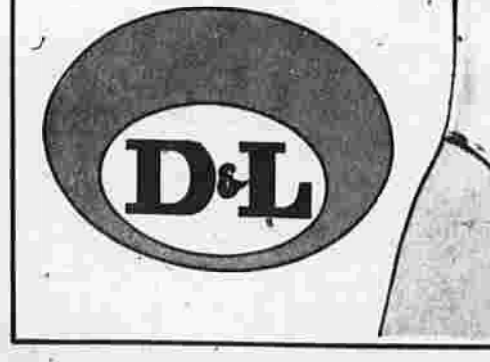

HARTFORD (UPI) — Two former United Aircraft International executives have complained to state and federal authorities they were illegally fired and lost some pension benefits as part of a systematic company plan to eliminate older employees, it was learned today.

Five persons die in fire

WORCESTER, Mass. (UPI) — Five persons died and one was critically injured early today in a fire of suspicious origin. Police and fire officials investigated the possibility of arson.

Names of the dead were withheld pending notification of relatives. Fire Chief Edward Hackett said his department received a mysterious telephone call at about 2 a.m. that a fire had been set at 337 Cambridge St.

The five persons were killed and a 10-year-old girl critically burned when the four-story wood frame tenement building mushroomed into flames.

Police said the fire were dead on arrival at St. Vincent's Hospital and the girl was hospitalized in poor condition with burns over 70 per cent of her body at Worcester City Hospital.

Investigators said they were going to listen to a recording of the voice of the person who called the fire station with the alarm.

Other survivors are a daughter, Mrs. David Petrilla of Bethlehem; two sons, Stanley T. Duro of Enfield and Michael Duro of Enfield.

