State

WILLIMANTIC — A federal mediator said there will be no more talks unless striking nurses and Windham Community Memorial Hospital officials change their bargaining positions. The statement followed separate meetings with both sides Friday.

HARTFORD — The Education and Public Health and Safety Committees of the Legislature decided Friday to conduct an inquiry of the goals and operations of the University of Connecticut Medical Center in Farmington. One of the allegations raised is the waste of money at the multi-million dollar facility.

HARTFORD — Sen. Henry Jackson, D-Wash., reportedly will slow down his bid for the Democratic presidential nomination but has scheduled visits to Connecticut May 7 and 8 to campaign for votes in the May 11th Democratic primary.

Regional

BOSTON — Canadian-American imposition of a protected fishing zone stretching 200-miles into the North Atlantic may be illegal and unenforceable, academics told a Council on Canadian Studies Friday. The study contends the plan would only work with cooperation of other Atlantic nations.

CONCORD, N.H. — Following charges Friday by the Justice Department that New Hampshire violated a federal law by mailing lottery tickets across state line in Maine, New Hampshire officials charged the federal government with trying to build a "Berlin Wall" around the state. The suit followed complaints by Maine lottery officials and is the first filed against any of the 13 states conducting lotteries.

NEWPORT, R.I. — Without any fanfare or boasting, until now Newport has quietly become the "lobster capital of the United States," according to Natural Resources Director Dennis J. Murphy, who reported 2.1 millions pound of lobster, nearly twice that of the top port in Maine, were landed at Newport in 1975.

National

NEW YORK — After 46 years, Lowell Thomas, 84, is giving up his evening radio news broadcast on CBS to devote more time to television and other interests. His first radio broadcast was 51 years ago for KDKA, Pittsburgh.

WASHINGTON — The Environmental Protection Agency Friday reported traces of asbestos, a potential cause of cancer, have been found in the drinking water supplies of five major cities — Boston, Philadelphia, Atlanta, San Francisco and Seattle.

International

PARIS — An illegal Turkish alien hijacked a Turkish airliner Friday with 253 persons aboard to protest his expulsion from France, but surrendered today after three airports refused to let the plane land.

Truck driver saves lives of couple trapped in fire

A Glastonbury truckdriver is credited with saving the lives of an elderly couple trapped in an intense house fire on Hudson St. Friday.

Authorities said rapid action by Richard A. Arnold of Glastonbury probably saved the lives of Harold and Tryphena Beebe of 74 Hudson St., who remained hospitalized in serious condition today.

Arnold, 41, was driving on Summit St. at about 11 a.m. when he heard screams and saw smoke pouring from upstairs windows of the two-family dwelling. He stopped his truck, ran inside and rescued the couple.

Beebe, 83, suffered facial and arm burns; his wife, 80, suffered facial burns, and Arnold suffered minor burns and smoke inhalation. Arnold was treated at Manchester Memorial Hospital and released; the Beebes were admitted.

The initial emergency call went to Eighth District fire fighters at 11:08 p.m. and the frame house was fully involved with fire as the first-men and apparatus arrived within a minute.

Three firemen who are Emergency Medical Technicians tended to the injured as other fire fighters attacked the mass of flames with six hose lines. Fire authorities said the blaze was "knocked down" quickly but was

not declared under control until 11:56 a.m.

The fire was most intense in a first-floor kitchen, where it appeared there had been a leaking natural gas pipe which might have exploded to start the fire. Authorities weren't sure of the cause and Eighth District Fire Chief Ted Lingard, also the fire marshal, is investigating.

From the kitchen, the flames spread in a haphazard pattern through false ceilings and spaces within remodeled partitions. Even after visible flames had been extinguished, the blaze continued inside walls and ceilings, fire fighters said.

Heat and smoke inside the house was heavy. Fire fighters, after dousing large masses of flames from outside, entered the structure with portable breathing devices, but two fire fighters still suffered smoke inhalation.

The fire fighters — Leonard Luzusky, 23, of 49 Rachel Rd. and Victor LeGeit, 29, of 37 Keeney St. — were treated at Manchester Memorial Hospital and then returned

to continue fighting the fire.

