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## News summary

### State

**HARTFORD (UPI)** — A Connecticut lawmaker has called for a legislative investigation of the firings of two natural gas company workers who charged their employer with improper business practices.

Rep. Russell Reynolds, D-West Haven, Friday urged the legislative Regulated Activities Committee to investigate the matter. The panel is in charge of writing laws on utilities.

George Dunleavy of West Haven and Raymond Fields of Durham were fired by Southern Connecticut Gas Co. after testifying during a Regulated Activities public hearing two months ago.

**HARTFORD (UPI)** — The National Labor Relations board plans a July 26 hearing into its 12-count complaint against the Hartford Sheraton Hotel for alleged illegal activities against its striking employees.

The complaint Friday charged the hotel, owned by International Telegram and Telegraph Co., threatened to fire, blacklist and take reprisals against employees if they went on strike, and demoted some union-involved workers.

**HARTFORD (UPI)** — Legislation allowing Waterbury, which faces an \$11-million budget deficit, to float a bond issue to meet the cash shortage has been approved by the House of Representatives.

The lower chamber Friday also gave its approval to measures that would allow the sale of liquor in certain bowling alleys and expand the powers of state auditors.

**HARTFORD (UPI)** — Lobbyists were thrown out of Senate Democratic caucuses because the small meeting room was becoming overcrowded, Senate Majority Leader Joseph I. Lieberman said Friday.

The Connecticut Citizen Action Group and the League of Women Voters complained earlier in the day their lobbyists were among those expelled Wednesday, adding, "We hope it is not because senators fear the close scrutiny of the voters."

**HARTFORD (UPI)** — Morris K. Udall apparently will face a major effort from Frank Church for the allegiance of the state's liberal voters in the May 11 presidential primary.

Church campaign aides confirmed Friday their man would make a substantial effort in Connecticut, an apparent blow

to Udall, whose hopes in the primary lie in unifying liberal voters.

### National

**WASHINGTON (UPI)** — The Air Force has admonished another nine officers and the retired commander of its space program for accepting entertainment from defense contractors.

Lt. Gen. Kenneth W. Schultz, retired commander of the Space and Missile Systems Organization, was rebuked for going to a hunting lodge owned by Rockwell Corp., which is building the space shuttle for the Air Force and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA).

**NEW YORK (UPI)** — New York State Democrats have re-elected their embattled chairman, Patrick J. Cunningham, to a second two-year term, despite a current grand jury probe into charges that Cunningham had sold judgeships.

About 80 per cent of the more than 300 persons attending a state Democratic committee meeting Friday in the New York Hilton rose from their seats to elect the Bronx County leader.

**WASHINGTON (UPI)** — The Agriculture Department tentatively predicts another record corn crop for the 1976-77 season. But it says wheat production may be off by about 75 million bushels and exports of wheat this year won't reach the previously predicted total of 1.3 billion.

In its first projection of crops to be harvested in the coming season, the department said Friday the increased corn acreage being planted this year could result in a crop of 6.38 billion bushels, up from last year's record harvest of 5.76 billion bushels.

### International

**PARIS (UPI)** — Leaders of a student protest rally have denied responsibility for violent demonstrations by thousands of young leftists who pitched firebombs and stones at club-carrying police until teargas dispersed them.

Police said authorities took 22 demonstrators into custody but jailed only one person allegedly caught smashing store windows with an iron bar.

## FitzGerald moves to end vandalism at Wickham Park

In an effort to combat vandalism and other forms of lawlessness in Wickham Park, Judge of Probate William FitzGerald is taking steps to make the park safe for the public.

He has called a meeting for 9 a.m. Wednesday in his office in the Municipal Building, to discuss the situation and to make tentative plans for enforcing rules there. Invited to attend are officials of the Hartford National Bank and Trust Co., trustees for the park, and the police chiefs of Manchester and East Hartford. (The park is in both towns, to the north of W. Middle Tpke.)

Judge FitzGerald is directly involved because the family residence of the late Horace and Edith Whitcomb, who left the property in trust for the use of the people of the two towns, is entirely within Manchester boundaries.

Judge FitzGerald said the Wednesday meeting will be private. A subsequent meeting however, at a time and place to be announced, will be for all interested persons and the public, in order to gain ideas for controlling what he says is "a very difficult situation."

