The truck drove Monday along 100 miles of Connecticut roads at exactly 47 miles an hour, making its way from New London to the New York border where it lost its state police escort and continued on to South Carolina.

Carter margin impressive

Ford calls victory 'a real clincher'

CHICAGO (UPI) — President Ford and Georgian Jimmy Carter decisively won Illinois' presidential primary victories Tuesday, leaving the 1976 campaigns of Ronald Reagan, George Wallace and Sargent Shriver in shambles. A "real clincher," said the ecstatic President of his fifth Republican primary victory in a row over Reagan. But Reagan, saying he still has a "50-50 chance," declined suggestions by Ford campaign strategists to drop out of the race. The wins were the most impressive to date for both Ford, seeking the

Republican nomination for the office he assumed without election 17 months ago, and former Georgia Gov. Carter, the political phenomenon of the year. In the biggest state to hold a primary so far, Carter's victory appeared to virtually nullify Wallace's hopes for the nomination unless he can score a big win in North Carolina next week. Wallace said he was pleased with second place. Shriver finished a poor third behind Carter and said he would actively campaign in only two more states, Texas and Maryland, to seek a voice

State bond issue sold at attractive rates

HARTFORD (UPI) — Wall Street investors today bought \$100 million worth of state bonds at a rate lower than expected, apparently confident that Gov. Ella T. Grasso was putting Connecticut's financial house in order. A syndicate represented by Hartford National Bank submitted a low bid of 6.2433 per cent which means the state will pay interest totaling \$6.5 million on the bonds over the next 20 years. Two other bids were opened by State Treasurer Henry T. Parker. One from a syndicate represented by the Connecticut Bank and Trust Co. offered a 6.2485 interest rate. The other, from Chase Manhattan of New York, submitted a 6.2520 per cent interest rate. Parker said he was "pleased with the winning rate. It's a tribute to the fact the governor went to Wall Street. The underwriters were impressed with his presentation," he said. He said he had no doubt Mrs.

Grasso's trip to New York city last week had helped convince the investors of the state's fiscal responsibility. Hartford National represented a syndicate of bidders that included the Morgan Guaranty Trust Co. of New York as the major investor. Deputy Finance Commissioner Anthony B. Milano said a few minutes before the bids were announced that "anything under 6.5 per cent would be a good rate." Milano noted that Pennsylvania, which like Connecticut had an AA rating from Moody's Investors Service and an A1 rating from Standard and Poor's, earlier in the week marketed \$110 million worth of bonds at a 6.32 per cent rate. The last time Connecticut tried to sell bonds, in September, the state received a 6.18 per cent rate. At that time the state also had a split rating, with one service rating connecting a AAA risk, while the other ranked the state as AA.

Weiss silent on allegation of 8th District

Town Manager Robert Weiss today declined to comment on claims by Eighth District officials the town is ignoring district overtures for cooperation between Manchester's two fire departments. Monday night, District Director William Marvin, who is fire commissioner, told of a Feb. 21 letter he sent to Weiss, Town Fire Chief John Riotta and all nine town directors. Nothing in the letter, "The goal of all of us is to make Manchester a safer place to live," he proposed a meeting between the two boards, the chiefs and assistants of both fire departments, and other interested parties, "to discuss and formulate plans for future cooperation of all concerned for fire safety." Marvin said he didn't receive even one reply to the 11 letters he sent. Weiss said today he has been in consultation with the town counsel even prior to Monday night's meeting of the Eighth District board and said he will have a reply shortly by the Feb. 21 letter. The consultation was held, he said, because of the ramifications of the action pending in Hartford County Superior Court.

Irish forget economic problems as they mark St. Patrick's Day

DUBLIN (UPI) — Irishmen had to pay twice the price for shamrocks, but they pinned them on anyway and jammed into Irish towns by the thousands today to celebrate the national feast day of St. Patrick. As with any festive occasion in Ireland, however, the threat of violence from the north was evident. Strict police security surrounded the parade in the capital, the official highlight of the celebrations. Extra troops and police were on duty at border crossings to check visitors from Northern Ireland to try to prevent any bombings. In a St. Patrick's Day message, Premier Liam Cosgrave said violence in the north continued to be "a source of great sadness to the Irish people." "The killings and the maimings of innocent people and the destruction of property have caused deep anguish to the Irish people," he said before flying to the United States for a six-day visit. In Northern Ireland, a total of 1,472 persons, including security forces, have died since violence erupted Aug. 12, 1969. Cosgrave said it was a "privilege" for him to spend St. Patrick's Day in the United States. A special section of the parade, depicting scenes from American history, was set aside for American visitors and bands.

