NEW YORK (UPI) - Old television pilots never die and sometimes they don't fade away, either As a matter of fact, they even have been

known to turn up at a competing network. That's what may happen next year with "Wonder Woman." "Wonder Woman" did well in the ratings both times it ran as an ABC movie, but ABC already has another wonderful woman — and she's Bionic. The network isn't likely to trade a Bionic bird in the hand for a wonder-bird who hasn't proved herself in series form. Two

perwomen seems superfluous. That's the thinking at NBC, where executives are said to be considering picking up the option on "Wonder Woman" if ABC lets it drop this fall. It could be ready for second season slot, to replace a show with not-so-wonderful

ABC may have one too many wonderful women, but it still is looking for a good Western and the network hasn't given up on a couple of its past efforts.

Last season ABC aired a TV movie called "The Macahans," announced as a pilot for a possible Western series. It was based on the movie, "How The West Was Won." Now ABC has announced it will air a limited series of three two-hour television movies called "How The West Was Won," based on "The Macahans." By any name it will still star James Arness and

Eva Marie Saint.

"The Young Pioneers," another Western pilot that failed to make the ABC fall schedule, will try again as a special Christmas movie about the teen-aged couple homesteading in the Dakota Territory in the 1870s.

ABC sweeps the sweeps

ABC may have niggling worries about Westerns, but next fall it'll be wrinkling its brows all the way to the bank.

The results now are in on the spring ratings "sweeps," and ABC came out the big winner, confirming its strong rating position this year and influencing the rate card it will present in selling commercial

'Sweeps" occur twice a year when the A. C. Nielsen Co., and ARB, another survey outfit, widen their regular surveys. In the case of Nielsen, for instance, the weekly survey usually covers more than 1,200 homes. In a sweep, Nielsen covers 220 markets and about 100,000 homes.

In the Nielsen sweep, covering the period from April 29 through May 26, ABC received a rating of 17.1, NBC 16.6 and CBS 15.4. A year ago during the same sweep period CBS was first with 17.5, NBC second with 17.3 and ABC last with 14.8.

The ARB sweep covered April 21 through May 18 and showed ABC with 17.9, NBC with 16.5 and CBS with 15.6. A year ago CBS had 17.7, NBC 17.4 and ABC 14.7.

## New two-dollar bill speaks 'notaphily'

The new \$2 bill has given a fillip to the hobby of bank note collecting. Members of both our stamp and coin clubs showed up

at the meetings with examples of the oneday-only

cancellations of the stamp-on-bill serviced by the local post office.

H.E. Harris, "The World's Largest

Stamp Firm," now a satellite of General Mills, has decided that it is a good time to get into the bank note business. They offer them for sale and have published a "Bank Note Collector's Guide and Companion." And they have come up with a new word, for which no thanks, "Notaphily" ... "The fastest growing hobby in America today. The book has a 46-page section for identifying foreign bills

The standard catalog in the field for pricing is the Kraus (Iola, Wisc.) publication, "World Paper Money" by Albert Pick. (Don't mistake this Pick for the other numismatic writer, Dr. Franz Pick, who bleeps at the very mention of any currency not made of gold or silver).

If you like pictorial bank notes, it would be hard to beat some of the Scottish pieces. Here is one from Edinburgh showing the Firth of Forth bridge on one side and a coat of arms with lion, griffin, and shield on the other. Then if you hold it up to the light, there is a woman's head in a circle.

The Forth bridge is more than a mile long and up to 361 feet above the water. It is really something to go over if you are sitting just behind the motorman on a rattly diesel train with the strutwork whizzing by far overhead - and then look down!

Seven years in building, it was opened in 1890 by the Prince of Wales (later to be the Edwardian Edward, who visited the Bellamys on TV and was served by Hud-

The three humps in the picture are dou-ble cantilevers. They go 680 feet in each direction to be connected by girders. This bridge is pointed to with awe whenever cantilever construction is the topic. They can build out over water a long way without support, and then meet the part coming from the other side. Actually the Britannica gives the bridge as one of the illustrations of the word — You look up 'cantilever" and they show a sketch of the Forth bridge.

Edinburgh's rival city, Glasgow, has a pictorial pound note, put out by the Clydesdale and North of Scotland Bank. It has a grain field in harvest, a shipping scene, and a raging, rocky river. It also has a coat of arms, this one with a stag and horse protecting the shield. The motto says something about being faithful and industrious from shore to shore.

Anyone into heraldry would have a ball with Scottish bank notes. Another Edinburgh piece, from the British Linen Bank, has a coat of arms topped by the single cogent word "Ditat," which means "It enriches" — perhaps just the right spirit for this section of the globe. Once in Scotland I was told, when asking about a bus, "Save your thruppence and walk it's only ten blocks!"