Horace Whitcomb died in 1945 and left the property (about 200 acres) for use by his wife in her lifetime.

When Edith Whitcomb died in 1960, the park and buildings, plus a trust fund for maintaining them, was left for the benefit of the people of Manchester and East Hartford. The fund has a balance of about \$4 million today. It is administered by the Manchester Probate Court.

Because of vandalism, harassment and other incidents, the park was closed to vehicular traffic earlier this year. Now it is open from 2 to 8 p.m. only, at a time when security personnel is on the job, but the problems have persisted and have become increasingly more difficult to control.

Judge FitzGerald said a similar situation existed in the earlier 60s but the problems this spring "are the worst in many years."

"The park," said Judge FitzGerald, "was left to the people of Manchester and East Hartford — to be enjoyed and to be used peacefully. It's my intention to see that they enjoy it peacefully and that the laws guaranteeing them that enjoyment are enforced."

He added, "Whether the problem this spring is due to the unseasonably warm weather or to increased disregard for the rights of people and property I don't know. I can only say it's going to stop and we'll find the means to make it stop."

## CPEC recommends Manchester name finance officer

The Connecticut Public Expenditures Council has recommended that Manchester create a department of finance under a director appointed by the manager as a means of improving budget operation.

The recommendation is one of several contained in a report submitted to the Board of Directors by the council after a study it undertook at the town's request.

Another recommendation calls for a system of reporting which makes it easy to distinguish between the budget as originally approved by the directors at the start of a fiscal year and as changed during the year's budget operation.

The council suggests deleting from the budget document, data on the

department request and on the revenue collected up to midyear.

One suggestion calls for creating a position of budget analyst within the manager's office or the controller's office to review and revise budget estimates as the year progresses. The council found the review is now done by department heads and is cursory.

In one operation, the council concluded that the town has a good budget program — cash flow management.

The council report said, "The town appears to be adequately forecasting its cash flow needs, thus obtaining the best use of its funds, earning in the process maximum investment income while keeping short-term borrowing to a minimum."

## Main St. tree planting a pilot program

An old song title, "In The Shade of The Old Apple Tree," suggests the pleasure shoppers and strollers now may enjoy along a particular section of Main St.

Fourteen golden locust trees have been planted from Purnell St. to Oak St. as a pilot project co-sponsored by the downtown merchants and the Environment and Beautification Committee of the Greater Manchester Chamber of Commerce.

If the project succeeds, it may be continued along other areas of Main St.

The Main St. tree planting project

began about 12 years ago as a

cooperative project with the former City Beautiful Committee and the merchants. There appeared to be obstacles to the plan at that time and the idea was abandoned. Some of the obstacles were the underground utilities which might be disturbed by plantings.

## P&WA shifts structure

A plan to reorganize and restructure Pratt & Whitney Aircraft, the largest division of United Technologies and the world's principal manufacturer of aircraft gas turbine engines, was announced today by Harry J. Gray, chairman and president of United.

Under the restructuring, a Pratt & Whitney Aircraft Group will be established and will be headed by Bruce N. Torelli as group president. Torelli is currently president of the Pratt & Whitney Aircraft division and group vice president - propulsion of United Technologies. The new Group will consist of four principal units: Commercial Products Division, Government Products Division, Manufacturing Division, and the presently operating Pratt & Whitney Aircraft of Canada. Each will have its own line and staff functions. Pratt & Whitney Aircraft of Canada will continue to serve the general aviation market with small aircraft gas turbine engines.

"The growth and expansion of P&WA since its founding 50 years ago," Gray said, "represents a remarkable achievement in American industry, one in which all of us in the company take great pride. Our new organization clearly delineates specific areas of responsibility and authority and sets the

stage for a new period of growth and development for our people, our products, and our customers. It will enable us to more readily and effectively anticipate and respond to all customer needs and requirements."

Following Gray's statement on the reorganization, Torelli announced the appointment of four senior executives of P&WA to top management positions in the new organization. They are Richard J. Coar, vice president, engineering, named as group executive vice president, technology and strategic planning; David J. Hines, executive vice president, as president, Commercial Products Division; Edmund V. Marshall, vice president and general manager of P&WA's Florida Research and Development Center, as president of the Government Products Division; and Donald Nigro, vice president, production, as president of the Manufacturing Division. Each will report to Torelli who said that additional announcements of new assignments will be forthcoming in the weeks ahead.

