Corporate Gifts Pour In, Despite Campus Criticism

NEW YORK (AP) — Every one has preconceptions and misconceptions about money, especially when it involves their own wages and budgets, but here are a few on a vastly larger scale — Corporate gifts to colleges and universities are way down this year because of the recession, student criticism of the establishment and campus disorders.

Far from the truth, The Independent College Funds of America, made up of state and regional fund raising groups, reports that corporate support of higher education continues to increase this year.

Thirteen state associations, for example, report increases for the 1969-70 fiscal year ranging from 5 to 15 percent over a year ago, helping to bring the total contributed through such funds to \$18 million.

The experience of the more inquisitive Council for Financial Aid to Education tends to verify the finding.

"Almost everyone thinks we are doing poorly," a spokesman said, "but things have held up very well." Last year, he said, some \$70 million was contributed.

He noted that in 1968, for the first time in over 40 years, there was an increase in corporate giving, but that the figures began rising again last year and that "within our experience and observation there is no marked drop this year."

Deaths, injuries and economic loss from traffic accidents claim that such a drop in the first year in the 25 years for which records exist is a total of \$16 million.

In 1969, injuries are expected to total 1.8 million, a reduction of 60,000. And economic losses are seen dropping \$382 million to a total of \$1.6 billion.

The institute notes that "while a continuing and significant loss ultimately would lead to a reduction in automobile insurance rates, such a reduction would take time in coming because of the many months' delay between experience to be reflected in rate-making statistics."

"The introduction of mini-cars by Detroit is finally opening the tide of imports from Europe and Japan, which had been taking an increasingly large share of the American market.

Tolland \$44,400 Deficit Seen By School Board

The Board of Education presented the Board of Finance with a four page report last night, indicating a probable budget deficit of \$44,400.

According to school board chairman Kenneth Kaynor, "The Board of Education appears unable to meet its financial obligations for this school year and still maintain a satisfactory level of education for the children of our town within the confines of its present budget."

Kaynor and Superintendent of Schools Dr. Kenneth MacKenzie blamed the deficit problem on inflationary economic conditions and the additional \$46,000 budget cut ordered by the finance board last year, over and above the \$60,000 cut by the Board of Education. Previously the school board had eliminated \$105,000 from the budget requests of the school administration.

The school board informed last year's annual town meeting that it most likely would have to come back for more funds in the spring if the budget was approved as recommended by the Board of Finance.

Dr. MacKenzie and Kaynor last night agreed with a request of finance board chairman Howard Wolfanger to draw up a revised budget for the balance of the fiscal year in an attempt to save additional funds.

Later in the evening the finance board agreed to request this revised budget be ready for presentation at the next meeting on Jan. 12.

The finance board members also indicated they would set no date for the visit.

In the school board report, Kaynor explained he had personally combed the budget at the time of presentation to the board last year, and removed every contingency dollar that I could find as well as making reductions in needed educational services."

The result was the school board's 600,000 cut which "rest of the board felt was too restrictive in the face of current inflation, but which was in a spirit of full cooperation with the Board of Finance," Kaynor explained.

"The final education budget recommended by the Board of Finance and approved by the town was still further reduced by another \$46,000," according to Kaynor. "The Board of Education felt that it could not cut further into the educational program without severely diminishing the learning opportunities for many of our students."

Major deficit items:

A bill for late and unanticipated charges on tuition for Rockville High School for the 1969-70 school year totals \$12,130 and was received in August after the close of the last fiscal year.

The other is an increase in tuition costs for 20 special education children from \$900 to \$1,900 each creating a deficit of \$16,000.

The town of Ellington failed to bill the local school system last year for the first year of providing major data processing services, creating an unexpected bill of \$3,750.

Transportation costs are running considerably higher than anticipated," according to Kaynor. The mileage resulting from double sessions and trade school reimbursements were underestimated and the board expects a \$6,000 deficit in this account by the end of December. Some of the buses are presently running in excess of 180 miles a day, MacKenzie explained.

Snow removal is also a problem according to school authorities. Last year the board paid two private contractors \$535 for snow removal. The town did some of the plowing without charge.

Although the item was eliminated from the school budget with the expectation that the town could do the entire job, the road superintendent has no one else to charge and will bill the Board of Education, according to Kaynor who estimates the cost at about \$1,500.

Inflationary fuel oil costs have jumped 46 per cent, and will mean an over-expenditure for oil heat of approximately \$4,000.

