Living Costs Rose Again Last Month

WASHINGTON (AP) — The pace of rising living costs quickened again in September, going up four-tenths of one per cent because of higher prices for clothing, housing and consumer services, the government reported today.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics said last month's rise was even higher on a seasonally adjusted basis—five-tenths of one per cent.

The September rise pushed the consumer price index to 126.6, meaning it cost \$12.66 last month for every \$100 worth of typical family purchases in the 1967-69 period in which the index is based.

However, the bureau noted that there was a easing of the nation's worst inflation in 1970. It said the seasonally-adjusted annual rate of increase had declined to 4.2 per cent in the third quarter of 1970 from 4.8 per cent in the second quarter.

The September report said grocery prices declined three-tenths of one per cent, but that they usually drop more in that month it was figured as a seasonal basis.

In other major categories, clothing prices rose 1.6 per cent for the month, housing 4.5 per cent, medical care five-tenths, transportation three-tenths and recreation four-tenths.

This year the United States is pouring just under \$500 million into Vietnam in economic aid alone. On top of this, direct U.S. loans to Vietnam for such purposes as rentals and services comes to another \$354 million.

It is mainly on the direct U.S. spending—the \$354 million—that the Vietnamese economy depends to generate foreign exchange. On their own, without U.S. aid, the Vietnamese start only about \$15 million to \$17 million from a few minor product exports.

According to all present calculations, U.S. economic aid alone will not be enough to cover the country's needs. The economic war promises to be a formidable challenge.

Some U.S. experts argue that the full employment now enjoyed by the South Vietnamese—with almost everyone in the family working at something—compensates somewhat for the effects of inflation.

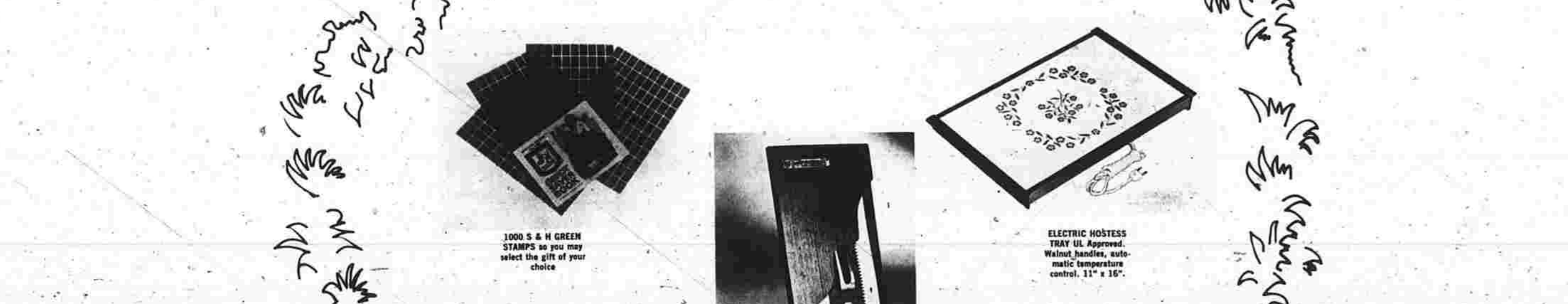
But the U.S. and its contractors already are cutting back on their payrolls, and it seems likely that contract work for the 140,000 Vietnamese nationals now working for the Americans will have their job for more than another year or two.

With few native industries to absorb them, the country may be faced with a disgruntled middle class, trained in a variety of skills by the Americans. The official rate of 18 piasters to one American dollar will remain in effect for other than imports, including the four-fifths of Vietnam's student exchanges.

Coventry Council Rescinds Action On Sale of Old Building

The Town Council has rescinded earlier action concerning the sale of the old brick building in the village, and will now wait for further action until it learns what legal options are available.

At a meeting last month, the council voted to sell the building to Judge of Probate David Rappe for use as a law office, but was later heavily criticized for the action.

The council had decided last spring that the building should not be destroyed, but had not officially announced that it was for sale. Rappe had submitted a bid of \$750 early in September and it was this that the council approved.

However, when the sale was announced, several other townspeople stepped forward to say they might be interested in the building.

In selling the building to Rappe, the councilmen said they thought they were acting within their rights, since Rappe's purchase price was based on an appraisal from local realtor Thomas Welles. The town charter states that buildings of \$1,000 or more in value must be put out to public sale.

It was later learned, however, that the building is assessed at \$1,600 in the town records, apparently putting it under the charter regulation.

Town Manager Dennis Moore also pointed out to councilmen at Monday night's meeting that they had not checked with the Planning and Zoning Commission on the sale of town property, which, under state statute, must be done.

