Hijack Passengers Returning to Russia

ANKARA, Turkey (AP) — A Soviet airliner took off from Trabzon today carrying 40 hijacked passengers back to the Soviet Union along with the body of a Russian slain and two crewmen wounded in the seizure.

The three wounded crewman, chief pilot Valery Adovoy, a 37-year-old pilot, and a flight attendant, were taken to a hospital in Moscow.

The hijackers remained in Turkey while a Turkish official sought a Bulgarian plane, forced to land in Istanbul and wounded the two pilots, Turkish authorities refused to extradite the hijackers.

There was no word about when the hijacked plane would fly back to the Soviet Union. Turkey has pledged to return it to the Soviet government.

Two policemen injured in Midwest Bomb Blast KANSAS CITY (AP) — A blast, predominantly Negro neighborhood, had been a bomb shattered a side door of a police station and injured two patrolmen Thursday night.

Officers Kenneth Fleming and Charles Robinson, suffered multiple lacerations. They were admitted to Menorah Hospital where their conditions were reported as good.

Police said the type of explosive used in the bombing had not been determined. They said the device apparently was placed or thrown at the doorway.

There appeared to be no link between the bombing and any radical group, some of which have claimed credit for recent bombings in California, Washington State, New York and Massachusetts.

The blast knocked a two-foot hole in the door, ripped it from its hinges caused minor damage to the brick wall and entrance, and blew out a side window.

Fleming and Robinson, both participants in Pinpoint, a walking patrol experiment funded by the National Institute of Law Enforcement Administration, were in the building. Both are white, but police said hostility toward them in the densely populated area.

Canada Imposes War Act; Separatist Leaders Seized

Manitowishippi, Wis., Oct. 15, 1970

OTTAWA (AP) — Canadian troops today outlawed the Quebec Liberation Front under the War Measures Act, never before imposed in peacetime.

Prime Minister Pierre Elliott Trudeau, saying the nation faced a threat of insurrection, proclaimed the War Measures Act in effect just before dawn.

Several hours later he brought before the House of Commons a measure to ban the Liberation Front, which carried out last week's kidnappings of two prominent men.

Negotiations to bring about the release of the kidnap victims had bogged down partly before the government acted. Authorities moved in military reinforcement and began arresting Quebec separatist leaders and their sympathizers.

Among those taken into custody were Robert Lemieux, a lawyer who has negotiated in behalf of the Liberation Front, and Michel Chartrand, a labor leader.

A spokesman for the Quebec provincial police received shortly after the War Measures Act was invoked at 4 a.m., reported 208 arrests and said other persons were being sought. He said police raids had resulted in seizure of "firearms of all kinds" as well as huge quantities of literature put out by groups that want to separate Quebec from the rest of Canada.

More than half the arrests were in Montreal and the others in various other Quebec cities including the capital, Quebec. The separatists kidnaped a British diplomat Oct. 5 and Quebec's labor minister Oct. 10. They then tried to bargain for the release of 23 separatists arrested on various charges, including bank robbery and murder.

The War Measures Act gives the government almost unlimited power to deal with insurrection. Trudeau reiterated that the federal government acted in response to a serious and dangerous situation.

The act, never before invoked in peacetime, asserts the government's power to control virtually every aspect of human activity. Federal authorities could be authorized to impose news censorship and control over the use of private property, including seizure and use.

One of the most prominent features of the statute, passed in 1914 at the outbreak of the World War I, is the wide authority it enables the government to give police to arrest, detain and deport those suspected of insurrection.

The act gives the government blanket authority to take any action it considers necessary in cases of a feared insurrection. The government may "do and authorize such acts and things and make from time to time such orders and regulations as are necessary or advisable for the security, defense, peace, order and welfare of Canada."

