High court strikes spending ceilings

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court today sustained individual contribution limits and disclosure provisions of the 1974 Campaign Reform Act, but struck down ceilings on campaign expenditures and spending by a candidate from his personal funds. The court, in an unsigned opinion, also upheld the law's public financing provision which will provide millions of tax dollars to conduct the 1976 presidential nomination battles and general election campaigns. But it held that most of the powers conferred by the act on the Federal Election Commission can be exercised only by "Officers of the United States" and therefore not by the six appointed members of the commission which began administering the law last year. The decision also struck down a part of the law that would have limited contributions and spending by individuals and groups which support or oppose political causes or philosophy such as the abortion and busing issues, but not specific candidates. On this score the court said "the independent advocate restricted... does not presently appear to pose dangers of real or apparent corruption comparable to those identified with large campaign contributions."

President promises more aid for Israel

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Ford has promised to seek "very substantial" economic and military aid for Israel, but no firm figures or new far-reaching agreements were announced after three days of meetings with Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin. Nearing the end of his visit, Rabin expressed concern Thursday about Syrian and Palestinian Liberation Organization actions in Lebanon. But he promised Israel will "continue to reach for a genuine peace" in the Middle East. He urged resumption of the Middle East talks in Geneva, but without the PLO. Diplomatic sources said as a result of Rabin's visit, the United States and Israel will increase efforts to get the Geneva talks started. They also said Israel is willing to have separate bilateral talks with Syria and Egypt in Geneva. White House Press Secretary Ron Nessen said Ford did not propose any new shuttle diplomacy in the Middle East, but has "accepted in principle" invitations to visit Israel, Egypt and Syria, without setting a time. Nessen told newsmen Thursday, "The President will request a very substantial foreign assistance program for Israel," he "reaffirmed there should be no stagnation or stalemate in the peace process in the Middle East," and "reiterated support for the security of Israel."

NEW HAVEN (UPI) — Four defendants convicted in the \$1 million Shelton Sponge Rubber firebombing returned to court today as the jury deliberated on further charges. The four were convicted in U.S. District Court Thursday of conspiracy to commit arson in the insurance scheme, and interstate travel to carry out the arson. Since his appointment in 1974, as head of the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration, John Warner has traveled more than a quarter-million miles, crisscrossing these not-so-United States. You might think that urging Americans to look back across their first 200 years to rediscover the nation's strengths of spirit and wisdom would be an easy task, says Warner, a former secretary of the Navy. "It is not always."

Warner points out, the ARBA has no power to tell anyone what to do. It can only advise and help state and local Bicentennial commissions in planning their observances. The freedoms two centuries ago included not only freedom of speech but freedom of taste, he reminds us. On a more encouraging note, he also reports that "what strikes me most as I move around the country is the great enthusiasm of citizens from every walk of life for activities that say, 'You bet, I'm proud to be an American.'"

Reagan-Shriver plans liven campaign

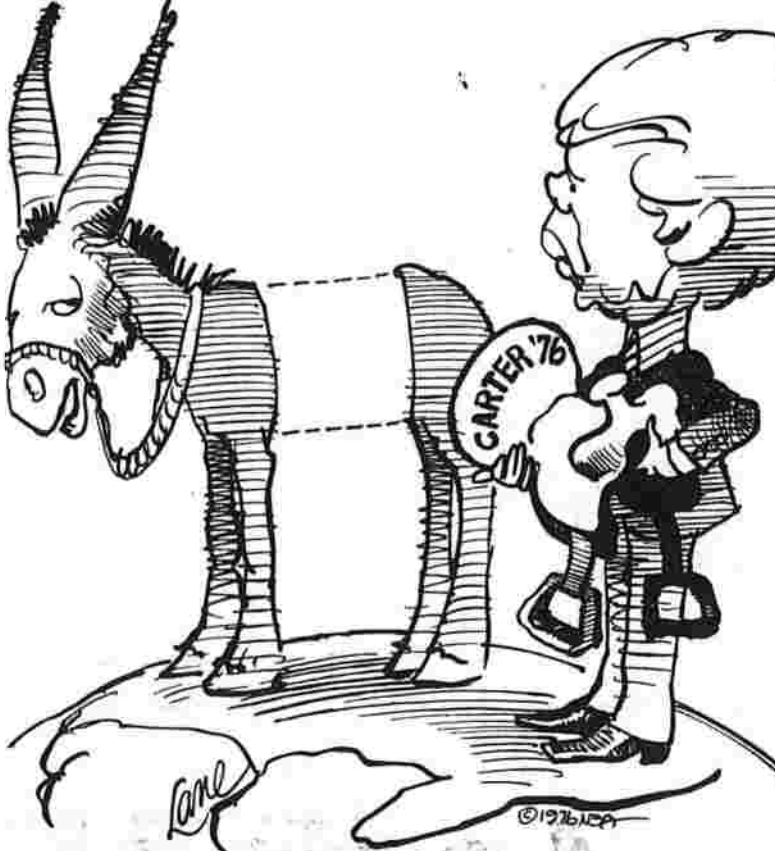
Old car taxes higher