An increase in the cost of Blue Cross effective Jan. 1 is expected to cause a \$200 deficit while an unexpected tuition charge for Jimmy West attending Pulaski High School in New Britain while a patient at Memorial Hospital adds another \$1,119 to the deficit.

Cost Saving Steps

The school board has already taken several cost cutting steps, and plans others to be implemented soon.

A budgeted addition to the teaching staff was retained in

Intermarriage Of Races Finds Friend in Court

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — A federal judge has ruled that an Alabama law against intermarriage of whites and Negroes is unconstitutional.

U.S. Dist. Court Judge Sam C. Pointer made the finding Tuesday in a suit filed against the state of Alabama and a probable judge by the U.S. Justice Department.

The suit came after a Vietnam veteran stationed at Ft. McClean, Sgt. Louis Voyer, 21, of Hudson, Mass., complained that he and his black fiancée, Phyllis Bett, 17, were denied a marriage license Nov. 10.

The two were married anywhere last Friday in Clarksville, Tenn.

Judge Pointer said laws that make it felony for a white to marry a Caucasian and a misdemeanor for a probable judge to issue a license to such persons are in violation of the Fourteenth Amendment.

He said such laws were voided in 1967 by a unanimous decision of the U.S. Supreme Court in a similar case in Virginia.

In that case the high court ruled that the Constitution, the freedom to marry, or not to marry, a person of another race was binding only on Virginia and the Alabama law was valid until specifically struck down.

Alabama filed a motion at the start of the hearing to dismiss the suit because the couple was married. But the Justice Department said they would still be subject to criminal prosecution under Alabama law.

Rham District Drug Problem Probed

It was felt by most of those present that this was a step in the right direction, but several of the clergymen expressed deep concern with problems they felt might exist at Rham which in some ways of the questions raised at Monday evening's Regional District 8 Board of Education open meeting on drug education at Rham High School.

Besides discussing the development of the drug program at Rham, philosophy and objectives of the program for this school year, area clergymen, interested parents and board members sought answers to the above questions.

J. Colin Pushee, principal at Rham, and school nurse Mrs. Alice Stone stressed the fact that the drug problem at Rham presently is more experimental than addictive.

They explained the present program in operation is mainly education through health, science and social studies classes.

However, Mrs. Stone reported that there are group sessions presently being held once a week at which students can air their problems among themselves without teachers being present.

"These group sessions will be greatly augmented later this year when further group orientation programs are initiated at Rham."

Mrs. Stone explained how ten teachers and five students had been selected to form a drug team at the Long Lane school dealing with group programs. This was the first time that a rural school had been invited to attend.

Presently, 30 teachers and students are participating in a six-week program at Rham applying the techniques learned at Long Lane.

Harry Megson, board member from Hebron, expressed concern that too many parents and residents of the district are taking a negative approach.

He suggested that "we show a little interest in the school, we can give the kids some pride in their school." This could possibly overcome many of their problems.

He reminded those present that board meetings are always open to the public but usually no interest in attending is shown until budget hearings or a meeting similar to the one in progress by Dananjari that "we will be in touch with you."

The consensus, however, was that regardless of the cause of the drug problem, it is, as Aram Dananjari, superintendent of Hebron schools, stated, "a problem highly charged with emotional and heartache—one that demands total resources of the community, home, church and school."