Gov. Grasso willing to compromise on plans to close state deficit gap

HARTFORD (UPI) — Gov. Ella T. Grasso says she's open to compromise on her plans to plug a \$40.3 million deficit predicted by June 30, so long as it doesn't involve major tax hikes. But she said, "these 'ifly' things are not productive because you have to have something specific," when pressed Tuesday by reporters for exactly what compromises she would accept on each of her plans. Mrs. Grasso wants to erase part of the shortage with revenues from the \$29.5 million Soldiers, Sailors and Marines Fund and savings through a longer work week for state employees without a corresponding pay hike. The governor retreated from her opposition to a compromise to borrow rather than liquidate the veterans fund, saying it would be counter alternatives to her proposal to repeal the seven per cent tax on business services, which raises \$25 million a year, a move she has said will lead to business development and more jobs. An early enactment of "accrual accounting" — spending in one fiscal year tax revenues not due in state coffers until the following year — only would shift the deficit to next year, she said. The governor said the possibility of further layoffs of state workers — 500 were furloughed Jan. 2 — was a cost-cutting step which lawmakers should not overlook. She said she "explored variations on all of these matters" in a meeting earlier Tuesday with the co-chairmen of the legislative committee reviewing her budget-balancing plans. "The initial proposals are having difficulty and the variations will be thoroughly considered," she said. "I'll wait for specifics." The legislature rejected her budget plans last December, and, since then, the 40-hour work week has gathered some additional support, but the takeover of the veteran's fund appears headed for another rejection. Mrs. Grasso also restated her opposition to closing out this fiscal year with a deficit larger than \$5 million, which she expects to pay out of the first tax revenues from next fiscal year. "I don't think we can go much beyond that," she said. "A few million either way leaves us some flexibility, but more than that would give us problems."

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Special report: Europe climbs out of recession

By RICHARD C. LONGWORTH BRUSSELS, Belgium (UPI) — Western Europe is showing clear signs of recovering from its economic recession. Output is rising, inflation is declining. Even Britain considered the "sick man" of the continent, seems to be coming out of the doldrums.

Washington window: Stage set for power struggle

BY DONALD LAMHRO WASHINGTON (UPI) — The announced retirement of Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield and his Republican counterpart, Hugh Scott, sets the stage next January for major intra-party struggles for the Senate's two most powerful posts.

Who wins or loses could be determined more by the personalities involved, though that, too, will affect the outcome. In the end, the fate of powerful ambitions may hinge on the outcome of this year's presidential race.

Mansfield's announced retirement was hardly cold when the heretofore behind-the-scenes jockeying for power broke the surface on the Democratic side.

Within a few hours of the speech, Edmund Muskie of Maine, perhaps the most influential Democrat in the Senate, announced he would run for majority leader. Muskie in fact had let it be known sometime before that he would seek the post and he has been quietly gathering support.

Muskie's candidacy runs smack into the life-long ambition of Robert Byrd of West Virginia, the Senate's No. 2 leader who has virtually run the Senate in recent years.

On the Republican side, Assistant GOP leader Robert Griffin of Michigan is the heir apparent to retiring Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania, though he may be given a strong challenge by the more conservative Sen. John Tower of Texas. Tower is known to have asked key conservatives if they will support him.

Griffin, a party moderate, is a longtime friend, House colleague and confidant of Gerald Ford. Should Ford win the presidency in his own right in November, Griffin would be hard to beat despite the heavy conservative makeup of the GOP side of the aisle.

Byrd, a shrewd and tenacious political tactician who has developed considerable support in the Senate through hard work and doing little favors for his colleagues, is clearly the frontrunner to replace Mansfield.

France and Germany have agreed to coordinate a short-term return to earlier deflated prices on their goods, and the results are becoming visible.

The Germans — and the neighboring Swiss — expect an inflation rate of 5 per cent or less this year. Industrial output is up, although consumer buying has not fully recovered.

Output also is rising in France and, in contrast to Germany, is led by the consumers. The trade balance is improving but inflation stays high — probably 11 per cent this year.

Britain's inflation rate is down from 25 per cent to around 14 per cent. North Sea oil is beginning to flow in and could wipe out Britain's

balance of payments deficit. The government is working to keep a \$12-per-week ceiling on wage increases. Even the tumbling value of the British pound has not overly worried most Britons. A cheap pound, it is felt, would make British exports more competitive.

In Italy, too, production and exports were up and inflation was down to 11 per cent, about half its 1975 rate. But the lira has lost 20 per cent of its value since the start of the year and the stock market has fallen.

The two most serious economic clouds remaining on the European horizon are the troubles facing the British and Italian currencies and unemployment.

The jobless figure has indeed leveled off — to somewhere between five million and six million persons — but in an area that has traditionally sought full employment, that is seen as sky high.

Otherwise the picture is bright.

Others, such as Hubert Humphrey, Minn., and Ernest Hollings, S.C., may get into the fray. But the race as of now is between Muskie and Byrd.

Byrd's political past, on the other hand, is the product of deep conservative roots, although he has become substantially a party moderate in recent years. Senate insiders are quick to note that Byrd "has done a lot of favors for a lot of senators."

Texas firm to run bus system for state

HARTFORD (UPI) — A Texas firm has been awarded an \$80,000 contract to manage Connecticut's bus operations in Hartford, Stamford and New Haven.

