PanAm Conducts Cabin Luggage Random Checks

EDITOR'S NOTE — Following this month's airline hijackings by Arab guerrillas, stricter probing searches of passengers and hand baggage were instituted. An AP reporter spent an evening watching the process at New York's Kennedy Airport.

NEW YORK (AP) — A weary Pan Am man Friday thrust his hand into a bag during perhaps his 20th pre-board check of the day—and grasped a bare double-edged razor blade.

Later, his thumb bandaged, he was back on the job, delicately searching over bags for the weapons a hijacker might carry aboard the 707 jet landing at the Pan Am terminal at John F. Kennedy International Airport.

The thumb injury—second such casualty at the Pan Am terminal that day—was just another incident of the emergency search procedures instituted following the plane hijackings this month by Arab guerrillas.

Pan Am was one of a number of airlines that had started random checks of baggage on Sept. 15, following the hijacking of a passenger plane before last Friday, when President Nixon ordered agents of the Bureau of Customs to assist U.S. flag-carrying airlines in checking all passengers on overseas flights.

Beginning that day, passengers leaving Kennedy New Orleans, Washington, and Boston's Dulles airports had their bags thoroughly examined. Many of them passed through metal-detecting magnetometers.

About one in 12 was subjected to a personal search. Soon, passengers using the nation's other "gate" airports will be searched in the same manner.

This means that every international air journey from the United States will begin with a stop between the twin aluminum uprights of the magnetometer, a portable device carried from state to state.

Any mass of metal—even pocket change—will activate the needle on a gauge wired to the uprights. Passengers who give high readings are frisked by customs agents who remove triggering inoffensive metal objects and usually send the passenger back through the magnetometer.

Some items—including pocket knives, scissors and even gun-shaped cigarette lighters—held by the flight's chief stewardess are inspected and inspected by customs agents, who perform the same chore in search of illegal drugs, or by airline personnel with less training or none at all.

As a final measure, a count of boarded passengers is compared with the number of tickets.

Older Man Sought As Girl's Pal

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — An older man may have been with a five-year-old girl the day she disappeared on her way home from school, police said Wednesday.

Police reported that a witness claimed to have seen the girl, Jennifer Noon, accompanied by a white male in his late fifties or early sixties. The witness, according to police, spotted the two in East Rock Park about 8:30 p.m., about the same time four other persons told police they had seen the girl in the area.

Police said the man described by the person who claimed to have seen him was between 5 feet 6 and 5 feet 9 and weighed 180 to 200 pounds. He was wearing a dirty-yellow short-sleeved pullover polo shirt and had a mustache and receding hairline.

Meanwhile, police and hundreds of volunteers scoured the East Rock area for the girl Wednesday and dragging operations were started in Mill River near the spot where four persons reported seeing the girl.

At the same time, more than 600 volunteers combed the heavily wooded East Rock area about a mile from the child's home. Many of the volunteers were students from Wilbur Cross High School, who were recruited from classes to participate in the search.

The Noon girl has been missing since Monday when she failed to arrive home during the mid-day lunch break from Worthington Hooker School. A school crossing guard, Mary Greenough, said Jennifer seemed "loose and forlorn" as she crossed the street about 11:45 a.m. Monday. 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Remote Control Cancer Therapy Machine Debuts

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — Cancer victims soon will be treated by a revolutionary system that shoots radiation into patients by remote control.

Dr. Carl F. von Eschen says he and associates at the University of California developed the system to overcome one of radiotherapy's toughest problems—getting radiation to a cancerous area without destroying intervening tissue.

"The instrument shoots small beads of radioactive cobalt into patients through thin metal or plastic tubes," he said Wednesday in an interview. "The beads are moved through the tubing and positioned at the cancer by a series of cables operated by remote control."

Development of the system took three years and was done in collaboration with Atomic Energy of Canada, Ltd., said von Eschen, professor of radiology and director of the division of radiotherapy at the University of California San Diego Medical School.

"The entire treatment takes only a few minutes," he said, "and it can be done on an outpatient basis."

"But it can also be used in other areas by introducing the tubes into the body through surgery," he added.

The cobalt beads or pellets, he said, are "about the size of a small pebble" and are positioned in the patient's body by technicians in a radiation-free area.

Von Eschen said the machine is not meant to replace systems "to complement such other forms of radiation therapy as external cobalt."

Von Eschen's machine makes its formal debut Friday. He said he expects it will be in regular use by Oct. 1.