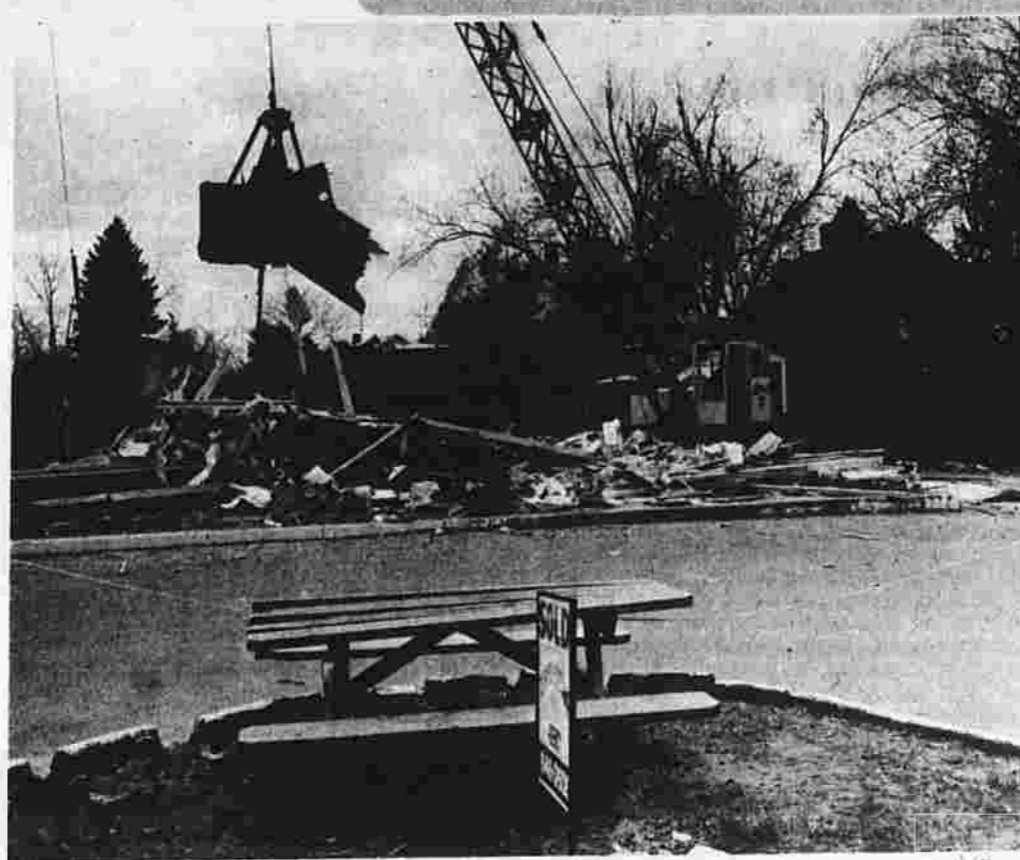

State HARTFORD — A proposal to put the state back on a system of two-year budgets has been approved by the Government and Administration Policy Committee. Also approved Friday by the committee were measures to permit postgrad registration of voters and setting up a Commission on legislative reapportionment for 1980. WASHINGTON — David Eisenhower, rejecting reports in a forthcoming book, says he never considered Richard Nixon demoted or near suicide. WASHINGTON — The Labor Department has reported men are dropping out of the work force as women grab most of the nation's new jobs. ST. LOUIS — Fire fighters hampered by brisk winds battled for two hours before containing a blaze Friday that began in a vacant eight-story warehouse and quickly engulfed a three-block area near downtown St. Louis. No serious injuries were reported. WATERBURY — A \$200,000 bond, under which accused double-murderer Murray R. Gold has been held for the past 18 months, has been cut in half, but it was unclear today whether the New York stockbroker could come up with the money. His first trial ended in a mistrial Wednesday. PITTSBURGH — Gulf Oil Corp. Friday said it was invited by the Soviet-backed government in Angola to resume oil production operations in the West African country and planned to do so as soon as possible. NEW YORK — Police have beefed up patrols around the Soviet Mission to the United Nations, the target of sniper fire Friday. No one was hurt in the incident.

BOSTON — The New England Council, prompted by the proposed massive cutbacks at Ft. Devens, has launched an investigation to see if discrimination is the reason why New England is losing so many military installations, according to the Boston Herald American. BOSTON — The Boston School Committee has voted on a budget of nearly \$179 million, of which \$22 million must be approved by the mayor and the City Council.

CARACAS, Venezuela — Owens Illinois executive William Niehouse, an American kidnaped by leftist guerrillas Feb. 27, is being well cared for, his abductors reported Friday. But they warned he would be killed if police try to discover the "people's jail" where he is being held. One third of the striking Teamsters have settled and negotiators in the San Francisco city strike have agreed to call a third party in their dispute, the negotiations in a television network strike were to resume today before a federal mediator.

Ford sharpens attack in Wisconsin forays

WEST BEND, Wis. (UPI) — With Wisconsin's primary only three days off, President Ford is forecasting his own victory but mounting his harshest attacks on Ronald Reagan to thwart the challenger's criticism of U.S. defense policy.

At one point, Ford all but accused Reagan of undermining national security with his claim that the United States has lost military superiority over the Soviet Union. He called that "a distortion" that "could alarm the American people... have an adverse impact on our allies and it could encourage our enemies."

Ford, who lashed out at Reagan repeatedly Friday during speeches in Milwaukee and West Bend, was winding up his visit today with appearances in Fond du Lac and Green Bay after an early morning stop at a family-owned dairy farm. While House aides and Ford supporters said privately the President stepped up his rhetoric because he was angered by Reagan's continuing criticism of American defense policy.

Manchester minority program examination urged by CROG

By ALICE EVANS Herald Reporter A regional commission is urging the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to examine Manchester's Affirmative Action program because it says the town has a "remarkably" percentage of minority municipal employees and town residents.

Affirmative Action assures that there will be no discrimination in the employment of minority groups and that the employer seek out employees from these groups. The letter states that although Manchester has adopted an Affirmative Action plan "in principle," it has not defined specific goals, timetables and monitoring system.

Alan Mason, the town's community development coordinator, has said that he believes HUD will take a close look at the city of Hartford's comments on the town's application. Last year, HUD did not consider Hartford's comments seriously, Mason said, and subsequently last year HUD can disapprove our application, and I can't see that really happening," Mason said.

The town has the option of responding to CROG's comments before the application is sent to HUD for final review. "Time is growing short for this action," he said.

"I am hopeful in terms of the attitude of the management of the town in making improvements. We can't make dramatic progress immediately," he said. McCarthy cited the Manchester Police Department, which has four women including a sergeant in the department.