Transportation Commissioner James F. Shugrue said Tuesday the National City Management Co. was selected because of its lengthy experience in the field "as well as its progressive approach toward improving bus service."

The firm will be managing buses to be purchased by the state from the Connecticut Co. for \$10.6 million. ConnCo has received \$11 million in state subsidies since a crippling driver's strike in late 1972.

National City will be paid \$248,000 in the first year of its three-year contract, \$267,700 in the second year and \$282,200 in the third, Shugrue said.

It beat out three other firms for the management contract, including a company formed by ConnCo's owner, West Hartford millionaire E. Clayton Gengras.

"We were extremely impressed with the firm's progressive attitude in developing a 'new image program' for transit in Connecticut," Shugrue said. "Development of this program will be a priority item once National City assumes its management responsibilities."

Shugrue also pointed out National City had a good record in labor relations. One of its duties in Connecticut will be to negotiate contracts with bus drivers and mechanics unions. National City began its transit management business in 1961 in Dade County, Fla. It also operates bus systems in Providence R.I., Columbus, Ohio, Houston, Texas, and Spokane, Wash.

Fauliso plans floor fight on veterans fund proposal

HARTFORD (UPI) — The legislature's top Democrat, faced with the likelihood a key to Gov. Ella T. Grasso's budget balancing plan will die in committee, is passing the word he'll use his power to force a floor vote.

"I'm prepared to take any and all action to force it out," said Senate President Pva Ten, Joseph Paulino, D-Hartford, of the plan to liquidate a \$29.5 million veterans fund and use the cash to meet part of a projected deficit.

Fauliso took a walk through the Capitol news room Tuesday to spread the word, but emphasized his position did not reflect a leadership decision on the matter. He rarely, however, splits ranks with the other legislative leaders.

Sen. Wayne A. Baker, D-Danbury, co-chairman of the Public Personnel and Military Affairs Committee which must act on the governor's request, conceded the measure looked as though it would die in committee.

"I don't think it could come out the way it is now," he said following a meeting with Mrs. Grasso Tuesday. Baker said, however, he outlined a compromise for the governor that might be acceptable to those opposing takeover of the Soldiers, Sailors and Marines Fund.

Mrs. Grasso, at her news conference later in the day, indicated she might be willing to accept some compromises on her proposals. Baker declined to make his plan public, saying he had to outline it first for other committee members. Mrs. Grasso, whose plan was

rejected by the Appropriations Committee at a special legislative session last December, has said the state faces a \$42 million deficit by June 30. She furloughed 500 state workers when lawmakers rejected her plan the first time and has threatened to let more go if it fails again.

The only other alternative to meet the projected deficit is new taxes and she won't support them, Mrs. Grasso has said.

"I think the alternatives are limited, its either that or increased taxes," Fauliso said, explaining his determination to push Mrs. Grasso's plan through.

Veterans groups oppose the measure despite the promised \$2.5 million they would get in benefits annually, more than the \$1.7 million they get now from the fund.

House Speaker James J. Kennelly, D-Hartford, said he had not considered certifying it as an emergency matter.

Stevens says tax load frightening business

HARTFORD (UPI) — House Minority Leader Gerald F. Stevens, R-Milford, says Connecticut's heavy taxes on businessmen have scared away potential sources of new jobs. Gov. Ella T. Grasso's Democratic administration has "created an unfavorable tax climate for employers within our borders," Stevens said Tuesday, calling for changes to benefit industry.

"We have seen Connecticut make a slower recovery from economic recession than the rest of the country, primarily because we have created an unfavorable tax climate," he told the monthly Republican Tuesday Luncheon.

"We have 35,000 fewer jobs in Connecticut than last year, and we

rank only 43 out of the 48 mainland states as a place for manufacturers to relocate," he said.

Stevens attacked the Democratic-controlled legislature for surrendering to state employ lobbying against a longer state work week, yet rejecting employers' pleas for tighter restrictions on unemployment benefits.

"Employers mean business when they say that our attitudes and lack of action on corrections in this serious area will mean even less jobs in the years ahead," he said.

He has introduced legislation that would deny unemployment benefits — paid for by employers — to persons who either quit their jobs or are fired for good reason.

Dog track ordered to build access ramps at own expense

HARTFORD (UPI) — Connecticut's Traffic Commission has ordered the Plainfield Greyhound Park to build at its own expense two access ramps to Rte. 52 in Plainfield expected to cost \$1 million.

But a lawyer for the dog track said after the commission ruling Tuesday the state should pay for the ramps because they were listed among future state highway projects approved in 1975.

Meantime, a spokesman for a planned horse track in Wolcott charged the commission was using a "hit-and-miss smear technique" to revoke Wolcott's traffic permit. The commission dropped the topic from its Tuesday meeting.

