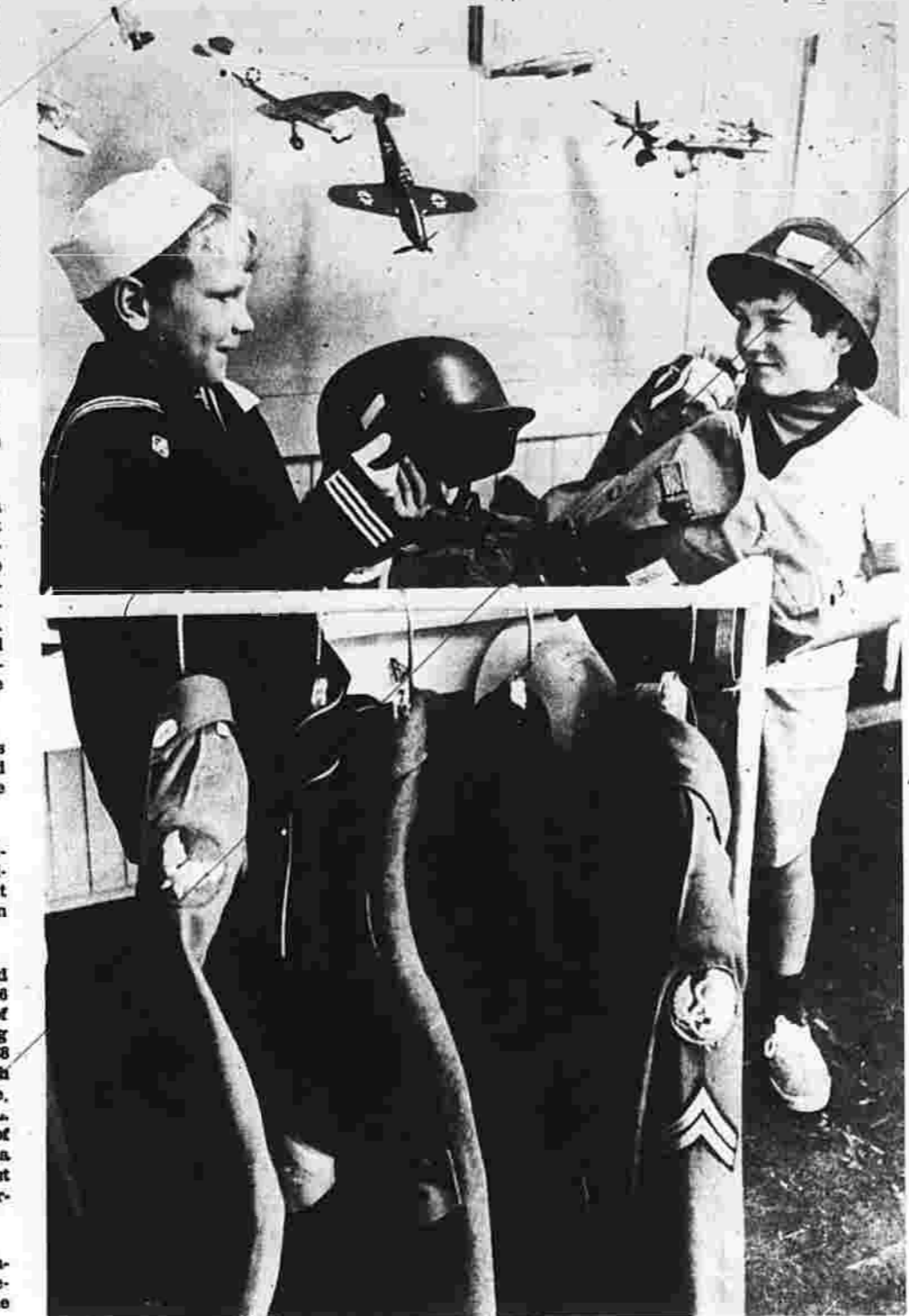

Tolland Superior Court Lack of Teen Facilities Hit in Sentencing Youth

The lack of state facilities to meet the needs of delinquent youngsters was deplored yesterday in Tolland County Superior Court.

A teen-ager Eddie L. Burns, 16, of Hartford, was being sentenced on a charge of theft of a motor vehicle and the court was told that he had built a background of trouble with the law since the age of 12.

The latest incident amounted to a "joyride" according to Douglas B. Cady, 19, and James R. Bitts, 21, based on their ages and criminal records. Bitts received a total sentence of two to six years in prison on five counts to which he had previously pleaded guilty, including binding with intent to commit robbery and theft of a motor vehicle, matting with intent to disfigure, robbery with violence and aggravated assault.

Two Williamstown men were sentenced for the hearing in July of University of Connecticut professor of art Raymond F. Hitchcock. In recommending State's Attorney Robert J. Pigeon said the vicious beating may have resulted in serious brain damage to the victim. He said he was recommending different sentences for the two men.

Bombs Blast Three Sites

Bomb explosions heavily damaged a National Guard Army and a county courthouse in California today and damaged the inside of Air Force and Navy ROTC facilities at the University of Washington.

Part of a wall was blown back and windows knocked out at the army on Santa Barbara. The county courthouse in San Rafael, where a judge was taken hostage and shot to death Aug. 7, was damaged by a bomb apparently planted in a locker.

Two of the blasts were preceded by telephoned warnings to authorities that a wall were about to go off.

The explosions came just two days after representatives of the radical group the Weathermen said that a "fall offensive" would soon be launched.

