers are required to withhold social security taxes on the first \$7,500 of wages paid during the calendar year for each employee. In your case, that requirement has evidently been met.

**Q** I'm selling my house and moving into a retirement community. Will I have to pay tax on the profit?  
**A** Any gain on the sale of property is usually taxable. However, you can postpone the tax if the sale is a personal residence if another is bought within a year before or after the sale at a price at least equal to the "adjusted sales price" of the property. If you are 65 before the date of the sale, you may avoid paying tax on the profit from a home sale altogether. To do this, the house must have been owned and used as your principal residence for five of the past eight years and the "adjusted sales price" be \$20,000 or less. When the "adjusted sales price" is over \$20,000, only a portion of the profit will be taxable.

**Q** Has there been any rate change on the highway use tax?  
**A** No. It is still \$2 per 1000 lbs. of weight for trucks with a taxable gross weight of over 26,000 pounds.

**Q** Is there any tax difference between alimony and child support payments?  
**A** Yes, alimony payments are taxable to the recipient and deductible by the payer. Child support payments are neither deductible nor taxable.

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# Mickewicz Was In on Cambodia Operation

Sp-4 Francis H. Mickewicz of Manchester returned to Camp Radcliff, his home base in Vietnam, in mid-June and is breathing easier these days after seeing extensive action in Cambodia as a combat infantryman.

His father, Frank Mickewicz of 120 Avery St., reports the 25-year-old soldier was in one of the first units of the 4th Infantry Division assigned to clean out enemy sanctuaries in the Cambodian border in the late April invasion.

In a recent letter home, young Frank wrote, "We're back at Radcliff now, taking it nice and easy and getting our regular three meals and a bath every day. And it's nice and quiet—they haven't popped a mortar at us in a week."

An account of their landing, accompanied by a photograph of Mickewicz slugging through a stream while on patrol during the invasion, was published in the June 21 edition of the Division newspaper, The Ivy Leaf.

The photo, by an army combat photographer, is reproduced with this article.

Going in, the helicopters climbed high above the clouds. Speaking of the landing zone, he said the landing zone, then dropped rapidly and hit the LZ at tree-top level according to the newspaper account, the troops were expecting to meet anti-aircraft fire.

"We were definitely scared," the newspaper quoted one of the men as saying.

Said another, "When I hit the ground, I thought we were receiving small arms fire, so I frantically low-crawled for about 10 minutes until we found out that it was just the gunship working out at troop level."

"The army cameras weren't the only ones covering the invasion."

"As I leaped from the bird, an scrambled for a few seconds counted a third man," I stated in amazement as I saw NBC and CBS cameramen calmly walking ground filming as everyone else ran for cover."

Describes Frank, "In a letter home dated May 26, Mickewicz referred off-handly related to his school. The school was decided to the Pleasant Valley Club and has been its meeting place for 12 years. "The club was formed with the stated purpose of 'working together for a better school, health, and living - socially and charitably.'"

The schoolhouse was decided to the club for \$1 with the stipulation that possession would revert to the school if the club was not active in one year. Over the years the club has made major repairs. Hardwood floors, kitchen fixtures, and water have been installed and paid for by club members.

Mrs. Cece said, "It is with deep regret that we return the building to the town. Due to the cost of sewers as well as other repairs needed, we feel we can no longer financially support the building."

The fate of the building has not yet been determined by Councilman Abraham Glassman at the recent council meeting, recommended the town's Historical Society for evaluation of the building's worth from a historical standpoint.

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# Economic War on War Aim of Women's Unit

WASHINGTON (AP) - With the support of several prominent members, the Women's Unit of the League for Peace and Freedom has called on the women of America to open an economic war on war.

"We are urging women across the country not to shop on the first Saturday of each month," the unit said.

