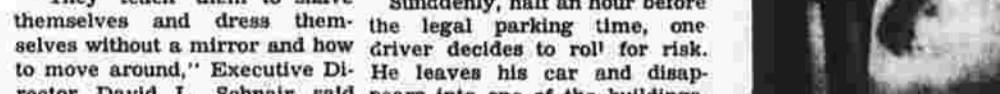

# Fortunes of Insurers In Hands of Actuaries

NEW YORK (AP) — Few people have more money riding on their decisions than the 8,000 fellows and associates of the Society of Actuaries, the men and women whose decisions commit \$200 billion of life insurance assets for decades ahead.

These days that can mean sweaty palms on the hands that do the figuring, because company expenses aren't entirely predictable in an unstable economy and there is no assurance that interest rates won't drop precipitously.

Those are two of the three major factors that the life insurance actuaries must work out. The third, mortality, has nearly settled on a plateau and may show only small but steady gains until another medical triumph is achieved.

If the actuary is employed by a health insurer he must deal with another factor, morbidity, or the relative incidence of disease. And always, no matter where he works he must not forget that his slightest miscalculation can have enormous financial repercussions when multiplied by millions of people and scores of years.

"I think of myself as something of a cross between an engineer and a financial officer," explains George Shelley, a fellow of the society. "We develop cost and price a product, and we also have to keep an eye out for the financial impact on the organization."

Like a boy scout, the actuary must always be prepared. This they do with great stores of numerical information that they blend with statistical formulas and mathematical probabilities to calculate present and future dividends and cash reserves.

Since nobody knows the future, even though a lot of variables seem to average out, the actuary must build in a margin to compensate for error. Being human, they sometimes err—monumentally.

Back in the early 1930s, for example, many companies began writing total and permanent disability insurance. The high unemployment rates of the 1930s were used in calculating a base rate. Then came the depression and... "The actuary just inter-employment rates," he said.

These plans, by Mankey Associates of Manchester, are for the proposed addition and renovation to the Keeney St. School.

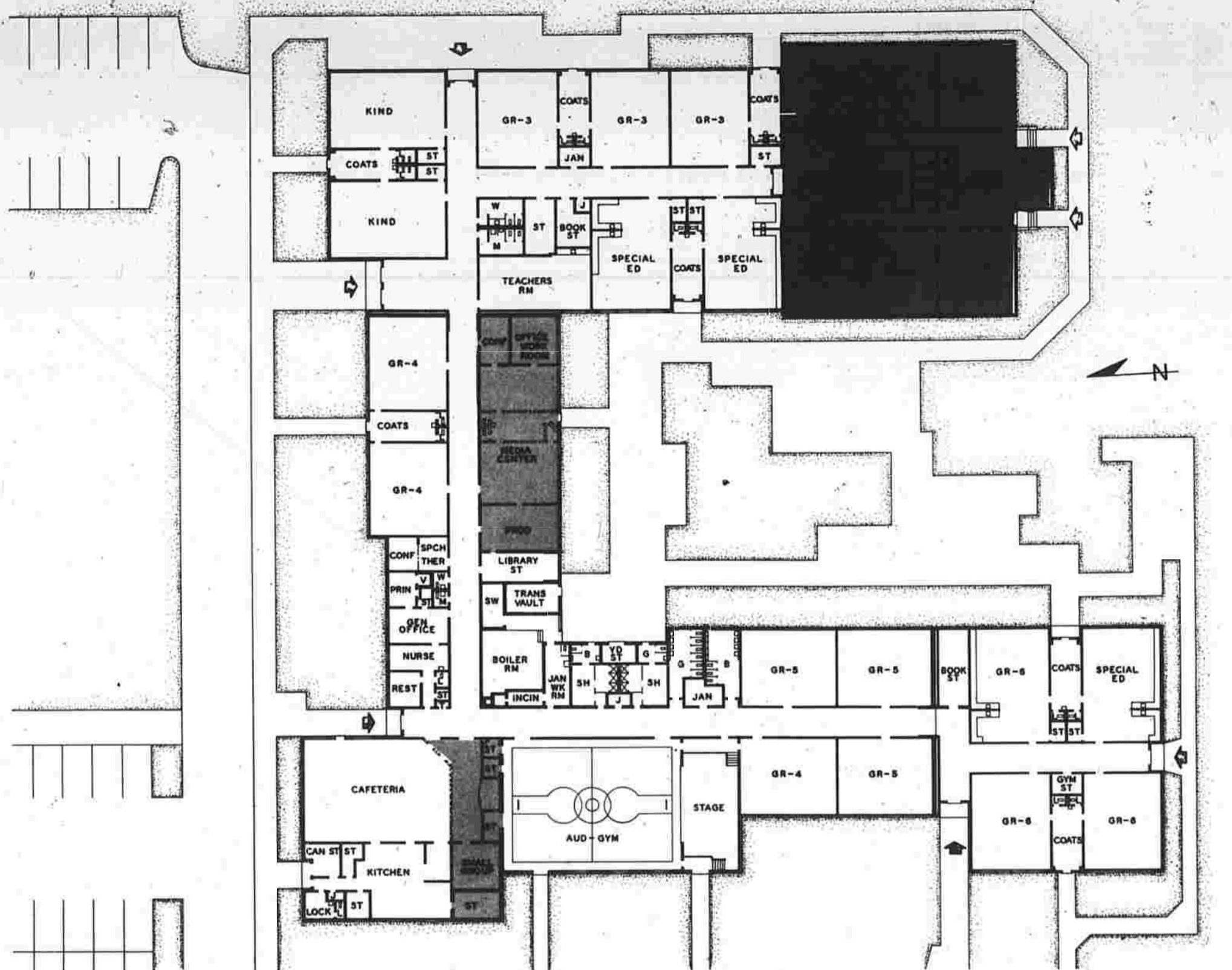
The central area of the addition would contain two teacher work rooms, and two instruction areas lavatories, a small individual or small group instruction room, and two coat storage areas would be provided by hooks on the walls.

