

Top students named at Manchester High

F. Douglas Baker and Amy M. Stone are the valedictorian and salutatorian, respectively, of Manchester High School's Class of 1976.

The announcement was made this morning to the student body by public address. Principal George F. Emmerling and vice-principal Laurence Leonard shared in the announcement of the high school scholars, honor students and others who make up the first quarter of the class.

They will be part of one of the largest graduating classes at MHS in several years. There are 704 candidates this year for graduation. In 1965 there were 719 graduates, and in 1964 the top figure was 757.

Graduation exercises will be June 21 on Memorial Field.

Baker, the son of Mr. and Mrs.

Fred Baker of 125 Walker St., is undecided where he will attend college. He has received acceptances from Yale University, University of Connecticut and Wesleyan University, but is waiting for responses from Harvard and Massachusetts Institute of Technology before making his final decision.

His choice of a career in math or science is a natural one for Baker has won several trophies during his three years on the high school math team. He will compete individually in the Eastern Regional Math Team Tournament in New York City early in June.

Baker is a member of the National Honor Society. He has also served on the debate team, the student assembly, and has been president of the chess club.

His activity in badminton won for him last year the high school championship in singles and doubles.

When he isn't pondering mathematical problems, Baker relaxes with a guitar or fishing rod.

Miss Stone is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Stone of 60 Butter-nut Rd.

As of last Thanksgiving, she knew she was going to attend Mt. Holyoke

College in South Hadley, Mass. She would like to study medicine, or some facet of it.

She said her interest was prompted by caring for an elderly lady who had broken her hip. Miss Stone worked with her all last summer in water therapy almost teaching her to swim. By the end of the summer, her patient was walking without a cane, she said.

She has been active on the school tennis team, a member of the advisory board of the student assembly, and photography editor of the High School World. She is also a member of the National Honor Society. Besides photography, her hobbies are playing the piano, skiing and golfing.

She was taken to Manchester Memorial Hospital by ambulance. She works as a nurse there. She was soon after transferred to Hartford Hospital where she was undergoing surgery late this morning.

Chief Kerrigan said her condition is "guarded" and she is being treated for multiple facial injuries including the loss of sight of her left eye.

Police are seeking her husband, Ralph H. Flath, for questioning. The couple have been separated, the chief said. They have no children, he added.

Police have not been able to question Mrs. Flath, he said.

GNP soars by 7.5 %

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Gross National Product soared 7.5 per cent after adjustment for inflation in the first quarter of 1976 for its broadest show of strength since the recession ended last April, the Commerce Department reported today.

The increase was well above most predictions, which had anticipated only minor improvement from the revised 5 per cent rise in the last three months of 1975.

The Commerce Department said the real GNP, which is adjusted to

reduce the impact of inflation, was estimated at an annual rate of \$1,238 trillion in the first three months of 1976, up from \$1,216 trillion in the final quarter of 1975.

For the first time, the value of the GNP exceeded the level it had attained before the recession began with the Arab oil embargo in the winter of 1974. GNP was estimated at \$1,233 trillion at the end of 1975.

There were two primary factors for the surprisingly large gain: a

swell in inventories — sale-ready goods held in reserve by merchants, wholesalers and manufacturers — and the lowest inflation rate in 3 1/2 years.

"Half of the growth came from inventory investment, which increased sharply after holding steady in the fourth quarter," Commerce said.

The GNP inflation rate, which measures prices paid at all levels of trading from wholesale to final consumption, was estimated at 3.7 per

cent. It was 6.8 per cent in the previous quarter.

GNP before adjustment for inflation was estimated at \$1,616 trillion, up 11.5 per cent from the \$1,573 trillion rate in the previous quarter.

For the first time since the recession ended last April, all categories of the GNP both before and after adjustment for inflation increased. In the previous three quarters various sectors had either risen or fallen, primarily inventories.

NORWICH (UPI)—Fire officials were looking into a blaze in a two-story wood frame building which killed a child and injured five persons. Seven-month-old Shannon Ogas was asleep in an upstairs bedroom Saturday when the blaze started. Firefighters battled thick smoke and intense heat to rescue the child, and efforts were made to revive him. He was dead on arrival at Backus Hospital.

HARTFORD (UPI)—Legislative leaders have said they would like to finish the 1976 session by April 30, five days before the constitutionally required, May 5, adjournment. The overwhelming Democratic majority in both houses precluded opposition delay tactics and contributed to the hopes for early conclusion.

