The fact that everybody's existence is at stake in the possibility of peace talks in the Near East is explanation of how difficult it has been to get these talks going even after basic agreement to hold them had been obtained.

Israeli and the Arab nations have their own survival directly involved, and are necessarily and naturally jealous to guard against the slightest possibility of advantage either way in the process to which they have now agreed.

But the people of all the rest of the world are also involved. In reality, this outside involvement is as firm and irrevocable as the involvement of those actually on the scene. And this outside involvement has to hope, it almost has the right to expect, that those directly involved will stretch some points, if they have to, in favor of keeping the possibility of peace alive.

Every day of possible progress toward peace is one of anxious straining on the part of all diplomacy of good will to see that talks are not exploded out of existence before they even start.

Let them appreciate the respective contributions, both real and tentative, they themselves have made to the prospect of peace. Let them understand how much the rest of the world is bound to them, and to their conduct, and how much the rest of the world wants to live too. Peace must be the result if it can be gained. In this risk, and in this possible gain, the United States and Israel, Russia and the Arab states, are all as one, and there is no separate fate in this situation for anybody.

That is why it is imperative to keep talking small steps forward, why it can be fatal to stand still. The next small step should be the naming of representatives for the first meeting.

But even if this is the only kind of future in which ETV can be given financial security, something still will have been lost. We could, possibly, be grateful, but we are not sure we should, or will.

In Affluence The Virus?

Israel Vs. U.S.

WASHINGTON — Dismayed by the Israeli control of the canal, U.S. officials were set to declare as early as last weekend that the strategic balance of power along the Suez Canal had not been disturbed by any Egyptian missile encirclement.

At the last minute, they were pressured by the Israeli government of Prime Minister Golda Meir to say nothing until new intelligence photographs were sent to Washington from headquarters of the Israeli Defense Force.

These photographs, the U. S. was told, would remove all doubt about forward movement of Soviet-Egyptian anti-aircraft missiles in the Mideast cease-fire Aug. 7, and convince the Nixon administration it had taken any recourse: Demand that Cairo and Moscow dismantle any new sites immediately.

But when the new photographs arrived they were, in the words of a top U. S. official, "fuzzy and inconclusive."

So angry about the delay imposed by Israel, the State Department finally issued its statement on Wednesday. Conspicuously omitted from that statement was any hint of a demand on Cairo and Moscow to remove the offending missiles.

Political Parade

WASHINGTON — Wednesday night's victory in the Connecticut senatorial primary by Joseph D. Duffey, national chairman of Americans for Democratic Action, represents the biggest breakthrough of 1970 for the "peace forces" and advocates of "new politics."

The results of his strategy were evident Wednesday night as the returns came in. While Duffey carried subcommittee investigations of these matters.

Duffey's victory confirmed the reputation of his campaign manager, Anne Wheeler, as perhaps the most proficient organizer to emerge from the 1968 McCarthy movement.

From the time two years ago when they led an unsuccessful fight against Bailey for control of the national convention delegation, the Duffey-Wheeler team moved systematically to expand their base of support.

They played an active role in the 1968 reelection campaign of Sen. Abraham A. Ribicoff (D., Conn.), and Ribicoff responded this year with a strong endorsement of Duffey over the convention-backed Donahue.

### Tolland County Politics Duffey Boosters a New Breed

By BETTE QUATRALE (Herald Reporter)  
Although legions of youthful under-age supporters of Joseph Duffey were often credited with his victories in the larger towns and cities of the state, his supporters in Tolland County are quite a different breed.

Checking with Citizens for Duffey groups in the area, a similar picture of the average Duffey worker emerged. The bulk of the work on the campaign was performed by groups of young married couples in their mid-twenties and thirties, with young children.

Many of the towns had readily mixed support and a small group of college students home on vacation who helped out the winning efforts was simple. All Democrats in the towns canvassed either in person or by telephone; their feelings regarding the candidates were recorded and those who were favorable to Duffey's senatorial candidacy were listed and contacted to get out and vote on a primary day.

The Duffey efforts in the towns of Tolland, Ellington, Bolton and Coventry as well as in Vernon often became a family affair, and in some cases whole neighborhoods became involved in the project.

Five and six-year-old youngsters could be heard telling their playmates that "Joe Duffey should be Senator," while those around eight and nine years old in Coventry put bumper stickers on their bicycles and rode around the neighborhood.

In Coventry three teenage girls took a boat decorated with signs bearing Duffey's candidacy around Coventry Lake on Sunday.