Chalk boards would be installed on either the load bearing walls or the folding partitions. Long range consideration has been given to removing the non-load bearing walls, including those which form the existing library as well as additional educational resource materials such as cartridge tape systems. The cafeteria renovation will include expanding the present library to take over the space of an existing classroom and the expansion of the existing cafeteria. The wall between what is now the library and a classroom would be knocked out to form a larger media center, including a conference room, an office and work room, and a production room.

The media center would contain the materials of the existing library as well as additional educational resource materials such as cartridge tape systems. The doorway at the end of the hall would be sealed off.

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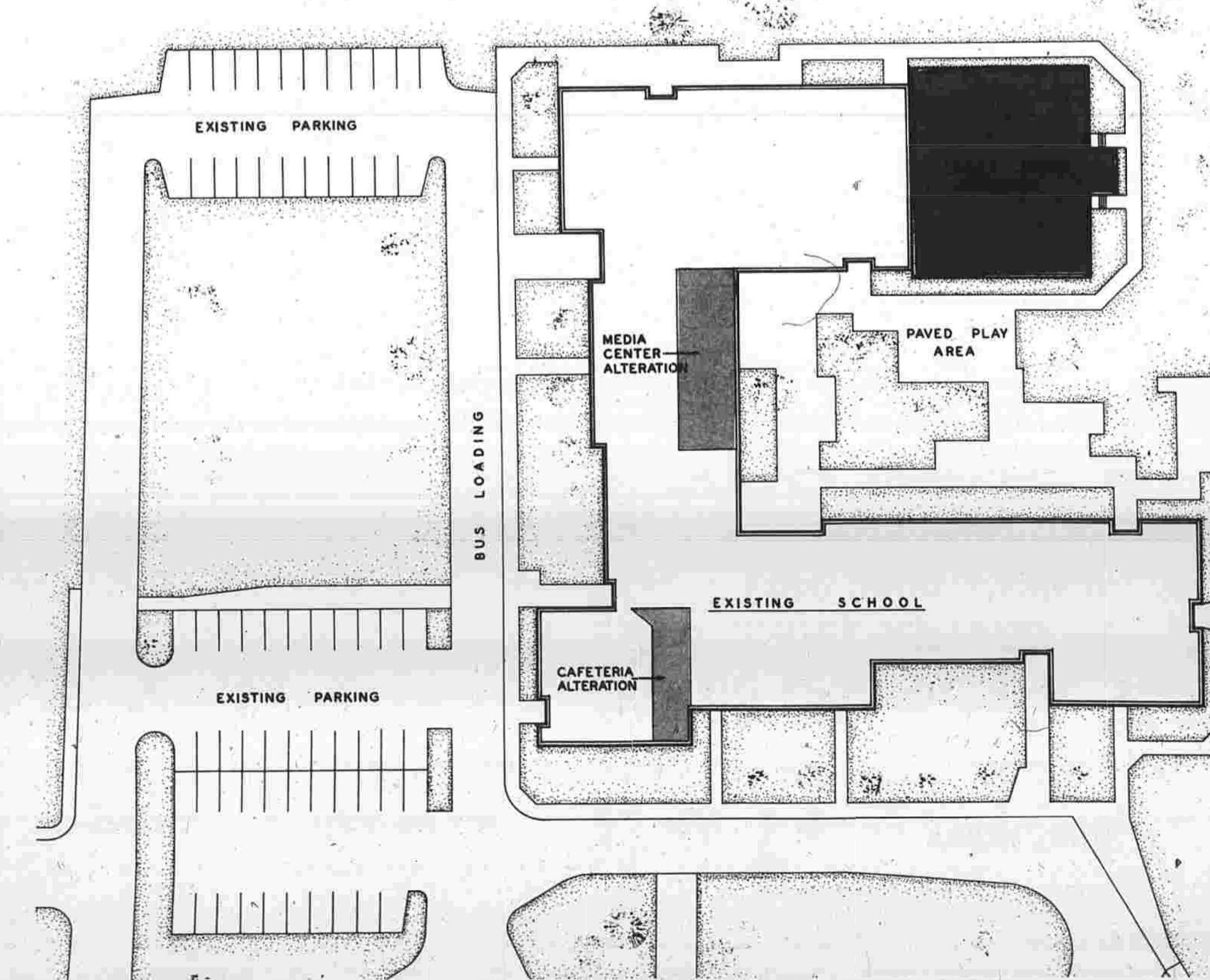
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# New York City, U.S. Pool Assets on Rubbish Disposal

