The hijackers forced it for the release of the earlier jetliner.

The Jordanian army chief of staff, Maj. Gen. Amrour H. B. al-Dabbas, announced today he has issued an order to all guerrillas and Jordanian troops to halt shooting in the area of the Jordan Inter-continental Hotel, the temporary home of the 122 women and children released by the guerrillas. The order also instructed all guerrillas to halt shooting in the area of the hotel.

Jet Crashes At Kennedy; Eleven Dead

A Boeing 707, carrying 107 passengers and crew, crashed today at Kennedy International Airport in New York. The plane was on a flight from London to New York. Eleven people were killed in the crash. The cause of the crash is still under investigation.

Officials Bid To Head Off Rail Walkout

Government officials resumed attempts with railroad union leaders to head off a threatened nationwide rail strike set for shortly after midnight tonight. Officials are offering a \$1.5 million wage increase to avert the strike.

In South Vietnam: Viet Cong Steps Up Attacks; Advance Expected on Coast

North Viet Cong forces fired 85 mortar shells at an American base in South Vietnam. The Viet Cong also stepped up attacks on the coast, capturing several small towns. The South Vietnamese government is expected to advance on the coast.

So much has been made, in the past, of the supposed inability of Communist parties and causes to win votes in free elections that it is perhaps only appropriate that there should now be considerable emphasis on news and comment of a Communist victory in Chile.

It is indeed, as is being said, the first instance in Latin America in which a Communist head of state has been chosen in a free election.

But that concession, standing alone, does not reflect the whole truth.

What happened in Chile was a plurality, not a majority victory, not for the Communist party, but for a coalition ticket which had been put together behind the Communist candidate.

And this coalition ticket managed to come out victorious by obtaining only 36.3 per cent of the popular vote cast that day, which was only 1.4 percentage points higher than the vote obtained by the independent candidate the far right had in the field.

In gaining its 36.3 per cent, or minority vote victory, the Communist coalition had the unusual advantage of support from a Catholic political party which originated out of sympathy for Dictator Franco in Spain but which has since evolved itself into a group of left wing Catholic revolutionaries.

Finally, the victory for Communism in Chile was less a victory for one brand of Communism—the Russian-sponsored and relatively moderate "popular front" approach as contrasted with the more radical theory and strategy of all out revolutionary war being preached in Latin America by Cuba and Communist China.

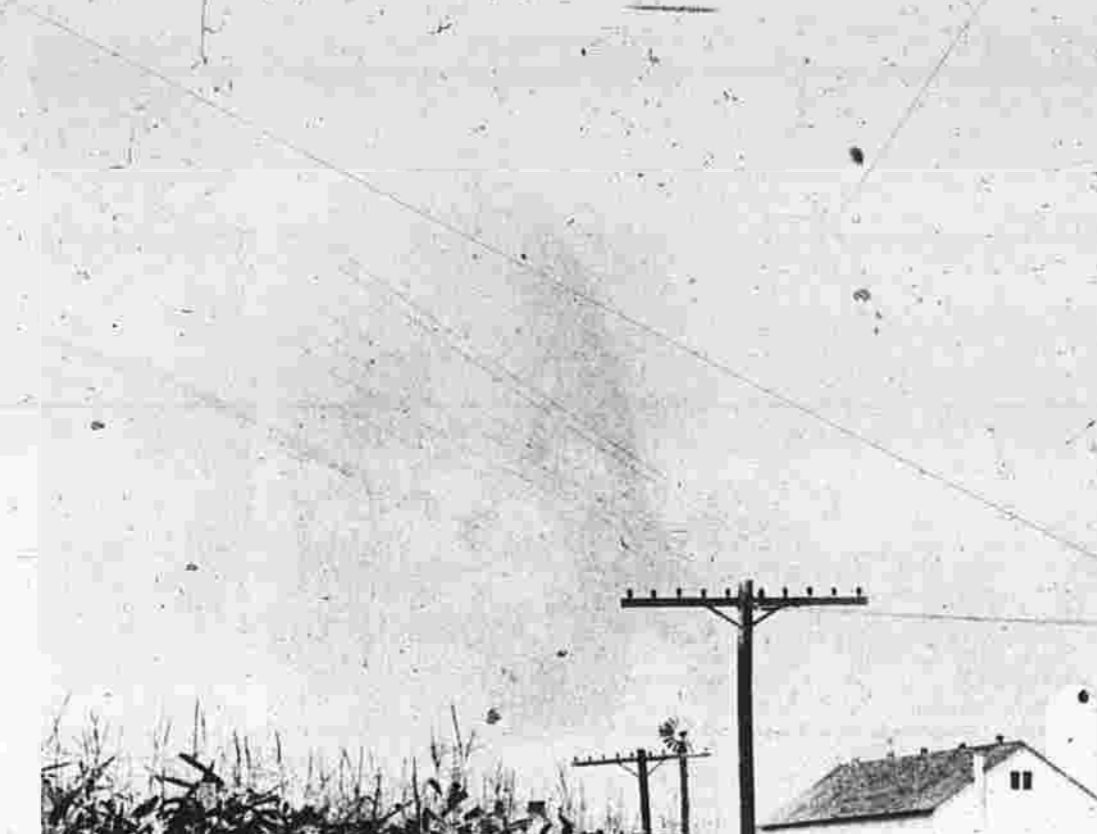

He said the equipment Thailand wanted left behind included, planes, helicopters, communications equipment and guns.

