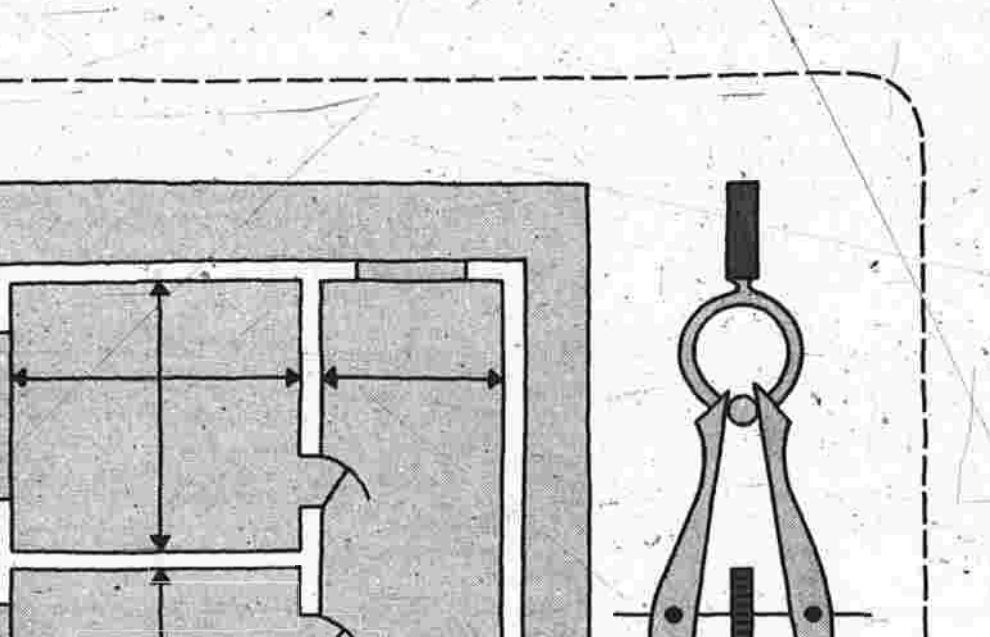

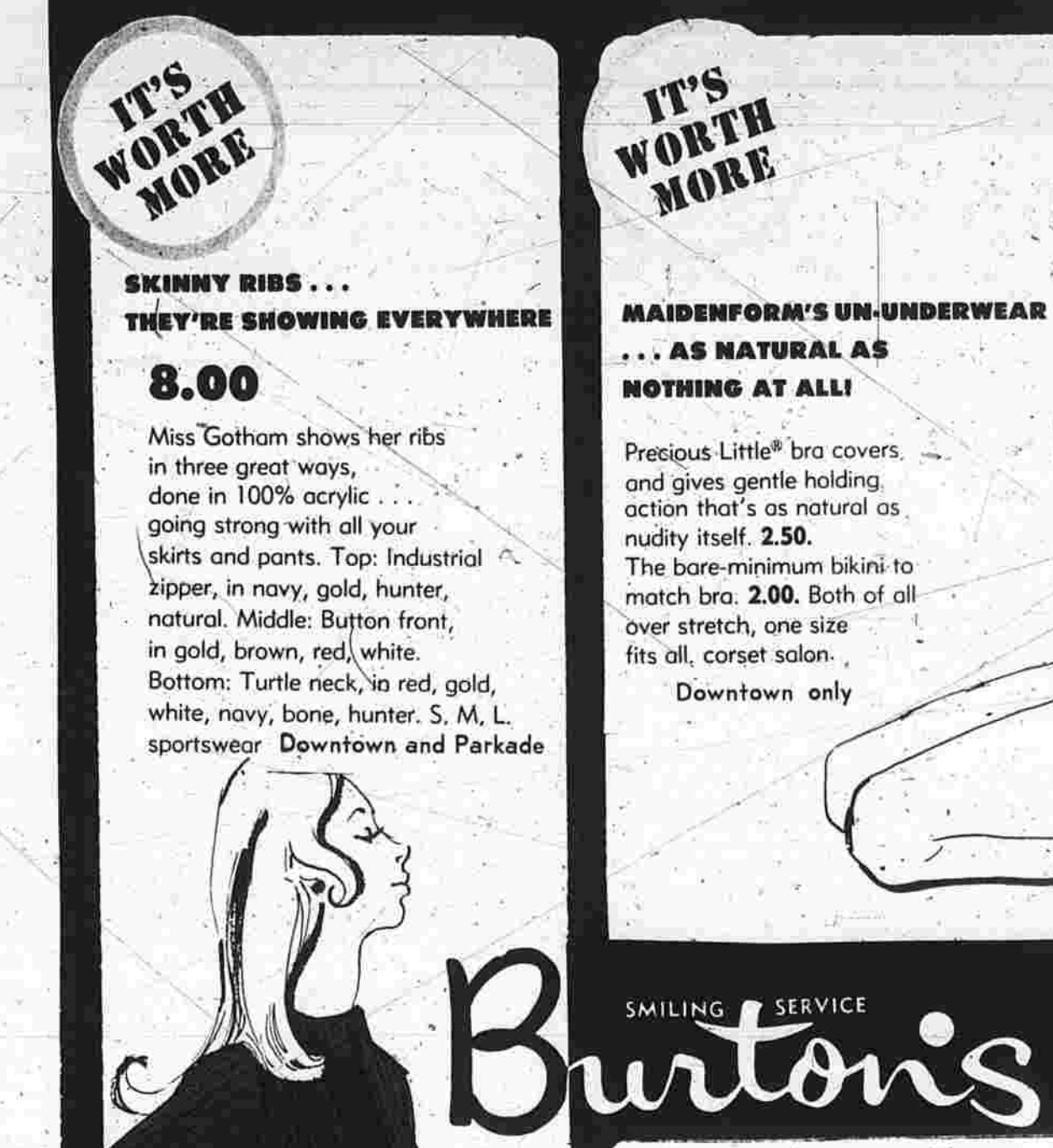

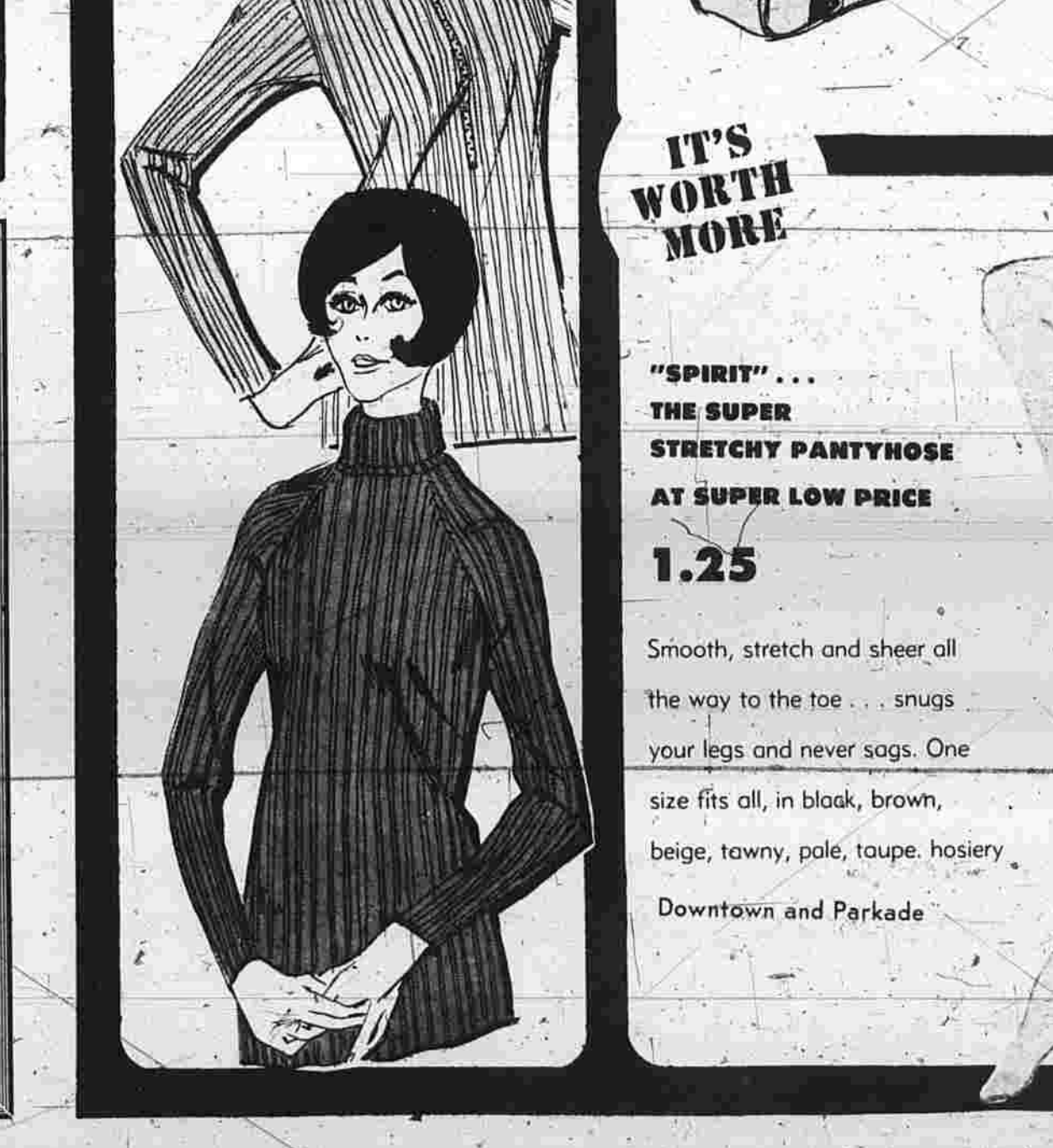

Strength In Ordeal

A long emotional ordeal tends to sanctify itself, and give all those who have shared it a feeling that they have been touched by an ennobling experience.

All of which is to say that there may be, later on, some retractions of sentiments which flowered around the immediate outcome of trial down in New Haven.

Nevertheless the evidence is that, even after the trial itself has been examined at cooler length and deliberated over, it will still stand as a demonstration of certain possibilities a good many people were doubtful about in advance of the trial.

It did seem possible for a member of a minority, and a minority scandalously advertised, to be given a fair trial. The Days of Peaceful Protest Are Over, Radicals Believe

Editor's Note: "Peaceful protest is no good," says a young radical. This philosophy is growing among extremists of the left, many of whom are now adopting the tactics of the out-of-control mob to change the System.

Madison, Wis. (AP)—With school reopening only three weeks off, officials of the University of Wisconsin are fearful of a renewal of the bomb-and-fire violence that has plagued the sprawling campus here.

But not all were shocked by the blast. "Anybody working for the Army is committing suicide," said a student who writes for an underground newspaper distributed on the 34,000-student campus of the university here.

The explosion killed Robert Faussnacht, 23-year-old graduate student, and caused damage estimated at up to \$2 million.

Radicals who might have actively sought publicity during antiwar protests three years ago have gone underground, and their organizations have escalated from street protests to hit-and-run guerrilla warfare.

Publicly organized groups on the campus, including the Students for a Democratic Society—SDS—have split apart in recent years by discussion over revolutionary tactics and the defense of Wisconsin SDS chapter, which at one time boasted 300 members.