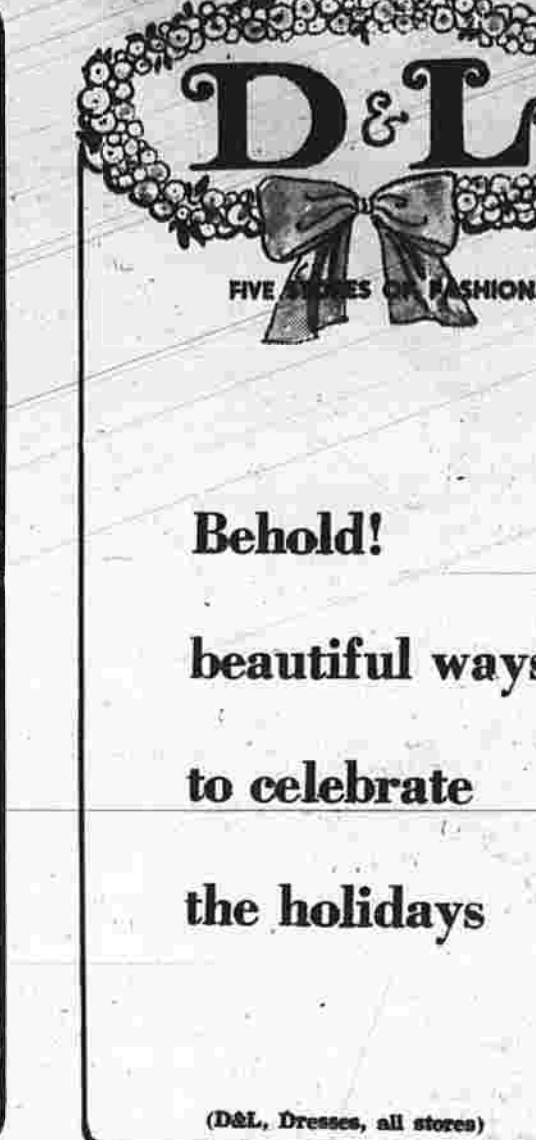

Canada Calmer After Cross Release of Munich Plaque But Relief May Not Be Permanent

By EDMOND LE BRETON Associated Press Writer. MONTREAL (AP) — Canada is breathing easier now that James Richard Cross has returned to the hands of terrorists and rearing in Britain.

But the relief is not complete, and it may not be permanent. The immediate continuing worry is that the violent Front de Liberation du Quebec—FLQ—separatists who carried out the other kidnaping—and killing of Quebec's labor minister, Pierre Laporte are still at large.

At least as long as they are, there is little prospect that the government of Prime Minister Pierre Elliott Trudeau, despite some opposition, will relinquish the power to take such extraordinary measures as holding a state of emergency without national troops, though less visible in their reduced numbers, still are deployed in Quebec Province.

Parliament has voted a Public Order Temporary Measures Act to replace the sweeping war Measures Act invoked after the kidnaping, but this continues the essential applicable powers. The new law specifically outlaws the FLQ.

As the first sign of relief dies, questions like these are being asked in newspaper columns and conversations: Is it true the FLQ has a program of selective assassinations and agents trained in the Middle East to carry them out?

Under the War Measures Act, 456 persons, all but 49 released in fairly short order—still resentment against the government? Or, on the contrary, will wavering citizens rally to the government to better its LePorte crime and in admiration of the tough police work and refusal to cave Cross?

There are solid indications of backing from Trudeau one of Quebec's own, in the province as well as the country at large. The cooperation among federal, provincial and Montreal municipal authorities is described as unparalleled.

A long-time political observer says Trudeau's Liberals would sweep the Quebec constituencies in an election were held today. A newspaper poll shows 78 per cent support for use of the war measures. A French-Canadian volunteer that he is especially firm against the kidnapers' demands, \$500,000 in gold, release of 55 political prisoners and an end to police investigation.

What the terrorists got in return for Cross' freedom was the chance to go into exile in Cuba, —separatists who carried out the other kidnaping—and killing of Quebec's labor minister, Pierre Laporte are still at large.

Trudeau said in a broadcast after Cross' rescue that the terrorist's father had backed so badly that the use of violence had been discouraged. The federal government would have "blown up the country" if it had acceded to the kidnapers' demands, he contended.

Prime Minister Bourassa in turn argued that the outcome of the Quebec premier's decision to well-organized part of the FLQ—and that use of the war powers was decisive.

While he withheld details that are still police secrets, the Quebec premier said: "The Special Measures gave police the powers to make arrests which provided information leading to the release of Mr. Cross."

Unofficial estimates give the FLQ a membership of about 2,000, with an activist inner core of perhaps 100 organized into a number of small cells. They are clearly a tiny minority of Quebec's six million persons. If, as many believe, they expected their violent challenge would set off an insurrection, they were widely wrong.

But FLQ strength is not a measure of separatist sentiment. Many more Quebecers stand for bringing about—by wholly legal means—some sort of special status for the province, ranging from independence downward. The Front Quebecois, which calls for an autonomous Quebec with continuing economic ties to the rest of Canada, got 23 per cent of the popu-

lar vote in the most recent provincial elections. Other citizens of the province argue that separatism is an escape from, rather than a solution of, the pyramiding problems of Quebec.

To the old complaint, not as wholly valid as it once was—that business in the province is dominated by English-speakers and young French-Canadians must learn their language and their ways to get ahead—have been added other, less particular factors. There are nagging problems of lack of capital and persistent unemployment—as high as 9 per cent, much above the national level. The cities, especially the metropolis of Montreal, are trying to accommodate a huge influx of population, with the attendant housing shortages and urban stresses.