Transportation Commissioner James Shugrue, traffic commission chairman, said the 1975 Master Transportation Bonding Act ordered the state to build the listed projects only if no one else was required to pay for them.

The traffic permit issued to Plainfield last year ordered track developers to pay for the ramps if state traffic engineers found they were needed, Shugrue said.

Richard Goodman, an attorney working for the dog track, could not be reached for comment on whether track owners intend to go to court to challenge the commission ruling.

The commission gave developers of the \$6 million facility six months to build the ramps, required because of the additional traffic generated by the facility.

Other arrests reported by Manchester Police included that of Raymond Myette, 49, of no certain address, charged Tuesday night with intoxication. Court date is March 29.

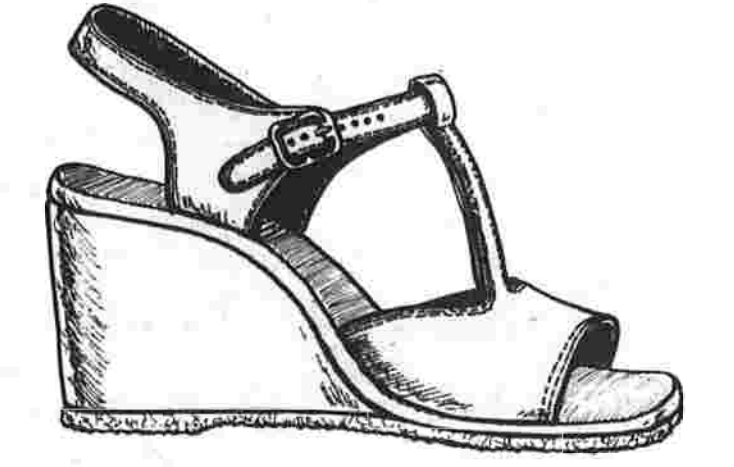

East's main shortcoming this season was speed. Its big men didn't lumber up and down the court as many expected. But this weakness was not exploited as much as it could have been because of the conservative style played in the H.C.U. In the tournament the deficiency was poignantly exposed by lightning-quick Crosby High of Waterbury. Crosby revealed what had been known all season. East lacks team speed and if it is to be an improved club next year this will have to be overcome. Knowing the players and their tremendous pride, it's safe to assume they will work very hard to somehow make themselves a little quicker next season.

Favorite again: Manchester copped the CCHL title by five games and according to Coach Doug Pearson should be considered a favorite again in 76-77. Penney, Windham, and Farmington most of their squads but the Silk Towners will be in the "King of the Hill" role. They're the one out on top who'll have to be knocked off.

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (UPI) — The cry of "Play Ball!" remains muted today in the wake of the major league players' stubborn rejection of the clubowners' "final and best offer" to settle the baseball labor stalemate.

Refusal of the players to accept the owners' plan, which technically would have enabled all 600 current major league players to play out their contracts and become free agents at the conclusion of their current contracts,

cast grave doubts that the 1976 season would open on schedule. "It's getting very close," said an obviously-wearied and disappointed Lee MacPhail, president of the American League. "Every hour we fail to reach agreement now puts the start of the season in jeopardy."

Basis for the players' latest refusal to the owners was a clause in the management "one and one" option proposal which would have limited a player's bargaining position to just eight major league teams. The so-called "liability issue" would, accord-

ing to the players, serve to underscore their "Andy Messersmith" "emancipation victory" which, having been upheld in the courts, gives any free agent the right to bargain with all 24 clubs.

"The owners' proposal is nothing more than a modification of the free agent draft," said the players' union chief, Marvin Miller. "In no way does it make a player a free agent in the true sense that Andy Messersmith is. As long as there is a liability of the eight clubs attached to it, I cannot recommend that the

executive board accept it."

The players' executive board was to meet in Tampa today but the owners, after hearing the players' sentiments, didn't bother to wait around for a formal reply. Both sides expected to continue their "stonewall" on both the spring training lockout and the final proposal.

"This is it," said Galterin grimly. "We have made our final and best proposal as the players asked. If it is rejected, it will be withdrawn and we will not submit another one."

Asked if that meant the baseball season was in real jeopardy because of the obvious impasse in the talks, Galterin said: "You can't be optimistic in the face of the attitude being displayed here."

