## Directors face major decision

# Storm-drainage funds insufficient to complete all projects planned

Because the \$2 million approved by the voters for storm-drainage improvements appears insufficient for the 28 projects spelled out in the November 1974 referendum question, the Manchester Board of Directors is faced with a major decision. Priorities must be rearranged, or more funds provided.

### Relief officials arrive in Guam

AGANA, Guam (UPI) — Federal relief officials arrived today in storm-devastated Guam where Typhoon Pamela caused an estimated \$300-million in damage and left 80 per cent of the island's buildings in ruins.

The officials, from San Francisco, were the first outside relief to arrive since Pamela hit the island Thursday and Friday with winds that gusted up to 175 miles an hour.

President Ford declared Guam a major disaster area to allow use of federal relief and recovery funds, including provisions for temporary housing.

Gov. Ricardo J. Bordallo said, it was a miracle no deaths were directly attributed to Pamela. Sixty persons were injured.

Public works officials and consulting engineers will brief the directors on the problems Tuesday, at a 7:30 p.m. special meeting in the Municipal Building Hearing Room. The consultants are Metcalf and Eddy of Boston and Griswold and Fuss of Manchester. They are studying the town's drainage needs through the year 2000.

Jay Giles, director of public works, said completing the 28 projects within the \$2 million approved would be tight, although some savings could be effected by utilizing the services of highway department personnel. He said the majority of the 28 projects remain to be done, with engineering studies and designs un-

finished and, in some instances, not yet begun.

Explaining why the \$2 million estimate may be low for the 28 projects, Giles said detailed engineering studies weren't available when the November 1974 referendum was proposed. He said, also, that some pipe sizes were increased, as a result of engineering studies, and costs of the work involved have exceeded estimates.

Two of the major projects still to be done are at White Brook, estimated to cost about \$600,000; and Thompson Rd., from Coolidge St. to Hop Brook, estimated at about \$250,000. Both are almost ready to be put out to bid.

# Hijacking ends with 13 dead

ZAMBOANGA CITY, The Philippines (UPI) — The hours dragged by in the hot, crowded Philippines jetliner, the six young Moslem hijackers munching the cheese sandwiches brought on board in exchange for 14 hostages.

Suddenly, an explosion rocked the main cabin, and the huge airliner burst into flames.

As black smoke rolled across the fuselage, government "antihijacking

troops" stormed the jetliner and more than 50 passengers scrambled to the ground.

But 13 persons died Sunday during the 15-minute battle inside the jetliner, including the leader of the hijack team, two other gunmen, a possible woman accomplice and nine passengers. Three of the bluejean-clad hijackers were arrested. The defense department said the "panicky" gunmen exploded a

grenade out of desperation when the government refused to meet their demands for \$375,000 and a longrange plane to fly them to Libya.

A government spokesman said the attack troops "prevented what could have been a massacre of all the passengers and crew."

At least 22 other hostages were injured, either from shrapnel or during the shootout between the gunmen and the attack troops. The blast destroyed the \$4 million Philippine Air Lines BAC111 jet.

"I was at the center of the plane and there was this loud noise in the forward area and I felt the plane move," said John Mallette of United Brands.

"I headed for the emergency exit together with other passengers and there was firing inside the plane as well as outside."

"I'm very glad to be out of it," he said. "I'm sorry for those who got lost but it had to happen."

One other American, Andy Max, of Tacoma, Wash., also escaped unharmed.

The gunmen, aged 17 to 23, boarded the jetliner Friday in Davao City, in the southern Philippines, then forced it to land at the sweltering seaport town of Zamboanga, 500 miles south of Manila.

Government investigators said the gunmen smuggled aboard two .45-caliber pistols, four .38-caliber revolvers and six grenades, some of them in a cake seen carried aboard by a woman.

The gunmen Saturday released 14 hostages, including five women and nine children, in exchange for cheese sandwiches and water. It was the only concession made by the government during the 48-hour ordeal.

According to a government spokesman, the gunmen were members of the Philippines Moslem Separatist Movement, the same group that successfully hijacked another Philippines airliner in early April and eventually landed in Libya after an 8,000-mile odyssey, the longest hijacking in history.

Brig. Gen. Mariano Castaneda, head of the newly created antihijack task force, said the "get tough" approach was a success.

"That," he said, "will be remembered as the last hijack."

