

Family Life Study Program To Be Presented to Parents

The Board of Education last night unanimously approved the study committee in which reports of the family life study committee but was hesitant to approve a date for implementing the program into the school system.

Fish and Chips Purveyors Fish For New Image

LONDON (AP)—The purveyors of fish and chips are being warned they must smarten up if they want to keep going. Generations of Englishmen have staved off evening hunger by wandering about eating fried fish and potatoes out of a wrapping made of newspapers. Now the new pollution regulations aimed at cleaning up the nation's waterways are simply "red tape," says the principal sanitary engineer for the Connecticut Water Resources Commission.

Robert Taylor said Monday that the commission was unsure about whether it would enforce the new regulations. The regulations are embodied in an 1899 federal law which President Nixon signed last week. They require a federal permit for a plant to pollute into any navigable stream.

Taylor said enforcement of the order would probably fall in part on the WRB. He said the commission already licenses about 1,000 firms under state law and that issuance of federal permits by his agency would be a simple "red tape" job.

Fish friers and their customers are not so sure. Ray Ryall, a spokesman of the White Fish Authority, commented: "People like their fish and chips in newspapers and that's the way it's always been. But we have had complaints that it's unhygienic. We are not taking any action at this time."

Ryall added that some fish and chip shops in the United States import old English newspapers for wrapping in the fish houses.

What the English call chips are known in the United States as French fries. Things you know as potato chips are called potato chips here.

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United Aircraft Reviews 1970

Despite a drop in its total employment during the year, United Aircraft Corp. reported a billion in the Connecticut economy in 1970. In its annual review of operations, Arthur D. Smith, 28 Raymond Rd., United's president, said the re-orientation in employment, from cutbacks and stretchouts in both government and commercial programs.

Smith said company employment during the year decreased about 1,000. United Aircraft employed about 60,000 men and women at year's end in Connecticut.

During the year, Smith said, the corporation put an average of more than \$1 million a week into the state's economy through its payroll, state and local taxes, and in purchases from Connecticut suppliers.

The corporation paid more than \$1 million in taxes to the State of Connecticut and to its cities and towns in 1970. Smith said.

Introduction of the Boeing 747 superjet, with its Pratt & Whitney JTUD turbofan engines, marked the beginning of the second generation of commercial jet travel. At the end of 1970, more than 50 747s had been delivered to airlines.

A major new engine program for the Air Force and Navy military aircraft was awarded to Pratt & Whitney Aircraft. Development work is being conducted at the division's Design, Research and Development Center. Production of the engines will be done at the division's Connecticut plants.

Early in 1970, improved combustion chamber development program for the JTUD turbofan to significantly reduce the amount of smoke emitted, went into production for new engines and as replacement parts.

An advanced version of the TP30, the world's first afterburning turbofan, went into production in 1970. It powers the F-111F, the latest model of the General Dynamics swing-wing F-111 series.

The Florida Research and Development Center successfully completed a ten-hour endurance test on its new 1,500-horsepower ST9, an advanced technology turbofan engine designed for short takeoff and landing aircraft and helicopters.

United Aircraft Reviews 1970

The Florida center also undertook a competitive design study for the main propulsion system for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's proposed space shuttle, and was selected by NASA to design and build a 5,500-pound thrust research rocket engine for potential use as primary or midcourse correction propulsion on space shuttle.

The Navy chose Pratt & Whitney Aircraft to supply a 20,000-horsepower turboprop engine for the Air Force, the Army, and NASA. The division also continued work on a program to develop a natural gas fuel cell for commercial use.

Hamilton Standard equipment played key roles in the safe return of American astronauts aboard the aborted Apollo 13 mission. The division's lunar module took over the support needs of the crew after the second stage of the Saturn V launch vehicle failed.

Hamilton Standard also built the Apollo guidance system used to align the spacecraft for re-entry into Earth's atmosphere. In the Apollo program, the division's life-support backpacks for the Gemini and Apollo astronauts.

The division received a contract to build the air inlet control system to regulate air flowing to the engines aboard the Air Force F-15, and is being awarded a contract to build the advanced engine being developed by the McDonnell Douglas F-15.

Pastore Election Under Challenge

PROVIDENCE (AP) — Martin S. Malinowski, a Providence attorney, Tuesday filed a petition with the U.S. Supreme Court to challenge the election of Sen. John O. Pastore and to defer his swearing in until a new election is held.

Malinowski had been ruled off the Sept. 15 Democratic primary ballot for senator by the state Board of Elections on grounds that he had not obtained the required 1,000 valid signatures on his nomination papers.

By a 4-1 vote, the Rhode Island Supreme Court upheld the board's action on an appeal by Malinowski.

Malinowski's petition cites part of the U.S. Constitution which says that each house of Congress shall be the judge of elections, returns, and qualifications of its own members.

The attorney is preparing an appeal of the state Supreme Court action. He said he is asking the high court to do the same thing he is asking the state to do.

On Monday Malinowski began an hour court action by filing an appeal in Superior Court of the Board of Elections' action which he alleges was taken without a tri-type hearing. He wants Superior Court to order the state Board of Elections to hold a full hearing on the matter.