Senate OKs Housing Bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — A \$4 billion housing bill including money for government insurance in high-risk inner cities and to help pay the debt of mass transit systems has passed the Senate.

The bill requires President Nixon to make recommendations on a national urban growth policy and authorizes money to rebuild city slums, develop new communities, increase subsidies for public housing tenants and help poor families buy and rent homes.

Passage came Wednesday night on a 69-3 vote with only Sens. Carl T. Curtis, R-Neb., and John J. Williams, R-Iowa, dissenting.

The Senate earmarked \$750 million for a five-year program of subsidies to mass transit lines. The money could be used for future deficits or for paying for equipment already in use.

The bill now goes to the House where similar legislation is nearing completion in the Banking Committee.

The Senate bill sets up a corporation to oversee development of new towns and broadens urban renewal. It carries \$25 million which the Department of Housing and Urban Development will use to salvage abandoned city housing.

The Senate adopted an amendment to remove the present 8 per cent interest ceiling on FHA home improvement loans. A separate provision lowers the required down payment on FHA-insured homes. If the bill becomes law, the down payment on a \$20,000 home, for example, would be cut from \$2,450 to \$1,950.

The new burglary-theft insurance coverage would be available to inner-city homeowners and businessmen who cannot buy private policies because of high crime rates.

Other major outlays in the bill include \$2 billion for urban renewal, \$250 million in guarantees for bonds issued to finance new towns, \$445 million for public housing subsidies, \$122.5 million for the Model Cities program, \$100 million for open-space grants, \$100 million in subsidies for poor families buying homes, and \$80 million for poor families seeking to rent apartments.

Cornell Students Stage Undie Raid

ITHACA, N.Y. (AP) — A disorder common to another era—the panty raid—has reappeared at the Cornell University campus.

Campus police said 800 male orange graduates marched on quad dormitory Baker Tower Tuesday night and called for the undies. They marched away half an hour later, many waving prizes that had been tossed out of windows by laughing women students.

Sgt. James Cunningham of Cornell's Safety Division told a university official later: "The nostalgia was unbearable. The tears were practically running down my cheeks."

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Court Averts Challenging News Source Confidence

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. (AP) — A confrontation on the claim of newspapers that they have constitutional privilege not to reveal sources of confidential information was averted in a Superior Court hearing in a drug case here Tuesday.

Judge Henry J. Naruk ruled that a reporter for the Bridgeport Post, a witness in a pre-trial hearing, did not have to answer a defense lawyer's question about the source of information.

Judge Naruk did not base his ruling on constitutional grounds but on the finding that the defense lawyer had not laid the groundwork required on the major question. The reporter, John P. Kelly, was told by the judge that his subpoena would be continued while the drug case continues.

Kelly was subpoenaed by Jacob Zeldes, a Bridgeport lawyer representing the defendant in the case. On Tuesday he requested a dismissal or a one-year continuance of the case on the ground that news stories in the Sept. 16 and 17 editions of the newspaper would prevent his client from receiving a fair trial.

The stories were based on complaints from the Narcotics Officers Association of Connecticut on alleged leniency by the courts with convicted dope sellers.

The letter was written by Darlene Police Lt. Gerald P. Kennedy, president of the association, to State Supreme Court Justice John P. Cotter, only the chief state judicial administrator.

The letter charged that the judges of Fairfield County Superior Court are doing a severe disservice to the county in that the 13 convicted dope pushers out of 128 arrests in a 12-month period, 68 were not punished with so much as a day in jail or one cent in fines.

Zeldes asked Kelly the source of the letter from which the articles in question were written. Judge Naruk ruled that Zeldes must first establish that his client's case was prejudiced by the stories and later inquire into the source of the information.

Asst. State's Atty. Thomas E. Minogue Jr. objected to the question, claiming it was irrelevant and made no difference where the reporter obtained his information.

Weather Bureau Has Hope Power 'Brownouts' to End

The Weather Bureau held out hope of relief for the power-short Middle Atlantic states today after a two-day heat wave that brought widespread "brownouts." Temperatures in the mid 80's were forecast.

Consumer cutbacks in electrical use eased the area through the second day of the critical power shortage Wednesday and the utilities did not have to resort to selective blackouts as they did Tuesday.

However, the Potomac Electric Power Co., which serves Washington and parts of Virginia and Maryland, including Baltimore, issued what it called an "urgent message" saying "an emergency exists again today."

It urged for the third day all its customers at home and work to curtail use of electricity wherever possible, turn off all air conditioners, appliances and other equipment not absolutely needed.