There are five acknowledged members of the American Communist party and one member of the Progressive Labor Movement, a pro-Chinese Communist faction in the campus community.

But they are scorned by most radicals as "too corrupt and ideological." The 600 black students have not staged a demonstration since a February 1969 clash on the campus between the school created a black studies department, one of the black demonstrators refused to accept an open admissions policy.

Road Deaths Top Israel's War Deaths

TEL AVIV (AP) — Israeli newspapers call them "the enemy within," a cabinet minister terms them disasters.

They are talking about dozens of reckless, horn-honking drivers. Road deaths are on a continual climb, standing at 260 for the first half of this year. The figure is double what it was three years ago, and far higher than the number of Israeli dead recently in the day-to-day war with the Arabs.

As transport minister, retired Gen. Ezer Weizman mapped out and obtained approval for a multimillion-dollar plan aimed at scaring, pleading and forcing Israeli drivers to take it easy. Weizman lost his transport job when his political party quit the Cabinet in August in protest against Israel's acceptance of the U.S. peace initiative for the Middle East.

The Transport Ministry, although temporarily without a minister, says it will see Weizman's plan through. Many psychologists pin the driving problem on the Arab-Israeli conflict. They say tension and the uncertain future have made Israeli motorists a reckless, devil-may-care bunch.

"They don't value their lives much," says one psychologist. "They take chances the bravest soldier wouldn't take in battle. Highway carnage first

reached worrisome proportions in 1967, the year of the six-day war. Road deaths suddenly doubled to 374, with 15,000 injured that year. Now the annual death toll tops 500, with the injury figure unchanged.

"Before the war, road deaths were on a continual decline," says Nathan Talmir, secretary of the National Road Safety Council. "We used to be one of the few countries that could boast it was licking the accident problem."

Lacking an expansive railway system, Israel puts 85 per cent of its interurban traffic on the highways. A fifth of the country's 200,000 vehicles are motorcycles and scooters, compared with 4 per cent in Italy. Officials regard the scooter as five times more dangerous than an automobile. A cabinet minister attacked the problem with vigor after leaving the military last November.

