Agnew Man Tops Goodell, Rocky Wins

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — James L. Buckley, a Nixon supporter running under the Conservative party label with broadly implied White House approval, has unseated New York's Republican Sen. Charles E. Goodell, a frequent administration critic.

The 47-year-old businessman's victory in a three-sided race with Goodell and Democrat Richard L. Ottinger featured voting Tuesday in which Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller was re-elected as expected, defeating Democrat Arthur J. Goldberg, former Supreme Court Justice and U.N. ambassador.

Forming a coalition of conservative-minded voters, Buckley managed a narrow margin over runner-up Ottinger. Democratic congressman who had competed with Goodell for the state liberal vote.

Goodell, who had been defeated by Vice President Spiro T. Agnew as a caucus runner, finished a well-beaten third. Buckley, an enrolled Republican who was defeated in a 1968 Senate bid, had been known best as the brother of columnist William F. Buckley.

With 65 per cent of the vote reported, Buckley had 2,148,601 votes, or 52 per cent of the total, to Ottinger's 2,088,146, or 52 per cent. Goodell trailed with 1,410,228, or 36 per cent.

Meanwhile, Rockefeller, 62, forged an emphatic victory over Goldberg. Making his first try for elective office, Goldberg, also 62, was thought to be leading early in the campaign, but Rockefeller finished strong.

In winning an unprecedented fourth four-year term, the nation's senior governor posted a plurality approaching 700,000 votes far better than he had done in any of his previous outings.

With 94 per cent of the vote counted, Rockefeller had 2,822,700 votes, or 63 per cent, to Goldberg's 2,307,794, or 40 per cent. Conservative party candidate Paul L. Adams polled 400,896 votes, or 7 per cent.

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Aircraft Turnover Accelerates

SAIGON (AP) — Secretary of the Air Force Robert C. Seamans Jr. said today that the U.S. turnover of air operations to the South Vietnamese is running ahead of schedule.

"This work of moving ahead jointly is symbolic of the progress we're making," the visitor from the Pentagon said at a ceremony transferring the Soc Trang Air Base in the Mekong Delta 46 miles southwest of Saigon.

Seamans said the South Vietnamese air force had made tremendous progress since his last visit in January.

"You can measure the progress in terms of the squadrons that are being activated, all on schedule, some ahead of schedule," he said. "I have absolute confidence that we are pursuing the right course, that President Nixon is right in drawing down our forces."

Along with the base, a squadron of 31 UH1H Huey assault helicopters was turned over to the South Vietnamese air force, giving it 27 air squadrons.

The U.S. Command announced another 50-man reduction in the level U.S. forces in Vietnam. The unit will be withdrawn from battle in the 7th Battalion, 11th Artillery, part of the 25th Infantry Division, which is returning to Hawaii.

On the battlefield of South Vietnam, militiamen caught a battalion of about 500 North Vietnamese trying to push into the coastal lowlands. The militiamen caught in bombers and artillery. Government spokesmen said 37 of the enemy were killed and 21 captured. No South Vietnamese casualties were reported.

The U.S. Command announced 14 enemy rocket and mortar attacks during the 24-hour period ending at 8 a.m. today. Three were against U.S. and South Vietnamese positions along the demilitarized zone, and casualties included one American killed and eight wounded.

In Cambodia, a government spokesman said elements of a North Vietnamese division have moved into flooded areas just across the Mekong River from Phnom Penh, apparently 400 yards from the city's defenses.

North Vietnamese forces made three attacks on Phnom Penh's outer defense ring Tuesday and early today, the closest seven miles southeast of the city, the spokesman said, but all were driven back without government losses.

A New Governor, A New Senator: Connecticut is going to have, in place of the pleasant leadership of John Dempsey, a new Governor for a new decade.

We believe that Governor-elect Thomas Meskill asked for, and received, a public mandate to try for stern and realistic measures as the state tries to adjust to its past sins of irresponsibility in its spending and taxing.

But the approach, at least, can be fresh, and need not be hampered by any network of involvements in the decisions of the past.

Connecticut is also going to have a new United States Senator at Washington.

Although there were moments in the campaign when, in the heat of battle, Congressman Lowell Weicker seemed to have been tempted outside his own natural character, the outstanding thing about his service in Congress and in his campaigning during last summer's primary and in most of his campaigning during the past few weeks has been that he is a civilized individual who likes to keep his eye and mind and tongue on positive essentials rather than divisive fantasies.

With two such results, it has to be said that the Connecticut political process worked well yesterday. The one grave inconsistency which did develop was that, as a Republican candidate for Governor won for the first time since General Assembly reappointment, he failed to receive the support of a working majority of his own party in at least one house of the legislature.

When the present redistricting was done, by agreement between the two parties, it was supposedly beyond the objective that any Republican who won the governor's office by a comfortable margin would have a chance to control at least one legislative house. Now, as it comes time for another redistricting, which, if the Legislature itself succeeds in doing it, will require the approval of both parties, the evidence seems to be that there ought to be some adjustment in the direction of a more even chance for both parties.

The Hoodlums And The Campaign: The story of the last week of this political campaign depended, in large part, on the conduct of young American hoodlums.

If they had not faithfully attended the transcendental campaigning of President Nixon with their long hair, their four letter words, and their nihilistic, the President himself would have had neither the sharp provocation nor the timely opportunity to turn the final appeal of his political campaign to the issue of law and order and his denunciation of anarchy and permissiveness.

Somewhere along the trail, these young people must have become aware, as the nation began to see, that their behavior was playing into the campaign strategy the very administration they were seeking to attack had selected as its own strongest weapon for its last minute appeal to the voters of the nation. They found themselves being admitted, in small, easily controllable groups, into the halls where the President's rallies were being held, so they could make their noise and thus provide the background for righteous denunciation of themselves. They found themselves, last Thursday night in California, allowed close enough to the President to make him a target for their eggs and stones.

