# Pollution Controls Pressed by Stanley

Democratic Second Congressional District primary challenger William Stanley brought his campaign to the Vermont area yesterday, calling for reforms in the postal system, creation of a conservation corps and improving the standard of living in general for the residents of Eastern Connecticut.

Following his talk to members of the Rockville Rotary, Stanley viewed first hand the effects of pollution as he accompanied former State Sen. Franklin Welles on an inspection of the Hockanum River as it flows through the Gold-A-Tron property in Talcottville.

Standing on the covered bridge, overlooking the river, Welles pointed out the dead fish lying on the banks of the river, speculating their deaths may have been caused by an overflow from the sewage treatment plant during the weekend.

Stanley reiterated his remarks made earlier during the luncheon and raised the problem of how to determine who caused the pollution once the result is found.

Despite the many laws on the books against pollution, Stanley said, "no matter how hard legislation is on the books, we can't control the pollution...not by the systems used in the past."

The high cost of pollution abatement equipment is one of the reasons behind his original proposal for the creation of an Industrial City-Jetport plan for Eastern Connecticut.

It is also desired to even the problems of local taxation, to prevent uneven tax burdens caused by industrial location in one town while the employees all live in another town. Revenue from the Industrial City would be spread among the towns in which the workers live on a pro-rata basis.

His comments met with general approval from the businessmen attending the Rotary meeting.

Stanley predicted, "We will see tax cuts 200 million in Eastern Connecticut, unless something is done to combat the present situation. It points out to the business community of Chaplin's 100-mile rate, which provides no services for the townpeople other than education."

Noting his opponent John Pickett's criticism to his Industrial City-Jetport plan, Stanley said the "terrible jet engine is made in Middletown."

# Great Salt Theft of '69 Only Bookkeeping Error

Manchester's 'Great Salt Theft of '69' has been solved. According to Town Manager Robert Weiss and Highway Superintendent Herman Paucan... "This was a bookkeeping error, and not an actual salt disappearance."

Late last year, an employee of the Town Highway Department reported to the Police Department that about 40 tons of salt had been stolen overnight from a storage shed. The incident received national news coverage.

From time to time, at Board of Directors' comment sessions, several town residents have asked for an explanation.

Paucan, in an explanation today, said that, although an order had been placed for 80 tons of salt during the week in question, only 40 tons were delivered.

He said that on a Monday morning, following the delivery, a supervisor, knowing that a combination of better bookkeeping and a better job was being done, called the Police Department and reported a "missing" salt.

Paucan stated, "Through the reporting of the incident to the Police Department was not hasty, I was thankful that 80 tons were ordered. The incident proved them to be. I realize that there may be some people who will tend to doubt this explanation, but it may help to substantiate my statement."

So ends the case of the "Great Salt Theft of '69."

Massive Offensive Launched by U.S. On Laotian Border

SAIGON (AP)—The United States and South Vietnam are waging a massive air and ground offensive along 200 miles of the Laotian border trying to block North Vietnamese troops and air supplies destined for South Vietnam and Cambodia.

U.S. Planes Committed On Cambodia

NEAR SKOUN, Cambodia (AP)—Any doubts that U.S. air power has been committed to saving Cambodian battalions in need of direct air support were swept aside today by seven American war planes.

The air controller on the ground was a U.S. Special Forces-trained Cambodian officer whose radio technique and American slang were flawless.

Three battalions of Cambodian troops trying to drive away a large Viet Cong and North Vietnamese force on the last four miles to the key road intersection of the district capital, Skoun were caught in freighter early today. They sent out urgent calls for air support.

The first to arrive were a U.S. OV10 reconnaissance plane and a South Vietnamese transport bristling with missiles. As the South Vietnamese plane pulled off target with its ammunition spent, this correspondent, who has heard hundreds of air strikes called in South Vietnam, listened as the Cambodian officer said on the radio that more air strikes were needed to break down enemy strong points.

The American pilot in the OV10 Code named "Rustic Zero Eight," said in a Midwestern accent: "If you can't get your Cambodian aircraft, we will call in our own."

Thirty minutes later, the first F100 arrived and started a bombing pattern. The Cambodian officer was asked if the strikes were in direct support of his troops. He answered Communist supply lines leading to South Vietnam, as Washington insists American bombers here are only doing.

"This is direct support for my battalion watch," the Cambodian officer replied. On the first pass, the F100 flew at tree-top level and dropped "snake-eye" bombs 300-yards with air brakes deployed for Vietnam to permit attacking aircraft to get as low as possible before releasing their burning maximum accuracy.

The spotter plane turned sky circles and based on infrared devices, the east of the border offensive.

Edict May Halt Flow Of Nerve Gas

MANCHESTER, Conn. (AP)—Mayor Ronald Thompson said today he will seek a federal court injunction to halt a scheduled rail shipment of nerve gas at the Macon city limits.

If all else fails, the mayor said, he will have all 200 city policemen halt the train and board it.

Thompson said the injunction would be sought on grounds that the shipment would be detrimental to the city, that the rail road tracks over which the train is to be routed are poor and that the possibility of a disaster is greater if the train goes through Macon.

The Army has announced that it plans to move 28 freight cars loaded with obsolete nerve gas from the Ammunition, Ala. depot to Sunny Point, N.C., for disposal in the Atlantic. The proposed route will take the train south of Atlanta, through Macon, then back north through Athens, Ga.

Thompson said Tuesday he would erect a barricade at the city limits to halt the train. But as possible before releasing the train, he did not want to erect a barricade that might wreck the train.