About 500 feet of three-inch hose was laid to draw water from a hydrant at Main and Hudson Sts. Fire fighters used four 1½-inch lines and two booster lines to attack the fire. The roof was ventilated by ax and power saw to allow gases to escape.

About 35 fire fighters were at the scene with three pieces of apparatus. A reserve engine pumper was transferred from Fleming Rd. to Eighth District Fire Headquarters, and the Town Fire Department was summoned for men and one engine for standby at the Eighth District station.

Fire fighters remained at the scene until about 1:30 p.m. After the blaze, officials said the entire dwelling was gutted. The house, owned by Truman Cowles, was boarded up later in the day.

Ford tries to stop Reagan in Texas primary today

DALLAS (UPI) — President Ford wants to halt Ronald Reagan's challenge by winning big in today's Texas primary, and Jimmy Carter hopes to keep his bandwagon rolling.

Campaigning hard before crowds of thousands right through the eve of the primary, Ford said he doesn't see how the American people can take Reagan seriously. The President's blistering attack on Reagan was coupled with a prediction that he has overcome his underdog status in the battle for 96 GOP delegates and now will win.

If Reagan loses in Texas, it will hurt his "sunbelt strategy" and could finish him as a serious challenger in the battle for the GOP nomination. If he wins, he will gain fresh momentum going into Tuesday's close contest in Indiana, which falls on the

same day as Georgia and Alabama voting where the Californian is favored.

Democratic attention also focused on today's Louisiana primary where 32 delegates were on the ballot. There was no Republican contest there.

Carter was opposed in both states by a diminished George Wallace campaign, but his real opposition came from favorite sons. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, who quit campaigning months ago, was on the Texas ballot, and Gov. Edwin Edwards led an uncommitted force in Louisiana.

Carter predicted he will win a third of the Texas delegates, although an independent poll gave him a majority. There are 98 delegates on the ballot, with another 32 chosen later at the state party convention.

Judge Shea says modern society turning to courts for solutions

We're living in an age in which our traditional institutions are under attack, Superior Court Judge John F. Shea Jr. says, and people are turning more and more to the courts to solve their problems.

Judge Shea, speaking at Friday's Law Day ceremony at the Manchester Municipal Building, said many of the problems brought to courts used to be handled by other branches of government.

Perhaps courts should leave those problems to the other branches of government, Shea said, noting there is a lot of criticism that courts are legislating instead of just adjudicating.

But the courts didn't look for the problems, he said. The problems were thrust on the courts by widespread dissatisfaction with the other branches of government.

Shea called upon everyone in the legal system — not just lawyers, judges and police — to support the law. The support is needed, he said, so the system can continue to protect individual rights and maintain the American tradition of liberty and justice under law.

The highlight of Friday's ceremony was presentation of the Manchester Bar Association's Liberty Bell Award to Sgt. Patricia Graves, youth services officer for the Manchester Police Department.
Law Day Chairman John D.

LaBelle Jr., presenting the award with Mayor Matt Moriarty, cited Miss Graves for helping promote a better understanding of government and of the law, and promoting respect for the law and the courts.

Adding to the praise for Miss Graves was Judge Shea; Moriarty; Judge of Probate William E. Fitzgerald, president of the local bar association; and Police Chief Robert Lannan.

Miss Graves, Manchester's first policewoman, joined the department in 1966. Since 1972 she has served as youth services officer. She is a graduate of Manchester Community College, the FBI National Academy and other law enforcement schools.

House votes to repeal motorcycle helmet law

HARTFORD (UPI) — The House today planned an unusual Saturday session to clear its desks of several major bills in preparation for the mandatory adjournment Wednesday.

Among them was the controversial overhaul of the state's higher education system.

Several bills were approved by the House Friday and sent to Gov. Ella T. Grasso for her signature, including measures cracking down on incompetent and disabled doctors and repealing the law requiring motorcyclists to wear helmets.

Under the "sick doctors" bill the Connecticut Medical Examining Board could suspend or revoke a physician's license for a specific list of impairments including alcoholism, drug addiction, and loss of competence.

