Kindergarten signup

Parents who have children eligible for kindergarten in September 1976 may register them from 3 to 4 p.m. on March 3 and 4 at the school which serves the child's area. Parents are reminded to bring the following: The child's birth certificate, immunization certificates, proof of a tuberculin test between the ages of three and five, proof of having had measles vaccine or the disease, and proof of having had German Measle vaccine or the disease. The above requirements must be met before the child enters school in September. A child is eligible for kindergarten if he is five years of age on or before Jan. 1, 1977. However, children are not required to register for kindergarten if parents are concerned about their child's readiness for school. In the past, the Manchester school system has used a child's chronological age to determine his/her eligibility for kindergarten. This year, their developmental age will be used as a factor to determine the kind of kindergarten program they need. Parents are reminded to make an appointment with the child's doctor as soon as possible for a physical examination which is a school entrance requirement. A preschool screening program is conducted for all children who will be five on or before Jan. 1, 1977. For further information about the preschool screening program, contact the school principal in your area.

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Manchester week in review

The flu took its toll on town

Manchester's attention, like that of the rest of the region, was focused on health this week - specifically on the flu. One by one hospitals and convalescent homes tightened restrictions on visitors as the incidence of flu increased. Schools and businesses felt the toll of absenteeism. Indications were the worst is not over.

Fiscal matters The Board of Directors this week spent most of its time on fiscal matters, discussing all, approving most, rejecting one and tabling several. Among those tabbed was a proposal by Town Manager Robert Weiss for a new pay scale for about 55 top and middle management personnel - retroactive to Jan. 1, 1976. The directors labeled Weiss' report incomplete and instructed him to present a "professional report" before they even consider his proposal.

Help for Quatemala Manchester churches, schools, organizations and individuals began collecting funds and articles to aid the earthquake victims of Guatemala. The Manchester Council on World Hunger emptied its treasury and sought more funds to aid Guatemala. The Manchester Community College Collegiate Civitan Club mounted an extensive fund-raising drive.

Budget adopted The Manchester Board of Education this week adopted a 1976-1977 budget request of \$14,150,063, up 8.9 per cent from this year's appropriation of \$13,000,000. The school board's budget plan is essentially the same as the one recommended by School Supt. James P. Kennedy. The bottom line is the same, but the board shuffled a few thousand dollars in various programs.