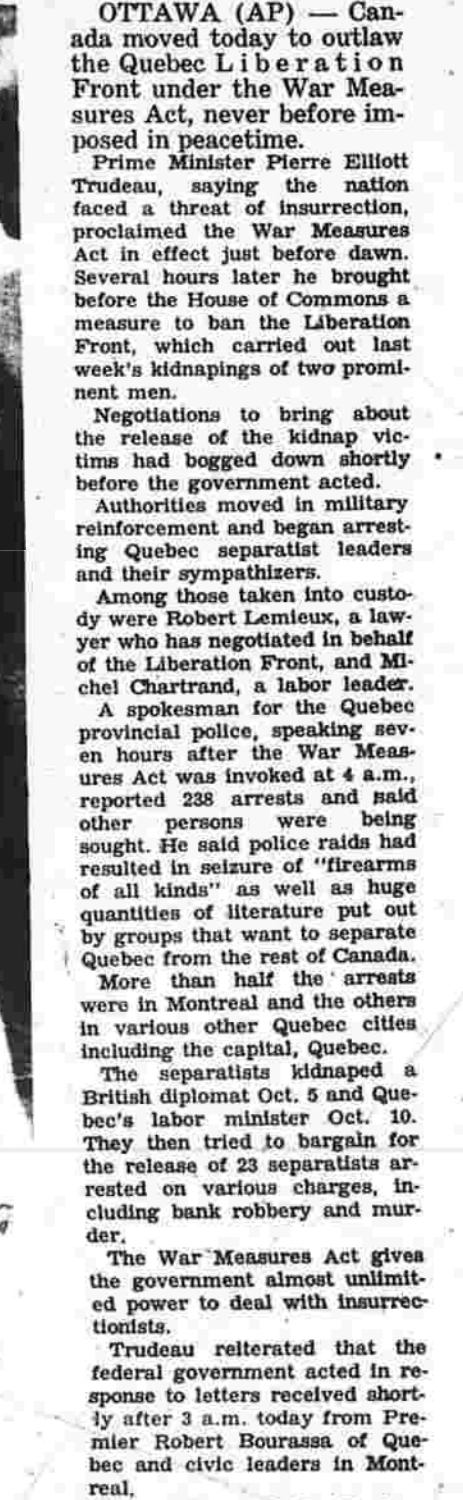

SAIGON (AP) — The 25th Infantry Division is being pulled out of Vietnam, and two of its three brigades will be gone by Christmas, informed sources reported today.

The remaining two brigades of the 4th Infantry Division and the 6th Marine Regiment also will be withdrawn under President Nixon's new order.

The 25th Infantry Division will be transferred to Hawaii, the division's home station. The transfer is probably by sea.

The division's 3rd Brigade has been transferred to the operational control of the 11th Airborne Division.

Martha Mitchell's Memo

WASHINGTON — At 11 a.m. today, the Washington Post reported that Martha Mitchell would like to see corridors in the Justice Department hallway painted shades of "rosy-sybian" and "primrose" yellow.

A guard on duty at the 10th and Constitution Avenue entrance Wednesday night confirmed that a paint crew had been brought to work a special four-to-midnight overtime shift "because the President is coming tomorrow."

"They may be here all night," the security man added. "The order to repaint did not come until late Wednesday. The Washington Post was told, although a directive outlining Mrs. Mitchell's wishes was circulated on Oct. 2."

Headed "patting of corridors," the memo bore the name of James Austin, acting business manager of the Archives, Justice file office, and William H. O'Donoghue, director of the Office of Administrative Services.

The instructions read: "The meeting with Mrs. Mitchell today she felt that the Attorney General's area should be decorated differently than the rest of the building. She would like to see various shades of color, including 'steel blue.' I think an experienced painter could make up small pieces of wall with various shades of steel blue from which Mrs. Mitchell could make a selection. She would prefer a better concept of color in relation to the murals and the scroll of heraldic design adjacent to the Attorney General's suite."

"As for painting other corridor hallways, Mrs. Mitchell requested that we set up a sample area for her to look at, preferably at the junction of hallways where there is stone. She would like the stone cleaned and then on one side of the hallway, adjacent to the stone, the walls painted white up to and around the nearest door."

"Ways To Create New Learning Opportunities" will be presented at an open meeting for youth of high school and college age and the walls painted white up to and around the nearest door."

"The board granted the request of one parent who has rented a home in town, but will not live in it for about a month, to leave his three children at Potters School. The parent must provide transportation and reside in town by Dec. 1 of pay tuition."

Another parent was granted permission to have her child ride the high school bus to Westminster to attend a Catholic School. The parent pays transportation charges.