The five-member panel would be expanded to nine members by adding two doctors and two consumer representatives, one of them a lawyer.

"This measure will mean better care for all citizens of Connecticut,"

said Rep. John H. Morrison, D-Enfield. Mrs. Grasso has said she would sign the bill into law.

Rep. Richard J. Balducci, D-Newington, said a measure eliminating the federal power to withhold federal funds from states without helmet laws is on President Ford's desk and is expected to be signed within 10 days.

A 17-year-old West Hartford youth was killed in a motorcycle accident recently because he was not wearing a helmet, said Rep. Robert D. Shea, D-West Hartford.

The helmet law has saved lives and prevented disfigurement, according to Rep. Francis W. Clampi, D-Waterbury.

"Without this helmet law, dear god, what protection do our children have?" he said.

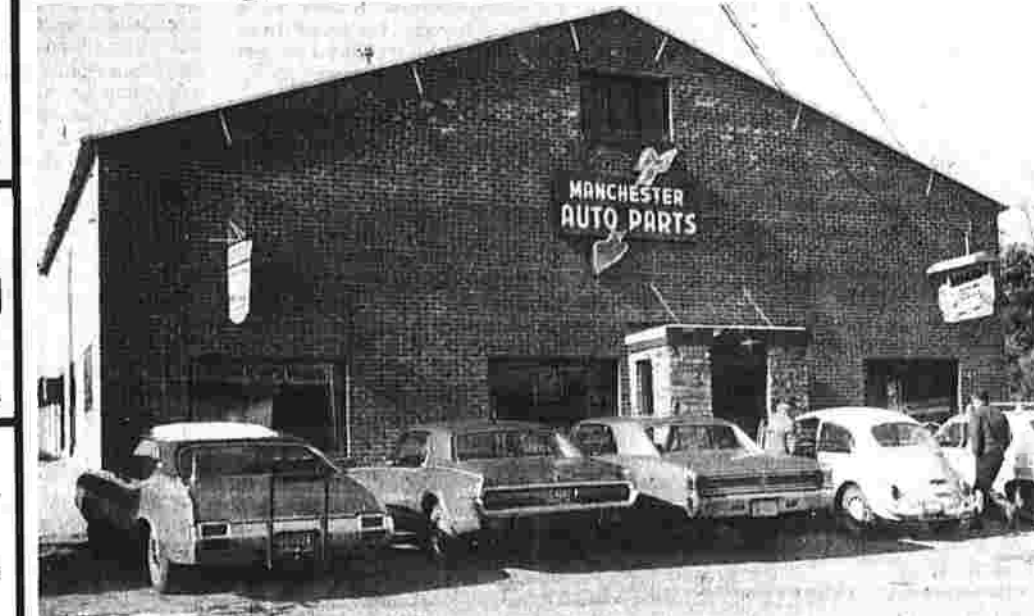
Opponents of the repeal measure, which passed 119-19, said it was part of a state effort to "protect people from themselves" which was destined to fail. They also said helmets interfered with sight and hearing.

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Rham seeks principal designate

The most controversial item in the Regional District 8 Board of Education proposed budget for 1976-1977 appears to be a new position created because the principal of Rham High School resigned.

The regional school board is suggesting a principal designate position at a salary of \$11,000 for six months beginning January 1977.

Approval for the entire budget totaling \$2,113,000 will be sought Monday at 8 p.m. at Rham High School.

Principal Colin Pushee submitted his resignation in January. It will be effective June 1977.

Superintendent David Cattanach and the school board believe it is essential for the principal designate to have time to work with the departing principal to ensure a smooth transition.

Cattanach said the job of principal is very complex and it is most important for the person to have in-school experience prior to accepting the full responsibilities of the position.

Norman Whitney, Andover resident, issued a statement objecting to a cover memorandum set to the elementary school board members asking them and their spouses to at-

tend Monday's meeting and support the budget.

Whitney said, "I object strenuously to this type of secretive procedure attempting to influence board members and their spouses not directly involved in the budgetary process."

He asked if the superintendent had the right to use his position to attempt passage of another budget under his control. Cattanach said he did.

