Violence mars teamster dispute

Gulfire and fistfights punctuated the first nationwide Teamsters strike in history and a flurry of other walkouts affected a variety of things from beer and bread to soap operas and buses.

The disputes — primarily over money — affected city employees, truck mechanics, television newswriters and technicians and brewery workers as well as Teamsters.

Some soap opera fans may have been hard hit.

NBC struck by a walkout by newswriters and technicians, was forced to rerun Tuesday's episode of the soaper "Another World," because "they couldn't find today's."

At Tampa, Fla., officials of the strikebound Anheuser-Busch brewery offered a \$10,000 reward for information leading to arrest and conviction of persons who in two separate incidents shot at trucks hauling beer for the firm. Teamsters have been on strike at Anheuser-Busch plants across the nation.

A strike by some 400,000 Teamsters — the first nationwide walkout by the union — entered its second day and already has been marked by gunfire and violence.

Two independent truckers reported they were fired upon in Ohio and Indiana also said they were shot at but no one was injured. Rocks and debris entered its third day today.

O'Sullivan named superintendent of town highways and sanitation

Timothy O'Sullivan, 38, of New Britain has been named Manchester superintendent of highways and sanitation, to fill the vacancy created the end of November when John Burchill resigned.

His appointment is effective Monday, April 5.

O'Sullivan's appointment is by Jay Giles, director of public works. Giles said O'Sullivan was one of 40 candidates for the position and one of the final 10 who appeared Feb. 11 before an oral examination board. He finished as one of the top three candidates.

O'Sullivan, a native of Kilmaree, Ireland, came to the United States in 1956. He served in the U.S. Navy for nine years and was discharged in 1966 as a first class electrician. He received

training in basic and advanced electrical and electronic systems and was involved in the Navy's nuclear power program.

Presently, he is teaching a 15-week basic course in construction to the Connecticut Chapter of NOW, the National Organization of Women.

O'Sullivan, who is single, lists his hobbies as electronic projects, writing, church and community activities. He said he intends to move to Manchester within 60 days.

O'Sullivan's salary will be \$16,494, the same salary being paid Burchill when he left the post.

The position of acting superintendent was filled by George Ringstone, works coordinator in the highway and sanitation department.

Wholesale drug arrests net 36 in Hartford

HARTFORD (UPI) — Police today sought an additional 14 suspects in what was called a million-dollar heroin and cocaine ring operating in metropolitan Hartford. Thirty-six persons were arrested late Thursday.

State police sources said a total of 50 federal or state warrants had been issued following a seven-month investigation in which authorities spent \$27,000, including \$1,800 in agents' personal funds, to buy drugs as evidence.

The suspects, all Spanish-surnamed, were taken to Hartford state police barracks for booking, police said. Bonds ranging from \$5,000 to \$25,000 were set.

Police said investigators had traced the alleged ring from Hartford to Springfield, Mass. New York

City, Chicago, Puerto Rico and Mexico.

They said that because of limited funds for narcotics buys, investigators were prevented from "penetrating still higher echelons" of the ring.

The investigation was conducted jointly by federal, state, Hartford and regional crime squad agents, who had obtained federal and Superior Court warrants.

The raid "cleaned up, for the time being, a million-dollar drug operation involving mostly non-users and many repeat offenders."

Some of those arrested had been apprehended as teen-aged marijuana dealers in a state-city investigation in 1966, police said.

Jobless rate continues downward

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The nation's unemployment rate continued its steady decline in March — dropping slightly to 7.6 per cent — while the total number of persons who hold jobs hit a record high of 66.7 million, the Labor Department reported today.

The 7.5 per cent joblessness rate was the lowest in more than a year.

The March drop of 0.1 per cent capped a steady five-month decline from 8.6 per cent last October and an over-all improvement of 1.4 per cent since the recession peak last May.

This rapid plunge prompted President Ford's economic advisers to predict that unemployment will dip below 7 per cent by the end of this year.