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## Bomb scares hit Boston

**BOSTON (UPI)** — Hundreds of office workers were driven by bomb scares into the streets to pray Friday, climaxing a week of real and threatened violence. A biracial sea of humanity flooded City Hall plaza to heal a city divided by race.

Police experts responded to at least 30 bomb threats at a variety of downtown office buildings. Three packages were located, police spokesman Edward Foster said. None contained bombs.

"The bomb squad has been all over the place," he said. A 20-story state office building atop Beacon Hill was evacuated as an estimated crowd of 75,000 at the base of the hill spread across red-brick City Hall plaza to protest violence wracking the city.

"I fear for my city," Rabbi Roland D. Gittelsohn told the rally within sight of the courthouse building where a bomb explosion injured 22 persons Thursday. "I fear for the city which I love."

# Buckland dispute takes new turn

The dispute over Buckland area fire protection took a dramatic turn Thursday, when Town Counsel Victor Moses filed a counter suit against the Eighth District, seeking \$500,000 in damages for the Town of Manchester.

A court action brought by the district against the town in January, seeks a declaratory injunction to determine who has jurisdiction in Buckland—the town or district. The district has extended its boundaries into Buckland, claiming a Nov. 17 referendum authorized the action. The town has refused to accept or acknowledge the expansion, claiming the town charter declares the town interest prevails in any conflict of authority between it and the district.

The \$500,000 counter suit claims district officials broke an agreement they had with the town relative to fire protection in Buckland. That agreement, Moses says, was to remain in effect until the Buckland Firehouse, scheduled for opening about July, is completed.

Monday night at an Eighth District board meeting, District counsel John LaBelle cautioned against emotional involvement in the dispute. He said the courts will decide the jurisdictional aspects of the case and predicted the action could drag on for up to two years before it is settled.

District directors scheduled a May 3 public hearing on a tentative 1976-77 budget. It will be at 7:30 p.m. in Whiton Library Auditorium. Adoption of the budget will be at the district's mid-June annual meeting.

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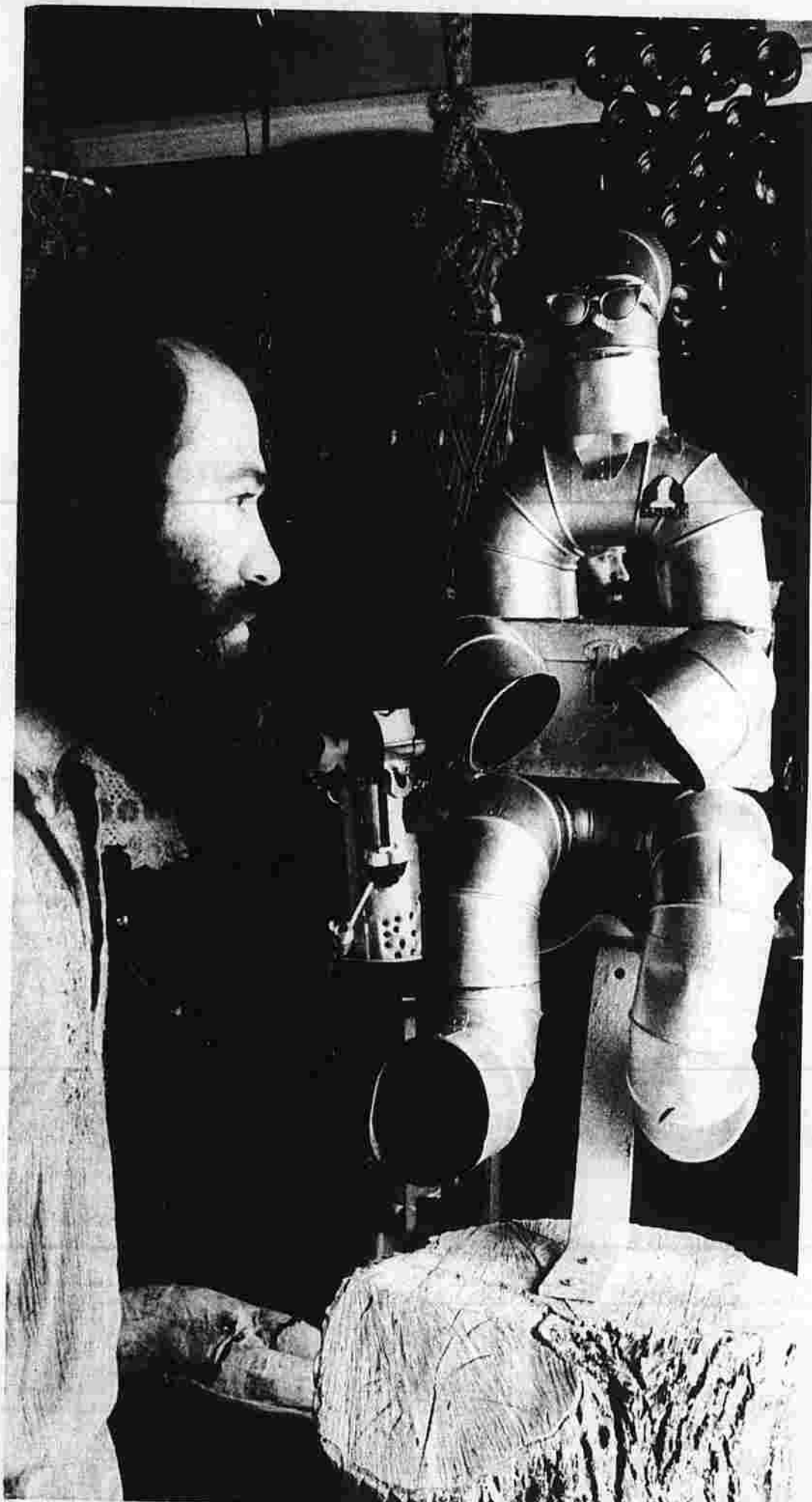