Canada as a whole, far-flung and diverse in its regional interests, is a giant neighbor to the south.

Now has come the violence, and with it shock and shame. The Canadian Magazine, in an issue devoted almost wholly to the kidnaping crisis, described the mood this way:

"At 6:18 p.m. on Oct. 17—the instant the Front de Liberation du Quebec announced the release of Mr. Cross—the changing sense of security that most Canadians felt almost as a birthright was lost. In the midst of this innocent, law-abiding country, a small band of urban guerrillas had resorted to the insanity of kidnaping and murder as a challenge to our system on values and a fantastical gesture to the world."

Aviation Control System Tested in Frisco Area

FREMONT, Calif. (AP) - In brilliant green letters, "conflict, conflict," flashes persistently on the big screen. Dotted green lines run out from two points, eventually converging. The air traffic controller starts pressing buttons and in a few seconds the lines vanish and the word "clear," replaced its voice broadcast and shows averted nearly an hour before it might have occurred. This is being done by a new system of control being tested at the Federal Aviation Administration's Air Route Traffic Control Center in Fremont, across the bay from San Francisco International Airport. The program, which started a week ago, is a cooperative effort among the FAA, Aero-radio, Inc., which serves as relay center for airlines flying the Pacific and the French firm of electronic and communications firms. The new system depends on a "data link," a miniature computer aboard the aircraft. Every 32 seconds in a split-second burst of computer language, the plane's number, flight plan, position, altitude, speed and weather conditions are flashed to the control center. Stuff Diplomats Facing Battle In Youth Incentives

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department unveiled today a broad self-reform program aimed at pumping new life into a diplomatic corps it admits has grown stuffy.

Praised by Secretary of State William P. Rogers, the plan urges faster promotions for former officers, can act as a younger foreign service officers' government deterrent against the diplomat's voicing opinions opposing those of his superior.

Out of it all emerges the image of a fast-moving, quick-thinking diplomat bypassing older counterparts in deciding proposals offered to State Dept. the U.S. gets along with the rest of the world.

Acknowledging department shortcomings in carrying out the President's mandate that it take charge of U.S. government activities abroad, the diplomats portrayed the department as all too cautious, stand-pat and parochial.

"The traditional mode of re-education and detachment cultivated by diplomats trained in the old school," they said, "must be reinforced by a more dynamic and aggressive style if the department is to play the role which the President expects of it."

In all there are 600 changes drawn up by some 250 professional diplomats under Deputy Secretary William B. Macomber.

No single proposal in the 600 pages of 13 task force studies is drastic. But if adopted in complete form, the changes would amount to the most sweeping reorganization since World War II.

Some of the proposals are already being put into effect. Others are circulating through the department for recommendations on how they might best be implemented.

All are bound in a document entitled "Diplomacy for the Seventies." Among the proposals: — A system to identify U.S. foreign policy goals and set priorities in applying funds and manpower.

Nixon Listens To Pleas For Oil Price Hike

SANTA FE, N.M. (AP) — President Nixon has been asked by governors of four oil-producing states to recommend two riders designed to curtail crude oil and gasoline price hikes.

The governors sent a telegram to the White House after Tuesday's concluding session of the 92-state Interstate Oil Compact Commission.

In a separate action however, the compact mandated Nixon for retaining an oil import quota system instead of switching to graduated tariffs as recommended by a presidential task force.

The oil and gas conservationists also called upon Congress for immediate and effective remedial legislation in view of an eminent fuel crisis they said is resulting in part from federal control of wellhead prices of gas sold into interstate commerce.

Last Friday Nixon reacted to a 25 cent per barrel increase in crude oil prices by ordering the Interior Department to take over from the individual states the responsibility of regulating production from undeveloped federal oil lands. He also said overseas import quotas could be used to import more Canadian crude.

Signing the telegram Tuesday were Gov. Dewey F. Bartlett, Republican of Oklahoma; Gov. Preston Smith, Democrat of Texas; Stanley K. Hathaway, Republican of Wyoming; and David F. Cargo, Republican of New Mexico.

Teachers Ratify Hartford Pact

HARTFORD (AP) — Public school teachers in Hartford formally ended their three-week strike Tuesday night with overtures to a 1970 re-election pact that was termed a "disappointment" to teachers and union leaders.