So the council rescinded its approval of the sale to Rappe, and will now check with town attorney to see what methods of sale would be most appropriate.

The bombs and dynamite that have surrounded family houses, the blazes that demolished a federal building and wounded a woman in a St. Paul department store also blew away any chance that the campaign in this normally Democratic district would be waged on economic and foreign policy issues.

In a contest typical of conservative-liberal confrontations in many parts of the country, Republican challenger Dick Enroth is crying "permissiveness" in his campaign to unseat incumbent Democrat Fraser, whose liberal credentials include the chairmanship of the Democratic Study Group in the House of Representatives.

"I'm not criticizing the man, but the record," Enroth said in an interview. "All we can do is point to the voting record."

He contends Fraser is vulnerable on his attitude toward crime, student protests, drugs, pornography and the Internal Security Committee, formerly the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

"I've been down this road before," said Fraser. "My opponent two years ago ran almost entirely on a charge that 'Fraser is soft on crime.' Wiretapping was the issue then."

But he acknowledged there are new elements in this campaign — President Nixon's advocacy of an expanded federal role in fighting crime; the election last year of a police detective, Charles Stenwig, as mayor of Minneapolis on a law and order platform over organizational-backed candidates; and the bombings.

"The Stenwig candidacy did uncoil some very genuine feelings of concern about law and order," Fraser said. But he insisted the focus of the campaign should be on a prompt disengagement from Vietnam, a stabilized economy with jobs for all, legislation to "make the cities wholesome and safe," and in the longer term — saving the environment, providing health insurance for all and closing remaining loopholes in the tax laws.

Fraser's tactics already have prevailed in one test this year. He was opposed in the Democratic primary by Alderman Joe Greenstein, whose campaign sides included leaders of the T (for taxpayer) Party, an offshoot of the Stenwig campaign. Greenstein campaigned against what he called left-wing militants spawned by a permissive society, but he polled only about 20 per cent of the Democratic vote.

The T Party support now is expected to shift substantially to Enroth, who says "Fraser is not in step with Minneapolis. He doesn't appear to be in step with the majority even of the Democrats here."

Minnesota, which constitutes the congressional district, has all a city's complexities despite the sober uniform nestling that extends even to much of the

Malaysia To 'Listen' To Communist China

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — Malaysia, after years of ignoring Communist China and its hostility, has taken a new step toward listening to the Chinese.

Malaysia is pressing for Peking's admission into the United Nations while asking world powers to persuade Chinese leaders to leave Southeast Asia alone.

The change came as Tun Abdul Razak succeeded his party colleague Tanju Abdul Rahman, who retired as prime minister last month.

Razak dusted off Malaysia's policy of nonalignment, long on the books but scarcely used. He said Malaysia sought friendship with all countries, adding only that her independence be respected.

So far, Razak admits, it has not worked. He said recently China still encouraged guerrillas along the Thai border and continued broadcasting propaganda from southern China.

"Peking refers to Malaysia's government as 'The Rahman-Razak clique.' Since 1967 independence, Malaysia has grappled with guerrillas supported by the Chinese, but it is not supported by Communist China," he said.

Kirk Takes Underdog Role To Hold Florida Capitol

By RICH OPEL
TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Republican Gov. Claude Kirk is waging a grueling, underdog re-election campaign faced with his familiar 1 to 10 odds against a Democrat who portrays him as a clownish headline-hunter.

"It's an uphill battle," Kirk conceded, putting a fat, green cigar after a game of hearts with two staff members aboard his old DC-3 campaign plane. "But I'm used to that. It's never been any other way."

The governor is on the road as early as 5 a.m., and as late as 2 the next morning, to search out voters on the first chicken circuit, in their homes, where they work and congregate. The rigorous campaign stands in sharp contrast to the last week of his primary battle against millionaire Jack Richard of Clearwater. Then Kirk's campaign strategist, Robert E. Lee, figured Kirk was so far ahead he could quit and keep quiet, which he did.

More in that mold now is the Democratic candidate, Rep. O'Donovan Aske of Pensacola, who has carried on a low-key campaign, with a stop to a low-key campaign, with a stop to a low-key campaign, with a stop to a low-key campaign.

After campaigning on a phony "no new tax" slogan, Aske said, "I've recommended the largest single consumer tax increase in the history of the state."

The Democratic candidate referred to Kirk's 1968 campaign for raising the 3 per cent state tax to 5 per cent. The legislature compromised, approving a 4 per cent rate.

Aske's attack was an echo of the first Democratic primary when he kept state Sen. John Mathews out of the runoff by quoting a comment Mathews had made years ago on a grocery tax, and tagging him "Food Tax Jack." Mathews couldn't shake the label, and now concedes that it beat him.

Aske, who proposes a corporate income tax which he says will avert the need for greater property and consumer taxes, projects an image completely different from Kirk.