# School spending tops board's agenda tonight

Adoption of a 1976-1977 spending plan, an update of enrollment projections and startup of basic skills tests for high school graduation are among the items on tonight's agenda of the Manchester Board of Education.

The school board, scheduled to meet at 8 p.m. at the Manchester High School library, will devote the first half hour of its meeting to public comments and questions.

One of the issues expected to be raised at the commet session is the anticipated closing of South School, to be decided when the board adopts its revised budget tonight.

South School parents have objected to closing the small, 57-student facility, which is one of the most expensive operations in the local school system. Officials say the closing — which is expected to be approved — will save about \$35,000 in 1976-1977.

The school closing is one of several recommendations by School Supt. James Kennedy for reducing next year's budget by \$325,000. The cuts were made necessary by town directors' allocation of \$13,875,000 for schools in 1976-1977 (about \$275,000 less than requested) and a \$50,000 increase in the cost of Blue Cross insurance. Kennedy will report tonight

on long-range projections of student enrollment and the board will be asked to consider hiring a demographer to further study the enrollment situation.

The board will also be asked to authorize a pilot program to start giving proficiency examinations. The exams, also known as basic skills tests, may eventually become a requirement for high school graduation.

Also on tonight's school board agenda are reports on the Vocational Educational Advisory Council and procedures for filling an administrative position at the high school.

The board will consider four personnel actions (one resignation and three leaves of absence), an extended field trip request, possible naming of the Nathan Hale School's new wing, and the tentative, two-year salary agreement with the school custodians' union.

# Oregon dominates Tuesday balloting

For the first time in history, there will be six primary elections in one day Tuesday. But the din coming from five contenders in Oregon almost drowned out all the other states.

President Ford, predicting victory, campaigned there Saturday and most of Sunday, buoyed by news that his delegate totals were swelled by a net of 75 delegates from caucuses in Kansas, Vermont and Alaska, 88 previously uncommitted Pennsylvanians Saturday and an anticipated additional 124 New Yorkers today.

The combined infusion would increase his lead over Ronald Reagan to 181 delegates — more than enough to withstand any gains Reagan makes Tuesday in such states as Tennessee, Kentucky, Arkansas, Idaho, Nevada and Oregon, which have a combined total of 179.

Ford hopes to win Oregon and possibly one or two of the others. Sen. Howard Baker, R-Tenn., predicted Sunday on CBS-TV's "Face the Nation" that the President would carry Tennessee.

Baker, who has said he would like to be vice president on either a Ford or Reagan ticket, was overnight host to the Reagans Friday and said he

had no problem justifying that hospitality with the fact he is a Ford man. After the primaries, he said, "we'll all be together."

Reagan flew to Oregon Saturday and won both boos and cheers from a student crowd at Oregon State University Sunday when he said "the latest evidence is that marijuana could very well be one of the most dangerous threats to an entire generation of Americans."

On the Democratic side, Jimmy Carter won 27 of the 106 delegates chosen over the weekend — 24 in Virginia and three in Vermont. Morris Udall, Henry Jackson and Jerry Brown each picked up a few and the rest were uncommitted.

Carter, for the second consecutive weekend, spurned his normal Sunday rest at home in Georgia to campaign hard — this time in Oregon where he faces a strong threat from Frank Church, on the ballot, and Brown, a write-in candidate.

The former Georgia governor anticipates little difficulty in adding Tennessee, Kentucky and Arkansas to his list of victories.

Church is expected to win his home state of Idaho and Brown is the favorite in Nevada. Both swelled the list of candidates beating the bushes in Oregon over the weekend — Brown scrubbing a scheduled day of campaigning in California to do so.

Church stressed foreign policy in his speeches. Brown and Carter argued over whether real tax reform is possible. Brown said it is not, Carter said he could achieve it.

There have been two previous write-in campaigns in Oregon: Nelson Rockefeller got 11.6 per cent in the Republican primary of 1968, and the late Sen. Robert Taft, R-Ohio, 6.7 per cent in 1952.

Only Udall of the active candidates remained in the East, campaigning in Kentucky Saturday.

# Several hundred attend IOH open house Sunday

Several hundred persons attended an open house Sunday at the Manchester High School pool and watched high school students members of the Instructors of the Handicapped (IOH) as they taught swimming and water skills to handicapped children.

