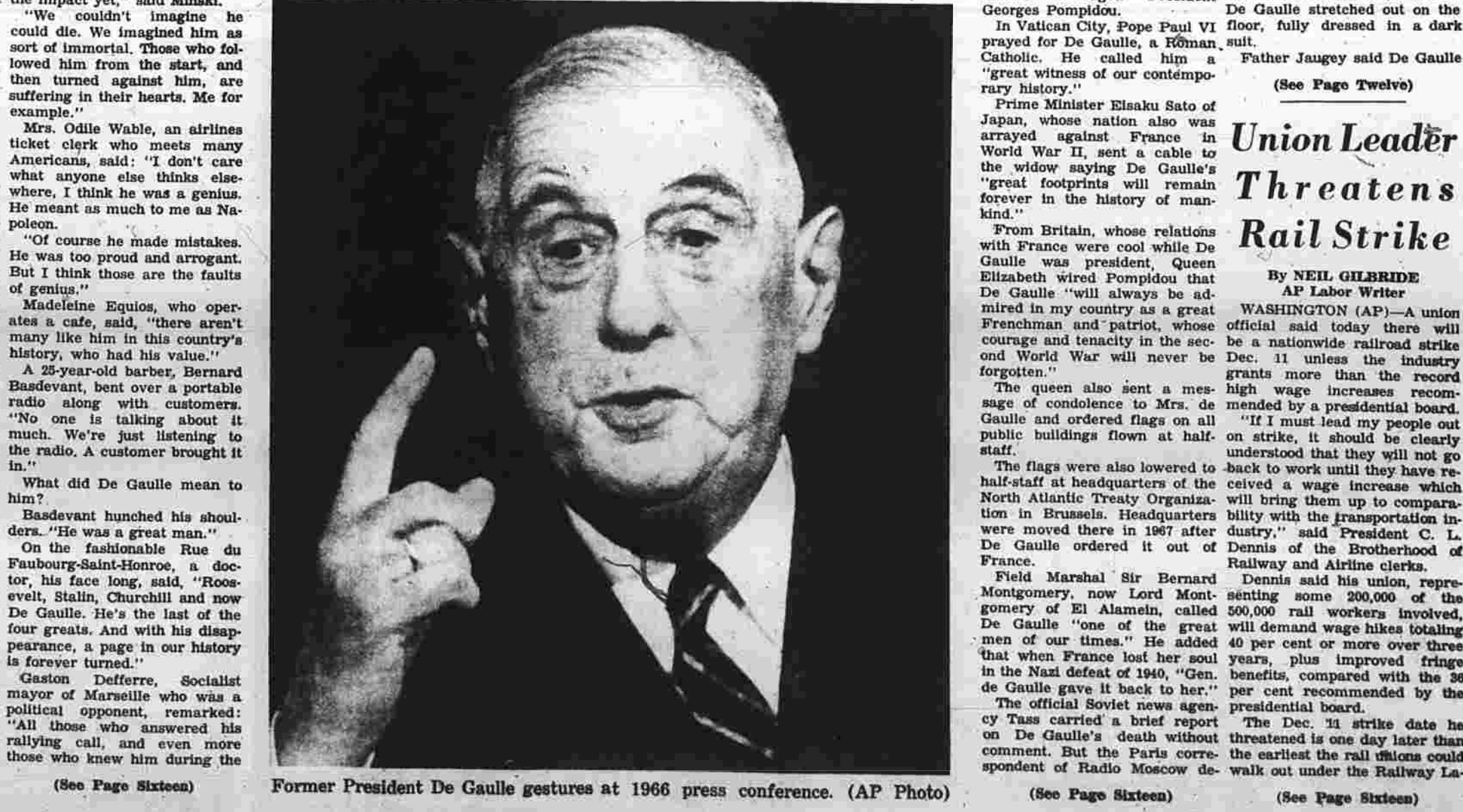

North Korea Highly Lauds Red Leader

TOKYO (AP)—The terms of a declaration flowing out of North Korea these days are challenging the standard set by Red China.

On Peking's wave lengths Mao Tse-tung is any one or all of the following: Great helmsman... great leader... great teacher... great supreme commander... brilliant interpreter of Marxism-Leninism... most respected and beloved great leader... savior... liberator.