They must have sensed, by this time, that every obscenity they uttered, every demonstration they made, every missile they threw, would be likely to undermine and sabotage the cause of liberal candidates all over the nation. They must have sensed, by this time, that their target was sniveling their attacks, so he could make them the closing theme of his campaign.

A question arises, then, about their own motivation.

Would they knowingly and willingly continue with a brand of conduct which would have the immediate political result of helping their proclaimed enemy, the President, and injuring those candidates in the nation who might conceivably harbor a more liberal understanding of and tolerance for the violence of youth?

The answer has to be that they probably would consciously choose to do what they did.

And the answer to the question of why they would deliberately choose to help the political strategy of the man they thought to be an embodiment of reaction and repression in order to build up the pressure for the success of an eventual total invasion. These young revolutionaries, insofar as they have thought and theory, would welcome and encourage the instinct in President Nixon to turn himself away from the fatherly let us reason together image back to the moods of the righteous prosecutor. They would, as well, welcome the defeat of any pronounced liberals in the campaign and a sharp turn by the voters to the conservative right, all on the theory that the worst enemy of revolution can have is moderation. Either in the personal conduct of leaders, or in the general mood of the nation's politics.

As almost every one is saying these days, those outermost revolutionaries who really make such intricate cold-blooded calculations are in a very small minority. But this very small minority seemed able, thanks to the possible innocence of youth and to the possible guile of practical politicians, to get itself into the very center of the campaign picture.

Don't Talk To Strange Children

Everybody loves a friendly child. The youngster who returns your smile when you pass him in the street or store, the kid who waves at you in your car or from the back window of a bus, the little tyke who rings your doorbell to sell you candy for a cause or a sticker for the class—they make anybody's day brighter.

It's a temptation to give a lift to the small hickie who whose mother probably doesn't know what he's up to. It can give you a good feeling to make friends with a youngster who is standing next to you at a store counter, to offer him a candy out of the bag you just bought. It's only human helplessness to take a little girl's hand to be sure she gets across the street when you see her hesitation.

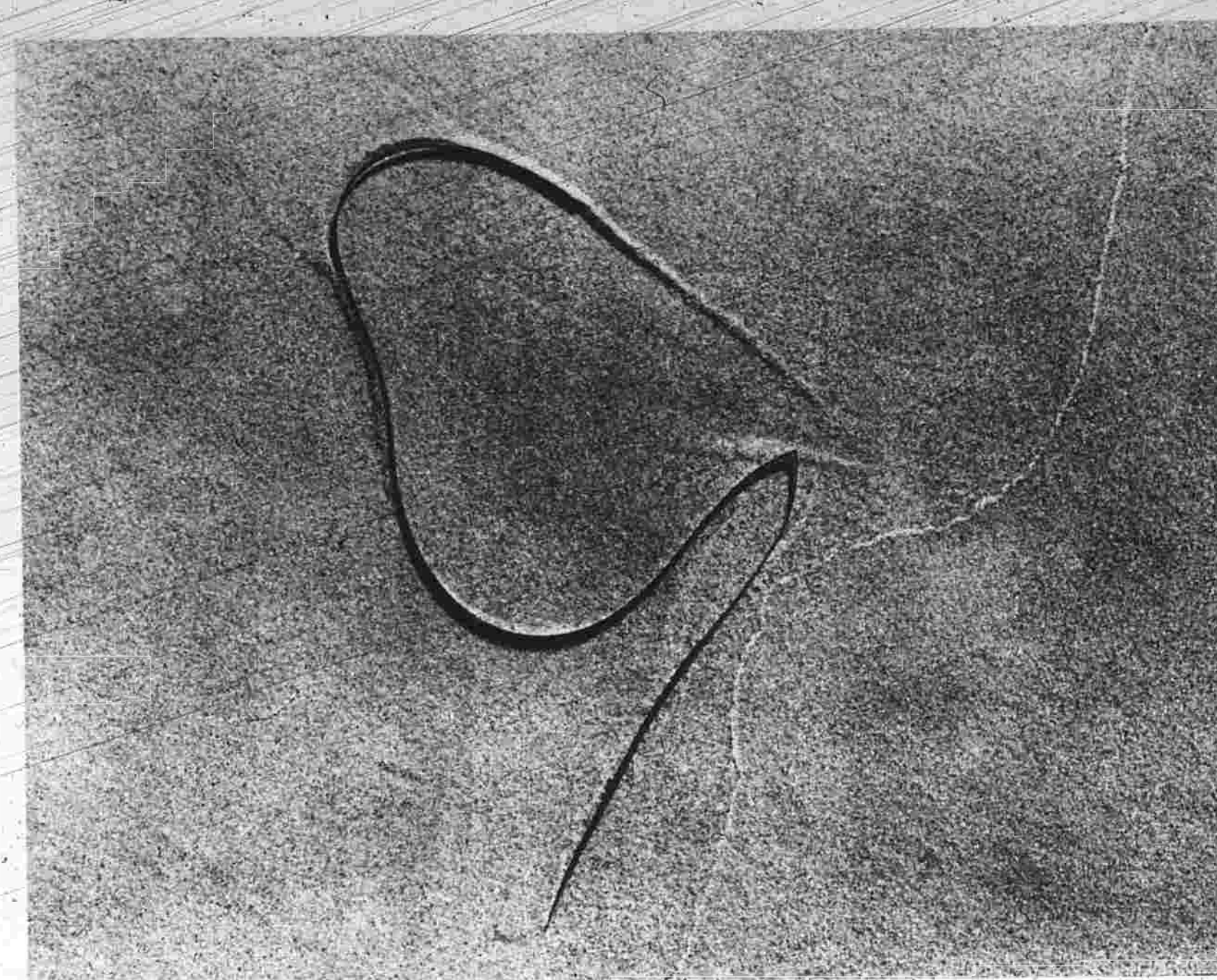
But these good impulses of ours can head a child toward trouble. There are people who take advantage of a child's natural friendliness, people so criminally warped and sick that they will use the child's trust and curiosity and appetite in order to destroy him.