At a press conference in New York on Tuesday, a recording said to the voice of Bernardine Doherty, a Westernman fugitive leader, said an offensive to disident youth will be held in Santa Barbara, California, back to Kent and Boston.

Nixon Visit To State Expanded

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — Some 20 news and broadcast executives from 14 northern states have been invited here for a foreign policy briefing from President Nixon Monday.

Nixon's press secretary, Ronald Ziegler, announced plans for the President to fly to Hartford for the briefing and for the dedication of a new Italian community center in Stamford.

Stanford Mayor Julius M. Wilensky said Ziegler had told him Monday that he would be in Stamford at about 3 p.m., after the visit to Hartford.

According to Ziegler, the briefing in Hartford will complete a series in which the President will have spoken to news executives from all 50 states about foreign policy.

The briefing series began in San Clemente, Calif., New Orleans and Chicago.

Yale Staff, Expenses To Be Cut

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — In a memorandum from President Kingman Brewster, Yale University's faculty members and department heads have been warned to expect "sizeable reductions in the current staff and expenditures."

Although the memorandum doesn't say who will be laid off or precisely when, it says the university is going to have to trim its spending during the 1971-72 academic year in order to survive off a financial crisis.

New hiring and spending guidelines, it indicates, will be drawn up by the time that the 1971-72 year begins next June.

The university has already put into effect a freeze on new hiring or filling of positions.

Dr. Brewster's memorandum discusses problems to be faced by the university in the coming year.

The meeting was scheduled, he said, for Oct. 10.

Nixon Offers Peace Plan; Cong Rejects Proposals

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon has proposed a five-point plan to end the Vietnam war but the proposals — including a standstill cease-fire throughout Indochina and a new international conference to negotiate peace for Southeast Asia — were rejected by the Viet Cong.

"Our side is ready to stand still and cease firing," Nixon told a national television and radio audience in a speech from the White House Wednesday night. He urged the Viet Cong to start serious negotiations promptly.

But the chief North Vietnam delegate to the Paris peace talks, Ambassador Xuan Thuy, denied the Nixon proposal to standstill, describing it as "an electoral gift certificate."

The real significance of the proposal was "unacceptable," he said, because it meant a halt to serious negotiations.

The Viet Cong delegation said: "The real significance of the proposal is that they are simply at negotiating for the United States the right to commit the United States to a Vietnam war that is to prolong and intensify the war to impose the yoke of U.S. neocolonialism on the Vietnamese people."

She added the Nixon speech did not reply seriously to the "concrete questions" contained in the Viet Cong's Sept. 17 "peace initiative" and then rejected each of the five points the President outlined.

The White House said the initial Communist reaction to the Nixon's new peace proposal was "unacceptable," noting that sometimes the initial response is not the final response.

Presidential press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler said the administration hopes the North Vietnamese will "give serious, thoughtful consideration to the proposal and consider it in the same spirit in which it was announced. But the toll for the South Vietnamese increased 40 percent over the week before, and enemy casualties went up sharply.

At one point in the 12-minute speech he offered to negotiate "an agreed timetable" for troop withdrawals from South Vietnam without specifying removal of North Vietnamese forces as a condition. But aides said Nixon was talking about a schedule for removing North Vietnamese as well as U.S. and allied forces.

He also called for immediate reports to their families. The summary reported a total of 43,775 Americans killed in 1969, and 1,424 missing or captured in the war since Jan. 1, 1961.

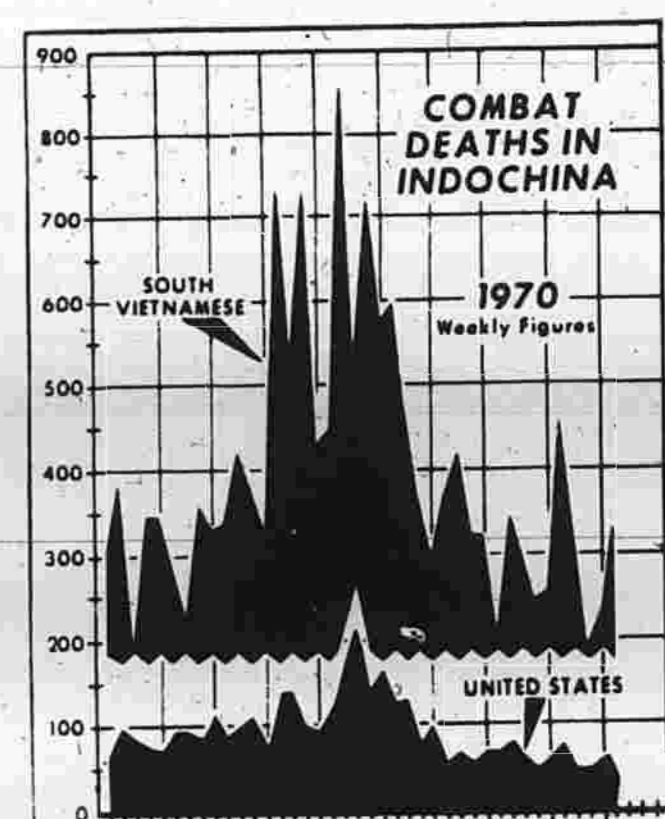

Marcus Reports His Primary Bid Cost \$278,629

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — The unsuccessful bid for the Democratic U.S. Senate nomination that State Sen. Marjorie Leader Edward L. Marcus waged last spring and summer cost \$278,629, Marcus reported Wednesday. And, he said, he was left with a \$102,873 deficit.

