

Prices weren't too bad in the good old days. On Thursday, Aug. 10, Mrs. Begg wrote "Drove back to Frisco (San Francisco) and drove around the city. Had dinner near ocean. Went to Chinatown, crosse ferry to Oakland, camped at East Bay Campground Rented a two-room bungalow for \$1.25 per day. Men went to movies at night." The travelers took the same trails once journeyed by

the pioneers. "Sunday, Aug. 13. Left Auburn, Calif. and had all mountain travel, rising from 29 feet to about 8,000 feet elevation. Passed Donner Lake, and saw Donner Monument and cross for the pioneers who lost their lives in the snow (1867). Entered the State of Nevada. had a delicious supper in Reno, then drove to Sparks and camped there.'

Begg recollects the August night when he and his friend shot two "jack rabbits." The following day Mrs. Begg noted, "Found 1/4-inch of ice on water standing in pail. Men made camp fire of sage brush and cooked the bunnies. Passed the largest coppermines in the world at Kimberly, Nev. Among the highlights of their trip was a visit to the Mormon Tabernacle in Salt Lake City, a trip by ferry over the Shonshone Snake River, and a view of the beautiful farm lands of Idaho.

Begg, who in his New Jersey days, served on the school board, was instrumental in bringing manual training to the school system there Now, he still keeps busy making bird feeders as a

"I've been making them for 60 years, and have passed them out to many, many people. I just don't like to waste anything," he said.

He is credited with inventing the pop rivet gun, which in its modern version as in its prototype, allows workmen to rivet together two sheets of metal while having access only to one side of the job. Begg, who still has a sparkle in his eyes, doesn't get around much anymore due to ailing feet. But he