The IOH instructors meet weekly on Sunday afternoons at the pool

where they conduct a swimming and physical activity program for about 70 handicapped and retarded youngsters from Manchester and about 40 from the Mansfield State Training School.

The high school students are responsible for the operations of the program which is in its 20th year.

**HARTFORD** — Republican chairmen from 11 Northeast states will meet here Tuesday with presidential politics a topic, but Connecticut's GOP chairman Frederick K. ### Wilson will campaign for GOP senate post

Edward J. Wilson, 56, of 17 Falkner Dr. has announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for Third District state senator. The incumbent is State Sen. George W. Hanson Jr., D-East Hartford.

The Third Senatorial District consists of all of East Hartford and about 25 per cent of Manchester (Voting Districts 1-4-7-8-10). Wilson will appear at 7:30 tonight before the East Hartford Republican Town Committee and will ask it to back his candidacy. He is the first Republican to announce for the nomination.

### Federal study may revive state income tax debate

HARTFORD (UPI) — A federal government study of Connecticut's tax system is expected next month. It could once again bring the subject of a state income tax to the political forefront.

The review by the Federal Reserve Bank is expected to call for overhaul of the state's tax system and probably will recommend a graduated personal income tax.

Gov. Ella T. Grasso, who adamantly opposes an income tax, said the Federal Reserve's apparent leaning towards recommendation of the levy it did so in a study of Massachusetts' tax system — should be taken into account.

Opponents, pointing to neighboring New York and Massachusetts which have both high income and sales taxes, say it would not mean an overall reduction in the tax burden, just more state spending.

Grasso speaks BOSON (UPI) — Connecticut Gov. Ella T. Grasso, Commencement speaker Sunday at Emmanuel College, told the graduates of the women's college time had come for change in government. She said Connecticut's fiscal situation was precarious and new solutions must be found to solve the problem.

### Census Bureaus reports most crimes unreported

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Census Bureau claims there actually were nearly four times as many serious crimes as were reported by the FBI for 1974.

In a victim survey released Sunday, the bureau listed 39.6 million serious crimes for that year. The FBI reported 10.1 million crimes in 1974 compared to 8.5 million in 1973 — a 17.6 per cent increase.

After a long intermission, we heard "Symphony No. 35 in D Major" by Wolfgang A. Mozart. In this concert and part concert, the classical period works seem to be the best performed pieces, and logically so. They required control and sensitivity and seemed to be more suited to Dr. Heller's conducting style. MACC news

Over the leisurely summer months, we would like to share some of the behind the scenes ministries of the conference.

The Human Needs Fund has been established by the member churches of MACC to provide emergency financial assistance to persons in crisis not eligible for federal, state, town, or private aid, and who have no family resources on which to fall back.

Since January of 1976 almost 50 requests for financial assistance have been received. Many of these requests have been initiated by social workers (from town, state, and private agencies) calling on behalf of families in dire straits but who do seem to "fall in the cracks" between aid programs.

In other cases, the need or circumstances were judged to be insufficiently critical to justify use of the very limited funds available to the Conference. Since January, 21 loans or outright grants have been made from the Human Needs Fund. Of the seven no-interest, slow-payback loans issued, four have been paid in full, and another is partially repaid.

In addition to these loans, 14 outright grants were made. In most instances the recipient was a young mother with a low-paying job or on ADC struggling to meet the expenses of raising her children. For many the backbreaker was the rise in utility bills, coupled with rising food costs. As you may know the allowances for families receiving AFDC remain based on price levels of April 1971, or 30 per cent below the present cost of living.

For most ADC families (if they have found an average rent) the food allowance works out to be about \$4.45 cents per person per meal. The allowance for heat and light would work out to between \$15-\$18 a month. Not many of us in Manchester were able to heat our homes so inexpensively this winter. Those who were not able to find a low rental were of course in even more difficulty. Though sometimes a low rent meant an old apartment with high ceilings, no insulation and an even bigger heating bill. In any event, an increasing number of our families just couldn't quite scrape through last winter in spite of the emergency assistance bill which provided time help with utility bills. When all other forms of aid were used up or not available, MACC, because of your generosity, was able to provide just enough to help to get oil delivered, lights turned back on, landlords to relent in other small ways to help a family stay together and keep going.