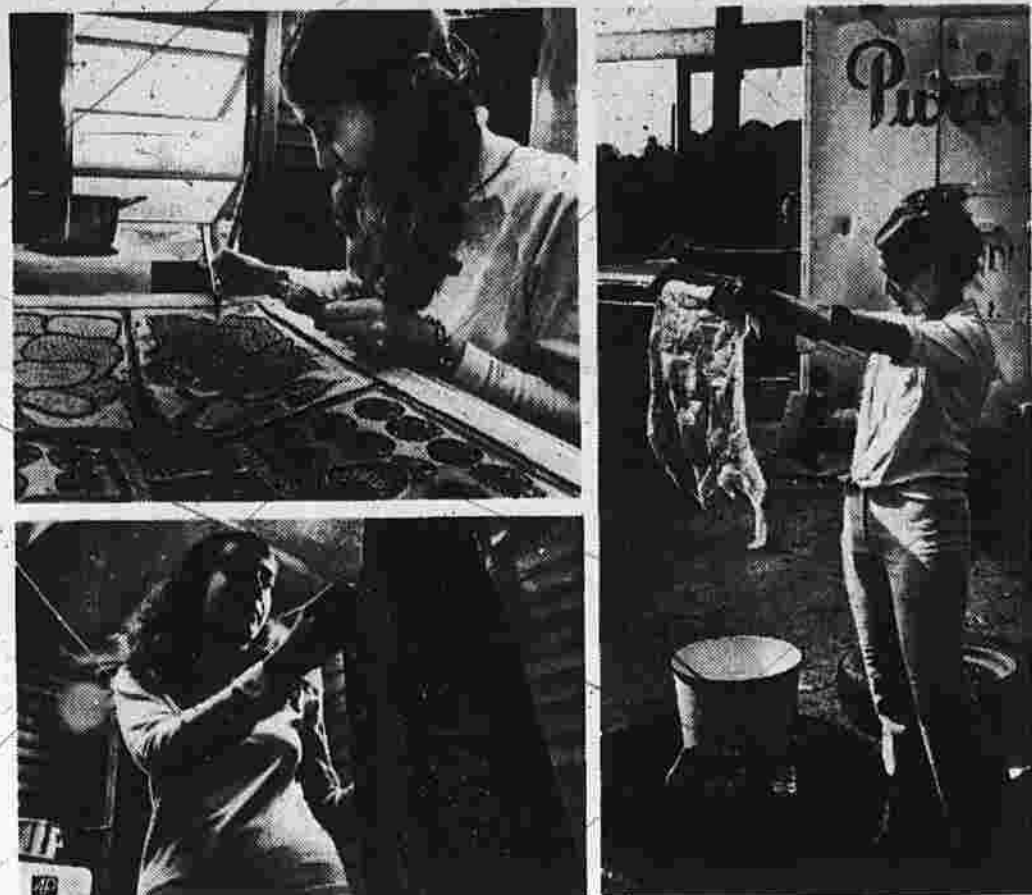

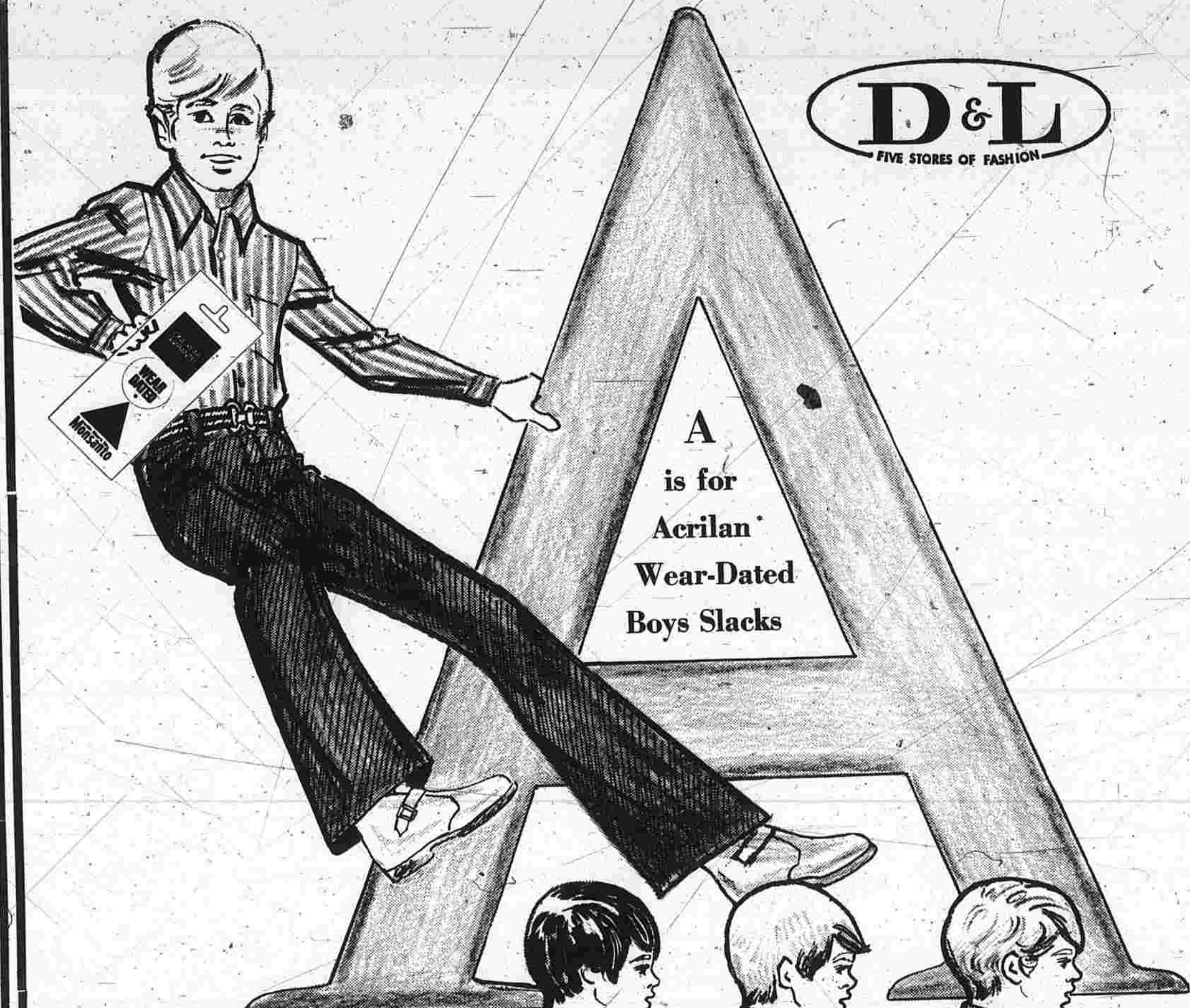

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Loses Satellite Contact
Lady Elk Vanishes

JACKSON, Wyo. (AP) — Missing: One female elk in northwest Wyoming. Wearing a bulky electronic collar, "Monique," if sighted, please notify the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

A 500-pound cow elk custom-fitted April 1 with a bulky electronic collar, hasn't been in contact with space scientists since shortly after June 1.

Her collar is packed with intricate electronic gear, designed especially for radio-frequency contacts with an overhead satellite. Among other things, the project was to determine how an animal could be tracked from summer to winter range with a satellite.

Dr. Frank Craighead Jr., directing the experiment from his science laboratory at Moose, Wyo., said he believes the loss of contact is from a malfunction in the collar or a satellite.

Dr. George Jacobs of the Goddard Space Center in Greenbelt, Md., said the short-lived experiment proved that electronic tracking is possible and now wants to expand the experiment to animals other than elk.

After months of planning, space scientists went into the National Elk Refuge north of Jackson and "livetrapped" two cow elk nicknamed "Red" and "Pleefoot." Dummy collars weighing 25 pounds were placed around the necks of each elk in anticipation that one of them later would become "Monique."

That was in early February of this year. On Feb. 19, more than four dozen space scientists, elk refuge officials and fishermen were on hand to witness the actual collaring of an elk for the tracking experiment.

However, at the well-attended collaring ceremony, University of Montana graduate student Harry Reynolds missed his target and the five-inch tranquillizer dart shot "Pleefoot" instead of the other unsuspecting cow elk.

When the Nimbus-3 passed overhead, it made contact with the electronic collar. Information received from the collar was transmitted from the satellite to a ground station in Alaska and then relayed to the Goddard Space Center in Maryland where it was routinely recorded and analyzed by computer.

North Vietnam Postpones Its Pursuit of Happiness

"All men are created equal," said the document. "They are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights, among these are life, liberty and pursuit of happiness."

With those words 20 years ago, a declaration framed by Ho Chi Minh proclaimed independence for what he called the Democratic Republic of Vietnam, with himself as president. Ho, a veteran international Communist and agent of Moscow, long had planned to use the American words for his proclamation. Perhaps it was sincere admiration for the 1776 declaration, but perhaps, too, it was a ploy to mask to the Communist behind the North's pressure.