More than 40 women attended an "Emergency Planning Conference" on Thursday, and among the speakers were: Mrs. Grant and Mrs. King, the "Shoppers' Stoppage" was put together by the aid of Jan Hart, president of the American Jewish Congress, and Mrs. M. J. M. Jeanette Rubin, former congresswoman from Montana, and Polista Bernstein, wife of congressman Leonard Bernstein.

"We will begin immediately preparing lists of consumer items produced by major war suppliers," said Virginia Staines, president of the women's division of the American Jewish Congress. "We hope to put these lists in the hands of millions of women."

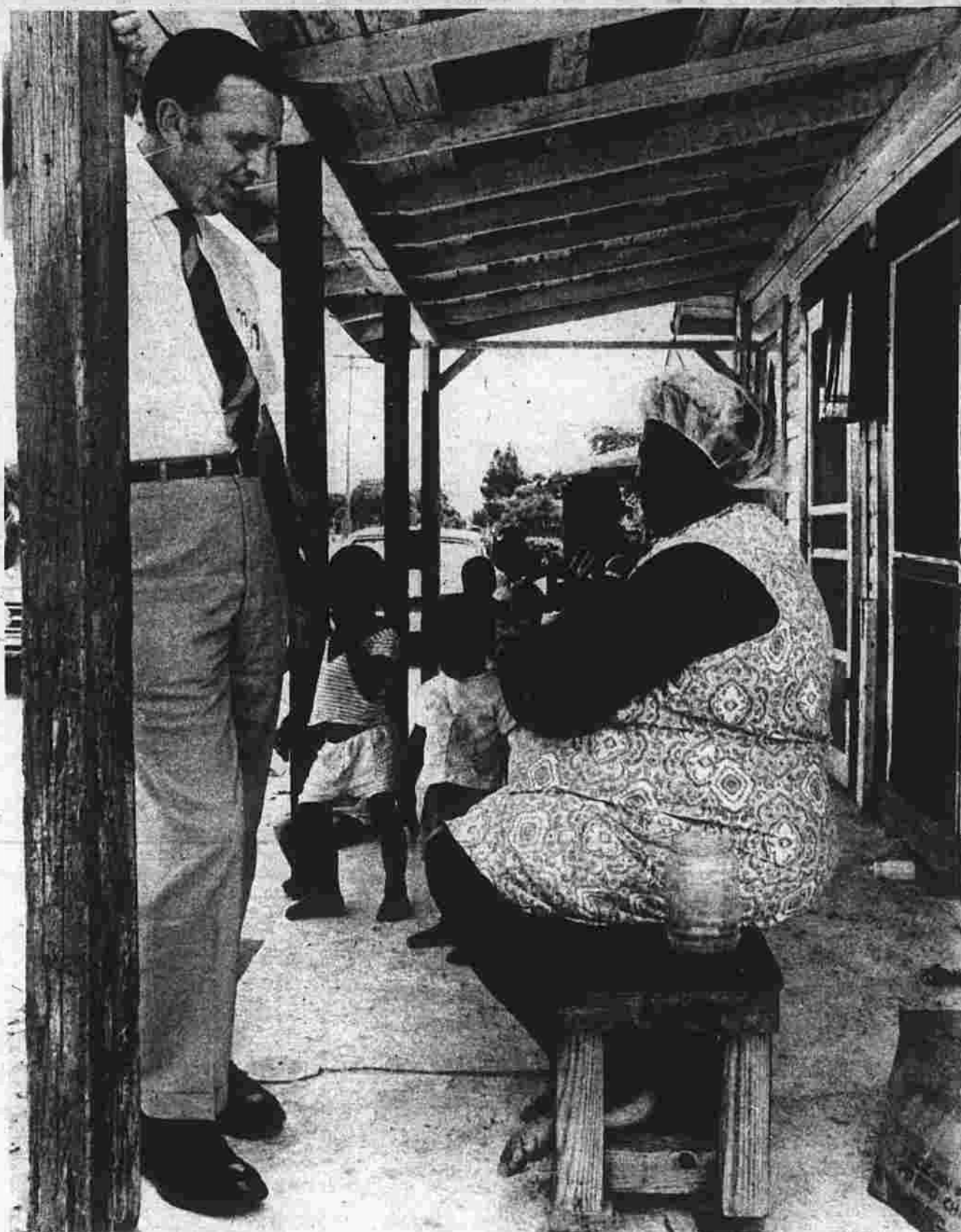

## TV Doors Opening for Black Actresses

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Tracy Reed, a June graduate of UCLA, is beautiful, bright, talented and one of the growing number of young black actresses landing continuing roles in television.

Miss Reed had been planning to go on to Columbia University and major in journalism, but she heard last summer that "Love, American Style," was looking for performers. She said, "I'd never acted before but they signed me for the blackouts."

She did the blackout sketches during her senior year and in December read for the feminine lead in "Barefoot in the Park."

She was called back twice to read and was one of five girls selected for a screen test. "It was New Year's Eve when I was told I'd gotten it," she said. "That was a nice present."

"Barefoot in the Park" is one of two half-hour comedy shows based on creations by Neil Simon—the other is "The Odd Couple"—in the ABC fall schedule. Her costar is comedian Scoey Mitchell.

Until recently there wasn't much call for black ingenues, unless they knew how to sing and dance. Chelsea Brown followed that route, from "Laugh-In" to a dramatic role in "Mat Lincoln," a new ABC show originally called "Dial Hot Line."

Diahann Carroll made the most conspicuous breakthrough for a black actress with the lead in "Julia" and Gall Fisher won an Emmy this year for her role in "Mannix."

Other new regulars in the fall include Judy Pace in "The Young Lawyers" and Ena Hartman in "Dan August," both on

ABC. Miss Pace was a regular on "Peyton Place" and has a string of movie and television credits. Miss Hartman also has appeared in a number of dramatic programs and movies, including "Airport."