With the reduced demand, the utilities were able to ration available power by cutting voltage as temperatures climbed to 85 in New York, 86 in Philadelphia and 88 in Washington.

Mechanics worked overtime to repair two generators that were broken down one in Pennsylvania and another in Virginia. Their loss aggravated a shortage that stemmed in part from some units being shut down for seasonal maintenance.

The power reductions, or "brownouts" affected the area from New England to the Carolinas. Millions of people turned off lights and turned off air conditioners to cooperate with conservation plans.

The Pentagon turned off its air conditioning in midafternoon an allowed tens of thousands of employees to go home half an hour early.

Some elevators and escalators were shut down, lights were dimmed and air conditioning turned down in many office complexes including the United Nations and Rockefeller Center in New York City.

Bethlehem Steel reduced electrical usage at several of its Pennsylvania plants and the Bu-ova Watch Co. halted production at noon in five Long Island plants to help out.

A scheduled night baseball game at Baltimore between the Orioles and Detroit Tigers was

put off until today to save power. Voltage reduction began early. The Consolidated Edison Co. in New York started cutting back at 8:55 a.m. and did not restore full power until 12 hours later.

Other systems reduced voltage 8 per cent—either because they were short themselves or so they could help out by selling the extra electricity to those that were.

The utilities in the grid serving New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Salt Lake County sheriff's office Maryland and parts of Delaware, Washington, D.C. and Virginia reduced power 8 per cent early in the day.

Others taking a similar step were the Carolina Power and Light Co., Virginia Electric & Power and Duke Power Co.

The New England electric system said power plants in a six-state area reduced voltage 5 per cent to protect reserve supplies, as required by the Federal Power Commission.

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Tolland County Superior Court Withdrawal Request Of Attorney Denied

The long complicated business of legal process began yesterday in Tolland County Superior Court for the five Somers prison inmates charged with first degree murder in the death of a fellow prisoner.

Although the court docket indicated the five were scheduled to make a formal plea, they were not brought to the courthouse. Only their attorneys, all special public defenders, appeared armed with motions to be heard and argued. A few of these were decided immediately.

The accused, John Reimann, George S. Howard, Frank Williams, Paul Sundry and Wallace Holman, were indicted last month by a grand jury and charged with the July murder of 26-year-old Richard Vereas, formerly of Wetherfield, Vero was allegedly beaten in the prison warehouse and died of a fractured skull and severe brain injuries five days later.

The grand jury session lasted attracted widespread attention when it was carried out under heavy guard and with the accused barred from the courtroom except when called in individually to testify. Fear for the safety of court personnel in the wake of a courtroom tragedy in California prompted the unusual security precautions to which the defense attorneys vigorously objected.

A motion to view and photograph the premises where the alleged beating is said to have taken place was granted in all five cases. The court was told the Commissioner of Corrections who is in charge of the prison would not object, providing the viewing took place after 4:30 p.m. and not by all the attorneys and accused at once.

A request that the state hire a professional engineer to make a motion would amount to an updated drawings of the prison sanction of Williams' attitude. He said the accused "may forfeit his right to be present if there must be sufficient talent available to the state to do such a job without hiring additional help.

Assistant State's Attorney Donald Caldwell said the state would make available to the defense its drawings and sketches but the defense attorneys indicated these did not show important changes. The motion was put off for the time.

Marcus Loses In Primary

By DON MEHLE Associated Press Writer NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — Edward L. Marcus, who had his sights set on the United States Senate just a few weeks ago, was shot down Thursday as he tried to retain his seat in the State Senate.

Marcus was one of three Democratic State senators who had their seats pulled out from under them as they fought for their political survival in Democratic primaries.

The other two Senate losers were State Rep. W. Barlow of Hartford and Sen. Paul D. Amodeo of New Britain.

Marcus was knocked off by 27-year-old Joseph I. Lieberman, a liberal Republican, who had the endorsement of Joseph Duffy, the Democratic candidate for U.S. Senator.

The count in the State Senate primary was 3,602 for Lieberman to 3,267 for Marcus.

The Democratic nomination for Marcus' 11th District seat in virtually unanimous election. The district is overwhelmingly Democratic.

The same is true of the Second District, where Sen. Robert A. NAAOP official Wilber G. Smith unseated State Sen. Booc W. Barlow, 5,400 to 2,108, and in New Britain, where State Sen. Paul D. Amodeo was unseated by State Rep. Stanley J. Pace, 3,926 to 3,431.

