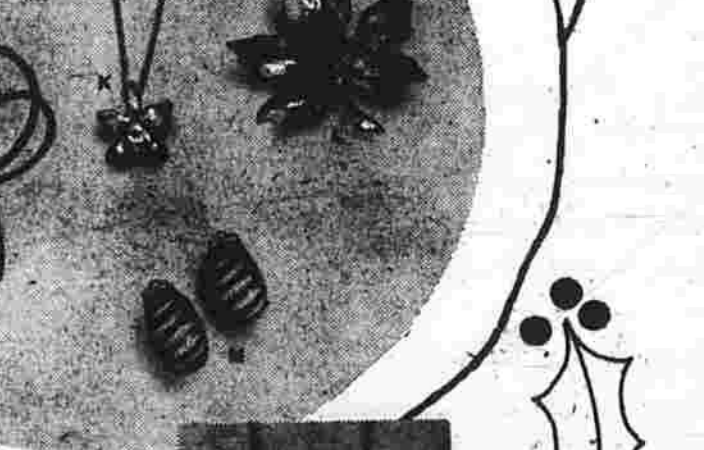

Who Needs Them? There are days when people wake up and find the circumstances of the world such as to suggest that perhaps the best thing we could do would be to turn the clock back and try to start all over again.

Mr. Hickey's Real Mistake While he was Secretary of the Interior of the United States Walter Hickey did many a thing which caused pain and disapproval at the White House.

Strike our power, as in Britain, and our transportation, as we have now begun to do in this country, and we could soon be well on the way to finding out whether anybody really cares about having a world that can run, or whether, as the signs would seem to indicate, we are merely a civilization of compartments each of which would even ruin itself in order to make what it considers just and necessary quarrel with the allotment of blessings to other compartments.

To try to apportion out the blame for this is an impossible and probably quite inconsequential task, just as it seems beyond human capacity to devise, in this existing context of interest, motivation, and license, that precise plan of sharing which might convince everybody all at the same time that everybody is being treated fairly.

Was Nov. 2 The High Point? Everybody — this page included — concluded that Senator Edmund S. Muskie's election eve performance last Nov. 2, gave him a tremendous boost toward his party's nomination for President in 1972.

Getting back with Senator Muskie, it has to be noted that although his "boom" continues, in that pundits after pundit now concede him the leading position in the Democratic race, those appearances the Senator has made since that Nov. 2 triumph have not seemed to carry forward the electric kind of promise he seemed to offer that particular evening.

Perhaps it would be wise to recapitulate the components of that Nov. 2 situation. The 1970 campaign had, in its first few days, seen the President deserting leadership in order to go out on the stump as an arm-filting prosecutor who was serving his law and order warrants on all the dissidents of our time. He had substituted "for the lower voice of his

own. Inaugural, he shouted political pick. Immediately following the special election eve presentation of this kind of Nixon, there came the Muskie program. Muskie was immaculate, dignified and freshly calm, except for the dramatic moments in which the script called for a flush of righteous indignation to creep into his voice. He looked soaped and wholesome. He had beautifully constructed sentences, many of them contrived by the most talented ghost writers for Presidents and Presidents-elect candidates of our time. The camera work was beautiful.

All the elements of that particular evening conspired to leave Muskie shining like a rare, long-sought jewel in the midst of a drab and jangled world. Recapitulating that evening now, it seems doubtful that Muskie will ever again find his particular and special magic repeating itself for him. There could not be, for anybody, any unending repetition of such a shining hour.

And the next few times Senator Muskie was seen he was, indeed, quite human again, somehow not quite that handsome again, somehow not quite so magnificently pertinent in his language, somehow, after all, one of the possibilities for future honor from his party, and perhaps the leading possibility, but nowhere near a real acclamation from the American people. Right now, we think, the cynical American electorate is not ready to buy anybody for 1972, and not very content if it will have distinguished choices then.