The screening program was explained this week by Mrs. Lynne Gustafson, head school nurse, to members of the Manchester Memorial Hospital medical staff. 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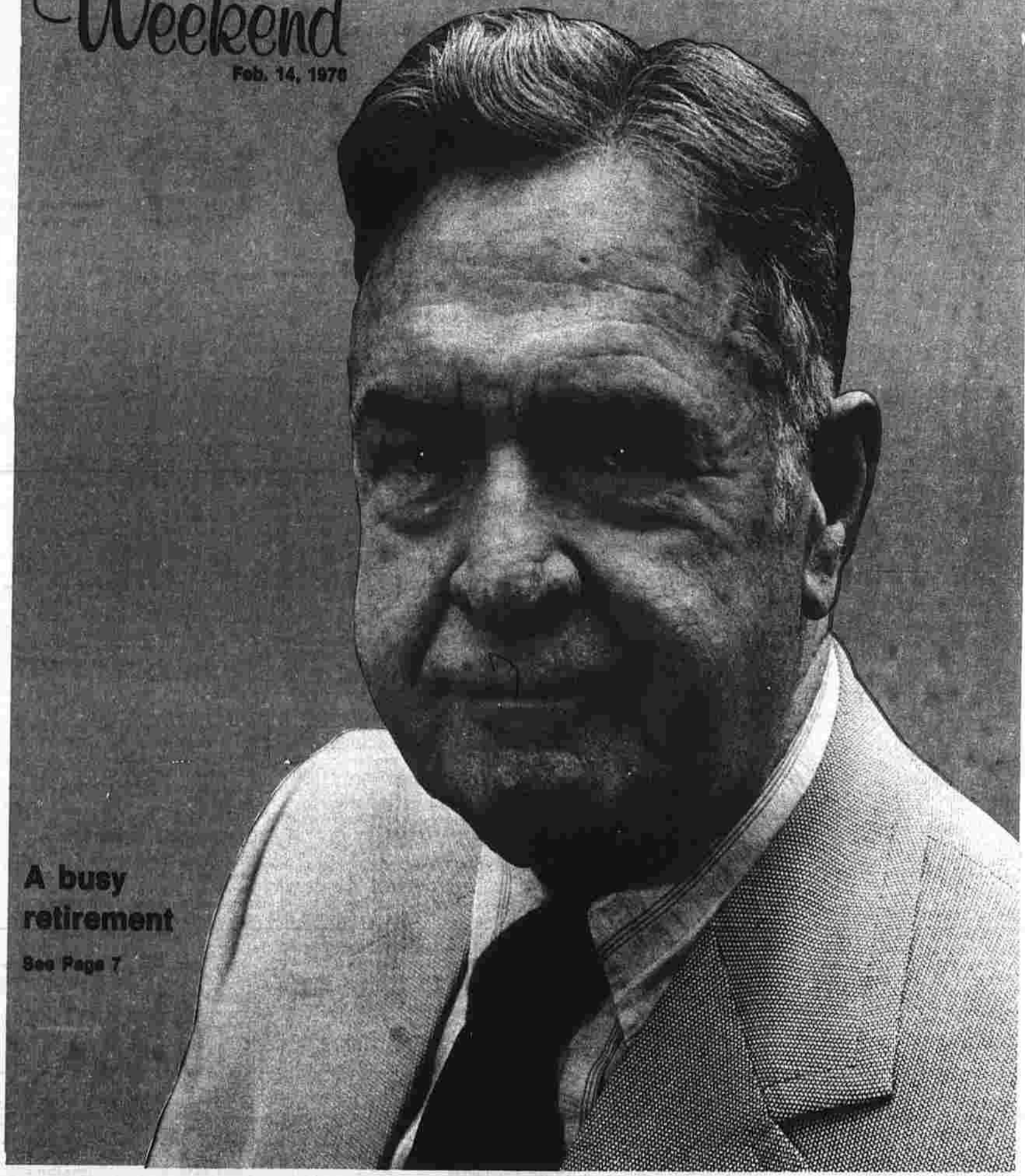

Large cents were worth their weight

By RUSS MacKENDRICK

The large cents of 1793 to 1857 are good hefty coins nearly as big as a half dollar. They are the product of an era when it was felt that the metal a coin was made of should be worth just about the face value.

When, in 1796, the coins were lightened so that the Mint was making a little prothere was an outcry of "legalized robbery" and "the scandal of the times."

The large cent and the half cent were the first regular coins authorized to be struck at the Mint in Philadelphia. The 1787 Fugio cents with the 13-link chain designed by Benjamin Franklin and the motto "Mind Your Business" were struck at New Haven, with dies made by Abel Buel of that city. The copper they used was salvaged from bands on French powder kegs left over from the Revolution.

This, and several other early coppers, were shown as slides by Herman Krajewski at the recent meeting of the Central Conn. Coin Club. The club library

also supplies the book "Penny Whimsy" which covers the large cents of 1793 to 1814. It is a revision of "Early American Cents" by H. M. Sheldon.

A preface by the principal author explains the unusual title by saying that the revision was a light-hearted task — almost a whimsy.

Too big to swallow

In it you may read that he hopes to give suckers a better run against shady dealers and that old coppers have survived because they are too big for kids to swallow. Also they have "a charm — an almost living warmth not possessed by gold, silver, or bronze." He gives the back of his hand to philately (fresh guy!) by saying: "Copper coins have a full sense of value and integrity not found in...bits of postage stamp paper." Later coins he called stereotyped — manufactured like so many buttons.

This well-illustrated book is a fabulous job, giving 60 pages to the 1794 cents alone (62 varieties). All of these show a neat long-haired Liberty with a pole carrying a cap. This design had replaced the "wild squaw with the heebie jeebies" — an unkind contemporary opinion of the 1793 Lib



with windblown tresses. The earlier coin came in many shades since it was struck from anything in copper that was handy. (Like nails, tongs, and George Washington's teakettle).

The flowing hair designs were followed by the staid Turban Head in 1808; the Coronet Head reigned from 1816 to 1857, when the smaller Flying Eagles took over.

The coin shown here is an AU (almost uncirculated) Coronet loaned by Benny

Gozzo of Connecticut Coin & Stamp on Maple Street. (In the pet shop).