Sheinwold on Bridge

GIVE TRICKS AWAY TO WIN AT BRIDGE

By ALFRED SHEINWOLD The trouble with most bridge players is that they aren't generous enough. They think only of winning tricks instead of giving tricks away. If that seems like a proper frame of thought for practical players, consider today's hand.

South dealer. Opening lead — King of Clubs. Declarer took the first trick in dummy with the ace of clubs, observing to his partner: "If a couple of cards are right, we missed the bust." He hoped that West had three hearts headed by the queen and that East had the ace of diamonds.

Daily Question Partner opens with one heart, and the next player says, "You hold: Spades, 5; Hearts, 10-8-8; Diamonds, 3-10-8-8; Clubs, 8-6-5-2."

What do you say? Answer: Bid two hearts. You have 3 points in high cards and should count 3 additional points for the side singleton. The total is just barely enough for a raise of partner's suit.

After taking the ace of clubs and two trumps, declarer should take both hearts and then lead the ten of clubs from dummy. East plays low, and South discards his last heart, allowing West to win the trick. Since West is out of hearts, he must lead diamonds, allowing South to win a trick with the king if West led a club, instead, dummy would ruff while South got rid of a diamond. Either way South would make his contract.

If West could lead another heart, he would set up a heart trick for declarer. For an exact sample, if West had only one heart, South would ruff and get back to dummy with a trump to discard on the jack of hearts. And if West had both the queen and king of hearts, South would make his contract.

Main Break Cuts Hours For Hours

A break in an eight-inch water main occurred at Autumn and Highland Sts. today at 11 a.m. Yesterday, the location was not identified until 4 p.m., repairs made, and pressure resumed between 7 and 8 p.m.

The delay in restoring water to the area was caused by a number of factors, according to Stanley Lambert, assistant superintendent of the water and sewer department. Excessive pressure at the time; original assumption the break was near Highland and Gardner Sts., failure of a valve at Shelton and Autumn Sts., necessitating the use of a School St. valve; and the amount of water in the ground at the break, making excavation difficult.

Lambert said the main was in a bed of rock and stone, which is no longer permitted. He added the pipe was very old, but he didn't estimate its age. He said the walls were so old, it crushed when the six-man crew attempted to cut it. The break occurred at a School St. valve, and the pipe, Lambert said he can't be absolutely sure what caused the break.

Tolland County Superior Court Moonans Awarded \$50,000 In Charges of Negligence

A settlement was reached yesterday in Tolland County Superior Court awarding a total of \$50,000 to the Moonans. The case was first tried in Feb., 1968 and decided in favor of the corporation represented by Atty. John Scully of Hartford. The case was appealed to the State Supreme Court which set aside the initial verdict and ordered a new trial on the basis that there was an error committed in the charge to the jury. It was at the beginning of the second trial yesterday that the settlement was reached. The Moonans were represented by Atty. Sanford Pleger and Atty. Roland Castleman of Manchester.

An amount of \$10,000 was awarded to Mrs. Moonan to reimburse medical costs and \$40,000 awarded to the child. As a result of the accident Kathy has been in the hospital 31 times and about a year after the accident part of her esophagus was removed. She is still receiving part of the company, for which the jury is to be removed.

The stipulated judgement, agreed on by both parties in a case, was issued by Superior Court Judge Leo Parsley after a jury had been chosen and the second civil trial in the matter was due to begin. The suit was originally filed in 1967 and brought for \$350,000 against the Clark Wellpoint Corp. of Bolton. It charged negligence on the part of the company, for which the jury is to be removed.

The Tolland Junior's Women's Club will present a major proposal for designation of a road or driveway access to the schools from Rt. 74 at a later date.

OLD CODGER'S COGNATIONS

After the Mt. Nebo and Globe hollow brooks joined, we knew it was Hop Brook. It was dammed into a small but quite deep pond along the east side of Prospect St. That was to supply water for Rogers' lower paper mill, which was close to the opposite side of Prospect St. Here were the finishing operations on the paper that was made at the upper mill on Charter Oak St. The Knight Rogers who owned the mill lived in a large manor house on top of the hill south of the pond. That was removed for construction of the new Rt. 6 highway.

