WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Supreme Court today let stand a lower court ruling that "one person, one vote" apportionment principles apply to Connecticut's regional school districts.

The justices rejected without comment an appeal by the Nonnewaug Regional School District 14 and Bethlehem, Conn., arguing that elected school district representatives do not exercise the kind of general government powers that require each citizen's vote be given approximately equal weight.

Under Connecticut law, cities and towns can voluntarily unite into a

regional school district. Methods of electing district representatives are left up to each district, but the powers of the district boards are

listed in state law. District boards may not levy taxes or issue bonds, but they can purchase or rent property and supplies, pay bonds which have been approved by the voters and borrow money.

The Nonnewaug district encompased Woodbury, with a population of 5,869, and Bethlehem, population 1,-923. Despite the population differences. Woodbury and Bethlehem elected the same number of district school board representatives.

A Woodbury resident, Joseph M. Scott, filed suit, contending his vote among over 5,000 citizens carried less weight than a Bethlehem vote. District Judge Jon O. Newman

agreed, and said the means of electing representatives in the Nonnewaug district must be changed.

A three-judge panel on the 2nd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals agreed. In seeking high court review, the nnewayg district argued school board members have no generalized governmental powers. It said their powers are narrow, and therefore the means of electing them is not subject to the one person, one

Patty Hearst to face additional charges

Patricia Hearst, emotional and bitter fired two guns to cover the escape of over her bank robbery conviction, will go to Los Angeles this week for arraignment on kidnaping and assault charges, according to U.S.

Attorney James Browning Jr. Chief defense counsel F. Lee Bailey said the bank robbery case 'definitely" will be appealed.

Browning said Sunday the 22-yearold newspaper heiress first would be interviewed by probation officers for a report to U.S. District Judge Oliver Carter on their recommendations for
