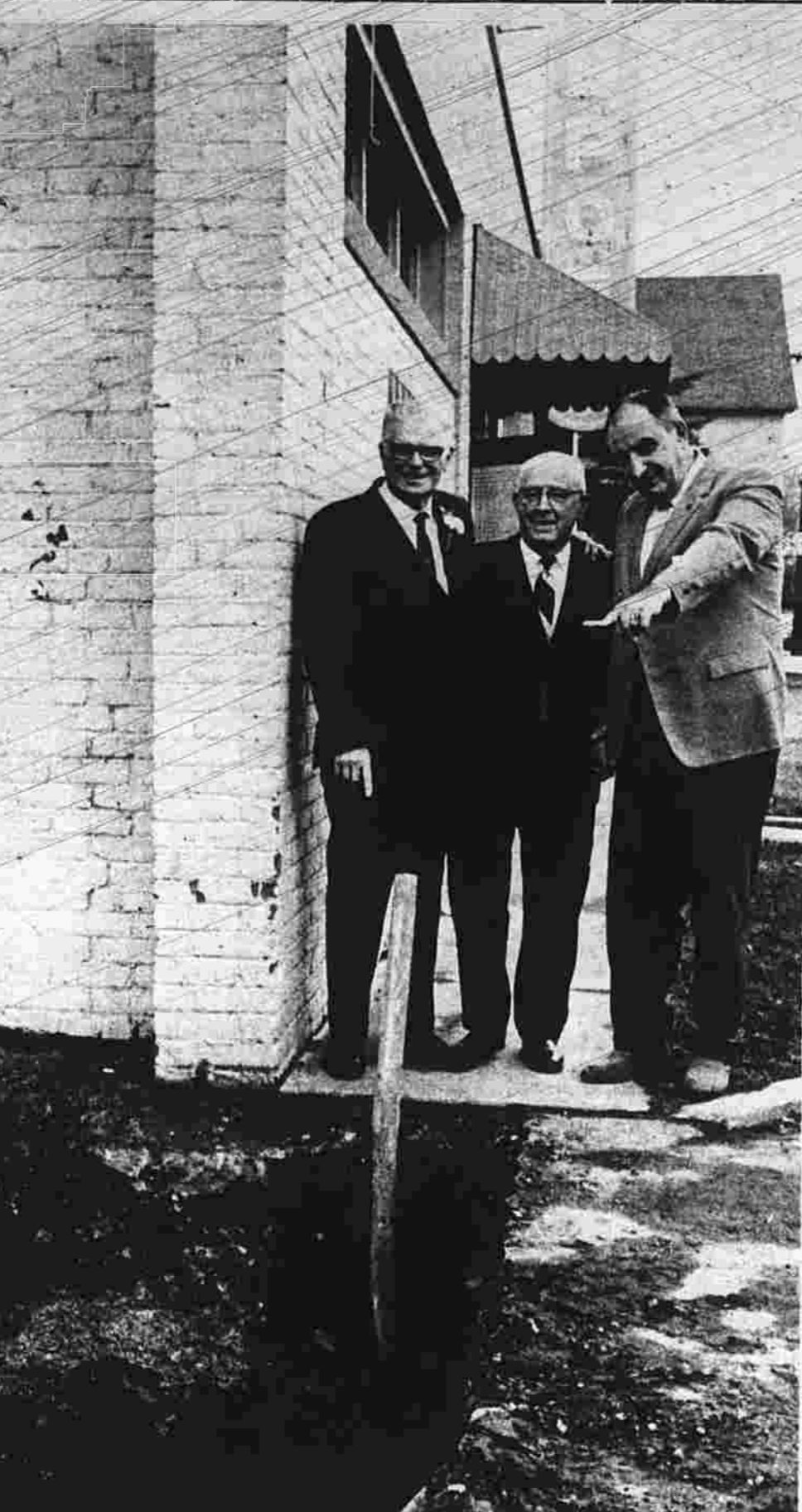

Gâteau Aux Pommes

| 2 eggs | 1 cup sifted all-purpose flour |
| 1/4 teaspoon salt | 1 teaspoon baking powder |
| 1 cup sugar | Apple Syrup* |
| 1 teaspoon vanilla | Cream Filling** |
| 1/2 cup milk | Apple Topping*** |
| 1 tablespoon butter or margarine | |

(The secret of this cake lies in the beating.) Beat eggs until thick and light. Beat in salt, sugar and vanilla. Heat milk and butter together to boiling point; beat in. Mix and sift flour and baking powder; beat in. Turn into greased and floured layer cake pan 9 inches in diameter and 1-1/2 inches deep. Bake at 350° for 35 to 40 minutes. Remove from pan. Spoon Apple Syrup slowly over surface of warm cake, covering entire surface, until it is all absorbed. Let stand until cold. Split carefully into 2 layers; fill with Cream Filling. Top with Apple Topping. Garnish with whipped cream if desired.