"The union will now have to go to the community to lobby for the things they wanted in the contract," said Arthur Brouillet, president of the Hartford Federation of Teachers, as he emerged from the closed-door meeting where teachers ratified a new two-year contract.

There was general disappointment on the part of the teachers, Brouillet said.

The pact includes a 12 per cent salary hike spread over two years and improved fringe benefits, but did not include a number of major demands made by the HFT.

The contract made no major changes in the teachers' grievance procedure, no provision for a More Effective Schools program or agency shop and the old contract's language on class size was retained.

The Hartford Education Association, a competing teachers union in the capital city, issued a statement early Wednesday criticizing the federation's tactics as indifferent and irresponsible.

Britain Fed Up, Ousts Diplomats On Spy Charges

LONDON (AP) — Britain has acted to smash the spying activities of several Communist diplomatic missions in London with the expulsion of nearly a dozen officials, government information reported today.

They disclosed that over the past year or so at least five Soviet diplomats and some other undesirables have been ordered to leave.

In line with normal interallied cooperation in the intelligence field the British authorities have, in all cases, advised the United States and other members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization of their actions and the reasons for them.

The purpose, informants said, is to be sure other allied governments are fully alerted to the latest methods and practices used by their Communist adversaries in Europe.

The Foreign Office rarely, if ever, comments officially on matters relating to espionage or counterespionage and so spokesmen are under wraps against discussing the report.

Former Refugee Tells of Pleas In Defect Try

WASHINGTON (AP) — Despite the pleas and advice of a civilian, former refugee, the Coast Guard allowed Russian seamen to take back a Lithuanian sailor trying to defect, Congress has been told.

In graphic detail, Robert M. Brieze, president of the New Bedford, Mass., Seafood Producers Association, told a House Foreign Affairs subcommittee how Simeas Kudirka was held for a time, then returned to his ship — "either unconscious or dead" — in the hands of the Soviets.

Brieze's account was "about as sickening a story as I've ever heard," said Rep. Wayne L. Hays, chairman of the subcommittee.

Petition on Provension Land Being Processed by Town

The town meeting for a special session is being processed by the first selectman's office. The petition, which was submitted to First Selectman Percy Cook on Monday with the required number of signatures, was drawn up and circulated by a group of interested citizens headed by Republican Town Committee Chairman John H. Storm. The reason for calling another town meeting, according to the petition, is to ask the town to reconsider its previous decision in regard to the purchase of the Provension property, and to authorize the Conservation Commission to initiate negotiations with the executor of the Mary Jurovay estate for purchase of the Jurovay land, which is adjacent to the Provension property.

Should the town authorize the Commission to enter negotiations for the Jurovay land, plans are for the purchase to be made under the open space program where approximately 90 per cent of the cost would be borne by federal and state grants, leaving the town to come up with the additional 10 per cent of the cost still remaining.

Cook has stated that Town Clerk Mrs. Ruth Munson is now in the process of verifying the signatures on the petition received, which is part of a normal procedure. After the signatures are checked, Cook states it must then be confirmed as to whether the property in question is still available for sale to the town. Assuming that no other offers for the property have been accepted, and assuming that the executor of the Provension estate will await this new decision by the town, the selectman's office is then in a position to call the town meeting.

The law states that a petition calling for a special meeting must be acted upon within 30 days and the petition itself, if a meeting is called prior to Dec. 24.

or at least opened the door to pay raises. The pattern of voting would indicate that this is not a particularly good time to raise the subject.

Fourth, it should be noted that legislators pay is best considered as a form of reimbursement for time spent away from one's regular job or profession. How many citizens of the next two years at the state level can afford to spend more than eight months of the next two years at the state level? How many can afford to spend more than \$1,500 in expenses and a mileage allowance?

"In our opinion," said the Eagleton Institute #1188 report on the Connecticut Legislature, "the level should be high enough so that a citizen will be unable to afford services in the legislature, but low enough so that the legislature can afford to pay for financial gain." Eagleton recommended biennial salaries for legislators of \$12,000 on an annual basis, as it will in the next biennium.

Fifth and last, it should be pointed out that Connecticut has more state legislators than most states — including some which are much more populous. California, the most populous state in the nation, has only 120 state representatives and senators, compared to Connecticut's total of 215. Only New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Georgia, Pennsylvania and Illinois have more legislators than Connecticut.

If the General Assembly of Connecticut feels its pay is too low, it should also consider that its membership may be too large for such a small state.