The only way to protect children from these people is to teach them to stay away from strangers, not to accept gifts from them, not to take rides from them, not to get close to them or follow them. Children must be taught not to trust strangers, and it may be as much as their lives are worth that they learn the lesson well.

It's not an easy lesson. It goes against the nature of children, and it goes against the nature of adults who prize the innocence and trustfulness and happy-heartedness of their children. It's a lesson that must be drilled into the kids' heads in defiance of all the good and friendly instincts they have.

The least the rest of us can do, who value children's safety and want to do all we can to protect them, is to stop ourselves from making the lesson harder to learn. We can refrain from putting temptation in the kids' way to break the rule, and thus refrain when nothing bad happens to them because of their response to us, from making it less likely that they'll heed their parents' rules next time.

If a child is hurt or obviously needs our help, it must be given. Otherwise, smile and pass on. It's the friendliest thing you can do for him.—MERIDEN RECORD.

WASHINGTON — Despite strong and growing pressures from Israel on the United States to accept present cease-fire lines in the Middle East more or less indefinitely, President Nixon is now plotting a precisely opposite diplomatic course designed to force Israeli withdrawal from most of the occupied Arab land.

But even more perilous, U.S. officials are convinced that Israel would have launched at precisely the same time an air attack against the Soviet anti-aircraft missiles emplaced along the west bank of the Suez Canal during the cease-fire.

That would probably have brought direct Soviet air intervention against the Israeli government that could well have averted the U.S. into a new Middle Eastern war with explosive potential.

That earlier plan, devised by Secretary of State William P. Rogers, was strictly a U.S. obligation in response to a specific Egyptian request from the late President Nasser. The new plan, that President has decreed must be a joint Washington-Moscow operation, worked out every step of the way with the Soviet Union and—when the time is ripe—pushed jointly by the Americans and the Russians.

The transcendent reason for this Presidential decision goes back to the dangerous events of mid-September at the height of the civil war in Jordan when, in the words of one Presidential intimate, "war or peace hung by the thinnest of threads."

Although Mr. Nixon's diplomatic experts have been publicly reticent about the terrifying days of Sept. 20 to Sept. 23, they now reconstruct the potential disaster of the period as follows: With Syrian tanks pouring across the Jordanian border, Israel was poised to carry out a self-defensive air strike against the tanks.

The precise timing of that Israeli air action depended on the progress of the Syrian tank force. With or without U.S. consent, however, Israel was primed to attack at any cost to prevent Syrian intervention from toppling Jordan's King Hussein.

Reluctant GI Testimony Ends At Bridgeport

BRIDGEPORT (AP) — Testimony was completed Tuesday in U.S. District Court here in the case of a Vietnam combat veteran who refuses to return to Southeast Asia for a second tour of duty.

Army Sgt. Edward DePino, 20, of West Haven told Judge Robert G. Zampino he did not want to go to Vietnam, but he was sent back to Vietnam in violation of his own wishes.

DePino has six months and 12 days to serve.

He returned to the United States in July 1969 after serving 11½ months in the war zone. While in combat, DePino earned the Bronze Star, two Oak Leaf Clusters, the Army Commendation for Heroism and the Purple Heart. For a hand wound received in the Mekong Delta.

When ordered to report to Fort Lewis, Wash., Sept. 8, DePino refused to go. He has been fully absent without leave since Sept. 8.

Army Lt. Col. Ronald Dubois, head of the Army branch that selected men for overseas duty, testified at length.

Leading in almost all counties, Bumper amassed about 65 per cent of the vote, compared to 35 per cent for Rockefeller. Bumper's defeat of Rockefeller capped a campaign in which the Democrat emerged from obscurity to win his party's nomination. He was virtually unheard of outside his own county five months ago and in 1962 lost a race for the Arkansas House, his only other bid for state office.

With 84 per cent of the state's precincts counted, Bumper had 79,576 votes, Rockefeller 48,848 and American party nominee Walter Carruth 37,488.