*Apple Syrup

Combine 1/2 cup sugar and 1 cup apple juice; stir over low heat until sugar dissolves. Boil 3 minutes; cool. Add 1 teaspoon vanilla.

**Cream Filling

Combine sugar, flour and salt in top of double boiler. Add milk; stir over low heat until thickened. Cover; cook over hot water 10 minutes. Add a little of the hot mixture to egg yolks; combine with remaining hot mixture; cook 2 minutes longer, stirring constantly. Add vanilla. Chill.

***Apple Topping

Place apples in small greased baking dish. Combine sugars, nutmeg and peels; sprinkle over apples. Dot with butter. Cover. Bake at 425° for 40 to 45 minutes, or until apples are tender. Stir occasionally during baking. Makes about 1 cup.

Honey Glazed Baked Apples

Core apples, being careful not to cut all the way through. Peel about 1/3 of the way down from stem end. Combine honey and orange juice; pour into centers of apples. Set in baking dish. Pour a little hot water in bottom of pan. Bake at 400° for 50 to 60 minutes, or until apples are tender. Remove from oven. Brush tops with additional honey, sprinkle with a little sugar and nutmeg. Run under broiler to glaze. Serve warm or cold with plain cream.

Old Fashioned Apple Pie

6 to 8 large tart apples
Pastry for 2-crust pie
1 cup sugar
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
2 tablespoons butter or margarine

Pare apples; cut in quarters. Remove cores; slice thin. Line 9-inch pie pan with pastry. Combine sugar, flour and spices; mix well. Rub a little of this sugar mixture into pastry. Arrange sliced apples in pan, heaping slightly in center. Scatter remaining sugar mixture evenly over apples. Dot with butter or margarine. Cut slits in top crust; moisten edge of lower crust. Place top crust over apples; press edges together; trim. Bake at 425° for 40 to 45 minutes or until apples are tender.

Apple Cobbler

3/4 to 1 cup sugar
1 tablespoon cornstarch
1 cup boiling water
3 cups thinly sliced apples
1 tablespoon butter or margarine
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
Biscuit Topping*

Combine sugar and cornstarch in saucepan. Stir in boiling water gradually. Bring to a boil. Boil 1 minute, stirring constantly. Add apples; simmer 5 minutes. Sprinkle with cinnamon. Arrange biscuit topping around edge. Bake at 400° for 30 minutes or until biscuits are brown and apples tender. Makes 6 servings.

*Biscuit Topping

1 cup sifted enriched flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
4 tablespoons sugar, divided
1/2 cup butter or margarine
1/2 cup light cream
2 teaspoons grated orange peel

Mix and sift flour, baking powder, salt and 2 tablespoons sugar. Cut in butter or margarine; stir in cream with a fork. Pat out about 1/4-inch thick; cut into 2-1/2-inch circles. Cut each circle in half. Arrange around rim of baking dish, rounded side in. Combine grated orange peel and remaining sugar; sprinkle on biscuits. Bake as directed.

From Your Neighbor's Kitchen County Bans Detergents

With only six months of lessons, a young girl had the courage to try out for the chorus of Sonja Henie's "Holiday on Ice." Her enterprise that day carried her far from her work as a medical secretary in Springfield, Mass. She would visit 22 foreign countries and take part in one of the first color spectacles on television.

There was a lot of fun and glamour for Marilyn Macdonald. There was a lot of hard work, too. Some days, the group would skate for 12 hours getting ready for a show. On an average day, practice was never less than nine hours.

For our younger readers, Miss Henie was a former Olympic figure skating champion. She took first place in 1928, 1932 and 1936. Her career has been unequalled for she won the world championship in her field for ten consecutive years. This is not to mention seven European contests. In 1960, she began her professional career as a movie star. By 1969, she had skated her way into third place as the nation's box-office attraction, surpassed only by Shirley Temple and Clark Gable. Her extravagantly staged and beautifully costumed shows were widely attended, often sold out well in advance of opening night.