To the North Korean Communist their party leader Kim Il Sung is any one or all of the following:

Great Marxist-Leninist of our times... respected and beloved leader... great and outstanding genius of revolution... brilliant Marxist-Leninist... great revolutionary... brilliant leader of revolution... brilliant teacher... ever victorious, iron-willed brilliant commander and genius in military strategy. Despite the similarities Peking's adulation of Mao in total exceeds the bounds of the personality cult that Korean Communists have been building around Kim in the last three years. But Kim at 56 is 12 years the junior of Mao, and thus presumably has a greater expectancy.

Student Boycott Protests Delay In Construction

WATERBURY (AP)—Upset over an apparent delay in construction of academic buildings, about 80 per cent of the Middlebury College student body boycotted Monday evening classes, its student body president said.

Anthony Guerrero said the boycott followed a vote taken at a rally about 5:30 p.m. He said students probably would return to classes Tuesday.

Guerrero said about 1,000 students stayed away from evening classes, joined by a few sympathetic teachers. The problems stem from lack of construction starts on temporary buildings for the college which Guerrero said were promised for completion by Feb. 1. Classes are now held in the Waterbury High School building and at seven other locations.

Atty. Gen. Robert Killian, in interview with WTRC radio, said the problem lies in a contract for the buildings submitted by an Indiana firm. He said the contract calls for a "lease-purchase" arrangement, something state law forbids the state to enter into.

Killian said he, college officials and contractor representatives met Tuesday on a charge stemming from a hit-and-run accident that left a 20-year-old pedestrian in critical condition.

The victim, Shelly Ciochinelli of Danbury, was struck by two cars as she walked along Balmforth Avenue at about 7 p.m. Monday. The first car did not stop, police said, but the second one did and medical help was summoned.

Miss Ciochinelli was reported in critical condition Tuesday at Danbury Hospital.

John Knox Dies, Was AP Writer
NEWTON, Mass. (AP)—John B. Knox, for 41 years an Associated Press writer and editor, died Monday at his home. He was 71.

Knox retired 6½ years ago after a career that dealt with virtually every type of news. Most of his AP career was spent in the Boston bureau.

His typewriter produced stories reporting most of New England's major happenings over four decades—depression, peace, crime, the advances of science capped by space explorations.

He reported the welcome home given the Navy's first round-the-world flier. He saw President and Mrs. Coolidge bring the body of their son to Vermont burial, and later he wrote of Coolidge's lonely, unexpected death.

In prohibition days he toured the Vermont-Canada border and wrote of smuggling—rum and aliens.

There were also hurricanes, plane crashes, fire—including the Coconut Grove nightclub holocaust in which 491 persons died in 1942—building collapses and ship collisions.

A lover of poetry and a man who wrote poetry, Knox won wide compliments with his story of Robert Frost's death in 1963. He served three nonpolitical terms on the state advisory council for university extension.

He leaves his widow, Marion; two daughters, Mrs. Robert E. Craig of Newham and Mrs. Walter J. Tanner of Glen Rock, N.J., and four grandchildren.

AARS Award Winners for 1971

Three new roses have been named as winners of the All-America Rose Selections awards for 1971. They are Aquarius, a pink and red grandiflora (front); Command Performance, a bright orange hybrid tea (center); and Redgold, a yellow-orange floribunda (top).

Aquarius and Command Performance are products of American hybridizers. Redgold was hybridized in Ireland, and has already won a Certificate of Merit of the Royal National Rose Society.

The winners gained the AARS awards after spending two years in intensive trials in 23 official test gardens of AARS scattered throughout the United States. They are scored for quality of plant, quantity of blooms and length of blooming, disease resistance, hardiness, and vigor.



1. Prepare and fertilize bed. Dig hole 12 to 18 inches wide and as deep. Add quart of peat moss mixed with ½-cup of fertilizer. Mix well with soil. Position rose on mound in center.

2. See that all roots are spread out naturally and that bud union (swelling at base of stems) is level with ground. Scatter several inches of soil over roots and firm with foot.

3. Fill remainder of hole with water and allow to drain. It's important to see that the bud union remains at ground level.

4. Fill remainder of hole with soil and tamp. The plant is now ready for the mound of earth to protect it through winter.

5. Mound soil around and over plant to height of 12 inches. Remove protective mound in spring after growth starts.

Vernon Junior Women's Club Joins The Fight Against Pollution

Chances may not be next to podiums after all. In fact, dazzling clean clothes may be a luxury we can't ecologically afford.