NEW YORK (AP) — The federal government and New York City are trying to develop a garbage recycling process depending on the key to garbage disposal without pollution.

Engineers working on the project say such a shredder is the mandatory first step in the process of recycling garbage, that in breaking it down into elements which will be useful to the environment.

They say recycling would eliminate the land and air pollution caused by conventional garbage disposal such as incineration and dumping.

The U.S. Public Health Service, which is the health arm of the federal government, has provided a \$10,000 grant and technical assistance to the project.

Shredding—the breaking of garbage into small pieces of relatively uniform size—is "mandatory for the new recycling systems and desirable for the current combustion and landfill disposal," said Nathan M. Roth, the city's chief sanitation engineer in charge of the experimental program.

"Until we have a reliable shredding system which we can take for granted, the new systems of waste disposal are doomed to failure," Rothman said. Engineers say they have in mind a number of problems in the current work.

In an effort to find a reliable garbage shredder, the city and the Public Health Service are spending \$50,000 to test five types of four hammer-mill shredders which have failed two previous tests since the city bought them 20 years ago.

The shredder, which is almost 10-foot square, breaks down solid waste with several dozen hammers which revolve about 900 times a minute around a horizontal shaft.

However, it has been subject to periodic jamming, always caused by nonbrittle materials.

Rothman said in an interview that, in addition to the ecological considerations, there is an urgent need for new disposal processes because the landfill areas in the nation are expected to be filled to capacity during this decade.

Furthermore, he said the volume of waste in the city has grown to 22,600 tons a day. Even with a stable population, he said the city's garbage volume is expected to increase by the end of the century to 46,000 tons a day.

He said other types of shredders will be tried. However, he said it is very difficult to develop an effective shredder for garbage because garbage includes every type and shape of material.

The city has also set aside funds to experiment with another recycling process depending on a shredder: the pyrolysis method. Under this method, the garbage is turned into sterilized charcoal and usable vapors of the recycling process.

A third disposal process involves high-temperature incinerators which turn garbage into a material which, when combined with water, can be used in cement.

Some 80 of the big, eight-jet bombers pounded infiltration corridors, base camps and staging areas in border areas of Laos and Cambodia and South Vietnam, in a series of sources in Saigon said. The heaviest concentration was in the northwest corner of South Vietnam, just north of the big North Vietnamese supply base in the A Shau valley and about five miles from the Laotian border.