Today, Hanoi's leaders seem resigned to protracted war as long as necessary, while the Democratic Republic of Vietnam, with itself as president, long had planned to use the American words for his proclamation. He concedes that no man has a monopoly on wisdom, but adds that collective leadership still doesn't mean lowering "the individual responsibility of leaders." That seems a way of saying that somebody, after all, has to be boss.

Perhaps the others would just as soon let him have the job for now. Le Duan, in speeches this year, has had to tell the people they must make many sacrifices in lives and property to win the war going. He has had to admit that "the material life of the people is low." He has had to put out warnings against gambling, bragging, "respectful socialism" for those who "break Socialist law." Significantly, Le Duan puts out frequent appeals for party unity, recalling this aspect of Ho's testament.

Also, 25 years after the inception of the riting words of the American Declaration of Independence, it seems clear that the pines have not come to the United States. One gets the impression that the men whom Ho brought up as leaders over the past quarter-century are obliged today to be gamblers. If they can hold out long enough, domination of all Vietnam, North and South, may one day be theirs. But the price will be heavy. Until then, the already light North Vietnamese ball must be drawn even tighter.

Bible Scholars Blazing New Ecumenical Trails

NEW YORK (AP) — Completion of a new English Bible for Roman Catholics points up a historic change in the attitude of both Protestants and Catholics toward the greatest, oldest, book: Their work is together, rather than separately.

The old-time conflicts over different versions of the Bible disappeared in the time of new translations, cooperative research, broadened knowledge of ancient Biblical times and better, earlier ancient manuscripts.

"Denominational affiliation simply does not affect the attitude of scholars in translating Biblical texts," observed Bradley Myers of the American Episcopalian Department.

In fact, several recent versions now have approval for both Protestant and Catholic use. In various languages, including English, as the efforts move near the long-sought goal of a "common Bible for all Christians."

Also, most of the newer translations have involved participation both of Protestant and Catholic scholars, including "The New American Bible" being teased next month for Catholics after 25 years work on it.

The Rev. Walter M. Abbott, an American Catholic scholar who now heads the Common Bible Section of the Vatican's Christian Unity Secretariat in Rome, says such joint teams now are working on common Bibles in 10 languages.

"The old expressions, Catholic Bible and Protestant Bible, are meaningless from a scholarly point of view," says McGr. Myers M. Bourke, a Fordham University New Testament expert who worked on the forthcoming New American Bible for Catholics. "It takes some time before this is widely accepted on all levels."

Producing an accurate translation of the text is "quite independent of any theological differences," he says, adding that in that effort, "there is absolutely no difference in approach on the part of scholars, whether Protestant or Catholic."

The cooperative work has the backing both of the Vatican and of the inter-Protestant United Bible Societies, with branches in most countries.

In the English-speaking world, three new translations of the entire Bible from original manuscripts have come out recently, all of the projects involving Protestant and Catholic scholars, with Protestant scholars also took part in producing the new translations.

"The New American Bible" now completed and to be published Sept. 30, a project of the Catholic Bishops' Committee of the Conferance of Christian Doctrine, in which Catholic scholars also took part in producing the new translations for use in official Catholic worship since the Douay-Rheims version of 1809.

"The Jerusalem Bible," a new translation published in English in 1966, produced originally in French under Catholic auspices, with Protestant scholars participating, and then rendered into English.

A 1966 edition of the Protestant-produced "Revised Standard Version," gives Catholic imprimatur and issued by Oxford Press without any changes in the text as completed in 1966 by an inter-Protestant committee in the United States. Another special Catholic edition has included minor changes, chiefly changing Jesus "brothers" to "brethren."

It is the only complete Bible achieving formal sanction both Protestant and Catholic authorities in this country, but it is only for non-linguistic Catholic use. It is a modern rendition of the old Protestant-produced King James translation of 1611, training camp. It just about breaks their hearts.

Most of those that come out of the United States are the fruit of cooperation between Protestants and Catholics. 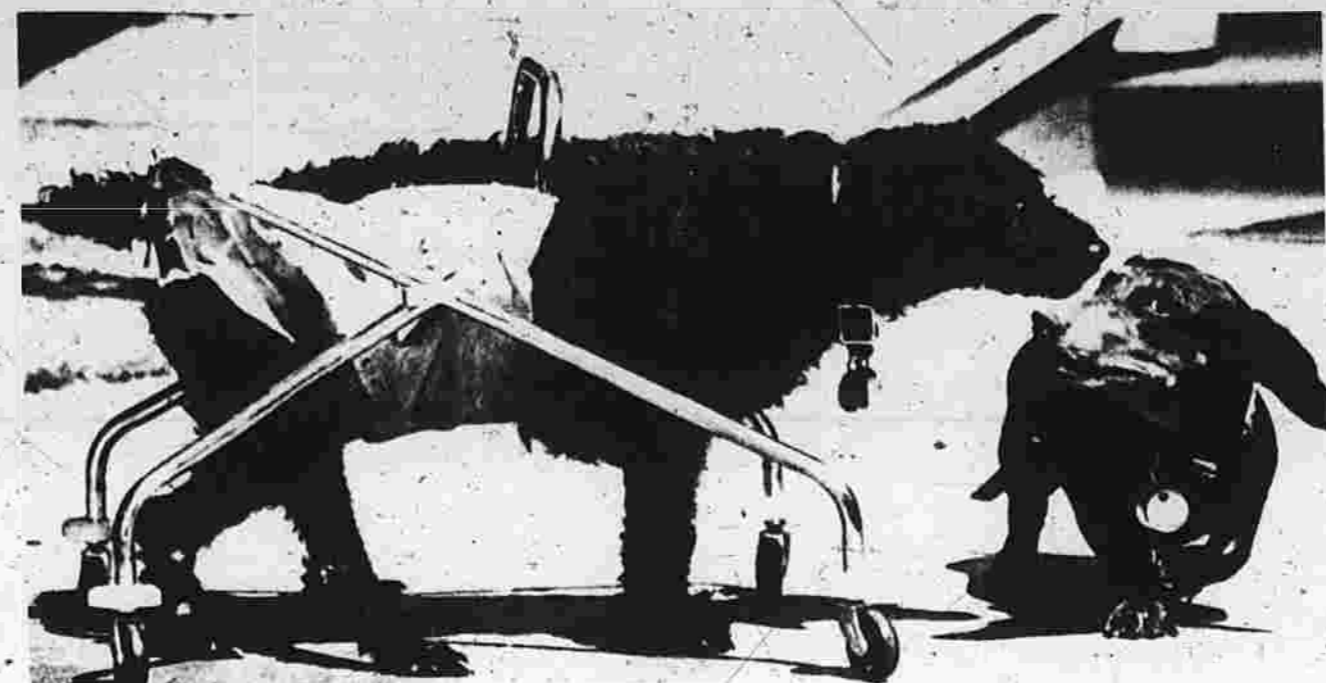