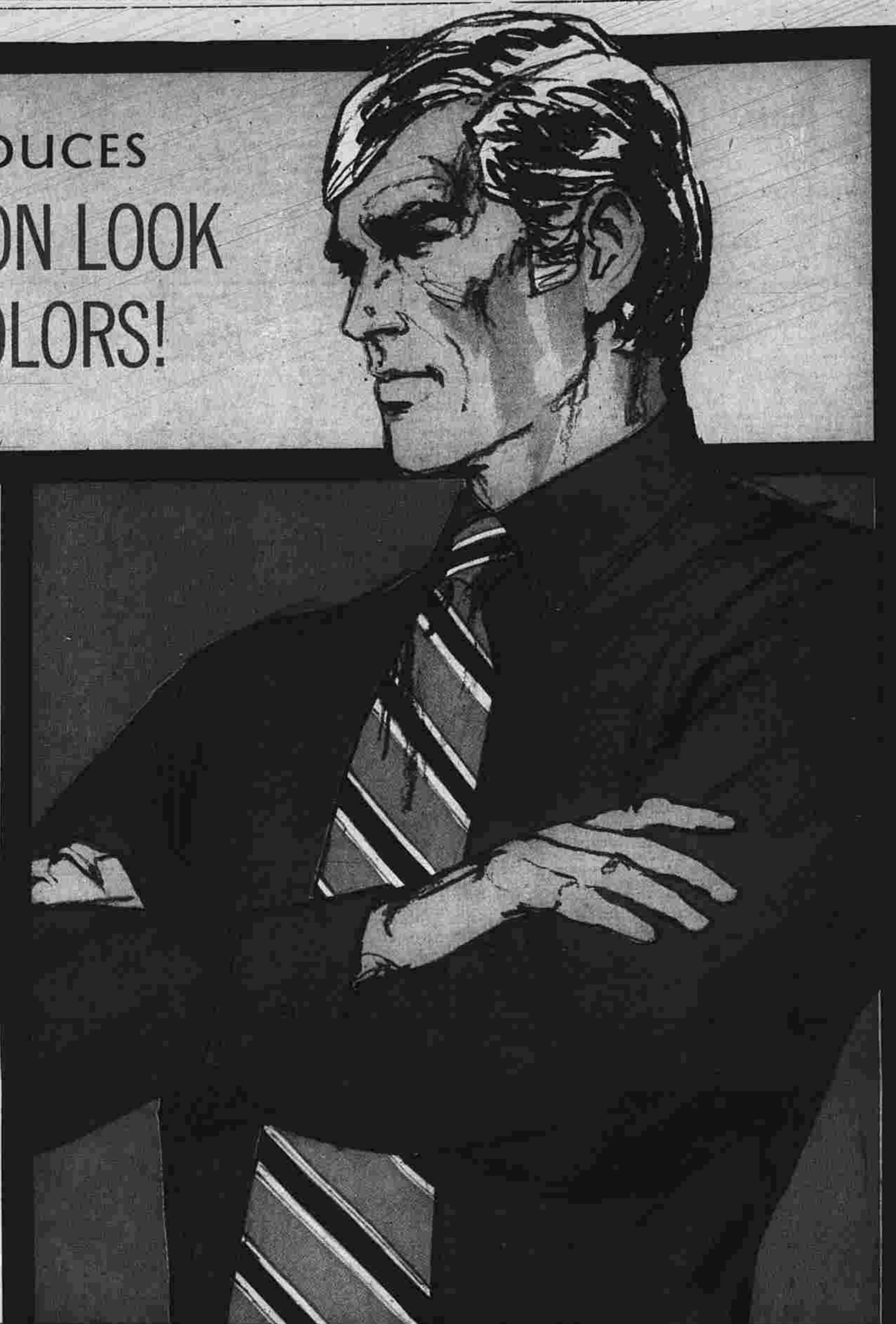

Select Rules Committee
Democrats Name Group of Five
To Aid, Advise Their Directors

In order to stimulate greater involvement in town policy and affairs by the three minority Democrats on the Board of Directors, the Democratic Town Committee last night authorized a five-member Political Action Committee.