Last fall, Marilyn watched a television show entitled, "A Tribute to Sonja Henie."

"Do you know," she said, "that the costumes were exactly the same as when I was skating with the show? They were in beautiful condition. The costumes could be ten years old and the audience would never know. They are so well taken care of!"

Marilyn had skated for her as a child. Figure skating probably came easier to her because of her dancing ability. She had been a member of Trunk Kaeschmann's dance group. The same type of condition is required in figure skating as for ballet. Just last summer, she appeared again with the same group. Miss Henie died about two years ago of leukemia at the age of 85 in her native Oslo, Norway.

Geschmetztes (Minced Veal) 1/2 lb. veal cutlet or other boneless veal, 6 tablespoons butter, 3 tablespoons minced shallots, 3 tablespoons cognac or brandy, 2 tablespoons flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon white pepper, 1 and one-third cups dry white wine, 1 cup heavy cream, 1/2 cup butter, milk, jelly with topping.

Trim meat of all fat. Cut against the grain into one-inch pieces. Heat butter in large skillet. Add shallots and cook two minutes. Add veal; cook for one minute. Flame with cognac. When flame has died down, sprinkle flour over veal. Stir in salt and pepper. Add hot white wine and cream. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to a boil and thickens. Serve with noodles or mashed potatoes and a green salad. Serves 4-6.

EVERHEAD, N.Y. (AP) — The Legislature of Suffolk County on eastern Long Island has voted unanimously to ban the sale of virtually all detergents in order to protect the county's underground water supply.

Exempted from the ban, which will go into effect March 1 following the expected approval of County Executive H. Lee Dennison, are detergents used in toothpaste, dishwasher compound and shampoo.

Suffolk, population 1.2 million, had been warned by its Board of Health and water authority that continued widespread use of detergents could seriously pollute the water supply and render it undrinkable.

"The law is aimed at eliminating products containing compounds that do not break down naturally after use," Charles G. Eustiman, vice president of the Soap and Detergent Association, attacked the new legislation as "irresponsible and bad technology."

He said the industry "will not take action against the law at this time but will wait and see what amendments are passed." He maintained that the major problem is the lack of sewers, virtually all of the county lacks sewers. Voters last year approved a 10-year \$275 million program for installing sewers in the towns of Babylon and Islip. Maximum penalty for selling the banned detergents was set at 15 days in jail and a \$200 fine. The ban does not prevent "housewives from purchasing detergents outside the county."