Wilson Deakin, assistant superintendent of schools, said the Board of Education had adopted a policy a year ago on Affirmative Action. "We are looking at Affirmative Action plans of other boards of education and will have a look at the town's when it is completed." Committee adopts \$1.7 billion budget

HARTFORD (UPI) — Connecticut will spend \$1,794,923,000 next fiscal year if a part of a state budget package endorsed by the Appropriations Committee gets full legislative endorsement. The spending side of the ledger, endorsed Friday on a 29-7 vote along party lines, was \$1.7 billion less than Gov. Ella T. Grasso recommended in her budget message last February.

The budget bill that was sent to the House followed closely the spending recommendations of the governor, although nearly all state agencies suffered minor cuts, mostly in payroll costs. Legislative experts told the committee although the longer work week was rejected Thursday it had no impact on the budget because also defeated would be a \$10 million pay hike for employees the governor had proposed. With surprisingly little debate, the package although it has reached preliminary agreement on what steps will be taken to generate the needed income.

A payroll savings was expected because a hiring freeze is slated to cut the state's 40,000-member labor force by 33 workers per month and employees left or retired were not replaced. There was some initial confusion because Mrs. Grasso's budget recommendations were based on her proposal to cut spending next year by \$10 million through a longer work week for state employees. Appropriations co-chairman Sen. Robert D. Houley, D-Vernon, said it was a budget "that will take a lot of work to live within it," but added it could be done. The Finance Committee has yet to vote on the revenue side of the budget