A campaign is on to get housewives to use only low phosphate detergents in their washing machines and one kind of detergent in their dishwashers. The battle against pollution is being carried out on a local level by the Vernon Junior Women's Club.

"It's a small thing but it's a state," said Dorothy Caruolo, chairman of the club's Conservation Committee. "Everybody just talks about pollution."

These young women have been distributing to supermarkets and stores 120 copies of a list of brand name washday products showing the amount of phosphate included per washload for each brand. Information the shopper finds hard to come by.

Even the list was hard to come by, according to three members of the club who have worked on the project. Dorothy Caruolo, chairman; Peggy Steiner and Sandra McDermott. They explained that the list they are using was the best one they could find after studying many that are available. It was reprinted from "The Women's Club" magazine.

They said they have found that the amount of phosphate said to be in a product depends on how it is measured and who the measuring. Trying to get an up-to-date, accurate list, they said, "is a tedious experience," and they asked, "who do you believe?"

They stressed the fact that any list is subject to changes as manufacturers make improvements and they change formulas. "I think the really significant race was Idaho because the environmental issues eclipsed everything else in the gubernatorial campaign," she said.

Red-Ink Budget A Nixon Target

WASHINGTON (AP)—The persistent and mounting red ink in the federal budget next year will be President Nixon's major target.

It is a Congress that Tuesday election changed only slightly—and not in a way to help him much in his fiscal dilemma.

Facing a deficit estimated by congressional specialists as high as \$18 billion to \$19 billion, the administration—if it remains true to its announced principles—must make "hard choices" about cutting spending, increasing taxes or both.

At the same time, it is under heavier pressure to try new ways of boosting an economy that now registers a seven-year high in unemployment—while avoiding feeding persistent inflation.

There is widespread feeling the economy, harped on by Democrats had more impact on the electorate Tuesday than the law and order arguments of the Republicans.

And with attention now turning to the 1972 presidential contest, more jobs and a slowdown in price jumps become a GOP political must.

Whatever decisions the administration makes must be submitted to a Congress that not only remains firm on the Democratic control, but maintains in key positions most of the same men who controlled the Democratic White House during the past two years.

The specter of big deficits plagues administration planners at every turn as they tackle more specific problems of the coming year, including:

—The draft, which expires June 30. Nixon is committed in principle to moving toward an all-volunteer army, which would be costly in pay and other incentives.

—Reform of the welfare system, unless Congress in the upcoming lame duck session succeeds in reconciling the conflicting versions. Main objection to the administration plan has been its cost. Federal welfare rolls continue to soar above predictions.

—Possible extension of federal aid to college students. Again, cost is the big headache.

—Continuation of the program of the antipoverty program, with heavy government financial participation.

On the other hand, Democrats gain in the election could improve the chances, still slim, of one Republican proposal—share

and control more state legislatures. The majority Democrats in Congress could be under job again next year.

More pressure from home to help hard-pressed local governments.

But Chairman Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., of the House Ways and Means Committee, shortly before the election firmly reiterated his opposition to sharing, especially

while the federal budget is in deficit. And Mills will be on the Secretary of the Treasury David M. Kennedy repeatedly has indicated it will seek new or extended taxes, if spending cuts do not reduce deficits to manageable size.

Although he has not been specific, one possibility is postponement of some income tax reductions, such as the increase in the personal exemption to \$700 effective Jan. 1, 1972, and a step-up in the standard personal deduction.

Revision of estate and gift taxes, including the possibility of taxing capital gains in inheritance, is still on the docket of the Ways and Means Committee.