Asked if the United States would bequeath some of its Thai-based F4 Phantom II's to the Thai air force, Thanom said instead the U.S. would replace the aging Thai F5s with more modern aircraft.

### School Savings Plan

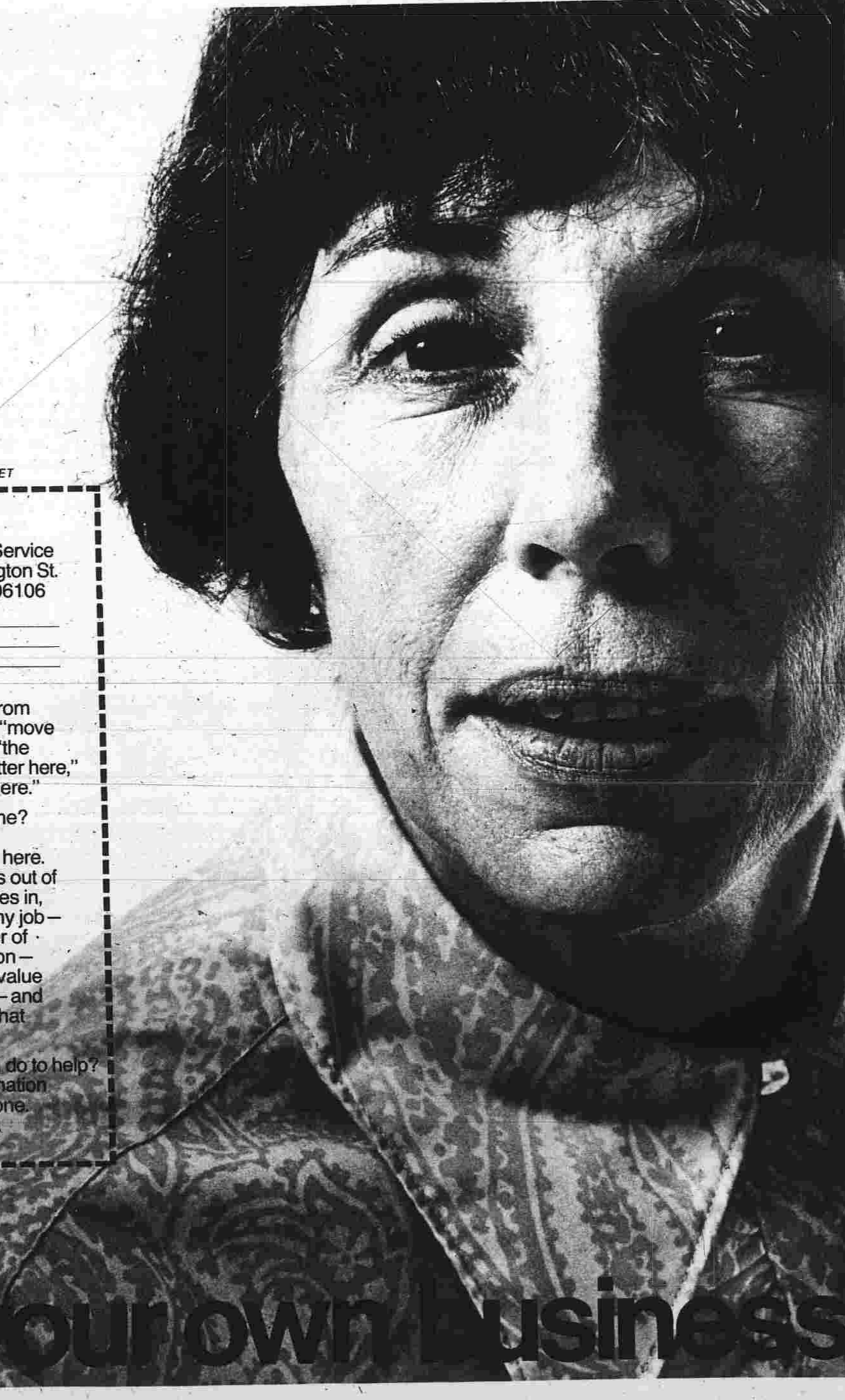

**Profit-Takers Thrive On Market Tumult**

NEW YORK (AP) — One of the riskier occupations on Wall Street these days is that of the profit-taker.

