WASHINGTON (UPI) - Attorney General Edward Levi and President Ford today pondered all the angles political and otherwise - of their forthcoming decision on whether to intervene in the Boston school desegregation case.

Levi had a meeting with the President scheduled this afternoon, but spokesman Robert J. Havel said the attorney general, beleaguered all week by arguments and pressure from opposing sides of the explosive busing issue, had no decision ready to

him (Ford) about what Levi is considering filing in the Boston case," Havel said. He also said said Levi is now considering only the Boston case, but might pick another if he decides against action in Boston.

PUCA orders audit of utility group

HARTFORD (UPI)-The state Public Utilities Control Authority voted today to order a management audit of Northeast Utilities to determine whether the firm has been overcharging consumers. The agency also voted to undertake a total examination of the records of Northeast, the largest utility company in New England

There have been claims that Northeast Utilities has overcharged, and continues to overcharge its customers," PUCA Chairman Albert J. Kleban said in announcing the action. "Northeast has denied there has

been an overcharge," he added.
"We must be absolutely certain that no consumer in this state is overcharged. We must be absolutely certain that no utility in the state which we regulate is receiving more than its allowed rate of return," he

Earlier this year, PUCA paid a consultant, Hess and Lim Inc., of Hyattsville, Md., to study the use of the fuel adjustment charge the utility is allowed to pass on to consumers because of the high cost of fuel to generate power.

On May 13, the authors of the report were brought to Hartford for a meeting with PUCA but that gathering was postponed because of a court order asked for by former Hartford Corporation Counsel Alexander Goldfarb, He had been a prime mover in a suit that earlier this year overturned a rate hike granted Connecticut Light & Power Co., a Northeast subsidiary, by the old Connecticut Public Utilities Commission before it went out of existence

alternative" to busing, Ford said: "Well, there are two answers to that. One, there is a possibility that the attorney general may intervene in one of the court cases that are in the federal courts. That is a possibility."

"No. 2, as I indicated," he said, "I have asked the attorney general and the secretary of HEW to find some other alternatives that would be preferable to court-ordered forced

Ford expected to gain delegate lead Monday

By United Press International President Ford, who has trailed Ronald Reagan in delegate votes most of this month, is expected to pull ahead Monday. Whether he can hold the lead more than a day will be determined in Tuesday's six primaries.

New York's 136 uncommitted delegates have been summoned to Albany Monday to declare themselves, and more than 100 of them - at the urging of Vice President Nelson Rockfeller - probably will come out for Ford.

'Timing is very important in politics," said New York GOP Chair-

April inflation termed moderate

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The cost of living rose 0.4 per cent in April as the pace of inflation picked up slightly after a lull in the first three months of 1976, the Labor Department said today.

A surge in food prices was responstill considered the April increase to be a moderate one

'Inflation is still not eating our leg off - it's still moderate," remarked an expert in the department's Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The 0.4 per cent jump compared to average monthly rises of slightly more than 0.2 per cent during January, February and March. The CPI increased 0.1 per cent in

Feburary and 0.2 per cent in March. The April increase was the same as January's 0.4 per cent jump. A relaxation of inflation in the cost of retail services, combined with a

continued slack in non-food commodities, helped offset the first increase in food prices this year. The Consumer Price Index stood at 168.2 in April, up 6.1 per cent over the last year. That means retail goods

and services costing \$100 in 1967, now cost \$168.20. The report eased the worst fears of some economists that the nation might experience a strong in flationary surge after a remarkably good first quarter. It also lent sub stance to President Ford's campaign claims that his conservative