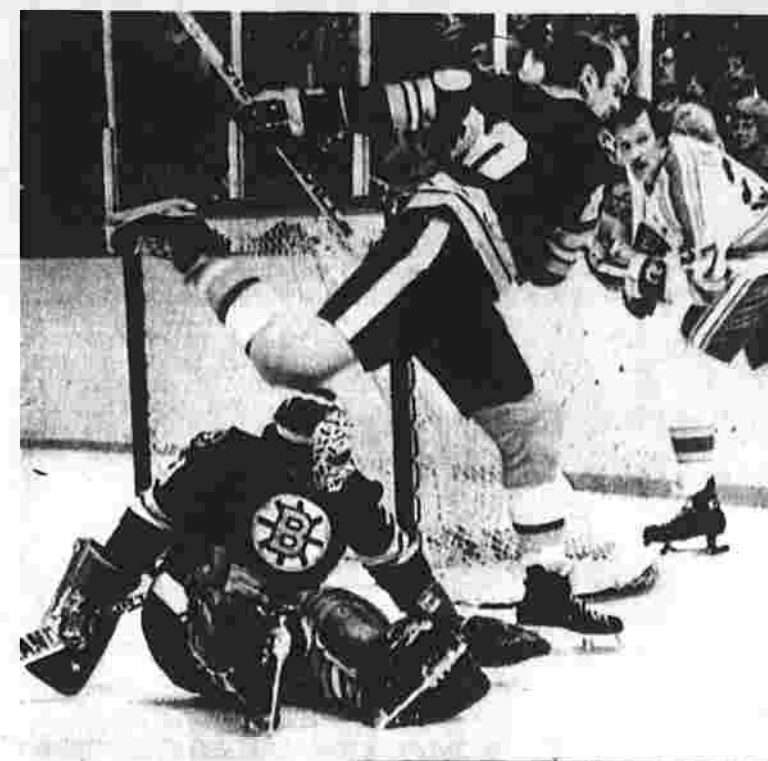
While the players remained adamant in their hard-line stance on the "one and one" issue, they were unanimous in their feeling that sufficient progress had been made to get on with spring training while the

"Although we are not satisfied with everything the owners have demanded we accept, it is obvious they have come a distance toward us," Miller said. "That's progress. Now Mr. Kuhn has stated publicly that if he sees progress in these talks, he would order the camps opened. Apparently he hasn't because the camps still aren't open."

NFL turns down more expansion

CORONADO, Calif. (UPI) — Owners from the National Football League at 28 teams for the 1976 season Tuesday following their decision not to admit any new clubs to the league in the foreseeable future.

Memphis and Birmingham of the now defunct World Football League had actively sought admission into the NFL.

In an earlier session, the 28 owners selected the Louisiana Superdome in New Orleans to host Super Bowl XII in 1978.

"After a lengthy and thorough discussion," said NFL commissioner Pete Rozelle, "the clubs concluded that under the present conditions — that is our legal and labor problems — they could not firmly commit to expansion at this time."

"However it is clear these two cities were the most active in recent months and will be among those strongly considered when the league eventually feels it can expand."

John Bassett, a Canadian millionaire who spent \$4.5 million to form the WFL, said the league's refusal to admit the Grizzlies was a "tremendous disservice to the people of Memphis who worked so hard and demonstrated the ability to form and support a team."

The NFL's two newest franchisees, the Seattle Seahawks and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, will have a chance to fill their ranks March 30-31 in an allocation draft to be conducted out of the NFL's New York office.

The existing teams will be able to freeze 50 players on their rosters before Seattle and Tampa Bay make their selections.

Rozelle said the names of eligible players will be made available to the two teams the day before the draft.

The annual collegiate draft will be held eight days later on April 8-9.

Among the problems the league must resolve before expansion, Rozelle said, were court rulings that went against the NFL and the issue of collective bargaining with the players' association.

The owners cast four ballots during a morning session before picking New Orleans over four other cities for Super Bowl XII for Jan. 15, 1978. Cities that had made bids for the Super Bowl included Miami, Los Angeles, Houston and Dallas.

Super Bowl XI will be held at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif.

Wilson departure may trigger vicious party leadership fight

By JOSEPH W. GRIGG LONDON (UPI) — Prime Minister Harold Wilson's abrupt announcement Tuesday of his "irrevocable" decision to resign has stunned Parliament.

It caused immediate speculation that it might touch off a vicious leadership battle inside Wilson's governing Labour party, already deeply rent by quarrels between its warring left and right wings.

Wilson is the first British government chief to quit without being forced out by a defeat at the polls since Harold Macmillan resigned suddenly in 1963.

Wilson said he is quitting because he has been prime minister longer than any other in Britain in peace time and because after 10 years of leading the country through a period of almost constant economic crisis, he has had enough.

Wilson's departure is considered by many to be the man at the helm, a compromiser by nature, a man of the political center.

With the funds, the Energy Research and Development Administration may make a deal with United Technologies Corp. of South Windsor for a two-year contract for a demonstration project with fuel cells. United plans to build most of the demonstration equipment in Connecticut. United is the dominant firm in fuel cell research, said Dodd.

Hebron board debates new budget

Hebron

The Board of Education last week voted not to accept recommended cuts totaling \$40,361 in their proposed 1978-79 budget. After several budget work sessions, the proposed budget totals \$1,940,000, a 15.4 per cent increase over the current \$1,680,000 budget.

The board had directed the administration to remove \$50,000 from the proposed budget which would bring the increase down to 10.1 per cent over the present budget.

However, several board members did not approve of the recommended cuts and told administrators to go back and see what other areas could be cut.