The size of the local organizations varied from six members in Bolton, between 10 and 25 in Ellington, Tolland and Coventry and up to 50 in Vernon.

All the local groups financed their own operations limiting themselves to a shoestring budget. Donations from the workers were made as a last resort and most towns held one fund-raising effort.

The expenditures went mostly for advertisements and mailings, with the supplies usually donated by the workers. In Vernon, where the local group opened a headquarters at the Gateway Shopping Center, Duffey workers at the polls agreed to contribute their pay to meet the expenses of the campaign.

In many of the towns, some of the local Democratic Town Committees were involved in the working Duffey group, but generally the campaign efforts on behalf of Duffey were carried on by political novices or at least by those who had not previously been active in the towns in which they were living.

It was this grass roots support which was the key to Duffey's victory according to Walter McCarthy, Tolland County chairman of the Citizens for Duffey organization.

### Bomb Cargo 183 Farmers Participate In Conservation Program

WASHINGTON (AP)—An explosion of farm-based conservation programs was set off by a report that a ship with 5,000 tons of bombs and ammunition was scuttled 118 miles off the Maryland coast, the Navy says.

# Migrant Families: An 'Invisible' State Problem

A farm job runs out, a family is displaced and new scenes begin for another of Connecticut's so-called migrant families. The drama is rerun daily for uncounted hundreds in the state, almost always against a depressing setting of tumble-down farmhouses or sprawling tenements.

For the Curtis family in Pomfret, a move this week to Tolland will be the ninth in three years. They answered an ad in a Maine newspaper in 1967 advertising jobs at a large dairy operation in Pomfret. A truck was sent for the family belongings and it brought them back to an apartment with heat, light, a daily supply of milk and \$60 a week.

But, as Mrs. Curtis sadly related, the truck was dirty, the apartment was part of a barn ("nice, but it smelled like barn"), and working hours for her husband stretched from 5 a.m. to 8 p.m. with 15 minutes off for lunch and about 10 minutes for dinner.

Arthur Curtis said he could take it for five weeks and then the moving from one place to another began, to poultry processing plants and to other dairy farms. Housing was usually provided and sometimes they were living in one room, but they were living in heat and light. "We never saw such a winter in our lives," said the mother of three young daughters. They went to the dump for firewood.

A mill job in Putnam followed and another farm job and another. "It's terrible to move because you never have the money," Drexler says, "but you have to move because you have to eat."

Another family spoke last week of plans to "fix up" a run-down house in Ellington. The building, which was in back of another, had no wall paper or closets and appeared to be more of a shed than a house, but people could live there, and that's all that counts.

A few days ago they suddenly decided to move on. There were construction jobs available in Jeffersonville, Ky. In two days they were gone.

These are examples of what is referred to as migrant families in Connecticut by the program offering them services. They are not migrants in the classic sense. They do not come and go with the seasons, but they come and go. The pick potatoes, work on tobacco, work on shrubs, or vegetables. They have special problems over and above those of minimum wage-earners, but they are not a specific group of people and they are not easily located by those trying to help them.

The Migratory Children's Program in Connecticut provides seven weeks of daily "search-

ment" during the summer to 1,800 children of migrant workers. Non-structured classes take the kids to many field trips, a week at camp, medical and dental attention, and a convalescent stay in a hospital designed to combat malnutrition. The ratio of students to teachers averages five to one.

The program is administered by the State Department of Education using federal Title I funds totaling slightly over \$400,000. There are eight centers in schools throughout the state, and they try to remedy what they can of the hurts inflicted by a life-style of being on the move.

### ... one day home, another gone

Administrators of the program note that "the presence of the migrant is often not noted and ignored in our cities and rural farm communities." The rural farm communities are those families which work on tobacco and tree nurseries, but they are also concerned about workers they refer to as the all-important school and health records in the program on truck, dairy and chicken farms. "Many of the small farms are unable to pay the increase in wages to the head of the family and when they are no longer needed they drift out to welfare or into the major migratory stream."

Finding these families in order to offer them the children's program is often not noted and ignored, according to Dewey McGowan, his state director. He said, "Our recruiting methods are crude, practically door-to-door. It is extremely inefficient."

He said, "We haven't been able to develop good channels for the free exchange of information from those people dealing with many of the migrant families, especially the tobacco growers." He explains that many of these workers are Puerto Rican and sign on to come to this country to work as single, later send for their families and crowd into the ghettos.