At the south end of the Prospect bridge and close to the east sidewalk was a Shippy mill. It was necessary to keep the trunk clad in galvanized hardware cloth to prevent folks looking into it for bark. It may still be there. If so it will be nearly a hundred years old. They are rather rare around Manchester.

A little way down stream was Cheney's gas house where gas was produced and piped to mills, some homes and other customers. A few feet up the hills, Tar was produced as a by-product. The odor from the tar drifted far down the valley so that the brook was often called the Tar Brook.

Nearby was Cheney's wood working plant called the Carpenter Shop and "Mud-Milk". Here were made packing boxes both wood and paper, benches, bins, hand trucks, and specialties within reach of the mill. When the brook reached about where the new Bridge St. bridge is and east of the old Bridge St. bridge

State PTA Gives Rogers Life Membership Award

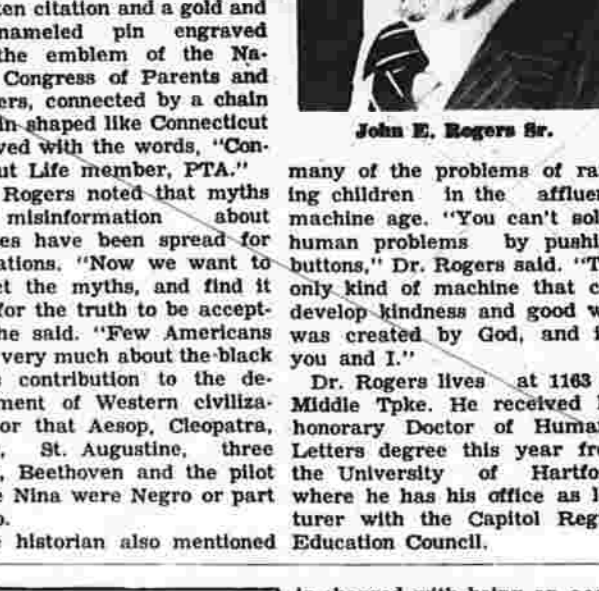
Dr. John E. Rogers Sr., lecturer of Negro history and culture, last night received a life membership award from the Parent-Teachers Association of the state PTA, was presented by Mrs. Roy Folsberg of Hartford, state president, at the annual life membership dinner at Les Shaw's Restaurant in New Haven.

The award was a surprise to Dr. Rogers. He had been invited as a guest speaker. He received a written citation and a gold and blue enameled pin engraved with the emblem of the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, connected by a chain to a pin shaped like Connecticut engraved with the words, "Connecticut Life membership PTA."

Dr. Rogers noted that myths and misinformation about Negroes have been spread for generations. "Now we want to correct the myths, and find it hard for the truth to be accepted," he said. "Few Americans know very much about the black man's contribution to the development of Western civilization, or that Aesop, Cleopatra, Ananias, St. Augustine, three popes, Beethoven and the pilot of the Nina were Negro or part Negro."

The historian also mentioned many of the problems of raising children in the affluent, machine age. "You can't solve human problems by pushing buttons," Dr. Rogers said. "The only kind of machine that can develop kindness and good will is the human mind."

Dr. Rogers lives at 1163 E. Middle Tpk. He received his honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree this year from the University of Hartford, where he has his office as lecturer with the Capitol Region Education Council.

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Report on Kent Riot Sharply Criticized

The special state grand jury report exonerating Ohio National Guardsmen involved in the fatal shooting of four Kent State University students has been sharply criticized by parents of the dead students.

"I have lost faith in justice in America," said Martin Scheuer, father of a slain student.

"You mean you can get away with murder in this country," said Bernard Miller, of Plainfield, N.Y., father of Jeffrey Miller, 20, one of the slain students.

"This is murder," he continued. "We have long known that the law is not being enforced in this country. It is a disgrace that the state grand jury should have acquitted these men."

The special state grand jury indicted 25 unidentified persons. None was a guardman, said Special Prosecutor Robert Ball, who said the grand jury's report was "a disgrace."

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Jury Report Disputed By Chief Ahern

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — The fatal shooting of four Kent State University students by Ohio National Guardsmen was "unwarranted and an act of terrorism," said Chief Justice Ahern.

"This is murder," he continued. "We have long known that the law is not being enforced in this country. It is a disgrace that the state grand jury should have acquitted these men."

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
