

Burgoyne surrenders at Saratoga

Taxable property list climbed over \$300 million

List, based on Oct. 1, 1975 valuation, broke through the \$300 million barrier and was reported at \$300,295,-664. Although it is minus all allowable deductions, it still is subject to adjustments by the Board of Tax Review. Just 10 years ago, Manchester's Grand List was about \$188 million.

The increase over last year is \$11,-491,774 or 3.97 per cent. Based on the current 50.65 General Fund tax rate, the increase would generate about \$582,100 in added revenue - the equivalent of about 2 mills.

In the area served by the Town Fire District, the valuation is \$10,-581,153 over last year - for a 4.8 per cent rise. Based on the current 6-mill tax rate, it would generate about \$63,500 in added revenue.

And, in the area served by the Eighth Utilities District, the valuation is \$763.948 or 1.29 per cent over last year. Based on the district's 4mill current tax rate, it would generate about \$3,060 in added

Manchester's Board of Directors will adopt budgets and will establish tax rates for 1976-77 by May 7.

Hartford Stage Company offers a powerful drama



Sharing their thoughts

A cross section of the time of Thomas Jefferson, packed with unexpected drama and human involvement, is being exposed at the Hartford Stage Company in Hart-

In the world premiere of Ray Aranha's "The Estate." Jefferson's confrontation with a free black scientist and his anguished love for a slave-mistress provide the background for the play which features the playwright in a leading role.

Aranha has used Jefferson's "Notes on Virginia" as a basis for the stateman's

Jefferson speculated in his notes on the mental capacities of blacks. Jefferson conceded that his doubts were the result of personal observation "on the limited sphere of my own State, where the opportunities for the development of their genius were not favorable."

And yet, when presented with scientist Benjamin Banneker's plea for recognition of his years of self-study and application, Jefferson acknowledged that he wished more than anyone that the talents of his black brethren might be recognized. "talents equal to those of other colors of men, and that the appearance of a want of them is owning merely to the degraded condition of their existence."

Jefferson is concerned with his public image if he accepts the black scientist's passionate plea for support in his endeavors. He is plagued by valid taunts that he is engaged in an illicit affair with a young mulatto slave in his household.

The play opens with Banneker and his sister in their humble Maryland shack preparing for his trip to visit Jefferson. As Banneker, Ray Aranha movingly describes his past, his struggles, and his hopes in the form of a soliloquy.

Aranha uses this form on several occasions throughout the play to provide a background of past time and events to support a scene. Lengthy at times, they are nonetheless beautiful verbal prose and show Aranha's acute sense of human character and inner conscience

Jefferson is played by Josef Sommer who perfectly examplifies a Virginia gentleman and statesman. Like most

southern planters of his era, he was compelled to use slaves on his several plantations because of economic conditions. although he publicly supported emancipa-

The frequent stage presence of Sally Hemings, the slave mistress of Jefferson. was more eloquent than most of the lines spoken by Secret Scott playing the part. She is, however, an effective and sensitive actress always giving the impression she is ever there tending physical and moral support to Jefferson's ideas.

Aranha has combined the various attitudes of the nation's society at the time toward slavery versus emancipation through the characters in the play including his daughter Martha, his close friend Abigail Adams, and neighbors John and Elizabeth Walker.

Martha "Patsy" Jefferson is played by Jennifer Jestin who capitalizes on an hysterical scene which is overdone. Otherwise, the part doesn't particularly add anything to the play.

As Abigail Adams, Anne Shropshire turns in a portrayal of a friend who was apparently a onetime mistress of Jefferson's, She will be remembered as the wife in "All Over" at HSC.

As a neighbor of Thomas Jefferson, Ted Graeber interprets John Walker as a hardheaded, querulous, pompous citizen who seems to delight in degrading his wife. played by Anne Lynn

At times, the conflict of fact and moral issues interwoven with emotions within the play make the audience almost cringe with guilt over a matter that is past, yet lingers in history.

The scenery is a clever arrangement of farm shack, elegant estate quarters and surrounding yard with overhanging verdure done by Marjorie Kellogg. Arden Fingerhut creates effective lighting throughout.

Paul Weidner worked with Aranha throughout the writing of the play and has directed a powerful drama which is deserving of a Broadway opening, hopefully before the end of this Bicentennial year.

"The Estate" will play at the Hartford Stage Company through March 7.

Jersey issues coincide with Interphil

The Bailiwick of Jersey has picked a good time to release these stamps — May 29, the kick-off day for Interphil '76.

Jersey (45 square mile 75,000 popula tion) is the largest of the Channel Islands, which were called by Victor Hugo "Bits of France fallen into the sea and picked up by England.

Although in the same latitude as Newfoundland, by some freak of climate, Jersey is known as an island of sunshine and they

grow two crops a year of garden produce for English tables.

Its history is deep pre-history, almost from the beginnings of the human race. Stone and Bronze Age artifacts are plentiful, and there are two caves with evidences of Neanderthal Man. There are also feudal chapels dating from the early

The language is mainly English, but many oldtimers still converse in a cor-rupted French lingo, a father-to-son thing, that supposedly has never been set down

This is the original source of that creamiest of cattle breeds, the lightbrown Jersey. No other bovine is per-mitted on the island to endanger the pure strain. Here must have lived the ancestors of my erstwhile pet, a tiny Jersey bull calf named Peanut. When newly born he was maked for extinction, but was rescued by

a kid's pleas and a two-dollar bill. Who could forget such a cuddly knobby-legged creature cavorting toward you at bottle

Jersey was cut loose from the British Post office in 1969. Since then their 150 stamps have caught on amazingly well with collectors, and there are special albums just for the Channel Islands.

These new stamps express the motif: "Jersey's Links with America." Sir Walter Raleigh, who named the state of Virginia, was appointed Governor of Jersey in 1600 and built Elizabeth Castle for his queen. He encouraged fishermen to sail along the latitude line to Newfoundland and bring back codfish.

The seven-pence stamp shows Sir George Carter, who harbored Charles II in that same castle until the king's fortunes took a better turn. He was rewarded with the area now called New Jersey.

The 11-pence shows a landing on Long

Island by the ships of a Jersey mariner, Philippe Dauvergne.

The last stamp depicts John Singleton Copley of Boston and his pairing of the Battle of Jersey (1781). This one represents the Massachusetts-Jersey