The report was made to the secretary of the state's office here. The expenses included both primary election and pre-convention spending.

Marcus first lost the convention's backing to Alphonso J. Donahue of Stamford. But both Marcus and the Rev. Joseph Duffey were able to get enough delegate votes to qualify for a primary. Duffey won the primary, Donahue came in second, and Marcus was third.

Donahue, a Stamford millionaire, reported earlier that his campaign had cost \$751,000, with \$674,000 of that coming from his own pocket. Duffey is not required to file his campaign expenses until after the Nov. 3 general election.

Marcus had predicted earlier that he would spend \$120,000 on the campaign but explained Wednesday that the estimate did not include the intensive campaigning he had done before the convention.

Much of the outlay by Marcus was for television, radio, newspaper and billboard advertising. He also spent thousands on dinner meetings with delegates to the state convention.

According to Wednesday's report, Marcus contributed \$25,000 of his own money to the campaign and his wife, Phyllis, put up another \$5,000.

Other big contributors listed were Audrey Bailey, \$9,833; Robert Bailey, \$8,900; Daniel Cosgrove, \$7,000; Adele Small, \$5,000; Herbert Small, \$5,000; Ross Eisner, \$6,000; and Dr. Ronald Alderman, \$5,000.

Marcus was assessed with an additional expense of \$25 for filing his financial report after the mandatory deadline had passed.

Home Towners Jolt Altolobello

MERIDEN, Conn. (AP) — Henry Altolobello, the Democratic State Central Committee secretary who has said he will support Sen. Thomas J. Dodd for re-election, was given a verbal slap Wednesday by six Democrats prominent in his home town.

Altolobello was mayor here from 1963 to 1969.

In a statement, the six said they would support Joseph Duffey, the Democratic candidate for Dodd's seat. Dodd has bolted the Democratic party to run as an independent.

The men said they "noted with amazement" Altolobello's decision to support Dodd.

The statement was signed by John Kramer, Democratic town chairman; State Reps. Patsy Meskita, Edward Iwanicki and John Papandreas; James Gaffney, candidate for state representative, and State Sen. Anthony Miller.

"It would have been easier for us to understand his position," they wrote, "if he had steadfastly supported Dodd during the recent campaign."

"However," they continued, "Altolobello made no secret of his whole-hearted support for Alphonso Donahue in his quest for the Democratic Senate nomination."

"On numerous occasions, Altolobello has reiterated the necessity of Democrats supporting both party-endorsed candidates and party nominees," the statement read. "His present actions and statements can only lead us to believe that because his candidate for U.S. Senate was not elected by Democratic voters he refused to adhere to his own 'standards.'"

The group concluded, "at this point we wish to re-affirm our support for the candidacy of Joseph Duffey and request all our friends to join with us in electing our Democratic No. 2."

Altolobello said Wednesday he "could not in good conscience" support Duffey because he did not "believe in his principles or philosophy."