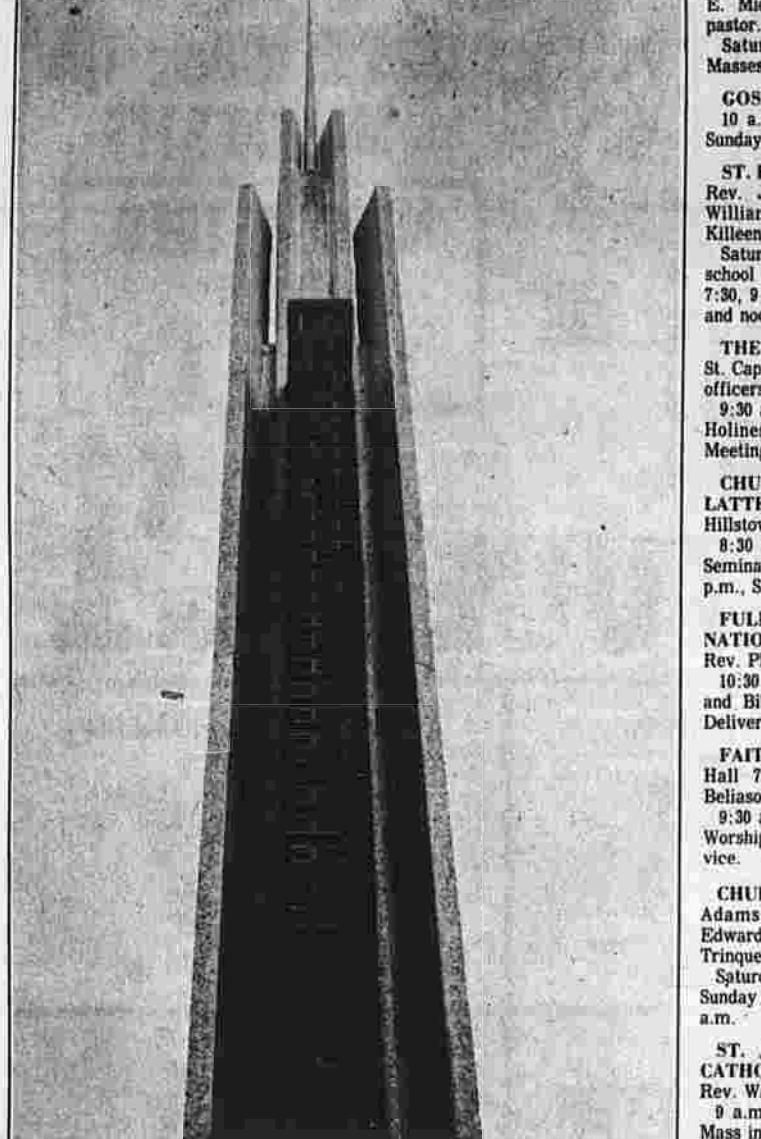

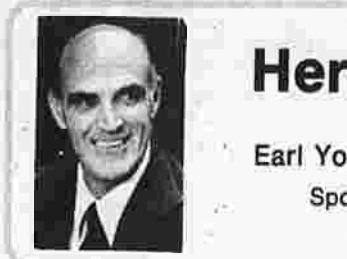

GREENSBORO, N.C. (UPI) — The Greater Greensboro Open has become a scrambling free-for-all with four golfers—Miller Barber, Al Geberger, Kermit Zarley and Mike Hill—tied for the lead going into today's third round and 11 others within two strokes.

The four leaders were clustered at 153, seven under par on the par-71, 6,643-yard Seefield Country Club course. 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# Don Nelson stars in Celtic triumph

BOSTON (UPI) — When Celtics fans were breaking out the crying towels over Don Nelson's pronged benching, Boston Coach Tom Heinsohn advised everyone to dry their eyes. "I haven't forgotten Nellie," he said in January of his 35-year-old forward. "He's just not shooting well and he's doesn't fit in to our fast break style. But before the season is over he'll come in and win us a halfgame or two, you'll see." Nelson made Heinsohn a prophet Friday night, scoring 22 points in 18 minutes, to boost the Celtics past Houston 119-115. The victory was meaningless to Boston, which already has clinched the Atlantic Division and Eastern Conference titles, but the loss pushed the Rockets closer to playoff elimination. Houston must win its final five games while Philadelphia or Buffalo must lose all its remaining games. The game had individual significance for Nelson, hoping to end a 14-year career with a strong finish. "I missed my first three shots," he laughed. "Usually, I'd be out of (the game) after that but I got three-point play and some contact and some good things started to go: I felt good." After the three first misses in the second period, Nelson hit eight of 10 field goal attempts. And in the fourth quarter he was the difference between a lopsided played, meaningless, Celtics loss and the team's 53rd win of the season. When Charlie Scott fouled out with 3:53 to play and his team trailing, 113-107, Nelson scored seven straight Boston points to bring the Celtics within one at 115-114. Dave Cowens netted the final five points while Nelson helped out with four rebounds to assure the comeback victory. "Nellie won the ballgame," praised Heinsohn. "He played a super game. You can tell whether he's got it or not in the first 30 seconds — if he's running, if he's on the boards and in the flow of the play."

## Police and firemen suffer budget cuts

## Delightful 'Dream' in Hartford

By JUNE TOMPKINS

"Dream on Monkey Mountain" may not be everyone's dream, but the play by Derek Walcott showing at the Hartford Stage Company in Hartford is exciting entertainment.

Walcott uses symbolism to describe the Caribbean native's eternal search for identity.

Subjected to colonial rule by the white man, yet yearning for recognition as a native African, the West Indian survives a constant struggle between the two forces.

Symbolizing the man who suffers the effects of colonialism and who dreams of a black man's Utopia, is Al Freeman Jr. as Makak, a charcoal burner, who makes weekly trips to

market to make a living.

Makak's poetic soliloquy of his dream, of the moon, the mist, and a beautiful white woman that talks to him are repeated in part throughout the play. The words are sheer poetry and beautiful.

However, the scenes in the play are disjointed, like dream sequences which have little actual connection.

There are tribal rituals accompanied by drums and dancing, and chanting.

On a bare stage which resembles the edge of a forest, or at times, a jail, a large silver moon is suspended to suggest a soft, sometimes eerie light.

In one scene, a group of actors covered with tropical fronds wave their arms in the subdued

light and emulate tropical bird sounds to suggest a tropical forest in the background.

As the author says, "I tried to combine various elements on a bare stage with just light, because we in the West Indies are also very poor."

Any attempt to depict a sequence of events or follow a plot in "Dream on Monkey Mountain" is futile.

But if it is observed merely as an impressionistic work of drama, it is delightful.

Freeman, who also appears as Ed Hall on the daytime radio serial in "One Life to Live," is a superb Makak whose portrayal alone is worth witnessing.

"Dream on Monkey Mountain" continues at the Hartford Stage Company through April 25.