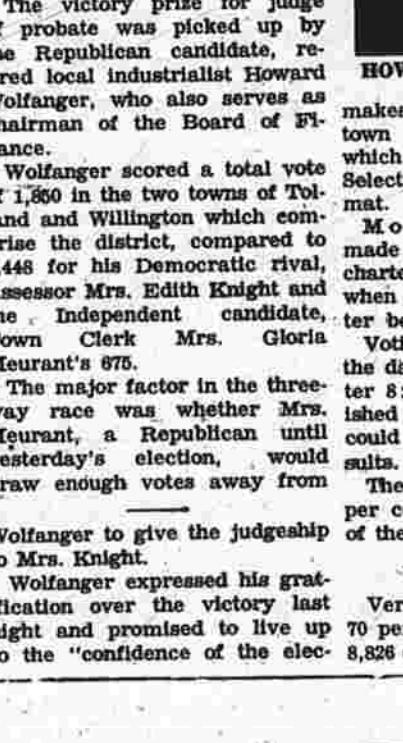

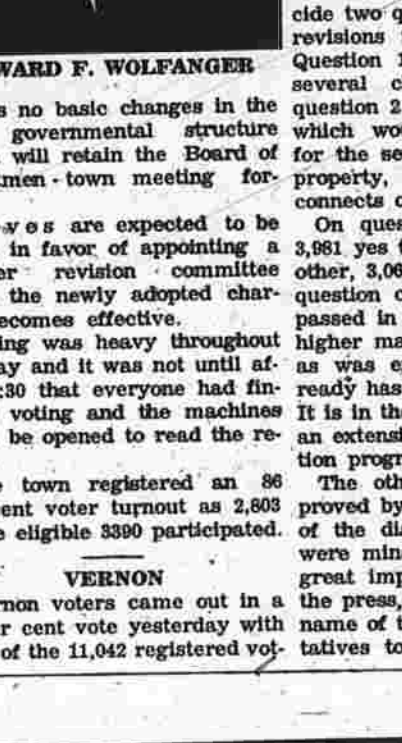

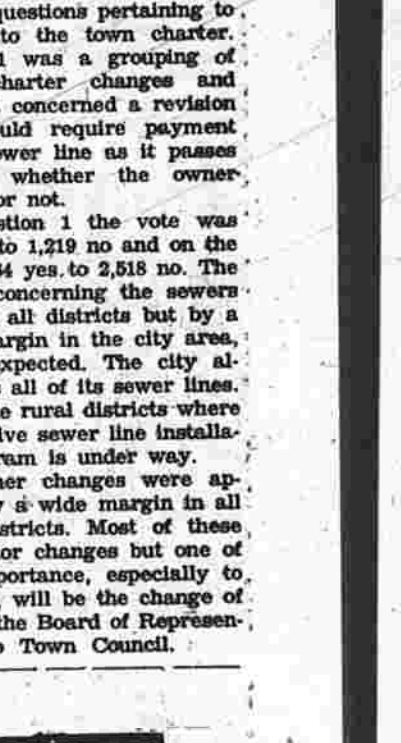

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Attress Faces Ohio Court On Charge of Smuggling

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP) — Attress Jane Fonda faces a year in jail and a \$10,000 fine today on a charge of smuggling a policeman during a hassle over her arrest on a charge of pill smuggling.

She next Monday is a preliminary hearing on a federal charge of fraudulently bringing stimulants and tranquilizers into the United States from Canada and smuggling Edward P. Matsumu, a customs agent.

The pill charge was based on the federal assault charge against Fonda. She was arrested Tuesday after a flight from London, Ont.

The "small quantity" of prescription Desferrioxamine, Compazine and Valium pills found in Miss Fonda's handbag, her attorneys said.

With the exception of Pawluk's 1967 victory, Sweeney has held the post of county sheriff from 1948, in the last election a campaign by 94 votes.

Yesterday Pawluk took the name of Massachusetts Governor, Elliot, Tolland, Somers, Vernon and Willington.

Taft Wins Ohio Race For Senate

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Republican Robert Taft Jr. won a close race for the U.S. Senate early today, bucking a trend that put Democrat John J. Gilligan into the governor's office after eight years of GOP rule.

Taft's victory gave Ohio two Republican senators for the first time since 1967.

Gilligan captured the governorship by a 278,258 vote margin.

Taft, who carried his campaign on the law and order issue, won by a 278,258 vote margin over Gilligan, the former state attorney general, who carried the gubernatorial race.

Taft and Gilligan, the governor-elect, are from Cincinnati. Gilligan is an insurance executive, former city councilman and one-term congressman. He lost his seat in Congress to Taft four years ago.

The state's two Democratic congressmen, Ferdinand B. Soto and Robert O. Terman, won new terms over Republican and Minority party opponents.

With 61 per cent of the state's 42 precincts reporting, Taft had 131,660, the Rev. John McLaughlin, 60,800; Daniel P. Farnsworth, 43, 40-year veteran of Senate service and a former governor, ran on his record and a platform of "law and order" and four other administration figures campaigned.

Moss' seat was on the Republican party's priority list in its bid to wrest control of the U.S. Senate from Democrats.

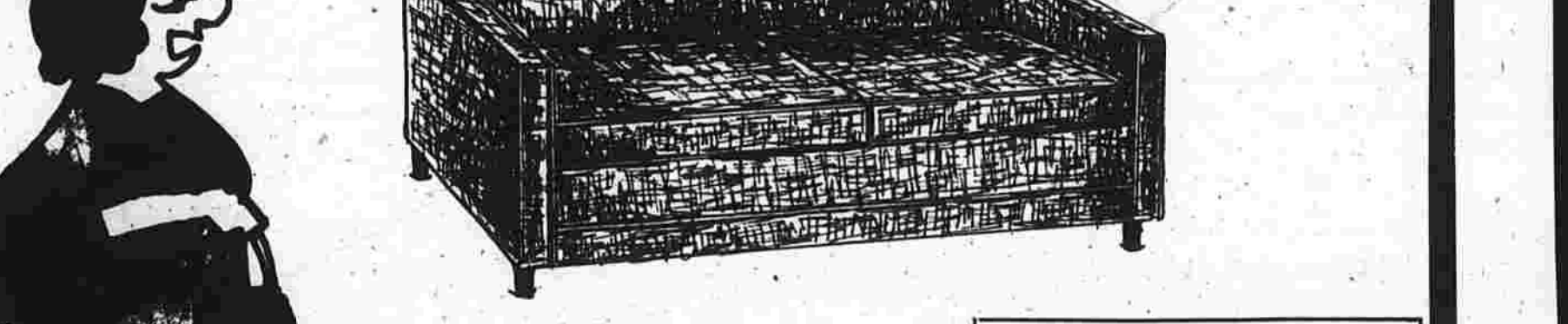

In Connecticut Democrats Hold Control Of Both House, Senate

HARTFORD (AP) — Democratic candidates for the state legislature managed to weather the Republican storm that swept Thomas J. Meskall into the governor's office.
Running ahead of the top of the ticket, they kept control of both the House and the Senate. The Democratic majorities are smaller than those of the 1969 session, but they are still majorities. Instead of 24-12 in the House, it's now 19-17; instead of 10-7 in the Senate, it's now 10-7.