Shelton Firm Votes to Merge

SHELTON (AP) — Pritigritrona, Inc., of Shelton and Griffin Laboratories, Inc., of Buffalo, N.Y., have agreed in principle to merge, a Pritigritrona spokesman said Wednesday.

The spokesman said Griffin would become a wholly-owned subsidiary in return for "not more than 500,000 shares of Pritigritrona common stock."

Pritigritrona manufactures eyeglasses, contact lenses and a wide variety of hospital equipment and supplies.

Griffin has developed a new type of plastic contact lens being marketed abroad and currently undergoing Food and Drug Administration evaluation.

The merger is subject to Griffin shareholder approval.

Lawmakers Polled
Wiretaps, Death Penalty Favored by '71 Assembly

HARTFORD (AP) — Police should be able to make greater use of wiretap and electronic bugs, no further state controls are needed on firearms, the death penalty should be retained for first-degree murder, no further legislation is needed at this point to put down disorders on college campuses in Connecticut and punish those responsible for them, and more professional police, more efficient courts and more constructive prison and jail system will help reduce the crime rate.

This is the way members of the 1971 General Assembly feel on "law and order" issues, according to a poll taken by the Associated Press.

Of the 61 lawmakers who answered the questionnaire, 48 favored more extensive use of wiretaps and "bugs" to catch sophisticated crooks—individuals as some respondents mentioned, criminals trafficking in narcotics. Only 12 expressed flat opposition to more use of electronic dropping devices, and three were undecided.

If the sampling is indicative of the mood of the entire 213-member legislature, the wiretap bill which was killed in the Senate last year by the veto of Gov. John D. DeLoach, Jr. should be passed with flying colors in 1971.

On the controversial issue of additional controls on sale and possession of firearms—an issue which figured prominently in the 1970 state election campaign—sentiment was almost as strongly opposed. Forty-three lawmakers said no further controls are needed, compared to 17 who favored additional controls—reversal of their mentioning handguns in particular. Three respondents were undecided.

"License and restrict handguns," said Rep. Rollin Mettler, D-Hartford.

On the other hand, Sen. George Gundler, R-Stratford, said, "The answer to gun control is not in registration but enforcement of strict and harsh measures on the illegal use of firearms."

And Rep. Joseph Pugliese, R-up, said flatly, "More controls are a farce and only interfere with the rights of law-abiding citizens. We have adequate gun laws but a rather lack of guts in our court system."

There was a distinct difference between the responses of Democrats and of Republicans to the gun control question. Republican lawmakers tended to be more opposed, 26 to 3, while the split among Democrats' respondents was 13-13 with 3 undecided.

Sentiment was more closely divided on the potential question of whether to abolish the death penalty. Of the 43 respondents, 13 favored retention of capital punishment, 26 wanted it abolished and four were undecided.

Drama of Apollo 13 Top Story of Year

NEW YORK (AP) — The dramatic flight of Apollo 13 has been chosen as the top news story of 1970 by editors of Associated Press member newspapers and radio and TV stations.

The editors' choices for the other nine top stories of the year, in order of news impact, were:

1. Shooting at Kent State and Jackson State Universities.
2. Vietnam war spreads to Cambodia.
3. Terrorism spreads across the United States.
4. Arab guerrillas hijack four jetties and hold hostages.
5. November 11 elections.
6. Recession and inflation in the U.S. economy.
7. Senate rejects Supreme Court appointment of G. Harrod Carswell.
8. Growing concern over pollution.
9. Terrorist kidnap and kill in Canada.

Panther Trial Top Story For Connecticut in 1970

NEW HAVEN (AP) — The continuing trial of Black Panthers in connection with the 1969 slaying of a party member was voted the top Connecticut news story of 1970 in a poll among members of The Associated Press.

The year-long saga of elections and electronic finishing second in the poll of Connecticut newspapers and radio and television stations.

The No. 5 rated story of the year was the series of bomb blasts, apparently set as a decoy during a bank robbery, and proceedings against two other defendants still fighting extradition from Colorado.

Connecticut had its first state-wide primaries ever in 1970 when candidates defeated at the party conventions garnered enough strength to force the U.S. Senate candidates in both an independent after pulling parties and the GOP candidates for governor had primary contests. When the primaries were over, there was still a three-rack sixth in the poll.

Ratchford Asks Code of Ethics For Legislators

HARTFORD (AP) — House Speaker William R. Ratchford has filed a bill that contains a code of ethics for state legislators, provides for a committee to enforce it and establishes a maximum penalty of three years in prison for violating it.

The code, proposed Tuesday, would prohibit legislators from engaging in outside business during their state duties, Ratchford says.

If passed, it would be the first of its kind for the Connecticut General Assembly.

The code would require that legislators file "written statements of economic interests" with the Senate Judiciary Committee. Ratchford says the bill would prohibit legislators and their assistants on legislative agencies to take or accept gifts or favors from anyone who has a business interest in a matter "which is, or may be, in substantial conflict with his official duties."
