The struggle for 104 Democratic convention delegates in Massachusetts - candidates' first test in a large industrial state appears likely to eclipse the Vermont primary, also Tuesday, the first in that state since 1920.

With the busing issue inflaming emotions in Massachusetts, the state may prove fertile ground for Alabama Gov. George Wallace in his first primary battle since being paralyzed by an 1972 assassination attempt in a Maryland shopping

The primary is the first of 1976 for the well-organized and wellbankrolled campaign of Washington Sen. Henry M. Jackson who has made his own pitch to anti-basing Democrat Milton Shapp, the low keyed millionaire now serving as governor of Pennsylvania, also faces his first test.

Other major candidates confront their second contest of the election year with the results likely to trim the liberal field.

Fresh from capturing 30 per cent of the vote in New Hampshire, former Georgia Gov. Jimmy Carter arrived in Massachusetts to find fruits of early victory carried a bitter aftertaste. 

Lee Hay, a Manchester High School teacher and chief negotiator for the Manchester Education Association (MEA), says school board officials are probably overly optimistic about a teachers' contract settlement within two weeks.

'Negotiations are progessing very well," Hay said, "and we expect a settlement well before the end of the school year.

Hay wouldn't be more specific, but he said he doubted a mid-March settlement as estimated Thursday night by Asst. School Supt. Wilson Deakin, the school board's chief negotiator.

The MEA, which is the bargaining agent for about 550 public school teachers, has conducted four or five negotiating sessions with the school board, Hay said. The next round of talks is scheduled this week.