There was ever a situation that would make Democratic State Chairman John M. Bailey receptive to calls for a stronger legislature, this is it. The General Assembly is the likely choice as minority leader.
There will be plenty of work to do. The new taxes and tax increases enacted in 1969 have a June 30, 1971, expiration date on them. The General Assembly has no choice but to go through the tax agency all over again. A state income tax is a distinct possibility.

There is also the complicated task of reapportioning the state legislative districts. Since this requires a favorable vote by two-thirds the members of both houses, no reapportionment bill may be enacted without bipartisan support.
In the House, Rep. William Ratchford of Danbury will probably be able to defy tradition and succeed himself in the speaker's chair. Back again are Majority Leader Carl Ajello of Ansonia, Deputy Majority Leader James Kennedy of Hartford, and John F. Papandreas of Meriden, and there is the more pleasant job of remapping the six congressional districts into six.

Stevenson Landslide Bucks Illinois GOP

CHICAGO (AP) — Adlai E. Stevenson III won election to the U.S. Senate by a landslide despite his opponent's heavy television campaign, which portrayed Stevenson as soft on law and order issues.
The 46-year-old son of the late twice unsuccessful Democratic presidential nominee captured 57 per cent of the vote Tuesday against interim Republican Sen. Ralph T. Smith, President Nixon and Vice President Spiro Agnew had made campaign appearances for Smith.

Though expected to win, Stevenson, the state treasurer, surprisingly whipped Smith in usually Republican Chicago suburbs and held his own downstate against Smith, a 14-year veteran of the Illinois Legislature.
His margin of victory decisively helped underwrite Democratic candidates for several state offices.
With 81 per cent of the state's 10,916 precincts counted Stevenson had 1,919,101 votes to 1,070,108 for Smith.

Besides the personal help of Agnew and Nixon, Smith used extensive campaign television commercials which attempted to show Stevenson soft on law and order and link him with young radicals.
Some said the television campaign backfired on Smith.
In one commercial, Smith said, "Adlai Stevenson regards some policemen as storm troopers in blue," a phrase Stevenson used nearly two years ago in

Another Democratic peace candidate, Rep. Alard K. Lowenstein, lost in New York to Republican Norman F. Lent. Lowenstein, who gained a strong following among the young when he led the dump-London Johnson campaign three years ago, lost much of his previous strength when his Long Island district was reorganized.
In Minneapolis, Democrat Rep. Donald M. Evans, a leader of House liberals, easily withstood a Republican assault mounted mainly on the law and order issue—in a city that elected a police officer mayor last year.

Farmer-Pilot Reflects On Perils of Hijacking

By BOB JONES

FRANK, Kan. (AP) — Dale C. Hupe is Kansas with his head in the clouds and his feet on the ground.

He is in the clouds when he is flying—he has "legged" about 23,000 hours in the air and has been a Trans World Airlines pilot 13 years.

The rest of the time he is a man of the soil, operating a 1,000-acre farm near Perry in northeastern Kansas. At the moment he is preoccupied about 1,000 animals in his pig feeding operation.

The contrast between Hupe's dual careers was never more clear than when his TWA 727 with 81 passengers aboard was hijacked last June 4 on route from Phoenix, Ariz., to Washington, D. C. Hupe, 51, was shot in the stomach trying to disarm the hijacker.

Now fully recovered and back in Perry, Hupe reflected on the chaos in his career and said he has been unable to come up with a complete answer to hijacking.

Such measures as armed guards on planes, electronic devices to detect metal weapons and selective searches of baggage can reduce the number of hijackings, he said, but they can't stop them completely.

Hupe said he can think of nothing he would have done differently during the hijacking experience.

"Nothing?"

"Well, maybe move a little faster when I was shot," he said.

Hupe's tense, eight-hour ordeal started while his plane was still over Arizona. A stewardess came to the pilot's cabin and told Hupe a man wanted to see him.

"He has a gun," she said.

The man showed a revolver—Hupe could see the bullets in the chamber—and said he wanted some messages sent. Hupe agreed, although he hadn't had time to decipher what was written on the piece of paper handed him.

The message was to federal officials. It demanded \$100 million ransom for the plane, its passengers and crew.

"I knew from the time I heard the demand for money that we were dealing with an irrational man," Hupe recalled. "We could only try to humor and pacify him."

A compact man of medium height, Hupe said there was one moment he might have been able to get close enough to disarm the hijacker. He didn't try because "you have to think of your passengers."

He added, however, he never had any doubt about the outcome. "I always knew we were going to come out on top."

When the plane landed at Dulles International Airport in Washington, a bag containing more than \$100,000 was taken aboard the jet.

It was the first time a ransom was paid a skyjacker.

Deputies Refuse Job of Flogging

Murray sentenced Howell to 90 more days in jail Monday.

