### Janitor Held In Death Of Retardates

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP)—A superintendent of a New Haven apartment complex was being held without bond here Friday night on charges he murdered three mentally retarded young persons last August.

The suspect is Harold W. Mead, 44, who is married and the father of two children, police said.

Three victims all died with their heads severely bled. Two of the victims, Sandra Hedler, 28, and Donna Schletter, 29, were found slumped to their death Aug. 12 in West Rock Park, on the outskirts of the city, near a center for the retarded where they lived.

The third victim, William White, 30, was found slumped against a wall at the same location on a city street. He died in a hospital Aug. 25.

Police said the three had left the institution, the New Haven Regional Center, for a shopping trip the day they were arrested.

Police Chief James F. Ahern said the crime was linked to Mead through a late model Volkswagen blue car that he said witnesses saw near the spot where White was beaten.

# Late Talk Shows Under Guard

NEW YORK (AP) — Network concern over disruptions and uninvited guests on late-night talk shows has resulted in the posting of extra guards when controversial guests are booked or when trouble is suspected.

"You always have that fear—that someone is going to jump onto the stage from the audience," said one talk show spokesman. Another said, "We have to have guards. It takes a lot of bread to stop taping or cancel a show."

Every network talk show has had interruptions or uninvited guests. Two such events in the past few weeks illustrate their concern.

Opposing factions of homosexuals threatened to break up the Dick Cavett show the Friday after Thanksgiving. A leader of one faction had been booked as a guest on the ABC show and a leader of another faction had not been.

Members of the second group threatened in advance to break up the show unless they too were heard.

A compromise was reached at the last minute and both sides were represented on the show.

"We had no problems," said a Cavett spokesman, "but we did have plenty of studio security and policemen were on call in the vicinity."

On a talk show a few weeks ago a comedian walked onto the stage and complained on camera that he couldn't get a booking on the show.

Instead of having guards nuzzle the man offstage, and erasing it from the tape before air time, the talk show host let the man give part of his comedy routine. It was then passed off as a planned stunt.

All three network talk shows were interrupted by black jazz musicians who contended they were being excluded from television.

The Merv Griffin show was disrupted in August when it was still in New York. About 40 black musicians and supporters blew horns and noisemakers. The taping was halted for the day and the studio was cleared. Police were called in to stand by, but were not needed.

In September the musicians briefly interrupted the Cavett show. Leaders of the musicians met with ABC officials and a booking on the show was arranged.

The musicians also showed up at the "Tonight" show, but never got into the studio. They did hold up the taping for 10 minutes, then they met with NBC

Miss Parker appears as Dame Brinker, the mother who supports her family during her husband's 10-year illness. Basehart is Dr. Boekman, and Greg-

son portrays the ailing Raff Brinker. Ritchard is cast as Mr. Kleef, the innkeeper.

In addition to Askwith, two other young British performers made their American television debuts in "Hans Brinker"—Roberta Tovey as Gretel Brinker and Sheila Whitmill as Han's friend, Annie Bouman.

Nine songs, with words and music by Moose Charlap, are featured in the special. (Charlap created most of the tunes for "Peter Pan," the Emmy Award-winning special which was presented on NBC-TV).

Besides telling the story of Hans's sacrifices to aid his father, the special also focuses on the boy's love of ice skating and his preoccupation with a big ice-skating race to be held in his town. Racing sequences involving both Hans and Gretel provide an action highlight of the program.

Authentic locales in Holland were the settings for much of the outdoor scenes in the colorcast. Additional filming took place at outdoor locations in Norway. Production was completed at Studio Hamburg in Germany.

"Hans Brinker" was adapted for television by William Manhoff. Robert Scheerer was the director.

The special was produced by MMM Production Company in cooperation with the NBC Television Network.

### Agnew Act Stirs Public, But Briefly

NEW YORK (AP) — Vice President Spiro T. Agnew's criticism of television newsmen a year ago produced a quick spate of viewer complaints about news coverage and some changes in practices.

That is the finding in "Survey of Broadcast Journalism 1968-70," a report by the Alfred I. duPont-Columbia University awards committee.

The survey found, however, that attempts by several stations to encourage public criticism of news coverage got no response from the Public.

The story, entitled "In Dreams They Run," is a new Doctors segment of "The Bold Ones."

Jerry Lewis, who handled the directorial assignment (only his second such stint for TV), is best known for his zany antics in motion pictures, nightclubs and on television.

But Jerry Lewis is a concerned man, a man of compassion. For the past 20 years, he has been national chairman of the Muscular Dystrophy Foundation. Each year he heads a nationwide MD telethon and this year, just two days after Jerry finished "The Bold Ones" assignment, the telethon raised more than \$5 million.

When the executive producer Cy Chermak and producer Joel Rogosin received the Don Tait and Sandy Stern script of "In Dreams They Run," they immediately selected Lewis as director because of his association with the Muscular Dystrophy Foundation.

In addition to the cast of performers, several young victims of MD were given atmospheric roles. They came off with flying colors because of Jerry's understanding of their affliction.

on Nov. 13, 1969, brought more than 150,000 telephone calls, telegrams and letters flooding into the networks, with the tally 2 to 1 in favor of Agnew.

The vice president's office reported receiving 73,938 favorable letters and 3,784 against his position.

The DuPont-Columbia awards committee is associated with the Columbia School of Journalism and its chairman is Elie Abel, the dean. Other jurors are Edward W. Barrett, a former dean; Richard T. Baker, a professor at the school; Michael Arien, the television critic; Marya Mannes, the social critic; and Sig Mickelson, former president of CBS News. The report was edited by Marvin Barrett, who is director of the survey and awards, and was released Tuesday.

Agnew, in his speech, had urged the public to "register their complaints on bias through mail to the networks and phone calls to local stations. This is one case where the public must defend themselves," he said, "where the citizen, not the government, must be the reformer; where the consumer can be the most effective crusader."

The Radio-Television News Directors Association established a clearing house for members to register complaints about pressures growing out of Agnew's criticism, but six months later it had nothing to report.