The committee consists of Atty. Joseph Conti, Atty. Richard Woodhouse, Miss Mary Ann Pazianos, John Tani and Jay Stager. Its function will be to assist the three Democratic directors in researching existing problems, in recommending possible solutions, in proposing new actions, and in publicizing the activities and involvements of the board's minority.

In addition, the committee will serve as liaison between the directors and their constituents Democrats on the town committee and in the separate seven Voting Districts — to bring town problems to the attention of the directors and board actions to the attention of the voters.

Creation of the committee was recommended by the town committee's executive board, with backing by the three Democratic directors — Anthony Pietranzono, William Placido and Jon Norris.

Meriarty Diassio, a committee member, voiced opposition last night to creation of the Political Action Committee — veteran member Matt Moriarty.

He warned that the action "denotes lack of confidence in their elected officials." Moriarty insisted, "Our three town committees chairman; Democratic directors were elected by the entire town, and they represent and serve the entire town. They shouldn't be directed by an appointed committee of five persons. Their decisions and their actions don't need all that advise."

After Pietranzono said that he approved the creation of the advisory committee, Democratic Town Chairman announced its five members.

Names Rules Committee Cummings appointed one of the committees, also with far-reaching implications — an 11-member special rules committee.

"This committee," Cummings said, "will have six to nine months for a major review of our present rules. It may do major surgery on the rules, or it may leave them alone. I anticipate that all 70 members of the Democratic Town Committee will be involved, in one way or another."

He instructed the committee to hold hearings in the town's seven voting districts and, if necessary, one or more town-wide public hearings.

One of the immediate changes to be made in the town committee rules is the procedure for nominating candidates for state representatives.

Under the existing local Democratic rule, candidates are nominated in separate conventions in the three Assembly Districts, with only those town committee members who reside within the respective Assembly Districts permitted to vote.

The rule is in conflict with state election laws, because the Democratic rule, candidates proposed rules changes, the committee will be required to keep in touch with a special committee. It also reviewing possible rules changes — by a directive of the 1968 Democratic National Convention.

Thus, whatever rules changes are recommended for Manchester, must meet with the approval of Manchester Democratic Town Committee members, Democratic State Central Committee members, and a committee of members of the Democratic National Committee members.

The Manchester Democratic Town Committee voted last night to fulfill its campaign commitments to its state senator candidate and its three state representative candidates, despite the fact that it wound up the Nov. 3 election with little if any balance in its campaign account.

In October, the town committee agreed to contribute \$700 to its state senator candidate and \$300 each to its state representative candidates, provided the money was available.

Last night, it voted to renew a \$1,000 bank note, borrowed for campaign uses. Instead of repaying the \$1,000, which is available, the sum will be split among the four candidates — \$700 to State Senate candidate Dominic Squatrito and \$100 each to state representative candidates Hugh Ward, Francis Mahoney and N. Charles Eag.

Ward Complimented Ward, who received a spirited reception last night for a campaign in which he halved his opponent's plurality from one he enjoyed two years ago, thanked the committee for its backing and its active support.

"It was a real and rich experience for me," he said. "I received a lot of help from a lot of people — even more help than I anticipated. You can be sure of my continued work as an active member of the town committee."

Dominic Squatrito, defeated Democratic candidate for state senator, also thanked the town committee and its individual members for their cooperation.

"It was a tough year, but one of the greatest experiences of my life," he said. "I plan to stay involved on behalf of the Democratic Party, and I encourage all Democrats to get involved. There definitely is a future for the Democratic Party in Manchester. We had fine candidates. We'll have many more fine candidates in the future."

In its final action last night, the Democrats voted to ask the Republican Town Committee to cooperate with them in a cleanup project at town elections.

The Democratic proposal is for reducing or eliminating driveway circulars for candidates. The circulars have cluttered the areas at the seven polling places and have been the subject of much criticism.

Vacancies Filled Three vacancies on the 70 member town committee were filled by acclamation last night.

The 70 committee members now are divided as follows: District 1 and 7 have eight each, Districts 5 and 6 have nine each, District 2 has ten, District 3 has twelve, and District 4 has fourteen.