Simply put, the profit-taker is the short-term trader. He's the one who buys a stock one day and sells it right away or as soon as the stock has gone up enough for him to cash in. It doesn't usually make money by itself.

The job takes patience, a strong set of nerves and a sense of adventure.

"They're in it for the excitement, not for the long pull. It's like betting at a lot of 20 windows rather than at the 500 window," says one long-time Wall Street observer.

The profit-taker is an elusive as it's also called, is a perfectly legitimate enterprise for a fund analyst credit him with quite a punch.

Over the past weeks, some brokers were saying it was the profit-takers who were keeping the closely watched Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks from rallying much beyond the 700 level. Before that, they maintained it was the profit-takers who kept the market from penetrating the 740 level after the Dow had made some sweeping advances.

Analysis says the profit-takers are generally professional traders who trade for their own accounts. These include some fast-paced mutual funds, they say if the public is involved to any extent, it's probably retired people who have the time to follow the intricacies of the market's activities continually.

According to Newton Zinder, an analyst with E. F. Hutton, the profit-taker is willing to accept a 10 per cent profit and Arthur E. Reynolds Jr., portfolio manager for Channing's fund to maintain a flexible cash position. "But for our more aggressive funds we buy more than a 10 per cent profit," Zinder explains.

The reverse is also true. A profit-taker doesn't need a rise in the market to make money. He can also ride the waves of a falling or bear market like the one of the past two years.

### Town To Mark 125th Year

## Tobacco Expert, 93, Recalls South Windsor of Yesteryear

The 125th Anniversary celebration of the incorporation of South Windsor at the Wapping Hill this year has stirred one of the town's oldest residents to recall his years spent in South Windsor.

He is 93-year-old Barney (Barney Daley) Daley of Buckland Rd. Daley escaped from Russian-ruled Lithuania when he was 19 and arrived in the United States in 1906. Young and free, he traveled from Massachusetts to Pennsylvania, working in wooden mills and coal mines before settling in South Windsor.

"There was work here and the land was good," Daley recalled, "and I liked to work outside."

Prime interest in tobacco, the most important product of this land, became his prime interest. He married Eva Petraitis in 1908, and this determined young man even asked the Bishop of the Catholic Church to relax a church rule for the wedding.

The bans of marriage in the church are normally announced three consecutive Sundays, but Daley was in a hurry. It was harvest time for tobacco. The bans were announced three times on Aug. 8, and Daley married Miss Petraitis the following day, had no honeymoon, and went to his job.

He still speaks of Mrs. Daley, who died in 1960, with a twinkle in his eye, reminiscing how friends and neighbors came around for her homemade whiskey for weddings and affairs. "It was the best there was and so was the wife," he said.

"To work a 16-hour day wasn't unusual for Daley who was employed as a part-time janitor at the Rye Street School (now an apartment house) and as an engraver on the Harry Farnham tobacco plantation. His day began at 3 a.m. every day. He also worked for Marcus Floyd, the first man to introduce shag-brown tobacco into South Windsor, and for the Hartman Tobacco Company of Manchester.

Tobacco expert Daley said he was an expert on tobacco. He planned by hand, tied, cut, hung, striped and sorted this product until age 80, when a triple operation forced him into retirement. He was sent to Southern Wisconsin to learn more about this crop, but instead, showed the men there one of his methods for sorting which was readily adopted.

In the early 1920's Daley acquired a general store, cracker barrel and all, on Rye St. He recalls a time during the war when there was no sugar to be had. His friend, Charles Ayers of the Ayers Soda Co. of Hartford, supplied his store with 100 sacks of sugar for the town. He is not sure who owned the first automobile in South Windsor but does recall the day the

### Law Expert Fears: Women's Rights Bill Ignores Facts of Life

By GREGG HERRINGTON Associated Press Writer

WASHINGTON (AP) — A proposed constitutional amendment guaranteeing equal rights for women simply ignores the facts of life, Congress was told today by the Harvard Law School professor.

For example, Paul Freund, dean of the Harvard Law School, said different life insurance rates for men and women based on life expectancy could be judged unconstitutional under the amendment.

Likewise, Freund said in testimony for the Senate Judiciary Committee, adoption of a House-passed amendment could mean segregation by sex in prisons, reform schools, public restrooms and military academies would be ruled unconstitutional.

"However noble the purpose," Freund said of the resolution, "it is hopelessly impractical to resolve all the diverse issues of classification by sex in the law. It is as if the Constitution declared 'All power to the people,' and left it at that."

At issue in the Judiciary hearings is a proposed amendment to the Constitution adopted in the House by a 50-5 vote Aug. 10. The measure had been introduced regularly in the House since 1923 but had always been killed in the House Judiciary Committee.