On the show it was sung by David Somerville. It was recorded by Suzanne Stevens on the Capitol label. Your record store either has it or can order it for you.

DEAR DICK: Can you tell me if Jane Rose of Phyllis and Florida Freibus are sisters. Also, are Paul Sorvino of We'll Get By and Charles Durning brothers? B.S., Wallingford, Conn.

None of these people are related.

DEAR DICK: On Starsky and Hutch, is the car Starsky (Paul Michael Glaser) drives his own or is it supplied for him? MARYANN JUDSON, Stockton, Ca.

The studio supplies it. That's the custom in Hollywood. The actors supply nothing, except their own talent.

DEAR DICK: Could you please give me some general information about the members of Monty Python's Flying Circus? DEBBIE SADZEWICZ, Methuen, Mass.

I'm glad you asked, because it gives me a chance to talk a little about those glorious nuts. The group is made up of six men. Five of them — John Cleese, Graham Chapman, Michael Palin, Terry Jones and Eric Idle — are Englishmen, all writers primarily. In a London pub in 1969, they decided to team up and write for themselves. They added Terry Gilliam, an American, who does the wild animation between sequences.

DEAR DICK: I hope you can help me. I have been a Tony Martin fan for years. I have two of his albums — worn this — and can't find any more. Where can I buy all or any of his recordings? And why are they so hard to find? P. JOHNSON, Massena, N.Y.

Records, like books, have a primary life, when they are new and in demand. Gradually, their popularity wanes and the publisher or record company doesn't make any more. They go out of print. That's what's happened to Tony Martin's albums. Your only hope is to find a good used copy in a second-hand record store, or through advertising. And you might also be happy to hear that there will be a book out next fall, the dual biography of Tony and his wife, Cyd Charisse. I know, because I wrote it.

# The fall schedules NBC plans 'events'

NEW YORK (UPI) - NBC hopes to win back its share of the television audience next fall with a one-two combination of heavy "event" programming and light touch adventures that forego punches for punchlines.

The network has canceled nine shows and the "McCoy" segment of its Sunday Mystery Movie. Only one show introduced during the 1975-76 season survives - "The Practice," starring Danny Thomas.