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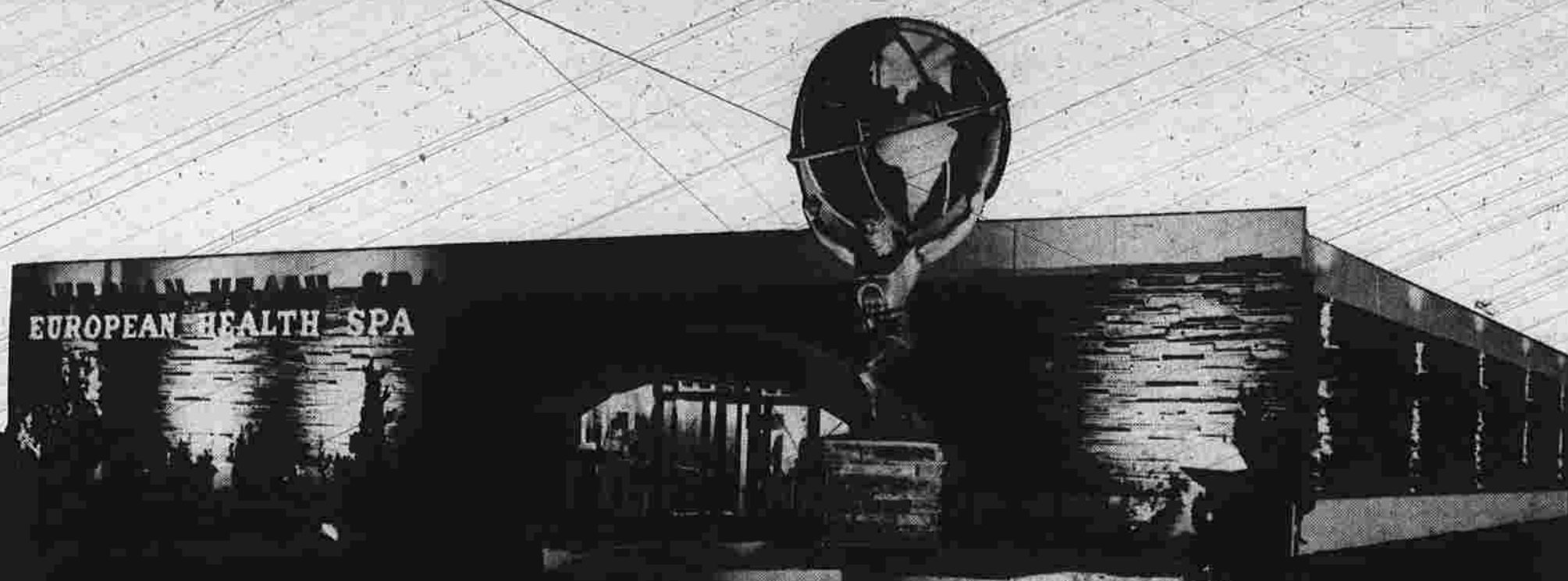

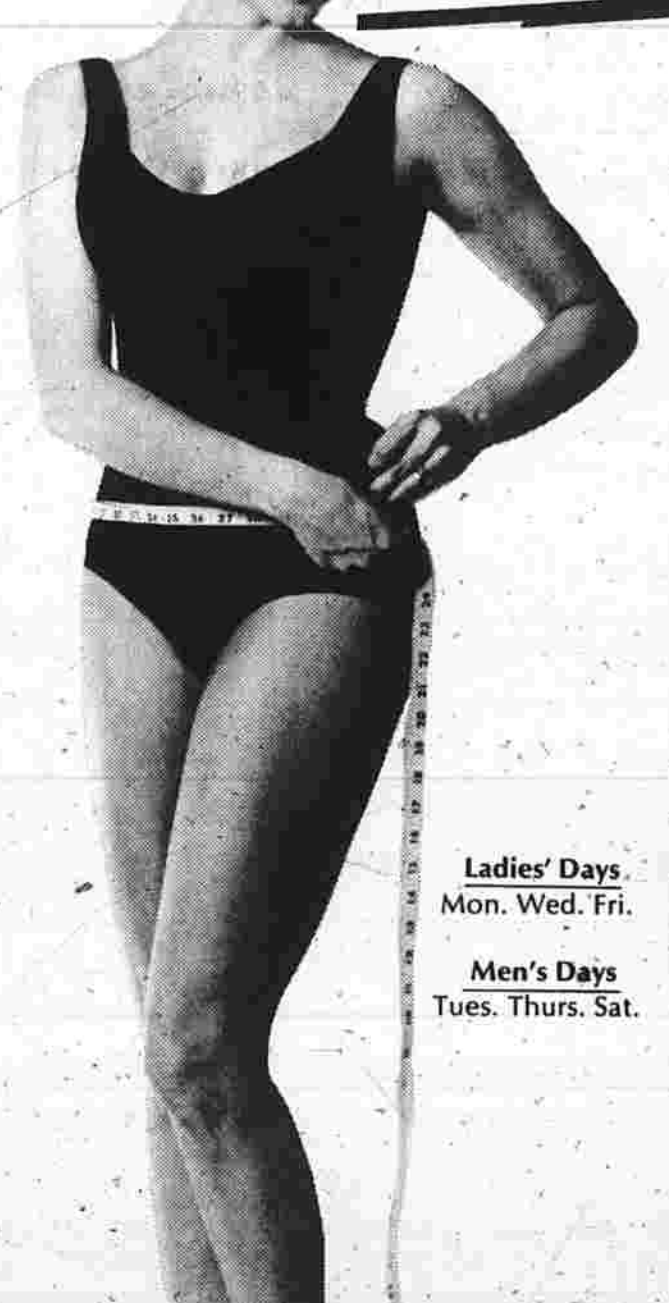

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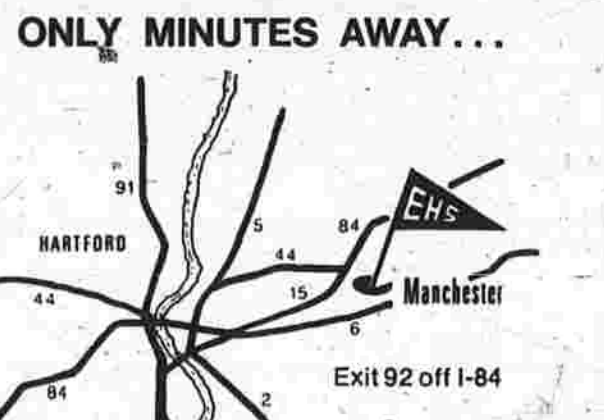