The recommended cuts included reducing the art and music teachers by one and two days respectively, and eliminating a proposed new full-time position. These proposed cuts received the amount of discussion by board members.

Items showing the largest estimated surplus are teachers, \$10,500; medical and life insurance, \$1,800; unemployment compensation, \$2,000; electricity, \$1,000; special education transportation, \$1,000; and heating oil, \$1,500.

The administration presented a revised estimate of 1978-79 expenditures. It shows there will be a \$8,308 surplus.

Items showing the largest estimated surplus are teachers, \$10,500; medical and life insurance, \$1,800; unemployment compensation, \$2,000; electricity, \$1,000; special education transportation, \$1,000; and heating oil, \$1,500.

The board agreed to let Jeffrey Kregg of Willow Dr., Andover remain in the Gilead Hill School for the remainder of the school year. However, for the 1978-79 school year, the youngster must register in Andover.

The board received a request from Kregg's parents last year asking that the youngster be allowed to remain in school in Hebron since he had been told he would attend the Gilead School and had already started.

They told the board the youngster slept in Hebron. His bedroom in their home is just over the Andover-Hebron border.

Washington lead parade back in '76

BOSTON (UPI) — Some facts for St. Patrick's Day: The very first St. Patrick's Day parade in America took place in Boston on March 17, 1776, and George Washington was the grand marshal.

It was actually a military parade with American revolutionaries, many of whom were Irish, who were marching into Boston to take the city over as British Redcoats fled.

General Washington directed the troop movement and his brigadier that day was an Irishman named John Sullivan.

"It wasn't as elaborate or colorful as St. Patrick's Day parades today," said Sally Hopkins, who is a researcher for a greeting card company, "but it certainly was joyous."

Two years later at Valley Forge, Washington ordered a St. Patrick's Day celebration that brought some holiday joy to his "miserable encampment."

The Valley Forge celebration got off to a shaky start when some of the troops started telling jokes at the expense of the Irish in the camp.

A brawl broke out, but Washington himself appeared on the scene and ordered an extra issue of grog and "thus all were made merry and were good friends," according to one account of the day.

Washington, incidentally, was made one of the few non-Irish members of the Society of Friendly Sons of St. Patrick in Philadelphia.

Audio visual program planned

The Rev. Fred M. Dole of Colchester will present from his own collection an audio visual program, "Photography: A New Way of Seeing," for the Manchester Historical Society Sunday.

At the museum we find ourselves answering or, at least, trying to answer all kinds of questions. We're asked everything from where you find rice paper kites to how to take care of injured animals.

Unfortunately, we can't always provide an answer for each question asked but we always try. And, if we can't give you the answer, we try to refer you to someone who can.

One question that is frequently asked and that we can answer is "What is Lutz?"

Here in Manchester and the surrounding New England states, perhaps even in the nation (we're listed on the National Geographic Magazine map of places to visit in New England), Lutz is a fun spot where one's knowledge in many areas from animals to ethnic restaurants can be expanded. It is a learning center with a "hands-on" philosophy that seeks to encourage discovery and stimulate curiosity on the part of its many visitors.

However, to those who have been most closely associated with this leisure learning museum, Lutz is also a very special and delightful person by the name of Miss Hazel Lutz. A charming and determined woman, Miss Lutz, 21 years ago, dreamed of a Manchester children's museum and, with her unusual abilities, involved an entire community in making that dream a reality.

Fond memories are with everyone to whom she taught art during her years in the Manchester school system. Those who have met her more recently are impressed with her talents and never ending wealth of ideas.

Outside of the realm of the museum, Lutz is a figure skating enthusiast, inventor by Gustave Lassie. To execute this particular jump, the skater must make a takeoff from the back outside edge of one skate, rotate counter clockwise and land on the back outside edge of the other skate.

Dorothy Hammill recently won Olympic and World gold medals in figure skating for her stunning performances in which she incorporated single and double lutz.

Both these women, sharing a unique determination to win have pursued their goals with daring and followed through to their realization. Miss Lutz and Miss Hammill are worthy of recognition as two gifted Connecticut women.

Many of the questions asked relate to animals. Perhaps the animal presently with us that generates the most inquiries is Rosie, the South American tree boa constrictor.

"Is the boa poisonous?" she is not poisonous, as many people assume. Instead, she wraps herself around the body of her prey and constricts her muscles, thus squeezing it to death.

"Why is the snake always sticking its tongue out?"

A snake has no fingers and no ears. Its tongue does some of the work that these two parts of its body would do if they were present. The tongue is a sensor that feeds information to the snake.

As the tongue is rapidly pulled in and out of the snake's mouth, it touches the ground and picks up vibrations of moving objects. These vibrations may alert the animal as to nearby prey or impending danger. The tongue also gathers in bits of dust from the surrounding air. Odors in the dust enable the snake to smell its enemies or its food.

These are only some of the questions asked by museum visitors or that come to us by way of telephone calls. There are many more, some of which have sparked an idea for a museum exhibit, such as animal camouflage, bird feeders or desert life.