"There is fairly heavy enemy activity and movement and storage areas in the region," said one source. "There has been a buildup going on the past couple of days."

The jungled region north of the A Shau provides infiltration corridors to the populous coastal region to the east around Hue.

Also in Saigon, South Vietnamese Foreign Minister Tran Van Lam rejected suggestions by members of the U.S. Congress that a timetable be published for the withdrawal of U.S. forces from Vietnam.

Lam said this would encourage the North Vietnamese "to sit tight and wait, and to refuse any serious negotiation."

Despite the withdrawal of American or allied troops, generally speaking, should depend on the progress of the war. Lam said in an interview with the Saigon Post.

The Park Department, however, is satisfied that these thefts are not thefts of malicious vandals, or thefts for profit which might be gained from selling the shrubs on some black market.

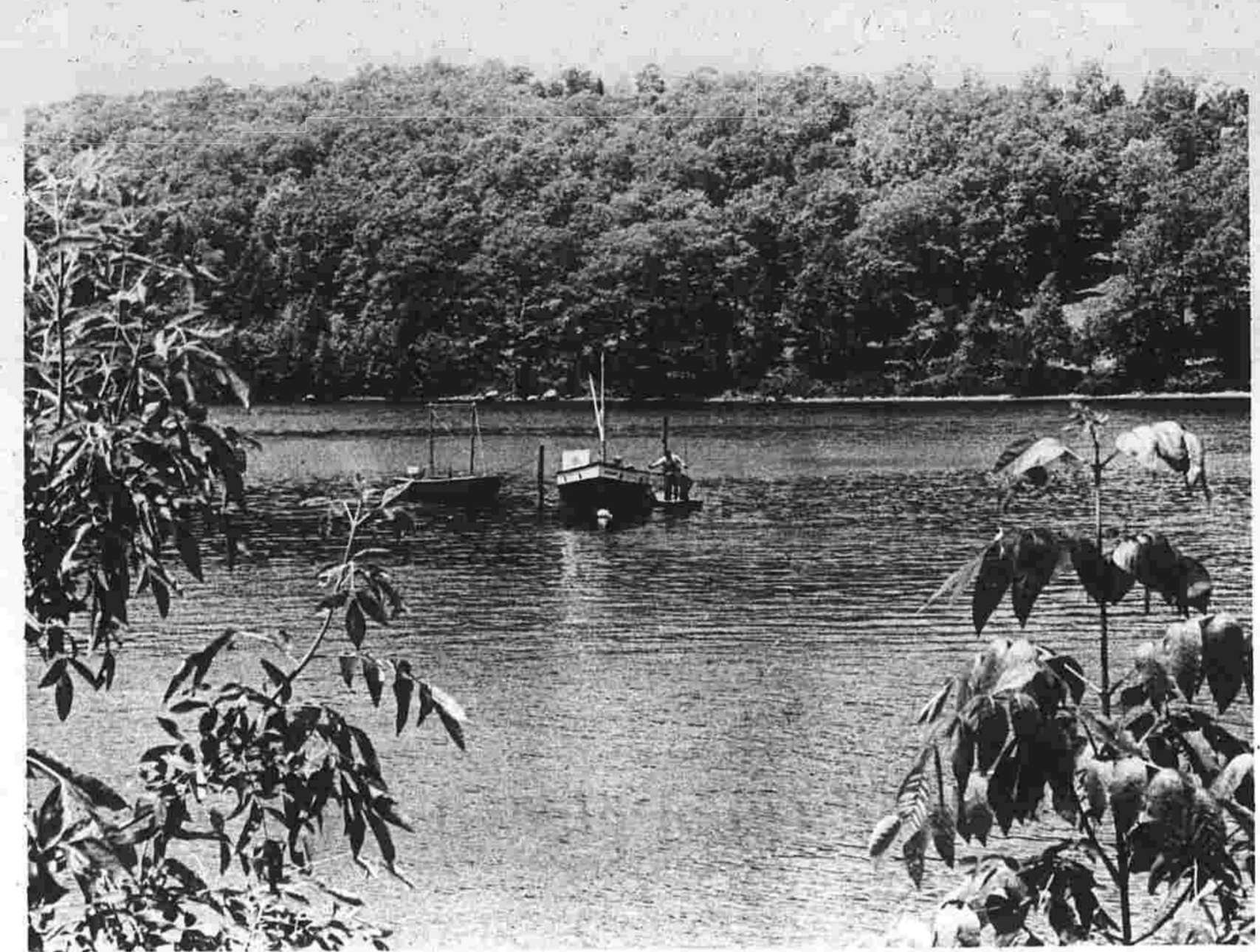
People steal these trees, the Park Department believes, because they cannot resist trying to have them for their own in some corner of dirt of their own.