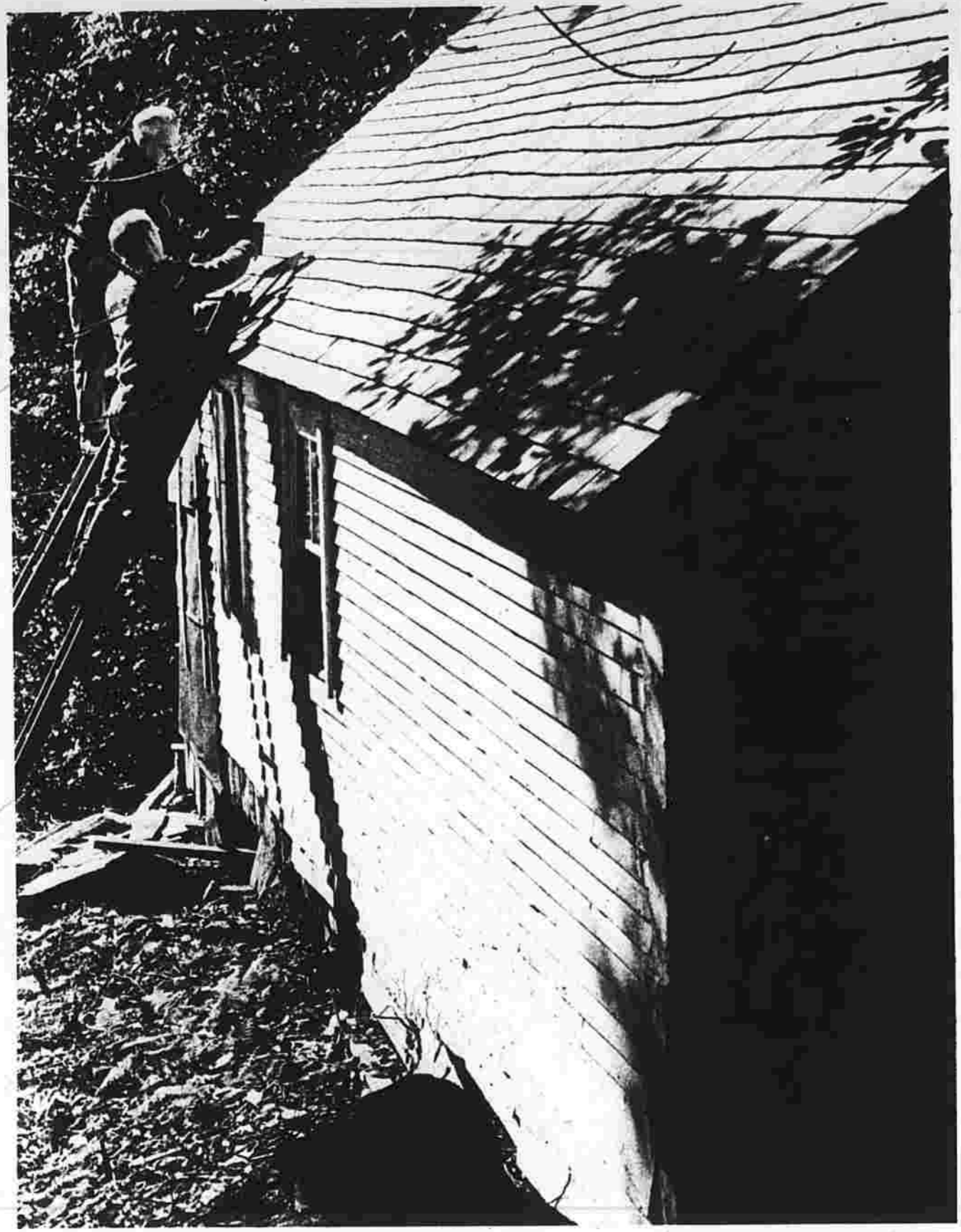
Crash Kills Boy At Woodbridge

Historical Society Sets Antique Sale To Finance Schoolhouse Restoration

By ANNE EMT (Herald Correspondent) Hebron residents will get a chance to recall the days of the one room schoolhouse, when the town's Historical Society completes its restoration job on the Burrow's Hill Schoolhouse.

To finance their goal, members are holding an antique show and sale this Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. at Rham High School, Rt. 88. However, the restoration is already underway. Attempts have been made in previous years by interested residents to restore the building, which according to one tradition was built in the early 1700's.

Back in Dec. 21, 1941, the Hartford Courant carried an article by Adelle White, a Hebron resident and a teacher in the school in the 1890's, to which the following editor's note was attached:

"During the past year, much interest among the residents of Hebron has centered around the more than 100 year old Burrow's Hill Schoolhouse. For 20 years now, it has been idle and only within the past few months has there been any attempt made by public-spirited townspeople to restore it against the malapropos of weather."

According to Mrs. White, "in the early days of the school, a church building was erected at the foot of the south hill and at 79 shows that the salaries of 11 teachers for the school year was built, owned and operated by Daniel Burrows, who the neighborhood was called Burrow's Hill." The schoolhouse was erected here on the property where "Frogg's Rock" stands.

Dr. according to another tradition, five young wives who had left behind in Whitsett decided to join their husbands who had gone ahead to establish a settlement.

Night overtook them and they huddled down at the highest point of ground they could find, "Frogg's Rock." Their walls were heard by their husbands who came to the rescue. Then the couples decided to settle there.

Two conflicting reports exist as to whether or not the Burrow's Hill Schoolhouse was the first school in town. Mrs. White's article claims that it was and that it was built by the young settlers mentioned above and others who arrived later. However, Mrs. Della P. Hill, another Hebron resident, mentioned in an article in the Northville Record dated Jan. 9, 1944,