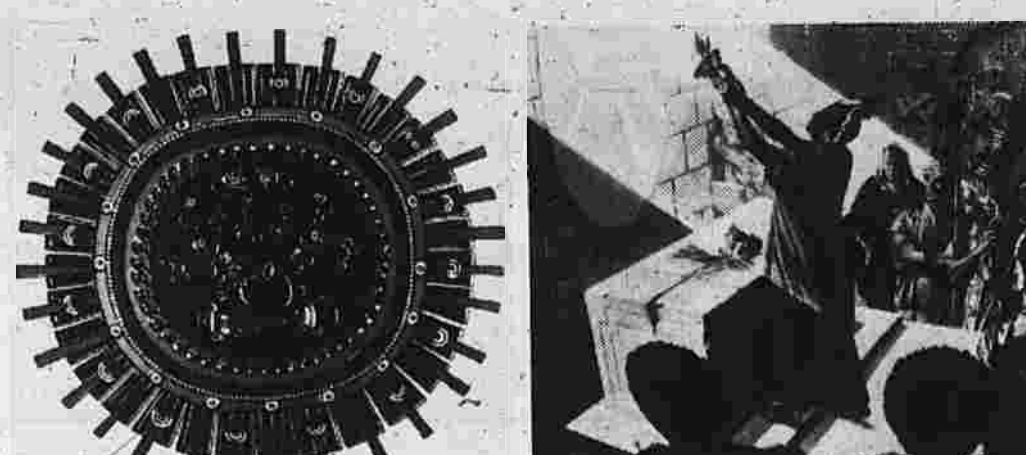

Water, Sewer Rates Raised, Hike 44% for Average User

Effective Oct. 1, users of town water will be paying an increase in their water rates and a still greater increase in their sewer service rates.

The Board of Directors last night approved a new schedule of water rates which will raise water bills by an estimated \$3 per cubic foot for an average family of four (using about 2,400 cubic feet or 19,000 gallons) of water quarterly. Water bills for larger users will show proportionately greater hikes.

In addition, the board revised sewer charges upward—to become 80 per cent of water rates. Under the old schedule, sewer charges were 75 per cent of water rates. In effect, the sewer charge hike for the same average family of four is just over 60 per cent.

Under the old schedule, the average homeowner paid \$1.10 for water and \$0.68 for sewer quarterly, for a combined bill of \$1.78. Under the new schedule, the average homeowner will pay \$1.77 for water and \$0.69 for sewer quarterly, for a combined bill of \$2.46. His combined water and sewer charge hike is 44 per cent.

The minimum bill, for the home using 1,200 cubic feet of water quarterly, will go from the present \$4.50 to the new \$8.86 for water, and from

Book Review

INSIDE THE THIRD REICH. By Albert Speer. Macmillan, \$12.50.

In the most fascinating account published so far of the inner workings of Hitler's regime, Albert Speer strips himself naked before the world and with incredible honesty accuses himself of frivolity, thoughtlessness and power intoxication.

THE STRANGE VOYAGE OF DONALD CROWHURST. By Nicholas Tomalin and Ron Hall. Stein and Day, \$7.95.

A true story that resembles a mystery novel, this book is an immensely detailed account of a very weird voyage.

It is this ring of honesty which lends authenticity to the diary of a man who started as an obscure architect, became Hitler's chief builder and eventually an armaments chief, the most vital link in Nazi Germany's war effort.

What had he been doing in the meantime? Surprisingly he had been sailing around Africa, into the Indian Ocean and the South Pacific, around the tip of South America and back towards England. His cryptic radio messages had given that impression. But actually it was all a hoax. He had been wandering all his life had to be the center of attention. His preparations for the race were botched and incomplete when the sailing deadline came, but he could not back out without losing face.

He pictures Hitler as the genial and relaxed leader during the early years of his reign, but by 1937 had turned into a "fear-bidding despot with few human relationships."

The authors have overread the psychological factors that led their narrative. In seeking to become completely irrational, they have compiled too much detail, and only a patient reader can get through it all.

Most enlightening is his story about Germany's plans for an atom bomb and how this project was scuttled by the autumn of 1942, contrary to the popular belief that Germany's atom bomb research was in high gear until the end of the war.

What it all comes down to is an interesting study in a frustrating drama of the sea.

Speers' analysis of Hitler must be judged as one of the most important contributions to contemporary history, in fact so should the entire book.