The resolution must be adopted by two-thirds of the Senate and 38 of the 50 state legislatures to become part of the Constitution.

Supporters of the measure are called the Equal Rights Advocates—and responsibilities—they have always mislabeled because of protective laws dealing with labor, marriage, family and even military service.

By Sen. Sam J. Ervin, D-N.C., claim it will create legal chaos by wiping out all laws that make any distinction between sexes.

Since the House action, Ervin has introduced a resolution to exempt women from compulsory military service and permit passage of any law "reasonably designed to promote the health, safety, privacy, education or economic welfare of women or to enable them to perform their duties as homemakers or mothers."

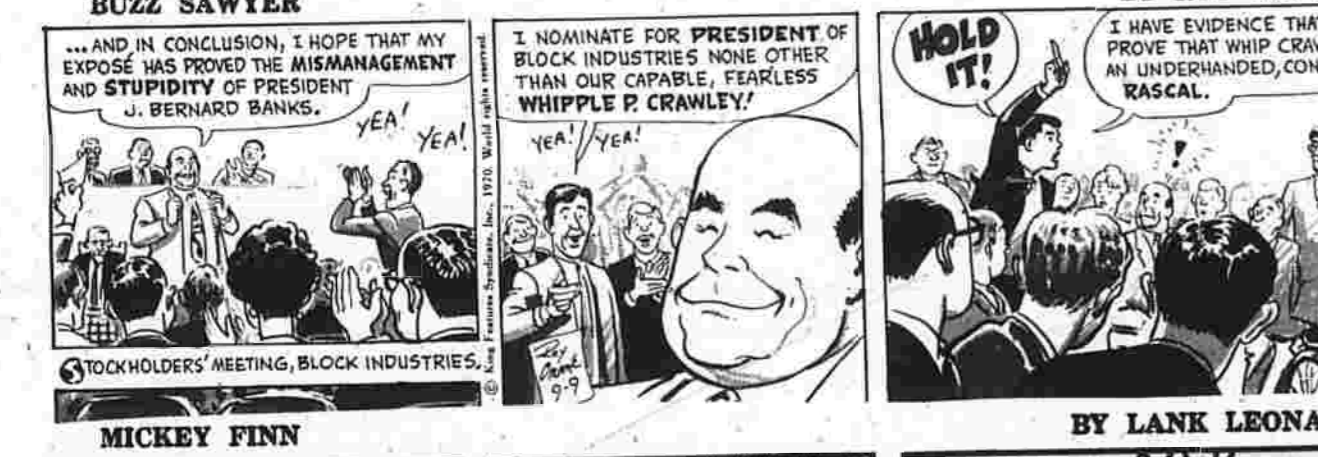

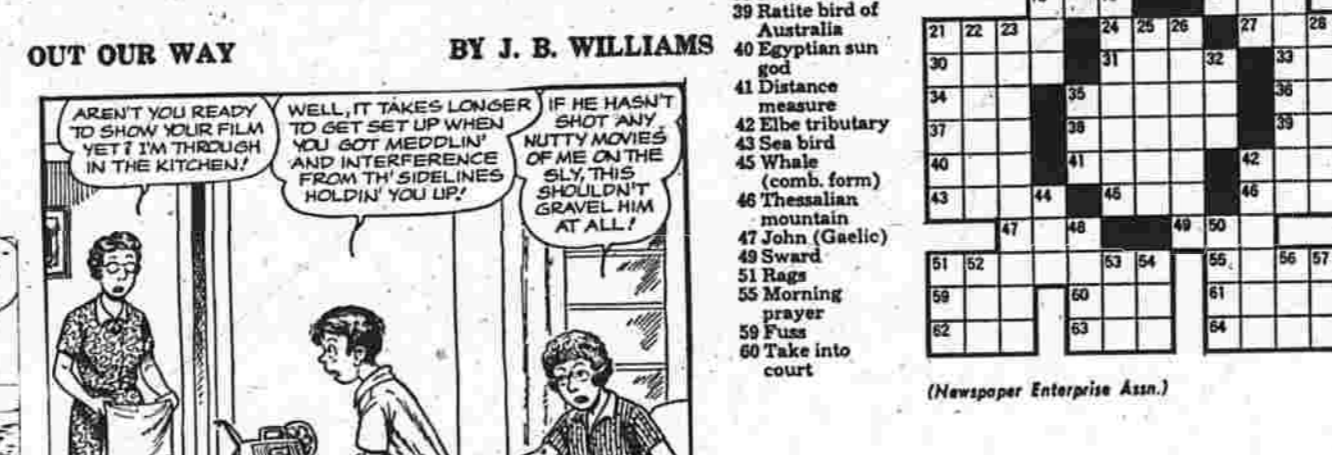