HARTFORD (UPI)—The wave of strikes in the state will continue, according to one of the governor's financial advisors. "We've had quite a number of strikes and we're going to get more, too," said University of Connecticut Prof. David Pinsky. Pinsky said inflation was the problem. "In the past, they (unions) got about 5 per cent a year. So they've fallen quite a bit behind."

CONCORD, N.H. (UPI)—The United States Supreme Court heard oral arguments today in the final round of a Maine-New Hampshire boundary dispute which has existed since men first fished the lobster-rich waters off Portsmouth Harbor. The dispute over waters between Portsmouth and the offshore Isles of Shoals got to the Supreme Court because increasing pressure of lobster fishing brought fishermen from both states into waters which formerly had been left to New Hampshire men.

National

WASHINGTON (UPI)—While the attention in the Republican presidential contest is focused on the May 1 Texas primary, Ronald Reagan has been working quietly to tie up a number of delegations in smaller states. Alabama, Arizona, Georgia, Louisiana, Nevada, Oklahoma and South Carolina are all scenes of possible Reagan victories over President Ford in the coming month.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—It takes "courageous, motivated, prepared and willing" people to decide battles, says a Pentagon study which proposes steps to boost morale of U.S. troops. The Defense Department's Manpower Commission prepared the study at the request of Congress two years ago. Published Sunday, it suggests some deterioration of U.S. troop morale — partly because top military leaders tend to view service men and women as impersonal statistics.

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Patricia Hearst's hospital guards are using sophisticated weapons and devices to protect her because of death threats. Her attorney says the newspaper heiress "has a constant fear of being assassinated." "The threats are coming in every day," said Albert Johnson, one of Miss Hearst's lawyers.

International

ON THE ROAD TO JERICHO, Israeli-Occupied Jordan (UPI)—Tens of thousands of Israelis with knapsacks, baby carriages, guns and guitars marched today on the West Bank today to show that all of the occupied region "belongs to the Jewish people." Hundreds of Arabs demonstrated against the march in the West Bank towns of Nablus, Ramallah and Jenin, raising Palestine Liberation Organization flags and tossing rocks at Israeli troops.

Town takes heat in stride

An early spring heat wave which made Easter seem like the Fourth of July continued today with temperatures expected to set record highs for the fourth day in a row.

Manchester area residents apparently were taking the weather in stride as thermometers soared into the 90s over the weekend.

The statewide forest fire danger remained at a high level today, although last week's series of many brush and woods fires in Manchester didn't continue into the weekend.

Local fire fighters reported several weekend calls to wash down gasoline which had overflowed from full automobile tanks. Officials warned motorists not to fill their tanks because the fuel expands in heat.

Manchester Police reported no unusual weather-related problems over the weekend, although there was a

slight increase in the number of noise complaints and night traffic was heavy.

Police said there were large numbers of people moving around after dark each weekend night. There was no increase in traffic accidents, though, police said.

State officials issued an automotive air pollution alert today as 90-degree temperatures continued. Motorists were asked to refrain from unnecessary driving and use public transportation.

People with a history of respiratory ailments were advised to moderate their physical activity. Manchester Memorial Hospital spokesman said there were no unusual emergency room cases over the weekend.

Officials of the Hartford Electric Light Co. said there were no "brownouts" over the weekend despite the

sudden demands for extra power for air conditioning.

Local appliance dealers, though, said there was no rush of buyers for air conditioners. Dealers said they sold a few units but they didn't expect heavy sales unless the heat wave continued for another two or three days.

Many area residents escaped central Connecticut for weekend trips to suburban lakes and the shore.

Beach traffic was heavy Saturday and Sunday and the shoreline parks were crowded. Area lakes were also crowded with boating and fishing enthusiasts over the weekend. The opening day of fishing season Saturday resulted in successful catches by most anglers, state Environmental Protection officials said.

In Manchester, municipal swimming pools weren't open, the season schedule calls for opening on Saturday, May 29. Officials said there

were no complaints and no calls seeking an earlier opening.

Elsewhere in Connecticut, two men who were apparently trying to beat the heat were arrested as they walked into a Salisbury restaurant Saturday. Police said they were partially nude and created a disturbance.

On Sunday, New Englanders took time out to celebrate Easter in many ways despite the record-breaking heat. Several thousand people turned out for a Bicentennial Easter Parade in Boston and Hartford's non-denominational sunrise service attracted hundreds to Goodwin Park.

In New York City, thousands ignored the blistering heat to stroll along Fifth Avenue in the annual Easter Parade.