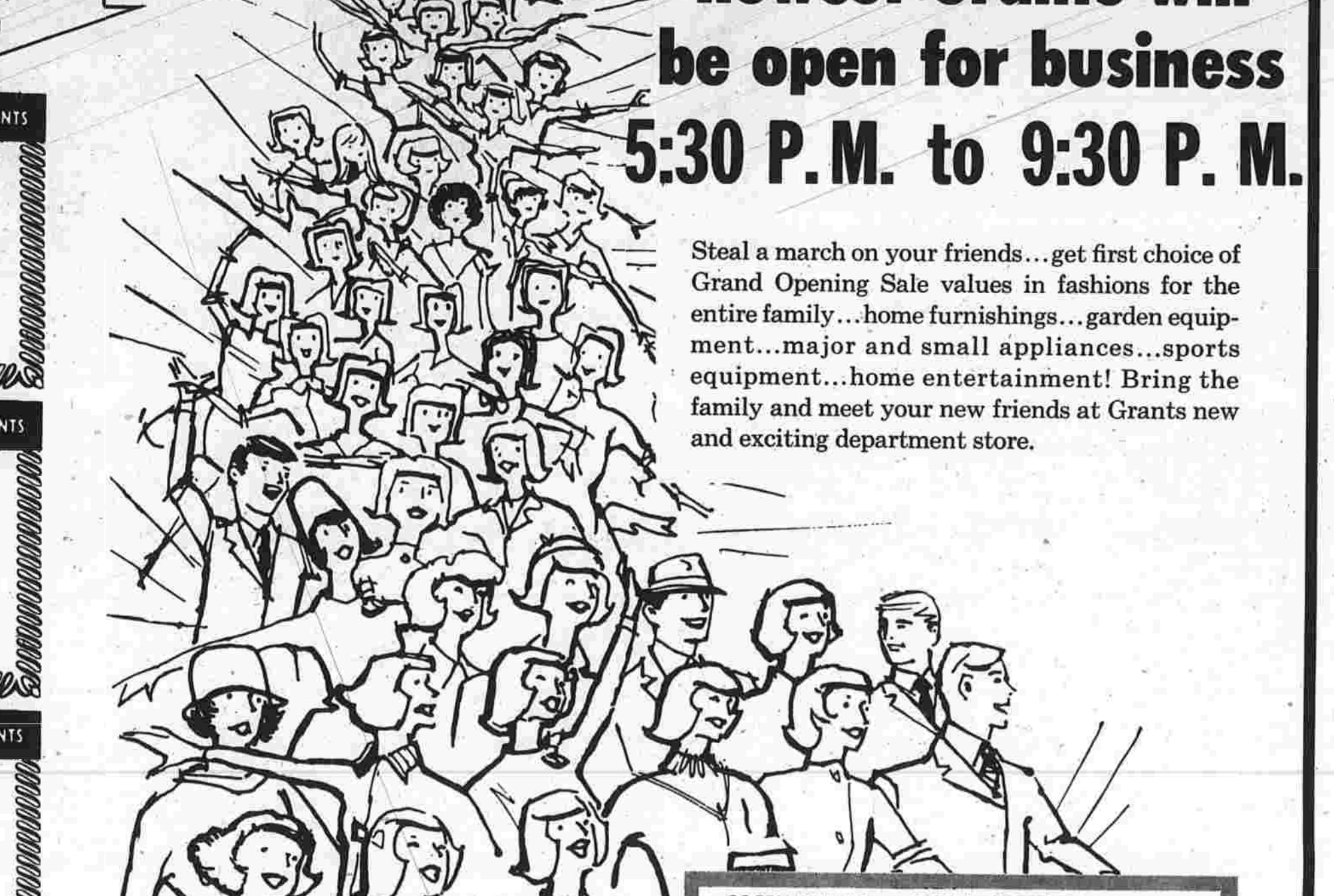

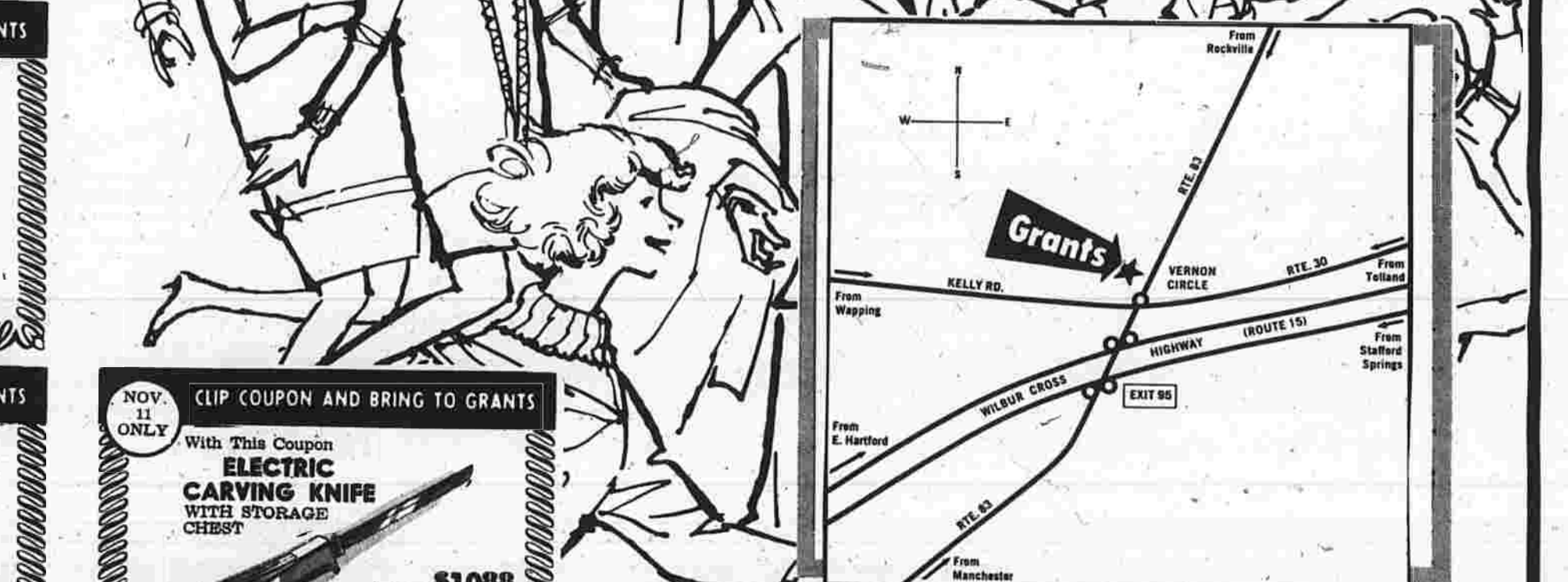

move or could have been aimed at forcing the Cambodian command to divert troops from its 20,000-man task force at Trang Kank, 15 miles north of Skoun. He said the government would not pull out of the Trang Kank area.

U.S. intelligence officers have reported recently that the North Vietnamese have gotten perhaps a month's head start in their annual late-year drive to replenish their ranks for operations during the dry season.

U.S. analysts estimate that nearly 60,000 North Vietnamese soldiers infiltrated into South Vietnam and another 30,000 passed through southern Laos into Cambodia during the first 10 months of 1970. In the same period last year, 47,000 North Vietnamese soldiers were estimated to have infiltrated southward, all but about 1,000 into South Vietnam.

On the southern Cambodian front, North Vietnamese Viet Cong forces made an 11-hour ground and mortar attack on government troops in the Kratong area, 70 miles south of Phnom Penh near the Vietnamese border. There was no report of casualties.

A 7,000-man Cambodian South Vietnamese task force continued to meet little resistance in the third day of a sweep 20 miles south of Phnom Penh. The objective is to trap a North Vietnamese regiment reported in the area, but so far the searchers have found only abandoned bunkers and trenches.

In Vietnam, the South Vietnamese command reported that its forces killed 46 North Vietnamese and Viet Cong in three widely separated clashes at a cost of one man wounded.