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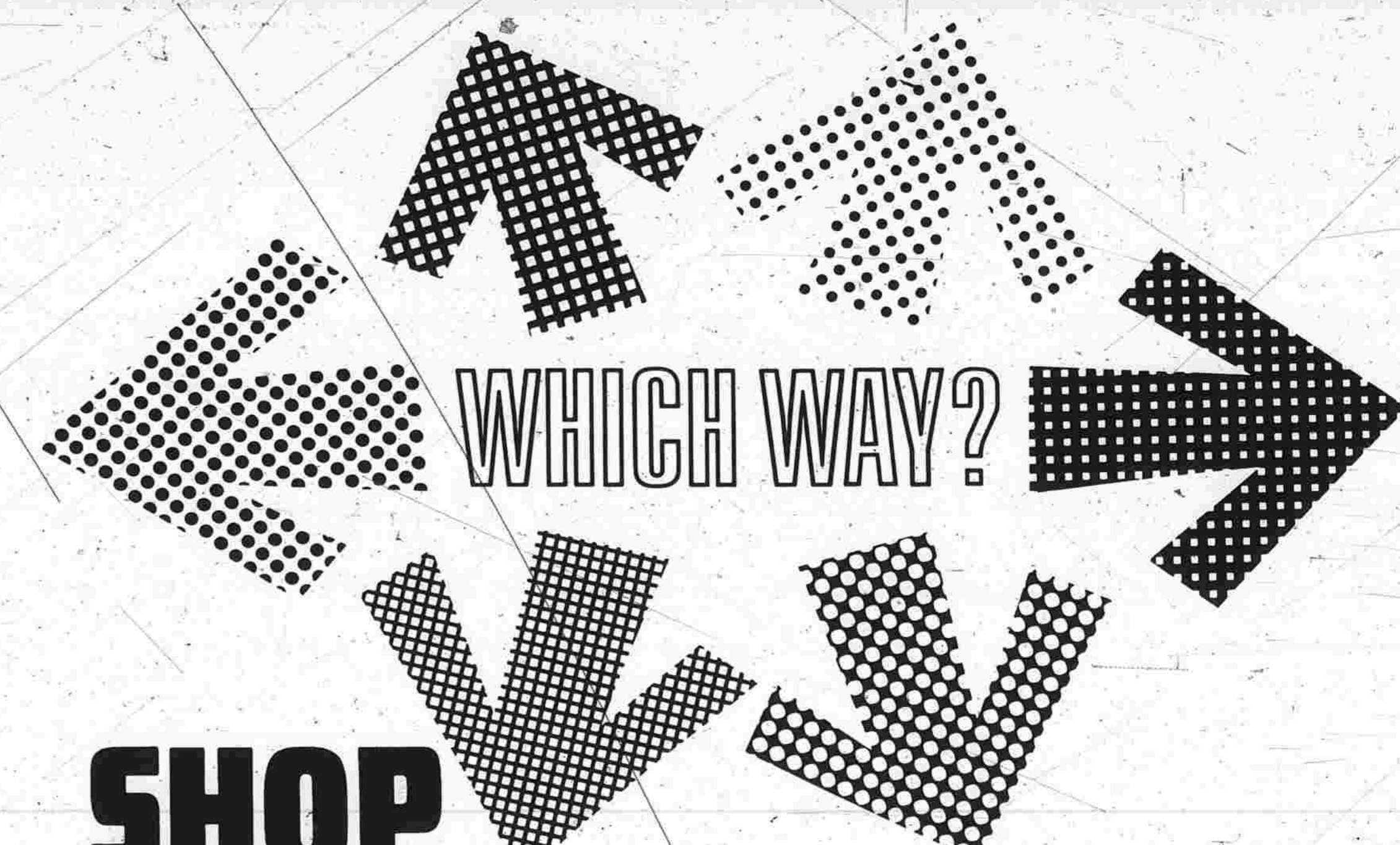

Interracial Couple Working To Educate Racism Out of U.S.

JOY STILLEY, AP Newsfeatures Writer, NEW YORK (AP) — They might have been any young couple sitting side by side on a sofa in the lobby of a midtown Manhattan hotel — except that the hand the man placed protectively over his wife's was white, and hers was black.

Good looking, clean-cut Mel Leventhal and petite and pretty Mrs. Leventhal, who is writer Alice Walker, were in New York to discuss her new novel, "The Third Life of Grange Copeland." The conversation turned more to what life is like for an interracial couple in Jackson, Miss., and to the American social problem.

"You have to remember marriage is first of all a marriage and not a curiosity," Mrs. Walker said. "We're not here to pry about ourselves in Jackson. I would like to live somewhere where we could hold hands on the street," she added wittily, "but Mel's work is there and I believe in what he's doing."

Her husband, a civil rights attorney, is associate counsel of the NAACP Legal and Educational Defense Fund and works primarily on desegregation cases. "I'm convinced I've got to get to the children before they're taught hate and prejudice," Leventhal declared. "Otherwise it becomes so much a part of them that it can't be educated out."

"Mel works day and night; he's always filing lawsuits," his wife said proudly. "But it's not so much to black people that you have to take everybody to court in order to get them to stop hating."

At 26, Miss Walker has made her way from a sharecropper's shack in Eitzen, Ga., where she was born, through a scholarship at prestigious Sarah Lawrence College, to her post as a professional writer. Her work has appeared in numerous publications including "The Best Short Stories by Negro Writers" and she has published a book of poems, "Once," in addition to the new novel.

"I had to clarify for myself the impact of oppression — what it can do and what a man lets it do," she said of her book about three generations of a southern black family. "Some people find it hard to hang on and be loving. The great challenge is that you don't give in."

She thinks many of the changes in these three generations are superficial, though she concedes that thanks to the civil rights movement black people have more self esteem.

"It helps your self esteem not to have to sit in the back of the bus, to be able to go into a store or restaurant. Blacks are acquiring a sense of self but not just enough to suit me," she said firmly.