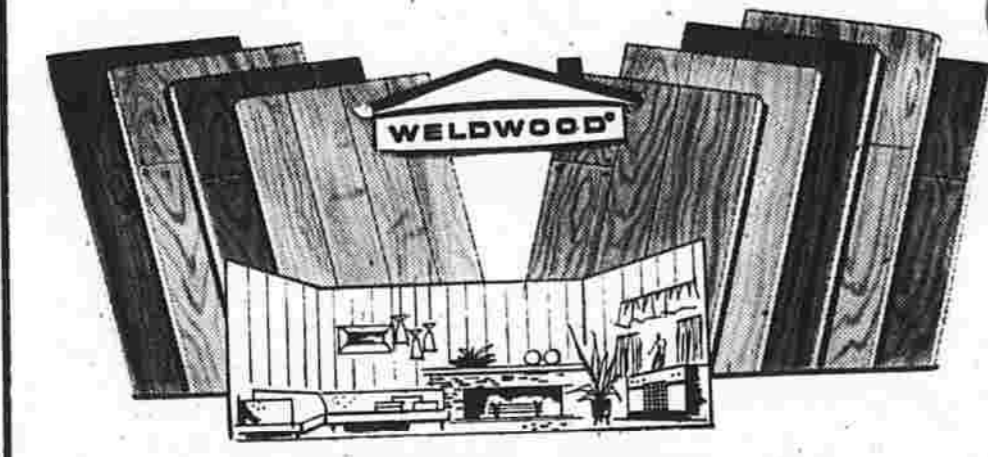

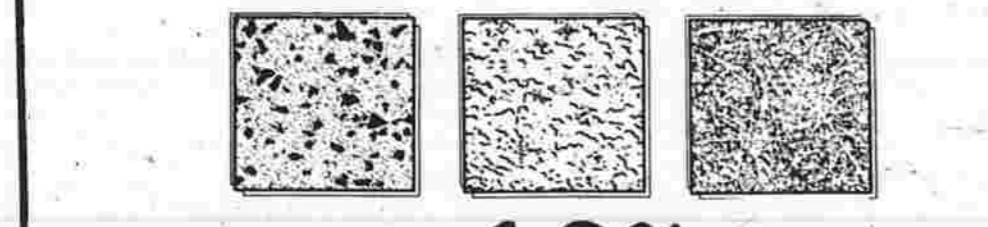

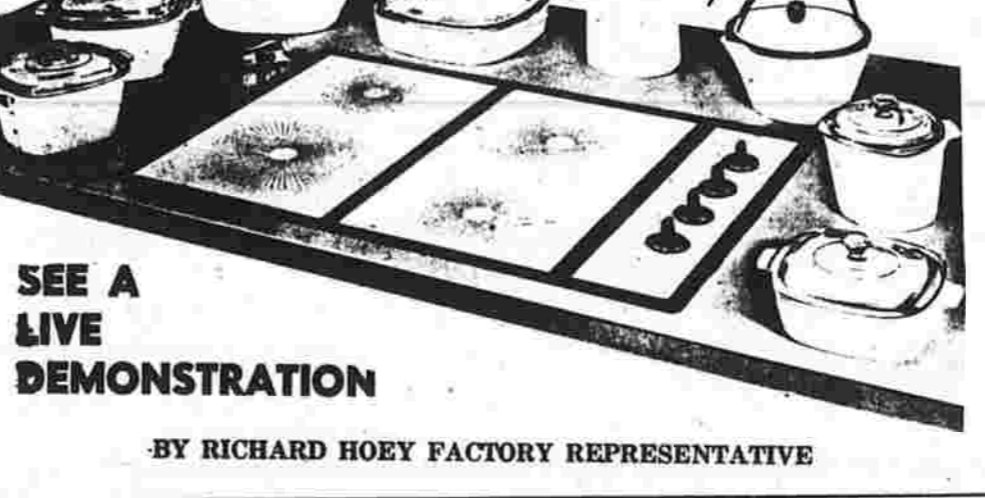

Nature Battles Economists In Fight to Hold Prices

NEW YORK (AP) — Bugs, blight and bad weather are likely to prove formidable opponents of Washington economic strategists attempting to produce a slowing in the rate of price increases.

Other words, that old conflict of man against nature is likely to lead to the loss of some battles on the pricing front even if the war against inflation is won. The critical area involves food prices.

Some of the strongest opposition to anti-inflation efforts is coming from the South. Here, blight, a fungus disease that already has ruined hundreds of millions of bushels of corn in the South and Midwest.

The corn borer is lending a hand in the destruction, and warm, humid weather in some areas is assuring the blight's spread through additional millions of bushels still in the fields.

Farmers desperately are harvesting crops in advance of anticipated dates so as to avoid further damage. But the destruction already done seems certain to force up prices of many items in which grains are an ingredient.

The record so far is this: On July the government estimated the corn crop would reach a record yield of 4.8 billion bushels. A month later the estimate was reduced to 4 billion because of hot, dry weather in some areas.

By Sept. 1 the Agriculture Department had dropped its estimate all the way down to 4 billion bushels, a decline of 9 percent since that estimate on July 1, largest as a result of spreading corn blight.

The biggest shock was still to come. Late last week the government reported a further 9 percent cut in the expected harvest, reducing the official estimate all the way down to 4.2 billion bushels.

In just three months, based on official estimates, some 600 million bushels of corn appear to have been destroyed. Not only the harvest but less than a year ago, meaning that large users of corn will find it difficult to substitute other grains for their lowered stocks of corn.

The impact, therefore, could be felt in the prices of almost all grains, and even in the price of livestock. Higher feed grain prices might lead to price increases for hogs and broilers and cattle.

Cash prices for corn at Chicago this week, though lower than during the late summer, were more than \$1.40 a bushel, about 20 cents higher than a year ago. What was more than \$1.50 compared with another car operated by Robert R. Darling, also 47, of Middletown, Conn., police said a year earlier. Darling was pronounced dead at the scene. FTC Studies Credit Card Protection

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Trade Commission today proposed new regulations aimed at providing a new eye for credit card users and deferred payment plan customers.

The proposals are subject to the outcome of hearings now scheduled for Jan. 25, and to responses by businessmen.

The regulations are aimed at cutting down on the flourishing stolen credit card business. They would require a business from billing its customers with disputed charges until the business has investigated the case and informed the customer of its findings.

They also would require retail stores, gasoline service stations, travel and entertainment credit card agencies, and banks and other credit dealers to post finance and similar charges to a customer's account if the dispute is settled in his favor.

Credit card concerns would be required to notify a customer before giving adverse credit information to any other party.

The regulations also would require sellers to mail statements at least 21 days before imposing a finance or service charge for non-payment. And customers would be credited with payment if the date the payment was actually received.

Overpayments would be refunded unless the seller discovered the error. If the error was not discovered until after the payment was made, the seller would be required to refund or credit to the customer's account.

The proposed regulations also would require that statements list the name, address and phone number of a person authorized to receive customer inquiries about adjustments in bills.

Even though the various polls being taken for the various candidates may differ in their results, the good pollster never proves conclusively that the candidate or party lifting him has already lost the election irrevocably—they all usually cover one factor on which they are considered fairly reliable.

There have, over the years, been some weird results put down in the "recognition level" statistics. There were once, for instance, a few unbelievable characters in the state who never heard of Chester Bowles, even after he had been Governor of the state for two years.

Conversely, but not quite logically, a report of the opposite character—namely that such and such a candidate is a very high recognition factor—always spreads great good cheer in a candidate's soul.

And his own natural instinct to think fairly well of himself suggests to him that the people who know him that well must like him too.