Why not stop by Tuesday through Sunday between 2 p.m. and 5 p.m. and have some of your questions answered? Admission is free.

Suspension suggested for food-animal drugs

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The General Accounting Office has suggested a suspension of four drugs used in food animals because of the danger of cancer to humans.

A GAO report including a recommendation to Health, Education and Welfare Secretary F. David Mathews, was released at hearings by the House Commerce subcommittee charged with overseeing the Food and Drug Administration activities.

The recommendation said continued use of the four as long as there are no adequate tests for detecting residues "may create an imminent hazard to the public health."

The four belong to a category of drugs known as nitrofurans. The FDA has found that one, furazolidone, causes cancer in laboratory animals. The other three, nitrofurazone, nifedipine and furaltadone, are suspected of causing cancer.

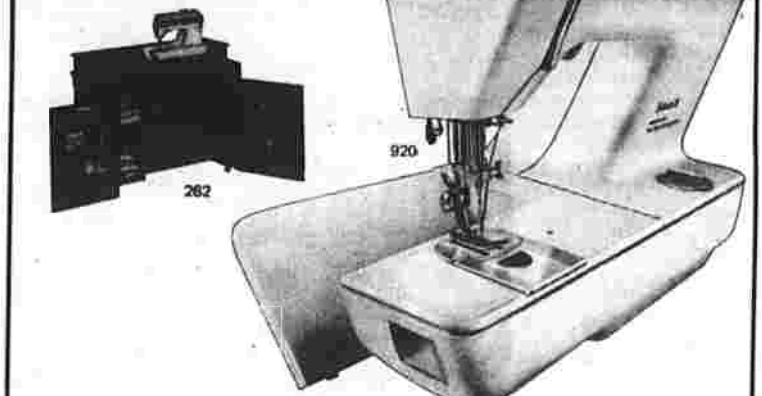
The drugs are used as germ-killing and growth-promoting agents for chickens, turkeys and pigs and as anti-infection agents for dairy cattle. Residues have been found in milk as well as in flesh.

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Rocket age began 50 years ago

WASHINGTON (UPI) — On a cold afternoon 50 years ago Tuesday, Dr. Robert Goddard launched the world's first liquid fueled rocket from the farm in Auburn, Mass.

"It looked magical as it rose," Goddard said in notes recording the activity that laid the foundation for the Saturn 5 rockets that sent men to the moon 42 years later.

His rocket was a five-pound assembly of pipes, tanks and hand-made valves. It burned liquid oxygen and gasoline and, Goddard said, roared as it accelerated skyward "at express train speed."

The strange machine traveled only 41 feet above the snow-covered ground during its 2 1/2 second flight. But it proved the feasibility of rockets that before had existed only in the minds of a few far-flying thinkers.

In spite of its short duration and the low altitude reached, my husband would have been proud, yet humble to know the beginning of the space age dated from that flight," Goddard's widow said in a message to the National Space Club, which commemorated the event with a dinner last Friday.

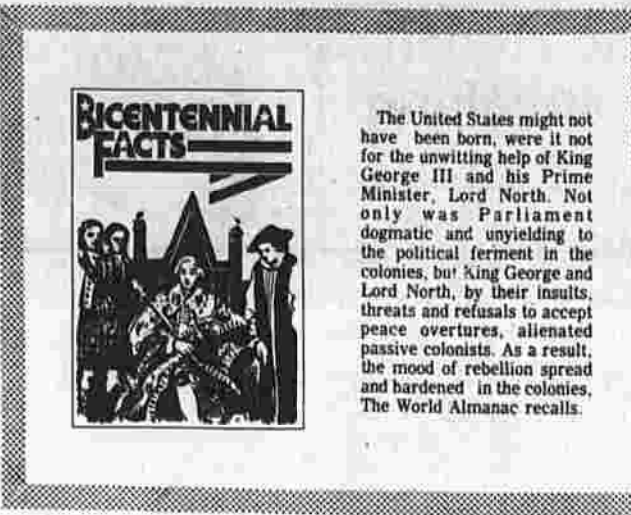
Goddard died at 62 in 1945. Recognition of his pioneering efforts did not come until later when the United States finally recognized the importance of rocketry to defense, science and exploration.

In 1960, Mrs. Goddard and the Guggenheim Foundation which supported

him were awarded \$1 million for the government's use of more than 200 of his rocket patents.

There were other rocket pioneers of the day. Russian scientist and teacher Konstantin Tsiolkovsky has been credited as the first to understand and develop the use of rockets in space travel.

"Tsiolkovsky's brilliant mind conceived theories and developed them, but did not lead him to perform practical experimental work," wrote Dr. Werner von Braun, who helped develop the Saturn 5 that sent Apollo pilots to the moon.

Social Security

Q. I plan to apply for Supplemental Security Income payments. I have a foster child in my home, and receive payments from the agency which placed him here. Would the foster-care payments make me eligible for Supplemental Security Income payments?