According to Miss Reed, "Barefoot" isn't going to have "social overtones, but it'll be fun. It's mainly a love story. I think showing that we're alive and function the same as anyone else makes it as effective as a heavy drama."

"My mother and brother came down to watch the pilot and my mother said at first she was very conscious of the blackness. But after about 10 minutes it was just about two people."

She sees the character she portrays, Corie Bratter, as a happy, naive person. "She has the ability to wonder at things," she said. She's a little kookie and gets into situations impulsively that she can't handle. Scoey is the square, solid husband.

### BRONX ACCENT

Shirley MacLaine, starring in "Two for the Seesaw," the NBC Monday night movie of July 13, as Gittel Mosca — beatnik and aspiring dancer — found she had to develop a Bronx accent for the role. Director Robert Wise imported a girl from the New York borough to act as dialogue coach, while actress MacLaine reported she had the most trouble with the words "walk," "talk" and "on."

will have three series and 10 Movies of the Week on ABC this year, describes "Most Deadly Game" as strictly entertainment.  
"It's like Agatha Christie," he said. "We never see the murder being committed. We originally called it 'Zig Zag' because just when you think you have it solved, it goes off again. It will always be crimes of passion."  
His other new series, joining "Mod Squad," is "Silent Force." He said, "They go after organized crime, and I don't mean just the Mafia. If seven truckers get together to put another trucker out of business

that's organized crime." The networks have the last word, but the producers are pressuring for more action in their stories.  
Leonard Freeman, creator of "Hawaii 5-0" and the new "Storefront Lawyers," said, "A cop operates in a violent world and it's a fact of life. The networks have been beaten over the head by pressure groups and they want to cushion that. If they cushion it too much, you'd lose reality and so there is that conflict between the networks and any action-adventure show."

Wyoming Home Singing star Robert Goulet, during a recent appearance on "The Merv Griffin Show" on the CBS Television Network, reported that he and his wife, Carol Lawrence, have purchased a home in Wyoming.