In the Democratic primary for the Senatorial nomination last summer, there was talk that Ed Marcus, by his unrelenting bombardment of the state's newspapers, had reduced the importance of the recognition factor to its proper proportion.

Recognition, in this case, obviously runs all the way from the faintest of recognition to an opportunity to speak at the polls to a sense of shock at the fact that the candidate's name is even being considered favorably by some Connecticut voters.

Still, it is better to be known by the voters, even if in contemptuous fashion, than not to be known at all. No one can deny the recognition factor a certain importance.

And when you pray, do not be like the show-offs! They love to stand up and pray in the synagogues and on the street corners so that everybody will see them. Remember this: They have already been paid in full.

Marland Denies Labor Charges In Senate Test

WASHINGTON (AP) — Dr. Sidney P. Marland, President Nixon's choice to be U.S. Commissioner of Education, has sharply denied an A.P.L.C.I.O. charge that he is part of an "in-house" union.

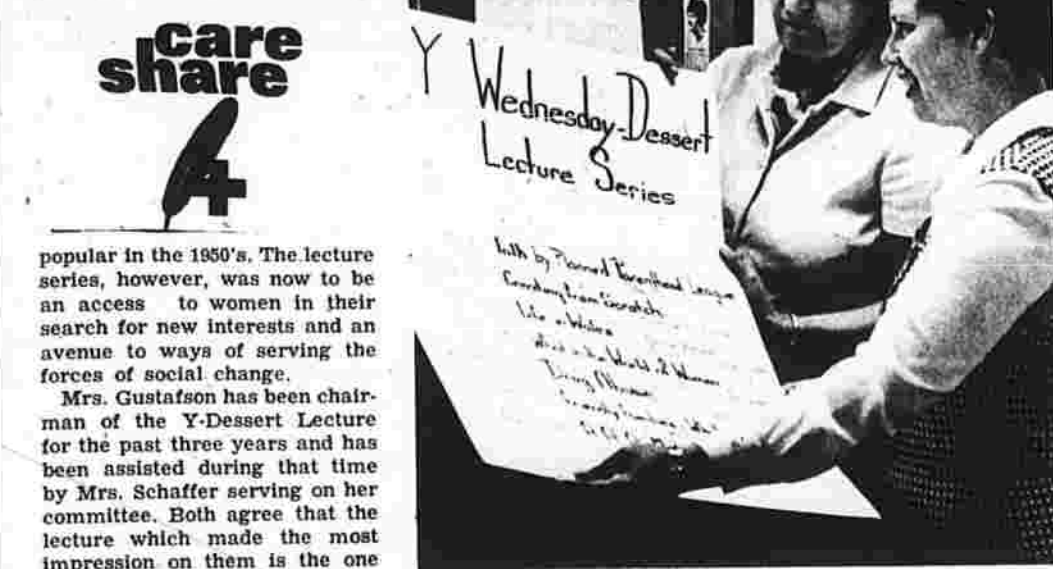

Drinking Drivers Target of Nixon

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Nixon has recommended that Congress give the highest priority to control of drunk drivers on the nation's highways.

In reports to the Congress on 1969 traffic and highway safety, the President said "no program is more important than one seeking to control the problem of drunk driving, which accounts for half the nation's highway fatalities."

Recommendations from the Transportation Department's National Highway Safety Bureau include identifying drinkers who drive, programs to determine who are problem drinkers in the community and action to get those unfit because of drinking off the road.

Nixon noted a "small but hopeful trend" in the reports which showed a downward in the highway death rate.

There were 56,000 deaths in 1969.

But dramatic examples of better safety features in cars has prompted the Transportation Department to "assign the highest priority to crash survivability in its programs," Nixon said.

UConn's Marine Institute Sets Pollution as Target

GROTON, Conn. (AP)—The University of Connecticut's Marine Sciences Institute here, installed now in newly revamped quarters, will be pushing hard to develop basic facts about the nature of Long Island Sound and the pollutants that are fouling it, the institute's director said Wednesday.

The director, Dr. Peter Dehlinger, spoke at dedication ceremonies for the new facilities, before a symposium of about 25 scientists.

One problem Dr. Chiburis noted is that everyone knows the Sound is polluted, but that isn't enough any more.

Operating out of a building used until recently as a Coast Guard training center, the institute will bring to bear on the pollution problem a fleet of three small ships on a budget for fiscal 1971 of approximately \$500,000, Dr. Dehlinger said.

Dr. Edward Chiburis, assistant director, said massive attacks on the pollution problem do not appear feasible at the moment because knowledge of the exact nature of the pollution is incomplete.

But he praised those who are "prodding" scientists to work harder to obtain that knowledge. And, he predicted that "we could absolutely ruin our continental shelf in 20 to 40 years" if pollution is not quickly understood and combated.

One problem Dr. Chiburis noted is that sometimes popularly believed to be pollution really isn't.

He said institute faculty members studying sedimentation—the carrying of solid mineral particles into the Sound by rivers—may be a disguised blessing.

"Here in Connecticut, we're running out of sand and gravel for our construction industry."