Hartford Voters Approve \$30.5 Million Bond Issue

Under the charter, the town exchanges its three selectmen for a new six-man board headed by a First Selectman with some of the powers of a mayor. In nearby North Haven, voters turned down a charter that would have had similar effects. Mrs. Miller Tops Ahearn Second Time

Voters in the tri-town district that covers Andover, Bolton and Coventry have returned the incumbent Republican Mrs. Dorothy Miller of Bolton, to the state House of Representatives for a second consecutive term.

Mrs. Miller defeated her opponent, Aloysius Ahearn, also of Bolton, by 152 votes, somewhat more than the 80-vote margin she garnered against the same opponent two years ago.

Mrs. Miller, obviously delighted over yesterday's victory adding he hoped "maybe there'll be a next time." He pledged to serve the residents of Andover, Bolton and Coventry, "to help in whatever way I can."

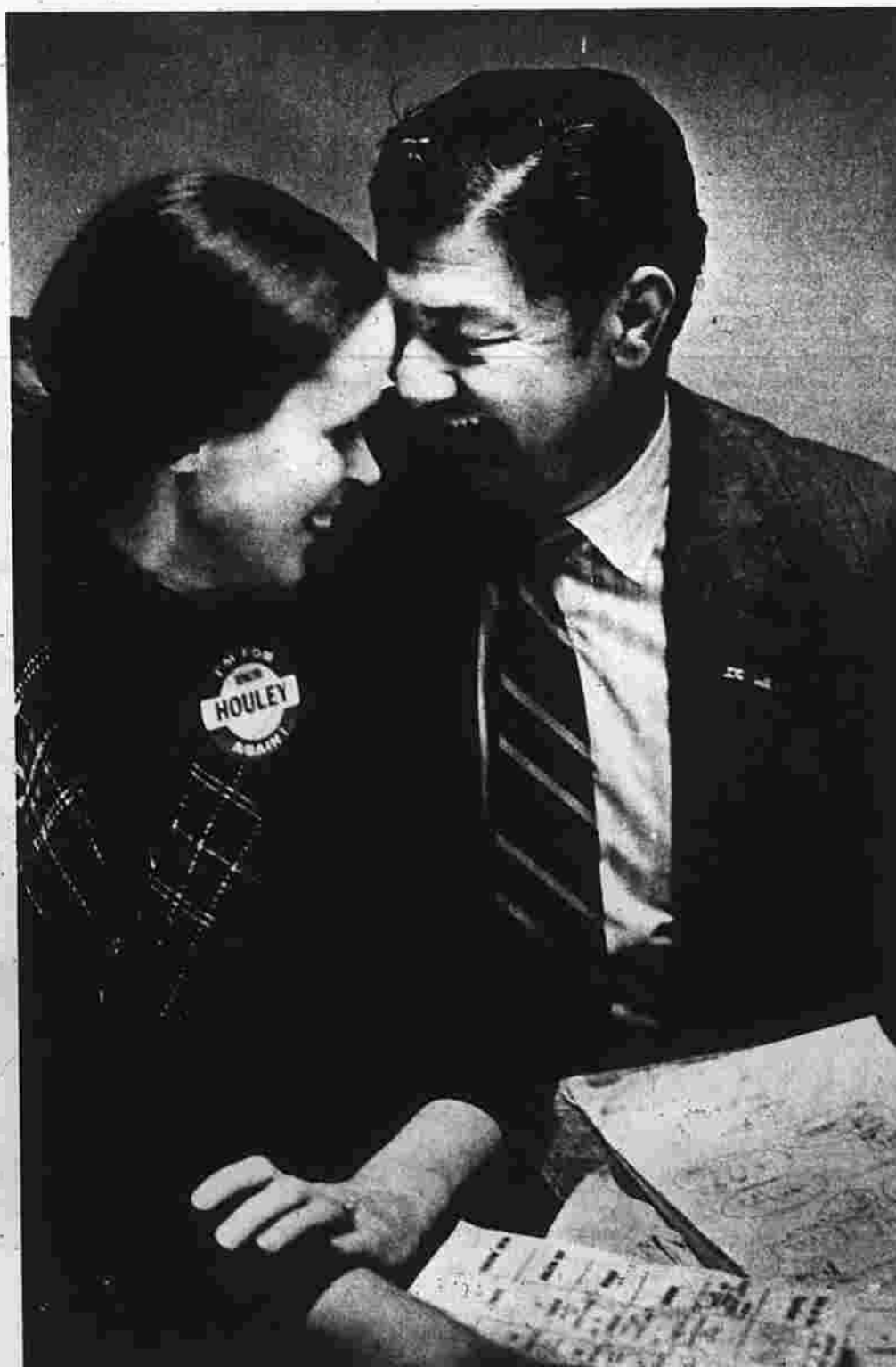

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Amateur Show Bows After Record Run

NEW YORK (AP) — The years went by but the scenario remained the same. The host-ess, crooners and comedians performed frantically for the man with an unusual style. His hair kept falling in his eyes and he kept failing to stand still. His name was Ed Sullivan.

Ted Mack's Original Amateur Hour, the oldest program on television, survived two wars and acted into a comfortable routine while the rest of television sought desperately to understand the taste of its audience.