Another Godsend in a hard winter was the Emergency Pantry which meant at least food was available when all else failed.

These ministries to our needy families have been greatly aided by the dedication and very real concern of the social workers both in our own Manchester Department of

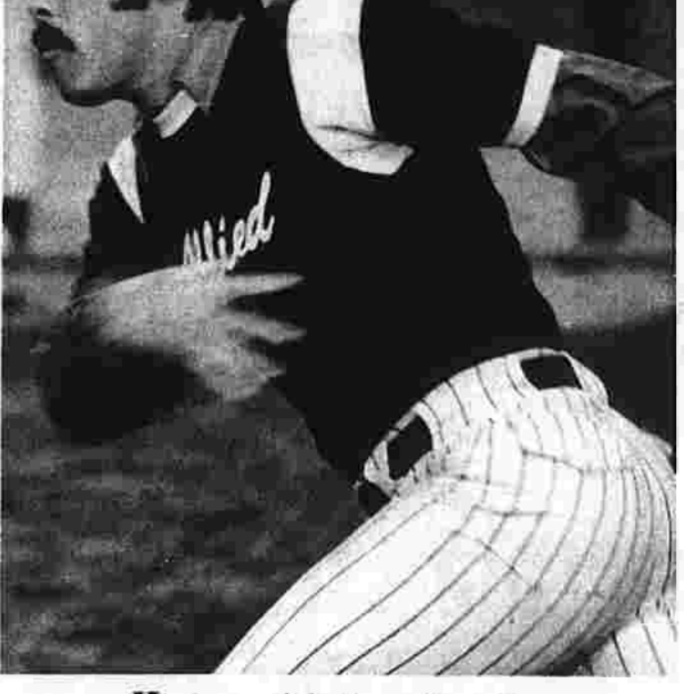

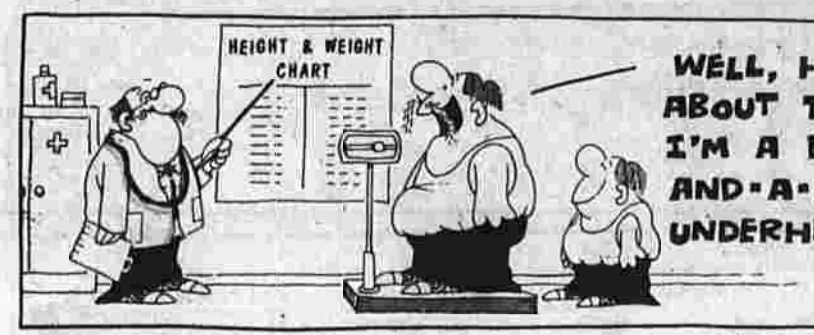

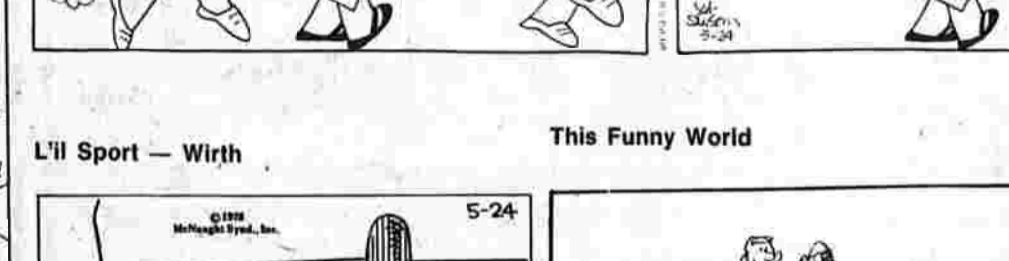

**MORRISTOWN, N.J. (UPI)** — Karen Ann Quinlan lay in a guarded hospital room today, breathing on her own without the aid of a respirator but with no signs of recovering from her 13-month coma.

 Joseph and Julia Quinlan, their parish priest and doctors and nurses treating Miss Quinlan were the only people allowed to enter the room, the hospital said. A guard was stationed outside the room around the clock.  
 The hospital refused direct comment on all other aspects of the case in line with the parents' wishes for privacy.  
 Paul Armstrong, attorney for the family, said the "situation is very sacredly private."  
 However, Armstrong denied a published report that the family had asked doctors to suspend antibiotic treatment and intravenous feedings. "At no time did the family make such a request," he said.