Gone are Rich Little, "Joe Forrester," "Jigsaw John," "Movin' On," "City of Angels," "The Dumpings," "Petrocelli," Mac Davis and "Ellery Queen." With that lineup goes a lot of action-adventure and some top performers, including Lloyd Bridges, Jack Warden, Wayne Rogers and Jimmy Coco.

There are 21 programs listed on NBC's new schedule, and only seven of them are holdovers in their old time slots.

NBC's third-place rating for the season generally was blamed on Marvin Antonowksy, dubbed the "mad programmer" by Lee Grant after he canceled her show, "Fay." Antonowksy has stepped down, although not out of the network, and the schedule was worked out by a committee.

The most exciting thing coming up on NBC this fall is "The Big Event," blocked in from 9:30 to 11 p.m. on Sunday nights, but expandable if programming demands merit more time.

"Big Events" include the television premiere of "Gone With the Wind," a Ross Hunter produced dramatization of Arthur Hailey's "The Moneychangers," and NBC's four-hour 50th anniversary special.

"Best Sellers" is another new concept in regular scheduling, slated for Thursday, 10 to 11 p.m. Here NBC is taking a page from ABC's book, what with the popularity first of "QB VII" and then of "Rich Man, Poor Man."

"Captain and the Kings" by Taylor Caldwell and "Evening in Byzantium" by Irwin Shaw are among the four to six novels slated for serialization at various lengths with major guests stars yet to be announced.

The new NBC schedule comes out like this:

Sunday sticks with "Disney," followed by "Mystery Movie" from 8 to 9:30 p.m., winding up with "The Big Event." There's a new newcomer to "Mystery" - Jack Klugman as "Quincy," a flip and irreverent medical examiner in the Los Angeles coroner's office.

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# UN commems drip with symbolism

By RUSS MacKENDRICK

This stamp and a twin of 31-cent value were released yesterday by the UNPA (the UN Postal Administration). It is the usual long commem size in black, green, brown, and purple. The perforations will cause some squinting and headshaking — 11½ by 11¾. The higher value is in five colors including pink and blue. As always with UN material, the design fairly drips with symbolism. The box on the hoist and the globe and the upsweeping curve stand for increasing international commerce.

## Stamps and coins

The occasion is the fourth session of the UN Conference on Trade and Development (the UNCTAD), which is to take place next month at Nairobi, Kenya, with 153 member states. The first session was in 1964 at Geneva (still the home base of the organization). There were at that time only 120 members. Later meetings were at New Delhi in 1968 and Chile in 1972. Right now the concern is to help developing countries get steady customers and stable prices for their primary commodities. To go with the stamps there is some artwork put out by the World Federation of UN Associations (the WFUNA). It is on

the first day covers and also on prints for framing. The promotional leaflet in shades of gray shows something like a mammoth croquet wicket looming over continents and oceans. It will hopefully be redeemed by the bright blues and greens as described and become a shining gateway to world trade.

With any luck all these items will be on sale at the United Nations booth of the Manchester Philatelic Society exhibition today and tomorrow at Illing. So you can trip to the MANPEX to see what the UNPA and the WFUNA are doing for the UNCTAD.

## Prices misleading

The April 14th Coin World had a page and a half called Trends of Small-size U.S. Paper Money. There were United States notes, silver certificates, Federal Reserve notes, and even WW II emergency pieces. Along with the price list there is a confusing statement saying that it is not a price list but a "composite."

The CW "trends" pages have never been anything to stake your bottom dollar on. For instance, they had one showing Liberty Head \$10 gold, XF, at nothing lower than \$160, whereas somewhere else in the same paper a dealer was making a market at \$105 to buy and \$116 to sell.

These lists appear week after week with no apparent change except the verbal text. The "Wall Street Coin Investor"

tries a little harder and much local dickering is based on still another paper nicknamed the "gray sheet."

## The dump stamp

"Commemorating 200 years of independent dumping and America's number one dump." The chief perpetrator says that the town was founded in 1653 but they were too poor to throw anything away until 1776, so the dump dates from then.

There will be an all-summer hoopla with a Miss Dumpy contest, a Giant Trash Parade, and an exhibit of test borings at the dump. These events start July 4th.

The covers will be in red, white and blue, at 75 cents, and will include a dump credit card good anywhere in the United States.

A redeeming social value is claimed for all this in the way of educating against pollution.
