Ford faces Reagan in six tough primaries

United Press International President Ford, bolstered by a big jump in his delegate strength, faced Ronald Reagan in six tough primary battles today while Democratic frontrunner Jimmy Carter sought to fight off his new challengers, Frank Church and Jerry Brown.

The six contests in border and western states were the most ever held in the single day, and provided crucial proving grounds for the President and the former Georgia governor as the 1976 primary season entered the home stretch.

Primaries were scheduled in Arkansas, Tennessee, Kentucky, Idahe, Nevada and Oregon. At stake are 179 Democratic and 176 Republican delegates - more than one-tenth the number each party and the South - the heart of

ventions. Ford got a big boost in delegate strength in the past three days, winning most of the uncommitted delegations from New York and Pennsylvania. But his battle against Reagan in the six primaries was up-

Carter was favored in the three border states, and in Missouri where he was expected to win 40 of the 54 delegates selected in district dent well ahead of Reagan in the caucuses. But Church and Brown ganged up on him in the West.

Ford and Carter both sought to keep their momentum and move closer to their predictions of a first

ballot victory. But the Ford campaign could stall

Reagan's "sunbelt strategy." Carter's fast rolling bandwagon was slowed somewhat when Church and Brown won their first presidential outings against him in Nebraska and Maryland respectively.

With a push from their old mentor, Vice President Nelson A. Rockefeller, 119 of New York's previously uncommitted delegates broke for Ford Monday, climaxing a three day spree that put the Presinumber of pledged votes.

The New Yorkers joined 88 uncommitted delegates from Pennsylvania and an additional net gain of 75 over Reagan from caucuses in Kansas,

Vermont and Alaska. That gave Ford a lead of 717 to 541 again as the scene moved to the West over Reagan in the number of pledged delegates, with 1,130 needed

Cuban troops leaving Angola

LUXEMBOURG (UPI) - Cuban Premier Fidel Castro says he is pulling his troops out of Angola at a rate of 200 a week in what could be a 'positive development" in American relations with Cuba and Angola, Secretary of State Henry Kissinger said today.

The message from Castro came in a letter to Swedish Prime Minister Olof Palme, who read part of it to Kissinger during their talks in Stockholm Sunday and Monday, according to a senior U.S. official aboard the Kissinger plane flying

from Sweden to Luxembourg.
"In our meeting with Palme, he read to us from a letter, but did not show it to us, from Castro, which he (Palme) said he was authorized to mention to me," Kissinger told

The school board voted 6-3 Monday night to approved the \$13,875,000 budget, which is about \$275,000 less than the board's original spending

The three items are \$12,000 for an extra teacher for alternate education at Manchester High School; \$15,000 to establish a second resources room for socially and emotionally maladjusted students: and \$6,000 for a half-time speech clinician for mentally handicapped