The losses by his three state senators contrasted with victories by 19 of the 21 state representatives in the Democratic caucus.

Marcus' loss was a setback for his bid to become the first Democrat to win the U.S. Senate seat in Connecticut since 1932.

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King, Guerrilla Chief Agree To End Fighting in Jordan

By HARRY DUNPHY Associated Press Writer BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — King Hussein of Jordan and Palestinian guerrilla leader Yasser Arafat agreed today to end the bloody nine-day civil war in Jordan and Sudanese officers were assigned to help police the truce.

Friday, Jordan's King Hussein announced over Amman radio that a team of Sudanese officers was going to Iraq to "arrange for the return of normal life" in Jordan and Sudanese officers were assigned to help police the truce.

Later it was announced the Sudanese would not go to Iraq but would help supervise the cease-fire in Amman. The cancellation of Sudanese guerrilla claims that they still held Irbid.

The agreement by Hussein, Arafat and Numairi was announced over Amman radio. Only Wednesday, Arafat, head of the Palestinian Liberation Organization, had vowed to keep on fighting.

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Believed Kidnaped

MONKTON, Vt. (AP) — The search for a New York City girl believed kidnaped by her governess, a matronly Swiss divorcee found dead Tuesday from an overdose of sleeping pills, spread across three states today.

"Maybe there's somebody at a filling station, a motel, a store — somebody who remembers them," said Maj. Glen E. Davis, executive officer of the state police and coordinator of the investigation in Vermont.

"God knows we can't find anything here," Davis added. He said a massive two-day search centered around the area where the body of the governess was discovered was being called off. It had involved nearly 200 men, aided by bloodhounds, a light plane and two helicopters.

Object of the widening hunt was Leah G. Sarachik, a blue-eyed, blonde-haired 5-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Philip Sarachik of Manhattan. The parents are college professors, she is in physics and he is in chemical engineering.

The governess, Mrs. Anna M. Frolich, 56, died from "acute barbiturate intoxication," Dr. Lawrence S. Harris, state pathologist, ruled late Thursday.

A half-empty bottle of sedative was found alongside Mrs. Frolich's body, which was discovered in the back seat of a station wagon parked at the end of a tree-lined farm lane a mile from town.

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U.S. Fleet, Soviet Vessels In Step in Mediterranean

Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. 6th Fleet and its jet bombers and Marines is steaming 100 miles from the troubled Middle East with the Soviet Mediterranean squadron already here, with its reinforced battalion of 1,600 men, is positioned well to the west in the vicinity of Crete.

Fleet intelligence officers are alerting the very heavy fighting there and a mission which would be necessary to save the American people.

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Second Girl Missing In New Haven

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — Two separate search parties, as well as a search for a girl reported missing for more than 24 hours.

Police weren't speculating whether the cases were related. Searchers for one of the girls, five-year-old Jennifer Noon, found clothing belonging to her Thursday across Evergreen Avenue from a cemetery in neighboring Hamden, police said.

Police began combing the area more intensively, but apparently found little else for clues Thursday night.

The search for Jennifer was to begin at the cemetery, which has a large area of open fields, downtown New Haven along Whitney Avenue, a major road to the suburbs of Hamden and Cheshire. The cemetery is about five miles from the spot in New Haven where Jennifer was last seen.

A witness reported seeing the girl in East Rock Park here on Monday night.

Police said they were looking for a man reported to have been with the girl then—a thickly built white man in his late 50s or early 60s, between 5 feet 6 and 5 feet 9, weighing 150 to 200 pounds.

He was said to have been wearing a dirty yellow polo shirt.

The second missing girl, 10-year-old Madeline Gilmore, disappeared Wednesday night after her parents searched her and she left her home in New Haven, police said.

Police announced they were calling for volunteers for a search party for her on Saturday.

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State Department Feels: U.S. Cuba Chill To Linger Despite Return of Hijacker

By GEORGE GEDDA Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) — State Department officials express doubt the return of an alleged U.S. hijacker by Cuba Thursday will lead to a thaw in the decade-long diplomatic estrangement between the two countries.

Official sources say the action has not been accompanied by any softening of the anti-American rhetoric of Cuban policy statements.

"If anything, anti-American statements coming out of Havana have been on the increase lately," one official said. "We noticed a change for the worse starting about last April."

Nonetheless, officials were clearly pleased that Cuba had returned a hijacker. They were calling for volunteers for a search party for her on Saturday.

The United States repeatedly has made known to Cuba through independent channels its desire that hijackers be returned for prosecution. About a