"I feel deeply that white Americans generally are as bad as they ever were — racist, lack-

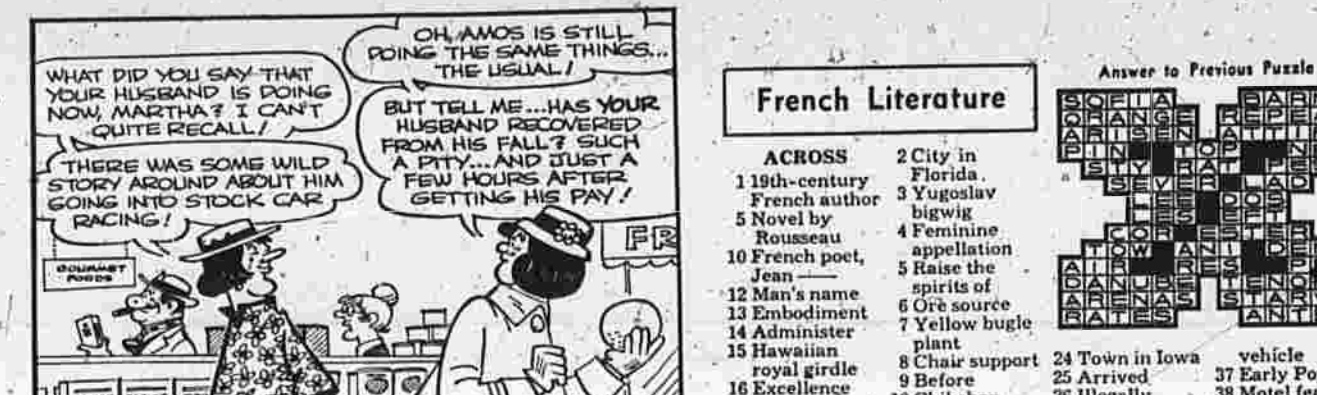
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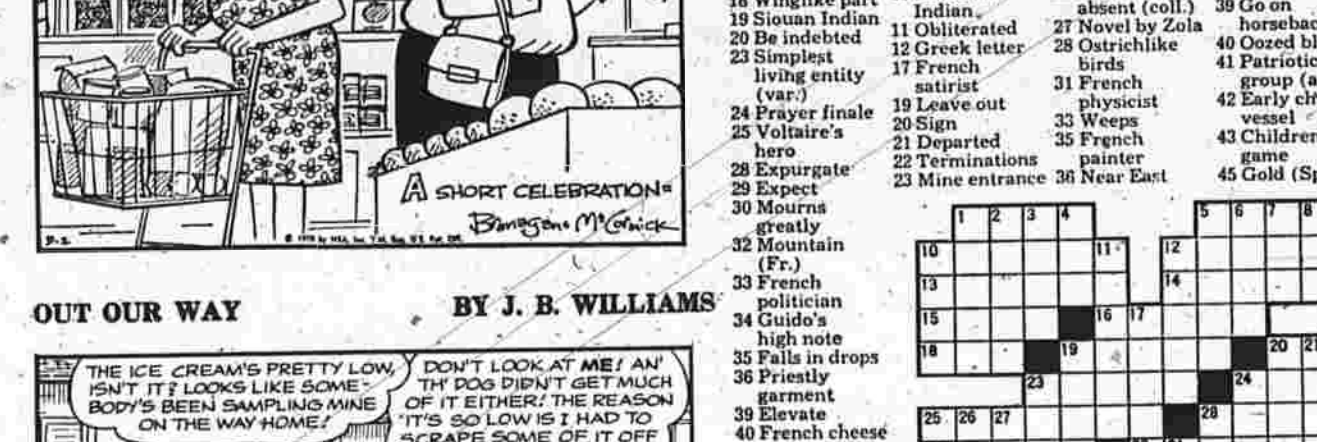

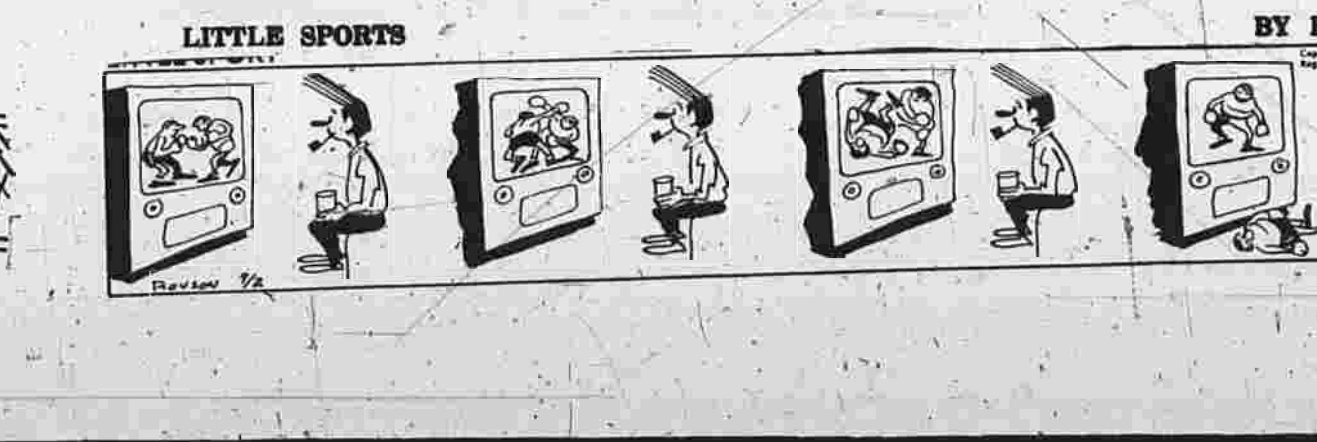