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## ABC kills 9 shows in fall scheduling

NEW YORK (UPI) — ABC, which guessed very right this year and presented a serious challenge to CBS as No. 1 in the Nielsen ratings, next fall will downgrade law and order in favor of comedy and variety.

The network has announced its new schedule, dropping nine shows and replacing them with four comedies, two variety shows, one cop and one private eye show, and a dramatic series, which may or may not be "Rich Man, Poor Man."

Nine shows have been scratched — "Marcus Welby," "Harry O," "Swiss Family Robinson," "On The Rocks," "The Rookies," "S.W.A.T.," "Good Heavens," "Almost Anything Goes" and "D-Angelo-Superstar."

Here's a rundown on the new slots in the ABC fall schedule:

Sunday, 7-8 p.m. The Bill Cosby Show, with Cosby in an audience-oriented variety show calculated to draw the youngsters away from "Disney" on NBC.

Monday, 8-9 p.m. Captain and Tennille, a husband-and-wife team, who will combine music and comedy.

Tuesday, 9-9:30 p.m. The Nancy Walker Show, starring Miss Walker in a Norman Lear-developed comedy series about a woman trying to fill three roles — as professional talent agent, as mother to a prodigiously procreating daughter, and as

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## Centennial stamp is a mystery

Manchester's 1923 Centennial bash ran for seven days. This mystery stamp carries the dates of the last three. The big pageant was on Friday the 5th. And as for the 7th: "On Sunday the town awoke to its normal sobriety." (from Spiess and Bidwell's "History...")

### Stamps and coins

Neither that book nor Dr. Buckley's "A New England Pattern" has anything to say about the stamp. Even the official program of the time gives it zilch. Strange too, since it does announce "Cheney Silk Flags, Wonderful Post Card Views, Souvenir Books, Badges and Penants."

A member of the Manchester Philatelic Society found the stamp in an estate collection and brought it to the clubrooms. No one had ever heard of it — not even longtime Manchester residents.

It is just the size of our small regular postage. The perfs are 12 by 12. It is fully gummed and the paper is a light beige or ecru. The lettering and figures are in black and design in red orange. The center is, of course, the coat of arms of the state. The motto "Qui Transtulit Sustinet" means "He who transplanted still sustains." The three objects on the shield are loaded grapevines.

It is a nice neat stamp that looks just great to anyone who has turned away where it came from and who

got it up. And how many were made and where it was sold and whence the proceeds. Also why the great scarcity? Were they all sent out of town on letters and cards like Christmas seals? Or was it an unauthorized use of the Connecticut arms and so squashed early?

### Photography on stamps

The April "Popular Photography" magazine has an article on collecting stamps that have to do with photography in its various phases. Topics such as religion, animals, art and so forth have produced so many stamps that it is almost hopeless to try to get them all.

However, the author notes that a complete collection of photo-related stamps to date can be assembled for about \$30. The first one to look for is the France, 1939, issue of Daguerre and Niepce. On later stamps we get Leonardo da Vinci, who described the camera obscura (pinhole), and Kepler, who drew up formulas for lens combinations. Then there was Thomas Edison and his kinetoscope, and, of course, George Eastman, whose Kodak brought cameras into everyday use.

There are many stamps that were made directly from photographs, such as the Iwo Jima flag-raising, the Devil's Tower out west, and the 1971 Wool Industry with the mother ewe and lambie. There is one of especial local interest — the Robert Frost issue that was taken from David Rhineland's shot and featured at the MPS exhibition.

One joy to behold is the Austria

1973 stamp that shows a Petzval lens so real it seems to be the lens itself. From the timing one might almost suspect that the PopPhotog author got going on a collection after seeing this particular stamp.

### Events scheduled

Two events tomorrow: The First Sunday Stamp Bourse at the Ramada Inn, East Hartford, and a Coin Show and Bourse put on by the Manchester Coin Club at the K of C Hall, 138 Main St., Manchester. The time in each case is 10 to 5 and the admission is free. You can either choose one or ping-pong back and forth for better hobby coverage.

On Tuesday, April 6, again at the K of C Hall, 7:30 p.m., the regular meeting of the Central Connecticut Coin Club, with another of those tricky Red Book quizzes.