The Eagleton Institute recommended reducing the 177-member House to its constitutional minimum of 125 members, perhaps that's what ought to be done to make palatable to the taxpayers what will otherwise result in a \$2-million boost in the cost of running the legislature for two years.

CHICAGO (AP) — The season to be jolly makes a lot of people sad.

They are suffering from what psychiatrists often call "Christmas neurosis." The holiday makes them feel lonely, sad and depressed.

And in reactions to it, some people may drink too much or engage in extramarital affairs of sexual deviancy, or other activities in which they normally don't engage, psychiatrists have reported.

Dr. George H. Pollack, director-designate of The Institute for Psychoanalysis, says, "At times people do various things to overcome a depressed feeling." In an interview, he cited the repetition for more of a sense of Christmas office parties as an attempt to achieve "pseudo happiness."

There is no way of estimating how many people are depressed at Christmas, he said, but for those who do, Dr. Pollack advised various things to search for on their own "to try to determine what is making them unhappy. Being aware of a problem can open up mental associations which help to overcome the depression."

And if a friend or relative has the Christmas blues, it doesn't do any good just to tell him to cheer up, Dr. Pollack said. The person has a reason for his depression. He needs to try to understand why.

Congress In Middle On Strikes

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress was in a familiar spot today—the middle—in the threatened nationwide rail strike, and Senate Republicans were demanding action so it won't be caught again.

But the odds are that what happened before will happen again. The strike crisis will pass, and so will pressure for a permanent solution for national emergency strike situations.

The administration's request Tuesday for temporary emergency legislation to limit off a walkout set for a minute after midnight Thursday in the fifth such strike since 1965.

President Nixon's request for legislation to avert the currently threatened walkout for 48 days produced Democratic demands for direct White House intervention to avoid labor and management to settle the issue.

Republican leaders urged approval of the Nixon request, and Sen. Robert P. Griffin of Michigan, the GOP whip, said Congress is in for a "long, unmanageable and inexcusable failure" to act on permanent legislation.

Nixon has proposed legislation empowering the president to order cooling off periods of up to 30 days in transportation strikes threatening the national health.

It would authorize him to order partial operation of a strike-breaking operation of a strike-breaking operation of a strike-breaking operation.

Griffin introduced the bill last Feb. 28. He said Tuesday if it had become law, the current strike would have been avoided.

Nothing was done about the measure, but Sen. Jacob K. Javits, N.Y., said he hopes for action on general emergency strike legislation next year.

The current strike threat led Democrats to urge that Nixon summon labor and management to the White House and press them to frame their own settlement.

Sen. Mike Mansfield, the majority leader, said Nixon should consider "the placing of his own personal prestige on the line, so to speak."

A TREE FOR CHRISTMAS



The kind of tree you get—pine, spruce, fir, or other—will depend on what the local lots have to offer for sale, or what you can cut wild. This illustration shows you how you can identify some of the favorites, including Scotch pine, an immigrant from Europe; Douglas fir, a native of the U.S. West Coast; and balsam fir, native to the northeastern states.

BLUE SPRUCE
Needles are about an inch long, four-sided, silvery green to blue green, stout, rigid, short-pointed and extended at right angles from nearly all sides of the twig. Twigs are straight and dark yellow brown.

BALSAM FIR
Its twig grows out almost perpendicular to the branches. Needles are usually flattened, short—1/2 to 1 1/4-inch long—dark green, rounded and notched at the tip.

WHITE FIR
Branches are yellowish green and needles are flat, 1 1/4- to 2-inches long, pale green, irregularly arranged and curve upward and outward.

DOUGLAS FIR
It has horizontal branches with pendulous branchlets. Needles are flat, short—1/2 to 1 1/4-inch long and dark yellow green to blue green.

SCOTCH PINE
In young trees, branches are regularly branched. Needles occur in clusters of two and are usually twisted, 1/2 to 3/4-inch long, bluish or grayish green.

THE FAMILY LAWYER

Fair Warning

While a housewife was polishing her dining room table, the telephone rang in the kitchen. Although she was out of the room only a few minutes, her infant son managed to take a drink of the furniture polish. It was poisonous, and the child died.

In due course, the victim's parents filed a damage suit against the manufacturer of the polish. They charged that the label failed to warn how dangerous the polish was.

True, the label did contain the words "May be harmful if swallowed." Nevertheless, the company was indeed held liable for the tragedy. The words were found to be too mild a warning for so deadly a product.