Betty Kowalski, Andover school board chairman, said she supports the new position. It will give the person a chance to meet and work with the teachers and students on an easy level, she said.

To date 94 candidates have applied for the position. After intensive screening the list has been cut to five candidates who will be interviewed by the school board.

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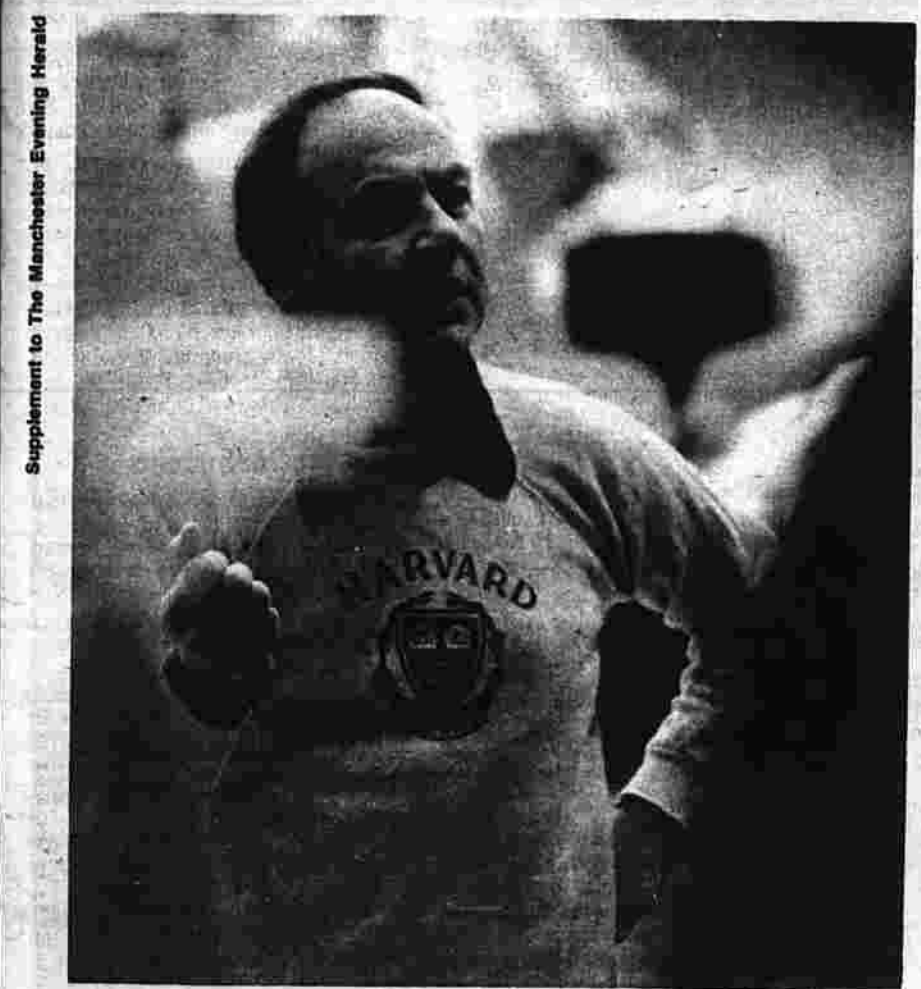
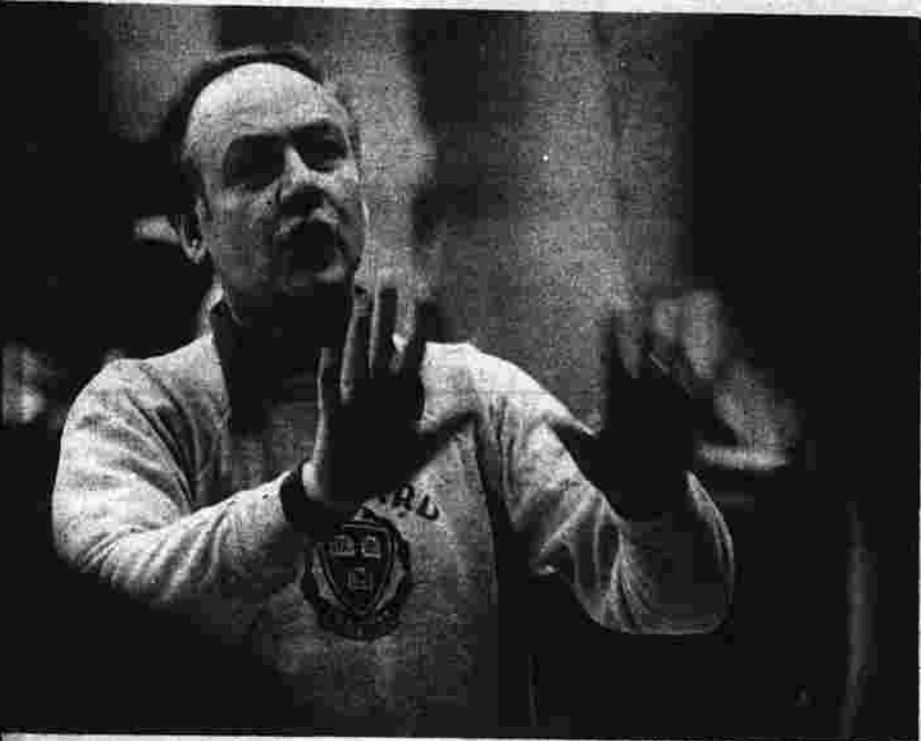