Rogers Almost Back In Line  
Secretary of State William F. Rogers, a gentleman who obviously got his position in the Cabinet because of his long personal relationship with President Richard Nixon, had to do some fancy skating the other day to try to recover his proper place in the Administration formation.

What he tried to do, in a surprise appearance of a routine State Department press briefing session, was to recover from what he had done in London two days before.

In London two days before, not many days after President Nixon had said that our success in our Cambodian adventure might very well have the result of inspiring Hanoi to serious negotiation at least, Secretary Rogers had said that the result of the Cambodian operation, and the set back for the enemy there, might very well have the result of making Hanoi unwilling to negotiate at this time.

This, taken by itself, might seem surprising good news, to be coming from a high administration official. Unfortunately, it collided directly with the obviously superior good sense and judgment of the highest of all administration officials, the President himself.

So, in his pentential, remedial public reading of the signs, Secretary Rogers, in his next public appearance, revised his analysis until he saw the Cambodian operation possibly leading toward negotiations, perhaps not immediately, but in a year or two.

Since this didn't sound as if the Secretary of State had quite made it all the way back toward the White House position, the White House press secretary undertook later on to assure news men that "it is wrong for you to assume there is any lack of unanimity. There is not." Especially, he added, in the White House, where foreign policy is really made.

One thing the Secretary of State apparently did not feel called upon to retract, perhaps because his chief had no particular public position on it. That was his observation, made in the London interview which got him into trouble, and sent him to during his next appearance in Washington, that one result of our move into Cambodia had been to strengthen Communist China's influence with Hanoi, by increasing prospects for the long drawn-out kind of struggle China is believed to wish Hanoi to continue.

Perhaps even the White House can't figure a way to deny the gain of influence for China, of a way to interpret such a development as something favorable to us.

But the important, troubling thing is that some of the pronouncements of the President are such glib, wishful thinking that intelligent members of his own administration have a hard time not contradicting them just by some careless, innocuous adherence to their own rules of common sense.

The more whatever man it is in the White House insists on telling it the way he wishes it were, the more important it is to have somebody who can tell it the way it is.

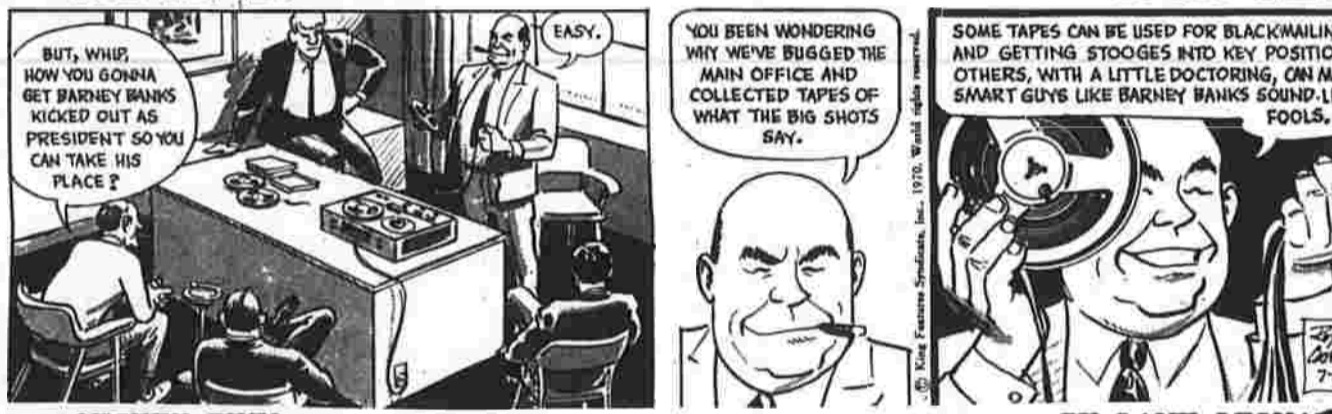