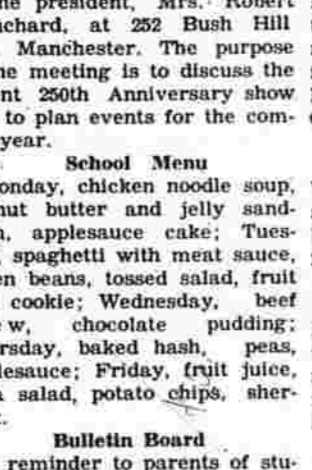

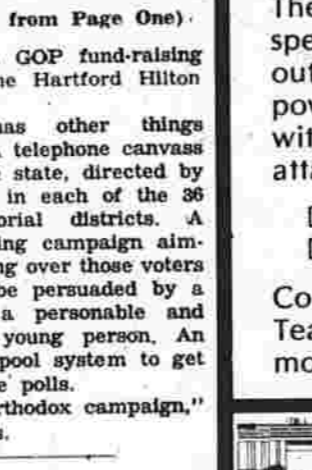

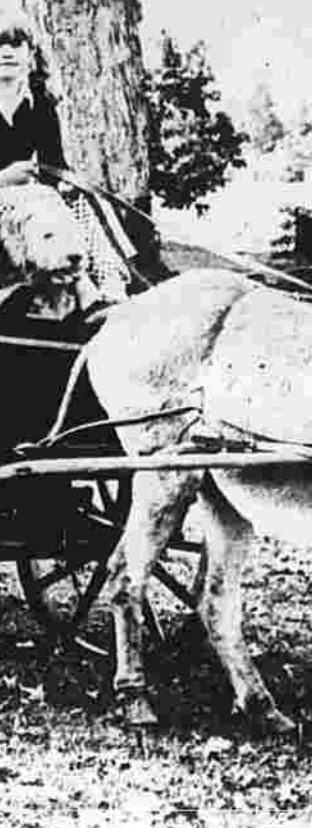

Glenney Marks 50th Year

In 1920, the W. G. Glenney Co. started in lumber and coal—started in business in a barn on Allen Pl. in North Manchester, making deliveries throughout the area with four horse-drawn wagons. The company was formed by the late W. George Glenney, a Manchester native, from the old Allen Lumber Co. shortly after his return from France following service with the 20th (Yankee) Division in World War I. From its humble beginnings until his retirement as chairman in 1965, two years before his death, Glenney—with the help of an associate, the late Louis C. Dimock of Bolton—built the firm to the point where it had relocated to its present address at 336 N. Main St., expanded three times, and employed more than 30 workers. Now, 50 years after its founding, the firm is headed by Glenney's sons, Edward and William Jr., who are respectively president and vice president of the corporation. Since taking over upon their father's retirement, they have expanded the business several times again: Company branches were added at Ellington in 1968, at Glastonbury in 1961, and at West Willington this past June. And today, the horse-drawn teams have grown to a fleet of more than 30 motorized vehicles, (lumber), Glenney officials reveal over 100. Egypt Requesting Early U.N. Action Over Mideast

CAIRO (AP) - The Egyptian government is requesting the United Nations to take early action to end the current session of the U.N. General Assembly, the Egyptian newspaper said.

The paper said President Gamal Abdel Nasser's political move would not be complete until the full six-year term when the National Assembly on Wednesday affirmed the Security Council's decision to withdraw from the territories occupied in the 1967 war.

At Al-Ahram said the Soviet Union has expressed "unqualified" support for the Egyptian plans in two meetings in the past 24 hours between a high Egyptian diplomat and the Soviet charge d'affaires in Cairo.

The paper's diplomatic correspondent said all Egyptian ministers abroad had been instructed to seek support for the proposed move, which Al-Ahram said was planned because of the breakdown in the indirect Arab-Israeli peace talks at U.N.

He said he was in the Middle East by the deputy minister of Nasser's mission. The United States pulled out of the talks in an attempt to be his choice.

