Retirement meant more work

When the Rev. Clifford O. Simpson resigned in 1971 as pastor of Center Congregational Church, people asked

"I think I've been around long enough," he replied. "Father Time has a way of catching up with one."

Today, five years later and approaching his 70th birthday, Mr. Simpson shows little, if any, sign he is slowing

"Retirement from my job by no means meant retirement from my work," he said. "In fact, now that I'm retired, I keep wondering where I'll find the time I need to do my work in the church."

In 1967, when he took a year's sabbatical for a trip around the world, his column describing his travels, "My Window on the World," appeared weekly in The Manchester Herald.

Once he wrote, "Part of the fascination (of travel) is the variety of experiences that await around the next

For Mr. Simpson, the variety of experiences never cease. He describes many of them in his current column, "Wings of Evening," now in its second year, every Saturday in The Herald.

Widely read by people all over the country (sent there by his host of friends), the column, even at this stage of his life and his career, has brought him a new kind of "instant fame."

He plays tennis almost daily (he is a member of Ellington Ridge Country Club and the Manchester Racquet Club), enjoys skiing and now is concentrating on cross-country skiing, plays chess regularly and with great skill and relaxes with his extra-curricular hobby, chain-sawing and chopping the toppled trees on his Spring St. property.

Recent activities related to his church

work include: Addressing Center Church president of the American Red Cross women at their annual luncheon, chapter, member of the Capitol Region teaching Hindism to a Center Church confirmation class, teaching another confirmation class the history of Center Congregational Church, speaking on the subject "World Hunger," in New Haven and West Hartford and twice in Hartford, conducting the "We Believe" Thanksgiving program on Channel 3, Hartford, and preparing to do the Easter

In 1970, when Mr. Simpson observed his 25th anniversary at Center Church, he and his wife, Elizabeth, celebrated their 35th wedding anniversary.

He's a founding director of the Manchester Land Conservation Trust, founding director and first president of the Manchester Council for World Hunger, director of the United Way, vice

Mrs. Simpson, "a wonderful helpmate" as he calls her, also participates as actively as ever in all phases of life. Her hobbies are making pottery and

Both are proud of Center Church's Simpson Educational Wing, dedicated in their honor in 1971.

They have three children: Paul, minister at Grace United Congregational Church in Farmington; Mrs. Fred (Anne) Flynn of Manchester, director of church education at Center Church; and Mrs. Kenneth (Martha) Broda, a teacher in Durham, N.C. They have nine

grandchildren - six boys and three girls. Mr. Simpson says, "I find I'm more intense in my faith than ever and more precise than ever in theology and in my thinking. At the same time, I find I'm a lot less denominationally-minded now than I used to be and much more friendly to all faiths."

He says his greatest concern is "the relaxation of morality by prominent people, both in their actions and their public remarks."

"It's a sorry state of affairs," he says. "Many of their pronouncements are causing people's sense of values to slip. Our young people are getting the impression that theirs is the life and they should emulate them.

"As a result, they're in danger of losing the glory, the joy, the tenderness, the physical pleasure and the wonderment of two people in love and united in marriage."

arge cents were worth their weight

The large cents of 1793 to 1857 are good hefty coins nearly as big as a half dollar. They are the product of an era when it was felt that the metal a coin was made of should be worth just about the face value.

When, in 1796, the coins were lightened so that/ the Mint was making a little pro-there was an outcry of "legalized robbery" and "the

The large cent and the half cent were the first regular coins authorized to he struck at the

Mint in I'illadelphia. The 1787 Fugio cents with the 13-link chain designed by Benjamin Franklin and the motto "Mind Your Business' were struck at New Haven, with dies made by Abel Buel of that city. The copper they used was salvaged from bands on French powder kegs left over from the Revolution.

This, and several other early coppers, were shown as slides by Herman Krajewski at the recent meeting of the Central Conn. Coin Club. The club library also supplies the book "Penny Whimsy" which covers the large cents of 1793 to 1814. It is a revision of "Early American Cents" by H. M. Sheldon.

A preface by the principal author explains the unusual title by saying that the revision was a light-hearted task almost a whimsy.

Too big to swallow

In it you may read that he hopes to give suckers a better run against shady dealers and that old coppers have survived because they are too big for kids to swallow. Also they have "a charm - an almost living warmth not possessed by gold, silver, or bronze." He gives the back of his hand to philately (fresh guy!) by saying: "Copper coins have a full sense of value and integrity not found in...bits of postage stamp paper." Later coins he called stereotyped — manufactured like so many buttons.

This well-illustrated book is a fabulous job, giving 60 pages to the 1794 cents alone (62 varieties). All of these show a neat long-haired Liberty with a pole carrying a cap. This design had replaced the "wild squaw with the heebie jeebies" - an unkind contemporary opinion of the 1793 Lib

with windblown tresses. The earlier coin came in many shades since it was struck from anything in copper that was handy. (Like nails, tongs, and George Washington's teakettle).

The flowing hair designs were followed by the staid Turban Head in 1808; the Coronet Head reigned from 1816 to 1857. when the smaller Flying Eagles took over.

The coin shown here is an AU (almost uncirculated) Coronet loaned by Benny

Gozzo of Connecticut Coin & Stamp on Maple Street. (In the pet shop).

Where are they now?