Upside-down eagle is 'Jaws'

Here is the Bridgeport Centennial half dollar with Coin World's arrows alerting us to the first points of wear. The mintage came to 25,000 with the last thousand remaining unsold until they were wholesaled off in 1950. A recent dealer's offer for an XF was \$38. A bright uncirculated brings up to \$79, retail.

Stamps and coins

If you don't like the stylized eagle, turn him upside down and you will have a pretty good shark with wide-open toothless "Jaws!"

Don't monkey with P. T. Barnum's head, though, or all Bridgeport will be after us. They don't know him merely as a showman and avowed "Prince of Humbugs" down there. They think of him as an author, a newspaper editor, and a real estate developer (he sold house lots at cost for a time). He was noted in Bridgeport for philanthropy — see the park they have. Also they know him as the city's mayor and a state legislator. He ran for Congress and was even asked to run for president on

the Prohibition ticket.

He received mail from overseas addressed simply: "Barnum, America."

Outside Bridgeport he comes to mind mainly in terms of the songbird Jenny Lind, the midget, Tom Thumb, and Jumbo, the world's largest-ever circus elephant. This animal stood over 11 feet at the shoulder and weighed 6½ tons. The name, Jumbo, has become part of the language and lives on to denote fair-sized eggs and olives.

Barnum was a prankster who loved to bamboozle both for business and for sport. Early in his career he had a museum in New York City where patrons got to hanging around — sometimes bringing lunches and staying overnight. He had a sign put up saying "TO THE EGRESS." The brown-baggers, expecting perhaps to see a female unicorn nursing her young, headed for that doorway and found themselves in the open air.

P. T. made and lost several fortunes, but at the end his estate came to four million and he died at 80 asking how the circus receipts were for that day.

Modeling a stamp

If you have ever stopped to read the USPS Stamp Posters at the local PO, you must have wondered about the word "Modeler" as applied to getting out new ideas. The designer designs and the engravers engrave, but what is there to model in a flat thing like a stamp?

The S. P.A. Journal clears it all up in their April number.

The term harks back to the time that engraving was the only way. Someone had to assemble the artwork and lettering into a large "working model." From this, a stamp-sized photograph was made and presented to the Postmaster General for approval. After the OK a similar photo was used by the engravers in making up the master die.

In some cases the designer, who got all the credit, gave only rough sketches and lettering notes to the modeler, who then made up the actual artwork.

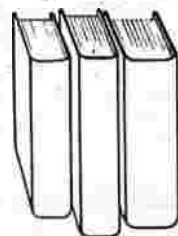
At the awards banquet Saturday 'at Willie's, Chairman Gerry Caron got a standing ovation for his smooth-running show.