The show finally died, quietly, CBS said Monday it had been canceled, when it was not renewed by the sponsor, General Electric.

The Amateur Hour had not been seen since late September, but its disappearance was not noticed because of a number of National Football League doubleheaders that preempted its Sunday slot.

For nearly 23 years—36 years counting the time on radio—its on-camera performers presented their routines to audiences great and small.

Most remained amateurs, even if they won. But over the years some of the entertainment world's most luminous personalities had their first national exposure on the show—and a lot of them went away losers.

There was skinny Frank Sinatra, a member of the "Hoboken Four" quartet. They were on in 1935, and lost. Ann-Margret appeared in 1957 but the audience gave its vote to South American who played a tune on a laurel leaf.

Some winners who went on to professional success included comedian Jack Carter, 1941; singers Pat Boone, 1953, and Teresa Brewer, 1958. A fat 12-year-old soprano named Maria Kalogeropoulos made the winners circle in 1935. She went on to greater operatic fame as Maria Callas.

Over the years, more than 25,000 acts were presented—barbershop quartets, dancers, standup comics and specialty acts. They often had unpronounceable names and came from unmemorable places.

The dress and hair styles of the 1 and changed, music more evolved into louder and more rhythmic forms, but on the Amateur Hour, time was trose in a golden past.

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Students Conduct Symphony of Hammers

The sound of hammers has been ringing through Bolton since this fall, but this music of carpentry may be passing unless you know that Mark Fava's carpentry classes from Cheney Tech are busy constructing a building in Herick Memorial Park, which is sort of hidden among the fields and forest in the center of town.

The 30-by-40-foot building was designed by architect Alan Wiede of South Rd. at the request of the Park and Recreation Commission and with the approval of the Public Building Commission. The town has appropriated about \$14,000 from its special fund for park development for the project.

It has grown from its original purpose of storage and skating warm-up hut to a true recreation building, thanks to the money saved by donation of materials and labor from various townpeople, and the fact that it is being built by Cheney Tech.

The main floor will contain a 45-by-30-foot recreation hall with a stone fireplace at one end. At the other end will be a 30-by-10-foot kitchen, men's and women's lavatories, and storage areas. A large gas range from the old elementary school kitchen has been donated, along with some benches and tables.

The basement, entered from ground level to the rear, will contain the furnace and be used for storage.

The recreation-storage building is a significant step in the gradual development of Herick Memorial Park. Each year half a mill is set aside for park development. The first step was a road and a small skating pond. Last year the pond was enlarged, the road and parking area improved, and a playing field cleared, graded and seeded.

The new building sits at the edge of this field and ought to provide a focal point for the town's expanding recreation program. The new field was not deemed suitable for rugged football games this fall. It has been reseeded and fertilized, and Park Commissioner Ray Soma said it should be in fine condition next spring.

The new building will certainly provide a warm gathering place for skaters, who have had to try to use frozen lakes sitting in the snow, or huddled in their cars. At the moment there is no water in the pond, but fall rains and assistance from the fire department should remedy the situation by the time winter really arrives.

And even the Senior Citizens, now meeting in the Community Hall, have asked if it's just to be for the young. No, said Soma, for everyone.

Since the foundation was poured this summer and classes began at Cheney Tech, the building has been progressing almost unimpeded, except by those who take the trouble to follow the sound of hammers. One recent break has more-

found Fava, dressed in a light sweater, directing eight boys in white overalls as they work on the building. Fava, who is a Bolton resident, blessed the carpenter's work and the panels are hard to handle in a wind.

"The boys are in a hurry to enclose the building. Then, come stormy weather, they can't make money any more. They need the building to make money for their project for the year," Fava says that, with the finish work required, it is as much a project as the houses his classes have built in other years.

"The boys do not do any of the site work, masonry, electrical work, or plumbing. Some of these have been done by volunteers; some local contractors have volunteered material or their equipment. Francis Piano, Ernest Reed, All Season's Pools, Mike Pease and the town highway department have all helped in one way or another, and John Whitham helped with fertilizing the football field. Alden Chick has volunteered to do the plumbing.

Stamps in the News

Many countries are issuing stamps which their inhabitants will be using on Yule mail, and recently we reported about the new U.S. Christmas set of five stamps to be released Nov. 5. Latest of the Christmas stamps comes from New Zealand, where postal authorities have included, for the first time, denominations to cover overseas postage. The 2 1/2 cents, for local use, will continue the "Old Masters" theme with a reproduction of Correggio's "Adoration of the Child." The original painting hangs in the Uffizi Gallery in Florence, Italy. The 3 cent stamp shows a stained glass window of the First Presbyterian Church at Invercargill and the 10 cents depicts the tower of the Roman Catholic church at Sockburn. Montserrat, sometimes referred to as the Emerald Isle of the Caribbean because it was settled by Irish soldiers of Oliver Cromwell, has announced its 1970 Christmas set of two stamps. The 8 cents and 20 cents show "Madonna and Child with Angels," a painting by Albrecht Durer (1471-1528). The 500th birthday of Durer will be widely celebrated next year. The 10 cents and 21 feature "The Adoration of the Shepherds" by Domenico Ghirlandaio (1484-1494). Montserrat is a British colony in the West Indies but has a locally elected government. The Republic of China on Taiwan will issue two new stamps publicizing its new Postal Zone Code, first introduced on the island to modernize its postal system. The 11 stamp will depict the postal zone map of Taiwan while the 250 stamp will show the Chinese postal zone code emblem—a standard envelope carried by a blue bird, reports the World Wide Philatelic Agency. The new code is a 4-year plan calling for an automated process which begins with bulk mail picked up from mailboxes and delivered to a series of machines for sorting and canceling.