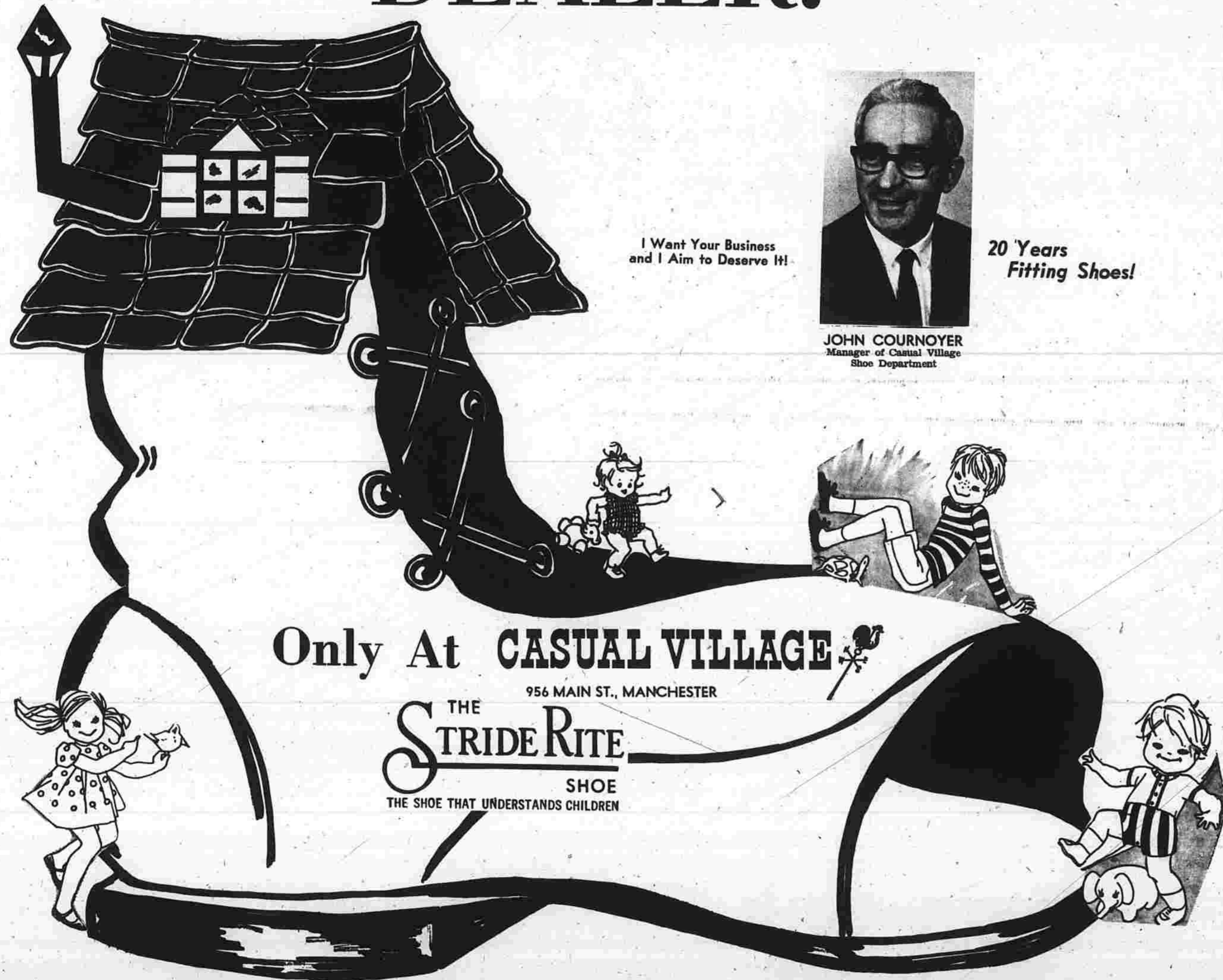

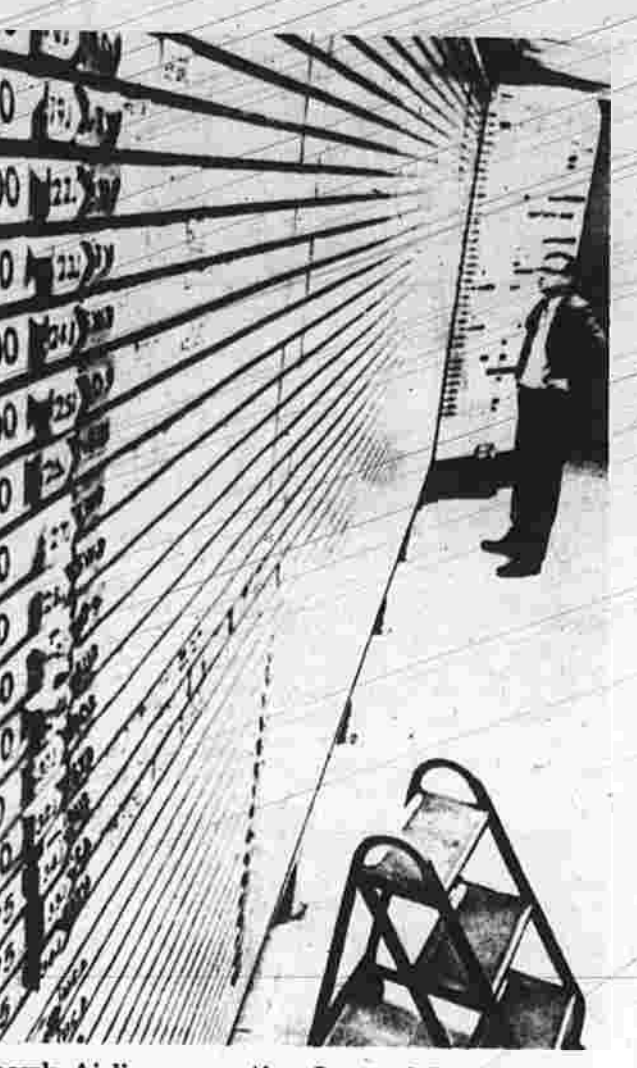