One of the common issues in product liability cases is whether the manufacturer has given the user "fair warning" of possible danger. Generally speaking, the warning should be as conspicuous and as urgent as the danger reasonably calls for.

To judge the adequacy of a particular warning, courts will weigh various factors. Thus, a label on paint, listing a dangerous ingredient, was held inadequate because the ingredient was disclosed only by its chemical name, which few users would understand.

And the warning on a cleaning fluid was held inadequate because it was printed in letters that were too small.

On the other hand, when the warning is false, it is not the manufacturer's fault if the user simply fails to pay attention to it. For example:

An adhesive compound, placed too close to an open flame, exploded and injured the user. But when he sued for damages, the company pointed out that the label had a plain and positive warning of the danger. Accordingly, the victim's claim was turned down.

Furthermore, many dangers are so obvious that no warning is needed at all. As one judge put it: "A knife will cut and a stove will burn; but no authority holds that manufacturers must warn of such contingencies. No one needs notice of what he already knows."

Olivier Waits For Peerage

By JAMES F. KING Associated Press Writer LONDON (AP) — Sir Laurence Olivier is still waiting in the wings to take his seat in the House of Lords.

The 63-year-old Shakespearean actor was made a peer by Queen Elizabeth II last June but complications have arisen over his choice of a title.

There was a previous Lord Olivier, a former governor of Jamaica, who died in 1923. He had no son to carry on the title, but left four daughters. One of them is still alive.

When there has been a previous holder of a title with the same name, the Queen's King of Arms, Sir Anthony Wagner, must be satisfied that there is no possibility of a "forgotten claimant turning up."

The usual procedure is to consult the descendants of the previous peer.

Until this is straightened out, Sir Laurence must wait for his peerage to be gazetted—that is given an official stamp by being printed in the London Gazette, the journal which records all crown announcements.

The usual easy solution in such cases is for the new peer to add a place name to his title: Lord Olivier of ... (whatever place he chooses).

Sir Laurence is in no hurry to take his seat as he doesn't plan "to get involved politically" though he intends to speak "if I think I can be of use to some particular cause."

And he says he isn't fussy about his title—"nothing grandiose," probably Lord Olivier that's all.

Farmer Quits HEW Office

WASHINGTON (AP) — James Farmer is returning to his old role as a civil rights activist after what he says were generally unhappy 20 months inside the federal bureaucracy.

"I must confess that I chafe in the ponderous bureaucracy and long—especially now—for my old role as advocate, critic, activist," said the 50-year-old former head of the Congress of Racial Equality in announcing his resignation Monday as an assistant secretary of Health, Education and Welfare.

Farmer, one of the Nixon administration's top black officials and probably its best known, said the crucial factor in his resignation was not his disagreement with the President's racial policies.

"I haven't been satisfied with the civil rights policies of any administration," he said at a news conference. "I have had differences with this administration as with other administrations."

Farmer declined to disclose these disagreements until he leaves the government in two weeks to lecture, write his autobiography, and organize a "think tank" to inject the ideas of minority groups into government.

His goal, he said, is to address the racial and economic divisions of the nation.

Gal Graduates In a Hard Hat

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Anne Stanford is the softest hard hat in town.

The Gainesville cop is carrying a "B" average in building construction at the University of Florida and will graduate this week with nothing but males at her side.

"I think I cramped a few instructors' styles," said the blue-eyed student who had to leave out the four-letter words.

There have been 1,000 building construction graduates at the university, but not one wore skits.

Although entering a field loaded with guys, Miss Stanford doesn't want the "women's lib" tag. "I don't approve of their methods," she said. "I think women are going too far and making fools out of themselves."

Earlier this year, Anne became the first woman ever admitted to Sigma Lambda Chi, national honorary scholastic fraternity for building construction.

Miss Stanford, 22, said her parents "wanted me to be normal."

She began college as a psychology major at St. Xavier in Chicago, but quickly returned to Florida to study at Polk Junior College before joining the UF build-ers.

She also says a woman's touch is needed in building.

"Men don't know what's needed in homes like women do," she said. "Women better understand quality and design."

Despite all the home talk, Miss Stanford admits her big goal is to be a "project manager on a dam or skyscraper."

Anne is eager to grab her degree and head into some job that includes "a lot of machinery and a lot of people."