The continuing warm weather is the result of a stationary high

Meriden council to act, teachers back

MERIDEN (UPI)—About 600 teachers planned to return to the classroom today, pending approval by the city council of their fourth agreement with the Board of Education.

Teachers voted unanimously Saturday to return to the 10,500 students they have not taught since April 7.

They also voted 453-7 to "adjourn" their 12-day-old strike, pending approval of the contract by the Court of Common Council, which has rejected three others.

Mayor Pro Tem Joseph J. Marinaro

told the Meriden Federation of Teachers a majority of the 29-member council approved of the contract and would vote in favor of it at an 8 p.m. meeting tonight.

MFT President Thomas Bruenn said teachers will resume their strike Tuesday morning if the council does not approve the pact.

Board of Education President Amelia Mustone called the new contract "fair and equitable," and said she was "particularly happy with the prospect of the end of the strike."

She said the board had already ap-

proved the pact.

Bruenn called the new agreement "fair and just."

The teachers contended their strike was legal, because it was directed against the council and not the school board. By state law, it is illegal for teachers to strike against a board of education.

The settlement provides a \$390 increase across the board, retroactive to Sept. 1, 1975, and the same next year. Teachers were paid between \$8,300 and \$18,400 a year under the contract which expired last August.

Estimated cost to the city will be \$451,000, compared to the \$461,000 cost of the last contract the council rejected.

Also included in the pact is a dental plan to be worked out by the board and the MFT. Layoff policy was not included in the contract; the two sides agreed to work that issue out later.

No fines have been levied against striking teachers, who will receive their full pay, according to a federation spokesman.

Girls boost male egos to gain own ends

BOSTON (UPI)—A psychology instructor says women help perpetuate the notion of male superiority.

"Based on a conscious sex-role ideology, the illusion of male superiority and dominance is maintained by women in order to support the basic vulnerability and fragility of the male ego," Dr. Dorothy Ullian of Wheelock College in Boston said Saturday.

Dr. Ullian said she reached her conclusions after "intensive"

clinical interviews with 70 males and females.

"By early adolescence, women knowingly participate in a psychological maneuver whereby they limit their potential for superior power and competence in exchange for the promise of romance and marital success," she said.

Girls begin to realize the "inflated need for status and power on the part of their male contemporaries" as

early as age 6, she said. Following that, she said, females go through three distinct sequences which end in self-limitation.

The first phase is "a preliminary stage from approximately 6 to 10 years of age in which girls are aware of the male's inflated need for power and status, but nevertheless regard this inequality with resentment and anger," said Dr. Ullian.

Then comes "a further level attained in early adolescence when

girls recognize that female subordination is required for successful heterosexual relationships, but are still reluctant to subordinate their interests to those of the male."

Finally, the adolescence level is achieved by age 14.

She said the results of her study, conducted as part of her Harvard University doctoral thesis, will be presented to a women's study conference April 24 at the University of Cincinnati.

It's been 30 years since the Holocaust, the calculated murder of six million Jews by the Nazi regime. Even at the time, the Holocaust was an evil of such gigantic proportion that the average person had difficulty grasping the enormity of what had actually happened.

Santayana once said, "Those who do not study the past are condemned to repeat it." In an attempt to reduce the possibility that such a horror will ever happen again, the churches and synagogues of the United States have increasingly become involved in programs to commemorate the Holocaust reminding us and teaching our new generation of the moral arithmetic involved when evil triumphs because good men do nothing.

Although other mass murders have occurred, the slaughter of the Armenians by the Turks, the killing of the Poles by the Russians, the starvation of the Biafrans by the Nigerians, even our own role with the American Indian — the moral arithmetic unique in the Holocaust was the systematic, organized, technological manner in which the elimination of an entire people was planned and carried out in a "Christian" country, surrounded by "Christian" countries.

April 25 is Holocaust Sunday. The Executive Committee of MACC has urged member churches to observe April 25 as Holocaust Sunday. Christian churches around the country will be holding special services.

In Manchester, South United Methodist Church will hold a special service in commemoration of the Holocaust, Sunday at 7:30 p.m. A 30-minute film, "Night and Fog," an internationally acclaimed award-winning review of the Holocaust will be shown.

You are invited to join in this evening program and the discussion period that follows. The Holocaust raises many human and theological questions. We must continue together to seek the answers.

Rival militiamen pound Beirut

By MICHAEL KEATS BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) - Rival militiamen pounding away at each other with a barrage of bombs and artillery fire have put Syria's latest peace plan to the test only hours after their leaders accorded it cautious support.