A. Foster care payments you get will not affect your eligibility for Supplemental Security Income if the child living with you is not entitled to Supplemental Security Income payments, and he or she was placed in your home by a licensed public or non-profit private child placement or child care agency.

Q. I am 68 and I am planning to apply for Supplemental Security Income payments. Every now and then I do odd jobs for people, but my earnings never go over \$50 a month. Will these earnings have any effect on my payments?

A. People can earn as much as \$65 a month without affecting their Supplemental Security Income payments. If there is no other income, such as Social Security checks or a company pension, they can earn as much as \$85 a month. Over that, the basic Supplemental Security Income payment is reduced by \$1 for each \$2 in earnings.

Q. My son, who is 19, has been severely retarded since birth. Could he get payments under the Supplemental Security Income program? My husband works full time and supports us.

A. Regardless of your family income, your son may be eligible for Supplemental Security Income payments. Under the law, mentally retarded people who remain independent of their families beginning at 18 or 21 if they're in school. Starting then, they may be eligible for Supplemental Security Income. Call or write any Social Security office for more information about applying for payments for your son.

Q. I am going to operate a private camp next summer, and I will soon be interviewing young people for counselor jobs. The youngsters I hire will get free room and board and a small salary. Will I have to pay Social Security contributions on the value of their room and board?

A. Yes, the fair value of their room and board plus their cash salaries are their total earnings for Social Security purposes and must be reported when you send in the Social Security contributions for them.

Glasses dropped, ladies fainted: And Richard Potter had his revenge

POTTER PLACE, N.H. (UPI) — Just as the host readied his carving knife over the glistening skin of a roasted pig, a loud roar and a blood curdling squeal erupted from the platter.

Glasses dropped. Ladies fainted. And Richard Potter had his revenge.

The magician was a noted ventriloquist in the 1800s. And making a

roast pig squeal under the carving knife was his way of securing an invitation to the dining room of a New England inn that had barred him because he was black. He was allowed to perform at the hotel, but not eat with other guests.

The tale is one of the most recorded details of Potter's life. Much of his past remains as hidden today as his gravesite located beside a small depot in this tiny central New

Hampshire hamlet. In 1814, Potter built an estate in nearby Andover on 175 acres of land. Between performances around the country, Potter retreated to his farm to till the land and spend time with his wife and children.

His first recorded performance was in Boston's Columbian Museum in 1811. Potter's act included juggling, mind-reading, knife-swallowing, card tricks and fire

resistance. He also pulled pigeons from the clothes of the startled audience.

Members of a New Hampshire magicians association, the "Black Richard Ring," travel to the gravesite each year to maintain the plot where Potter was buried in 1835 at the age of 52.

Dwight Damon of Merrimack, a past president of the magicians organization, said Potter maintains

an important place in magicians' history. Although his tricks might be considered amateurish by today's standard, his repertoire was innovative and lucrative for his time. "In that period people were amazed by such things as cutting off the head of a dove and having it restored," Damon said. "People in those times were more easily fooled by simple things like sleight of hand and tricks with cups and balls, coins, handkerchiefs and eggs."

Disagreement on when and where Potter was born abounds.

One of his assistants claimed the slight, dark-haired magician was the son of Benjamin Franklin. Others said he was stolen by a ship's captain at the age of 10 and carried to Europe where he joined a traveling circus. And in the absence of certainty, tales continue that Potter's ghost roams the quiet hills beside his gravesite.

"People like to talk," Damon said.

Is it slander to yell "Robber!" at the umpire in a baseball game? A New York judge said no and explained why.

"The umpire's business invites criticism. It goes with the work."

The judge was expounding a rule of law that has wide application in everyday life. Anyone who seeks the public's approval — umpires, athletes, novelists, rock stars — is agreeing by implication to submit to public disapproval as well.

True, criticism may be hard to bear. But the law considers it justified as part of the process of open discussion by which standards of taste are developed, encouraging what is good and discouraging what is bad.

Of course, there are limits. For example, a critic may be liable for defamation if he attacked the performer on purely personal grounds.

This, a critic had to pay damages when he not only belittled a work of art but also accused the artist of being a swindler. The court said the accusation was outside the critic's privilege because it had nothing to do with the quality of the art.

But in dealing with the work itself, the critic may use wit, scorn, and sarcasm — "all those delightful touches of style," said one judge, "which make an article readable."

In one famous case a reviewer described a vaudeville trio as follows: "Effie is an old jade of 50 summers, Jessie is a frisky filly of 40, and Addie is a capering monstrosity of 35. Their mouths opened like caverns and sounds like the wailings of damned souls issued therefrom. Effie is spavined, Addie is stringhalt, and Jessie has legs as classic in their outlines as a broom handle."

A judge conceded the review was "graphic," but (after seeing the act himself) found no grounds for liability.

"If one makes himself ridiculous in public," he said, "he may be ridiculed by those whose duty it is to inform the public."