The U.S. Command reported North Vietnamese-Viet Cong attacks on two units of the 26th Infantry Division 45 miles southwest of Saigon and 30 miles northwest of the capital. Two Americans were reported killed and 12 wounded; enemy losses were not known.

FAA in Study Of Plane Mishap

HARTFORD (AP) — Investigations have begun into a belly-landing by a small chartered plane at Brainerd Field here Monday morning.

There were no injuries to the pilot or four passengers. The pilot reported minor damage to the aircraft, but no flames broke out. He said the landing gear failed to drop as the plane made its approach to the field.

The plane was en route to Brainerd Field from New York.

The mishap is being investigated by the Federal Aviation Administration, the Connecticut Department of Transportation, Bureau of Aeronautics and the National Transportation Safety Board.

Kidney Device

WASHINGTON (AP) — Simpler and cheaper artificial kidney equipment may help double the number of persons now receiving aid from such devices by 1977, a government medical scientist says.

Dr. Benjamin T. Burton says several new procedures may help raise the 2,000 beneficiaries of kidney disease relief to 4,000 in seven years. Among the new techniques is the use of a starch-like diet supplement that may "absorb" poisonous materials.

Ultimately, Burton added, it may be possible to save up to 7,500 kidney disease sufferers \$90 million to \$225 million.