"I think the people want a governor not so interested in headlines," says Aske, "not so interested in exploiting his name and more effective in getting the job done."

He is fond of accusing Kirk of running the government like a meatgrinder without meat: "He puts air in the top end, by turning the crank fast enough, it comes out hot air."

The Democratic candidate has been three times hit with the liberal label, first by Robert E. Lee, then by Kirk himself, and finally by Vice President Spiro T. Agnew. It's a word that Republicans, outnumbered 3 to 1 in registered voters, have used effectively in defeating such Democrats as Robert King High and LeRoy Collins, but Aske's campaign manager, Elmer Rounds, says it hasn't caused the slightest ruffle yet. "Our people just laugh," he says.

Kirk's campaign was boosted last week by Agnew's appearance in Jacksonville and Orlando, but nobody in Kirk's camp felt this, in itself, could nudge the 44-year-old Kirk into the lead.

Still, together with U.S. Atty. Gen. John N. Mitchell's appearance at Miami Beach and Port Lauderdale, and President Nixon's expected entrance into the Florida campaign, things are looking up for the governor.

"Let them (Florida Democrats) bring their guys down," Kirk grinned after the Agnew visit. "Who have they got? William Fulbright? Birch Bayh? Ted Kennedy?"

Although the White House via its wire calculated to bolster GOP Senate nominee William C. Cramer's difficult campaign, they have to accrue to Kirk's benefit also. Agnew carefully devoted equal time and equal praise to Cramer and Kirk in his speeches, probably knowing that any snub of Kirk would drive another wedge between the none-too-friendly Floridians. Kirk actively supported G. Haywood Carwell against Carter in the primary.

Through it all, Kirk's colorful style goes on.

"Campaigning at Miami International Airport, a union steward blocked Kirk's path. He approached a group of airline workers. The steward said it was a closed shop and candidates weren't welcome. Kirk, who vigorously opposed collective bargaining rights for public employes, held his ground and finally gained admittance. Later, Kirk, a burly ex-Marine, allowed to a newsmen, "I've met them together than that guy" and, if the union man hadn't yielded, "I would have decked him."

"When he greeted the vice president by saying before 8,500 people, 'Mr. Vice President, oh buddy, do we love you! You are our gladiator going into the nation to do battle with the Philistines—those wild radicals Mr. Wonderful...'"

campaign comments last week. At Daytona Beach, he told a PTFA group that the Daytona Beach Journal News thought more of his attendance there than to send "a lady reporter."

The apparent slight of the reporter, Jennifer Boich, angered several women's and press organizations.

Shortly before that, Kirk told a reporter in Quincy, where a racial disturbance had broken out, that "it was just another Saturday night in Gadsden County."

Although the governor's remark was recorded by the newsmen, Kirk later insisted that "some of the wild-eyed, ultra-liberal media misinterpreted his statement."

"Every Saturday night in every Florida county is going to be normal," the governor added.

Kirk's aides suggest that Aske is vulnerable because voters fear that his tax reform proposal is the first step toward a personal state income tax, and because of alleged improprieties of Aske's running mate, Sec. of State Tom Adams.

But Aske's opponent in the Democratic runoff, Atty. Gen. Earl Fritchell, tried this tactic with a notable lack of success.

Adams, an elective cabinet officer for 10 years, disclosed last year that he was more than \$100,000 in debt because of said of unaccounted spending by campaign workers in his first statewide campaign.

Kirk's running mate is a 34-year-old attorney from St. Petersburg, keynotes of Republican strength in the state. He generally is regarded as a moderate.

Aske's "fair share" tax reform package, reduced to the simplest terms, means a big business would pay proportionately more under his administration. Although he claims he hasn't modified his stand on the corporate income tax, there have been little touch-ups here and there that could appease some portions of the business community.

Early in the campaign, there was talk that a corporate income tax could be adopted by the legislature. If such happened, Aske said, he would seek a state supreme court opinion as to its constitutionality before signing such a bill into law.

However, now Aske says he couldn't conceive of such a tax becoming a fact without amending the state constitution, and that would require a referendum.

Philly Teachers Agree to Pact

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Public school teachers returned to work today after a three-day strike settled by a new contract providing for a 10 per cent raise in the second year of the two-year contract.

Before the strike Friday the board said it was offering raises totaling \$17 million in the first year. The cost of first-year raises would be \$12 million, it said. The second year would cost \$5 million.

The new salary schedule for starting teachers would be \$12,000 with a 10 per cent raise in the first year to \$13,200. The second year would be \$14,520.

The agreement Tuesday paved the way for resumption of regular classes for the nearly 300,000 pupils in 275 schools, most of which remained open during the strike.