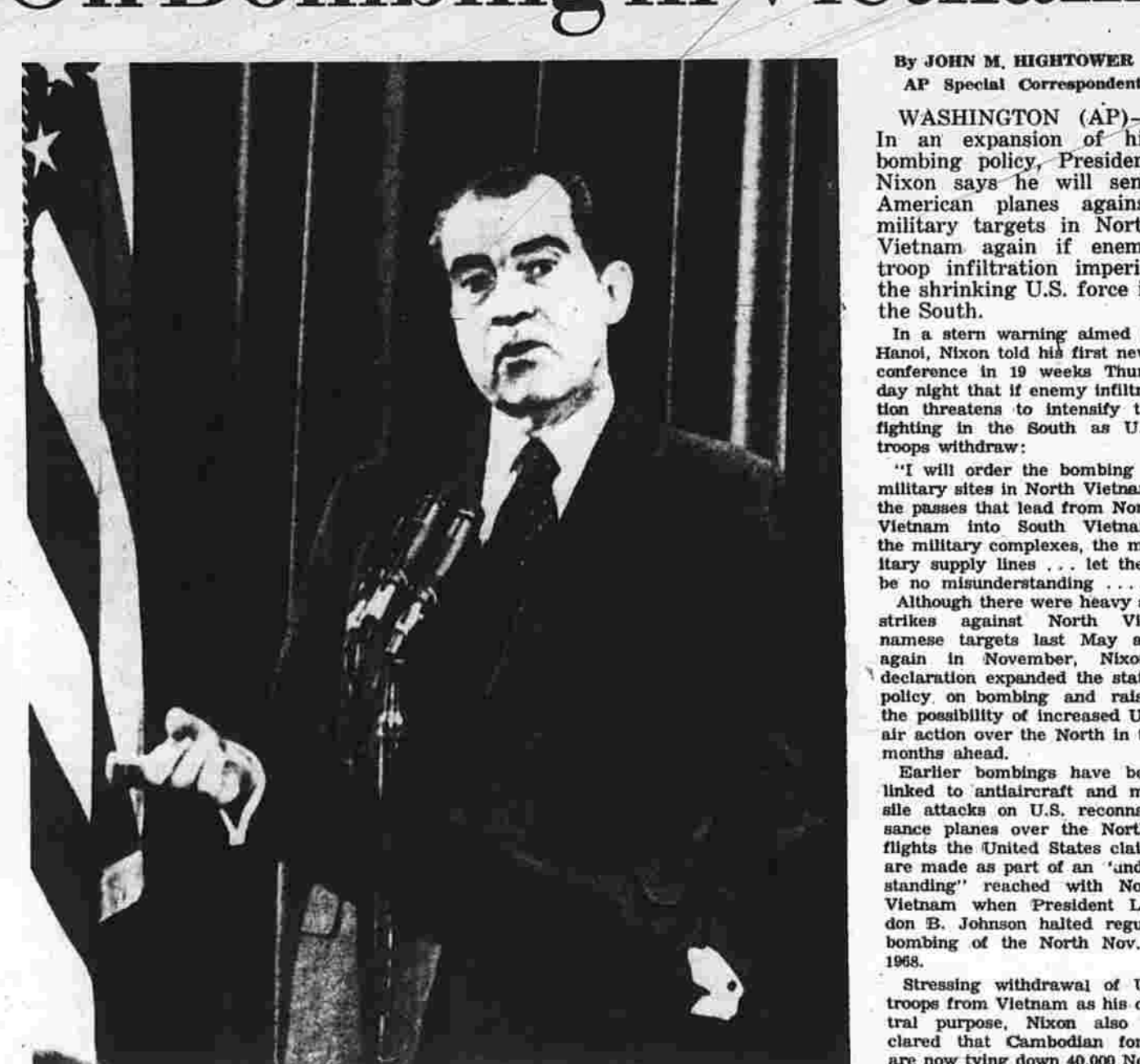