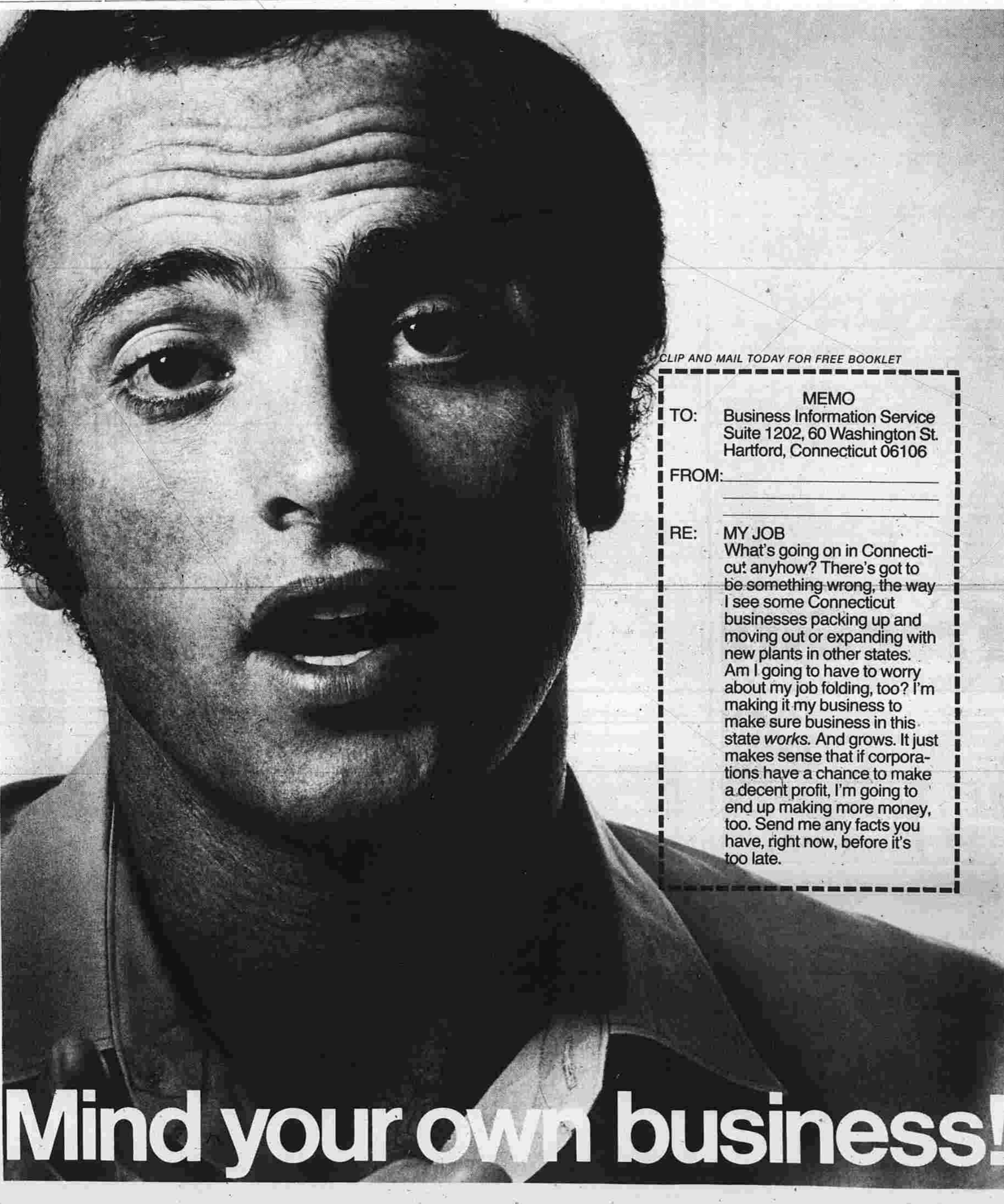

"When he visited the Orioles to practice Wednesday, I was asked if I was looking for a World Series salary advance," Pappas said. "I cracked, and I'll take it."

He referred to the three World Series the Orioles have won since he left Baltimore.

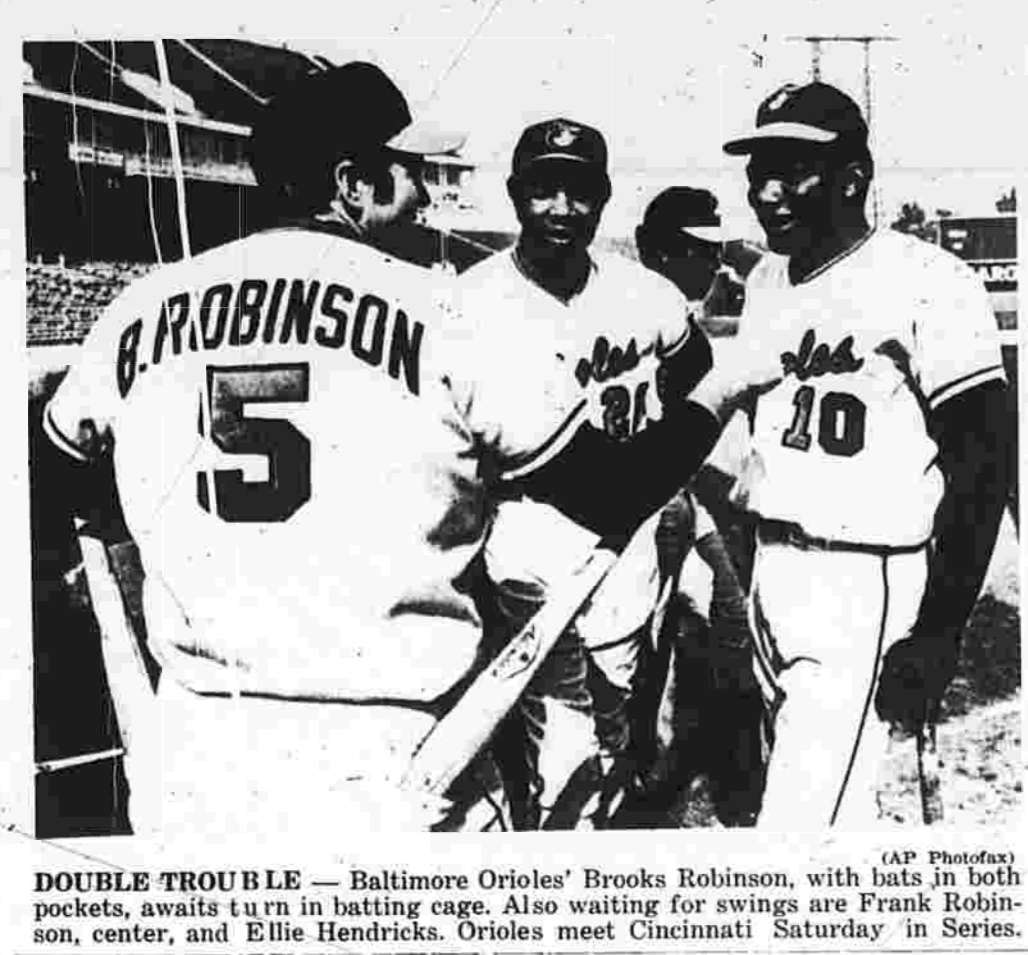