"We are dealing with a small number of people and they are very hard to find. Many live in extremely adverse conditions, and it is my job to reach all of them."

According to one of his area directors, William Johnson of the Ellington center, one of the biggest problems is getting people to understand that there is a migrant population here in Connecticut and that Puerto Ricans only make up part of it.

The State Department of Labor recruits the Puerto Ricans for the tobacco growers, but that is about the extent of their involvement with migrant workers. According to Richard Specter, public relations officer, "We don't know any cases where family quarters are provided."

He explained that most information collected by his department is based on the registration of certain federal and state labor laws, and expert cultural workers are assigned to apartments where a few days

before they had a good relationship with "their" families. But they try to follow them with the all-important school and health records to smooth the transition to a new school in the fall.

In the Windham area, the agricultural jobs are on dairy farms and egg and poultry packing plants. About 40 per cent are Puerto Rican, 40 per cent are white and 20 per cent black. The teachers voluntarily do the recruiting, but they miss many children hidden away in the city ghettos and in isolated farmhouses.

Kaplan said, "If we used the definition of migrants provided by the farmers we would have no children in the program, but we found many cases where there are two and even three families working a farm." The farm workers themselves are delighted with the Windham Center which offers so much to their children, and the educators don't quite understand what they or shame causes the employers to deny their existence.

### ... medical problems are often crisis

In Bloomfield and Hartford, three centers serve the agricultural worker in the ghettos of Hartford. Hot pavement gives rise to situations alien to dusty country roads. "These are not rural type children," declared director Curt Wilson at the Wintonbury School. The child sitting in Hartford and it difficult to pick up the children each morning and attendance dropped some. The environment was evident in one class which was constructing masks to reflect different cultures around the world. A little girl suddenly realized she had a culture of her own and asked, "Can you make me a tear gas mask?"

At the Hamden center there is a situation where the families are settling down to family life, but they are leaving the migrant stream. Some families are simply breaking up, however, and going on welfare.

The migrant's problems are assumed to be associated with his frequent moves, but to one observer viewed by a parade through high rent districts of shacks, the problem is what he moves into and out of.

To a nurse on the program the problem is teeth. Medical problems are frequently critical situations and are taken care of, she observed, but teeth are sadly neglected both in parents and children, and more than one child dare not smile lest he show his blackened teeth.

Thomas Chitlicki, director at the Pomfret center, sees the problems spanning migrant and non-migrant alike, and feels there should be similar programs for all youngsters in deprived situations.

McGowan feels the employers of the migrant have a responsibility to contact agencies providing services for these people. The answers he seeks would somehow stabilize the lives of the agricultural workers, possibly by providing more jobs and upgrading what he termed "slump" labor.

He stressed education as the most important factor along with family life.

All is not despair, however. There are happy successful families working in agriculture. Thanks to the inspiration from the president of the United States, Julio Santiago is here and well in Broad Brook. He came to this country from Puerto Rico to work in tobacco about 20 years ago and found a lot of discrimination. "People were against me and my people, I felt I didn't belong here, like I came from the moon or some place," he recalled.

# Soviets Move Toward Peace But Still Seek to Rule World

What's the Kremlin mood these days? Is peace about to break out?

The Russians show an interest in ending the danger in the Middle East. Moscow has signed a treaty with West Germany re-nouncing use of force. There are signs that Moscow is listening to American proposals at the strategic arms talks in Europe. The Kremlin plumps for relaxation. All this might suggest inclination toward peace. Yet, in the long term, there is something about Moscow's attitude which calls to mind the old Russian adage about approaching a friendly bear with extreme caution.

Temporarily, at least, Soviet leaders seem to want to turn their attention away from Europe, to mark time there. They are concerned about East China and Asia, but China may be a real source of irritation to a real worry.

Historically, Moscow has liked to take care of one big project at a time, having a distaste for chewing too many large bites simultaneously. It would seem that for some long time to come the center of Soviet attention will be the Middle East. That should make the Middle East the No. 1 problem of the United States, Vietnam notwithstanding.

Soviet leaders have just ratified the 1969 agreement with West Germany, whose whereabouts of the agreement were unclear for some time. The agreement is a mutual guarantee of non-interference in each other's internal affairs.

But internal strains are nothing new to Soviet leaders and they do not seem much a deterrent to pursuit of foreign policy goals. One of these goals can be to interfere in any Communist-ruled country, secure the European buffer zone.