Masses in Latin Fill Trumbull Pews

TRUMBULL (AP) — A return to the traditional Roman Catholic Mass in Latin filled all the pews of St. Theresa's Church at 8:30 a.m. Sunday.

The Rev. James Laughlin, pastor of St. Theresa's, said the traditional Latin Mass was reinstated after parishioners were questioned "to fill the need of the people who feel forgotten in the rush to satisfy other segments of the church."

The Vatican II council made the Latin Mass optional in 1969, suggesting that the Mass be conducted in the native language of the country in which it was being said.

Father Laughlin said parishioners indicated overwhelmingly in a questionnaire that they wished to have Mass said in Latin.

He said 1,000 persons attended the 8:30 Mass.

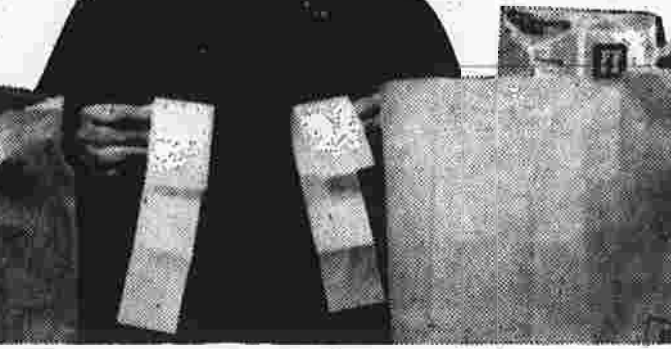

Class-Action Bill Dumped By Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) — Administration forces in Congress have killed another major consumer bill, tossing it onto a scrap heap that contains most of what President Nixon proposed in a highly touted message a year ago.

Latest victim: the consumer class-action bill.

One of the farthest reaching pieces of consumer legislation ever to come before Congress, it would have broadened powers of the Federal Trade Commission and permitted defrauded consumers to band together to sue for damages.

Senate Republicans twice blocked consideration of the measure in recent weeks, insisting they need "adequate notice" to prepare amendments.

Although Democrats a week ago vowed to force it through, both sides now concede there is no hope for passage in the dwindling and crowded days of the 91st Congress.

Senate Republican Leader Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania said he intentionally killed the bill with delaying tactics.

But Scott conceded "some Republicans feel strongly" about the measure. He said it had "a good deal of blackmail potential" against businessmen.

Sen. Norris Cotton of New Hampshire, ranking Republican on the sponsoring Commerce Committee, said President Nixon preferred no bill at all to the one reported to the Senate.

Backers of the measure said it would have made legal redress a reality for millions of people now too poor to bring damage suits.

But opponents argued the measure would have turned the federal judiciary into a system of small-claims courts, enriched private law firms and resulted in harassment of legitimate businessmen.

The class-action bill was the second major consumer proposal killed in the past two weeks at least in part by Republican design or apathy. Even though both were listed prominently by Nixon in his "buyers' bill of rights" unveiled last 30.

The other, which would have created an independent consumer protection agency, slipped through the Senate after Republicans abandoned last-minute efforts to weaken it. But it died in the House Rules Committee when Republicans joined with conservative Democrats to keep it from going to the floor.

But the proposal's staunchest supporter, Rep. Benjamin Rostenberg, D-N.Y., said the most telling blow was failure of Virginia Kennedy, Nixon's consumer specialist, to speak out for the bill.

Two New Yorkers Killed in Sharon Airplane Crash

SHARON, Conn. (AP) — Two New York men are dead, victims of the crash of a single-engine aircraft crash discovered here Monday.

State Police said Carl Turner, 56, of Poughkeepsie and Robert A. Tester, 37, of Wappingers Falls died instantly when their Piper Cherokee had both wings sheared off as it flew between two trees. They identified Turner as the pilot.

The plane owned by the Lazy S Flying Club of Poughkeepsie had been reported overdue late Sunday on a flight from Poughkeepsie to Westfield, Mass.

Officials credited the relatively quick discovery in part to a device rare on civilian aircraft. It is a unit which begins emitting a radio beam when an aircraft crashes.

State Police said they were informed by rescue officers at Robbins Air Force Base in Georgia about 10 a.m. that the aircraft was believed down in the Sharon area.

At Robbins, where rescue efforts in the eastern section of the nation are co-ordinated, spokesmen said the search area was narrowed through use of homing device.

State troopers said they found the wreckage—with a military helicopter hovering overhead—on the afternoon after a local woman also reported seeing it.