Manson's Newspaper Act Leads to Jailing of Counsel

By LINDA DEUTSCH Associated Press Writer LOS ANGELES (AP)—A defense attorney is spending three nights in the same jail as Charles Manson, the shaggy-haired cult leader who briefly halted the Sharon Tate murder trial by flashing at the jury a newspaper headline reading: "Manson Guilty, Nixon Declares."

The trial judge ruled attorney Days Shinn committed "a willful and deliberate contempt" of court by leaving the paper with him in Manson's reach at the court table. Shinn said he'd done it by mistake.

Manson's move came Tuesday after Superior Court Judge Charles H. Older denied without comment a defense motion for a mistrial based on Nixon's statement—later withdrawn—that Manson was guilty directly or indirectly of eight murders.

Defense attorneys said later they would consider a further mistrial motion based on their own statements, made to newsmen in Denver Monday.

"This is a massive hind of prejudice," said Paul Flieger, attorney for Patricia Kennebrew, 23, one of four defendants charged with killing Miss Tate and six others a year ago. He added: "What we want to analyze is what would happen if such a motion were granted. Would it be humanly possible to tell a jury that Manson had been tainted by publicity?"

Older said since Nixon's remarks were made he had ordered special precautions to protect jurors from exposure to the news reports. He had windows made opaque on buses that ferry jurors to court and ordered their radios to talk-phones, radio and television suspended.

"I'm satisfied there has been no exposure," he said. Shinn, attorney for Susan Atkins, 21, was the third defendant to be jailed in the past week. Ronald Hughes, representing (See Page Twelve)

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (AP)—Eleven men, most of them elderly, died in a blaze that swept a three-story building in downtown Minneapolis early today. Four persons were hospitalized in critical condition.

A preliminary loss estimate was put at \$150,000 by Lee J. Schoepkoetter, Fire Department supervisor of investigations.

Larry Langsdorf, 66, who occupied a third-floor room, was asleep when the fire broke out. "I awoke and smelled smoke," he said. "So I opened the door and I could hardly see through the light. It was black."

He said he knew he'd never make it down the stairs, so he kicked his way into a vacant room next door and found a coil of rope at the window.

He threw out the rope and slid down it. (See Page Fourteen)

Union Activity Grows Teacher Strikes May Hit Schools Throughout Nation

By WILLIAM J. WAUGH AP Education Writer WASHINGTON (AP)—Teacher labor leaders predict that union activity will gain momentum this fall in urban, suburban and rural schools of all 50 states, bringing with it the increased chance of teacher strikes.

Their forecasts came after a decade which saw dramatic escalation in the number of teacher walkouts. In the past three years there have been 426 teacher strikes—nearly six times as many as there were in the previous seven years.

32 Lives Lost Hurricane Celia Damage Put at \$300 Million

CORPUS CHRISTI, TEX. (AP)—Estimates of damage reared \$300 million today in Texas' Coastal Bend vacation area in the wake of Hurricane Celia. The storm claimed 32 lives, 13 in Texas.

Figures kept mounting on death and destruction from the effects of Celia's blows in the Corpus Christi area and northward into Mexico, where the storm finally beat itself out Tuesday.

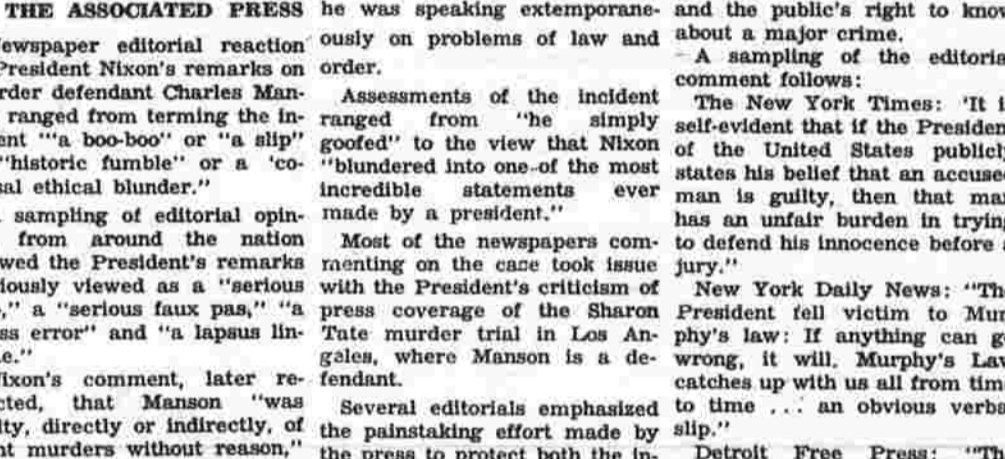
Five persons perished as the storm battered across Cuba and 14 drowned in Florida waters turned turbulent by the storm's passage through the Gulf of Mexico.

With damage to more than three-fourths of the buildings and houses in Corpus Christi and dozens of neighboring towns, officials tentatively put the property damage total around \$223 million. Crop losses were estimated at nearly \$60 million.

Winds ranged up to 160 miles per hour, the Weather Bureau said as Celia surged ashore Monday across Corpus Christi Bay. Before crossing the international border to hit Mexico's mountains, it still packed winds as high as 89 m.p.h. The big storm dealt lessening blows as far as 250 miles inland.

However, Celia brought rains amounting to less than three inches along the watershed of the Rio Grande, where downpours up to 10 inches set off massive floods on the heels of Hurricane Betsy in 1967. There (See Page Thirteen)