Moslem leftists traded mortar, rocket and machine gun fire in heavy fighting Sunday night. The sound of exploding bombs and shells echoed across all sectors of Beirut, giving citizens another night of only fitful sleep in basement shelters.

In the east, artillery exchanges boomed between leftist-controlled Aintoura and Meien and the town of Bolonia and Mrouj, under control of the right-wing Phalangist party.

The heavy fighting marred the first meeting of the Syrian-Lebanese-Syrian troops, who entered Lebanon more than a week ago to impose an arms blockade, remained in position along the frontier. More than 40 Syrian tanks were dug in at the main stronghold near the Massaa checkpoint, about three miles inside Lebanese territory.

As Manchester area residents tried to beat the heat again today, their town officials were already looking forward to next winter. Bids were opened today on furnishing the town with its sandspreader needs for 1976-1977 snow and ice control.

Jackson in state today

NEW HAVEN (UPI) - A 16-hour campaign swing by Democratic presidential hopeful Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., was slated in Connecticut today.

First stop for Jackson, considered the frontrunner in the state's first presidential primary, was in the New Haven area at 8 a.m. to address the Interfaith Public Forum at Congregation B'Nai Jacob in nearby Woodbridge.

He will then return for a private fundraiser. The senator recently won several labor endorsements, including those of John Driscoll, Connecticut State Labor Council president, and of 25,000 United Steelworkers in 60 Connecticut locals.

A 22-member steering committee of labor leaders is rounding up labor help for Jackson in Connecticut. He also has the endorsement of Gov. Ella T. Grasso and a number of Democratic party leaders.

Jackson plans to motorcade to Hartford for an 8:30 a.m. private fundraiser at the Hotel Somerset, to be followed by a news conference at 9:15.

He will drive to a 10:15 a.m. Jackson for President rally at Meriden's Holiday Inn, according to his schedule, followed by a labor rally at Carpenters' Hall in Hartford.



BICENTENNIAL FACTS

Fl. Granby, S.C. was defended by Tories under Andrew Maxwell when on the night of May 14, 1781, "Light-Horse Harry" Lee moved a six pound gun within 600 yards of the fort. The next morning, Lee fired the cannon and his infantry moved in Maxwell, not noted for courage or military skill, agreed to surrender if he and his men could keep their plunder and withdraw to Charleston as prisoners of war. Lee, aware of approaching British reinforcements, agreed. Without the loss of a man, The World Almanac recalls, the rebels gained possession of an important post along with a considerable supply of ammunition.

Jackston seeks meeting to study MEG contract

Claiming that all of the facts weren't clarified when the Board of Directors last Tuesday approved a two-year contract with the 60-member Municipal Employees Group (MEG), Manchester Director Phyllis Jackston is requesting a special meeting of the directors.

"The special meeting," she explains in a letter to Mayor Matt Moriarty Jr., "is in order that the matter be clarified and that every member of the board is in full knowledge of the facts."

She says she's concerned of the effect the MEG terms might have on other union contracts now being negotiated. Specifically, Mrs. Jackston

questions a statement last Tuesday by Town Manager Robert Weiss, when he said the MEG contract provides average raises of 5.44 per cent in the first year and 5.7 per cent in the second and that the percentages combine raises and step increments.

She says she has learned that the percentage increases are exclusive of step increments and that combining raises and step increments brings the figures closer to 7.5 and 8 per cent, in some instances. The special meeting, she says, might prevent questions about other contracts, when they are presented for approval.

Auditors say tech school didn't follow bids rule

HARTFORD (UPI) - The Southbury Technical School did not follow state rules requiring competitive bids when it awarded a contract for \$2,000, according to the state auditors.

The auditors also found a number of other revenues without competitive bidding, including one costing more than \$3,000.

College paid for goods before date of delivery

HARTFORD (UPI) - Goods and services worth \$150,000 were paid for in 1973 before they were delivered to Middlesex Community College in an audit by Middletown, state auditors which did not say today.

In an audit for the three years ending June 30, 1975, the auditors found that the school's move to a new campus in September 1973. The prepayments violated state procedures, according to the auditors.

New equipment at the new campus was not properly marked or recorded, the auditors said, nor were sufficient records kept on equipment moved from the old campus.

The auditors noted the timing of the two transactions, involving \$54,000 and \$96,000, suggested the community college was trying to make sure the appropriations for the work

did not expire before they were billed.
