Can Laurie survive in NYC?

NEW YORK (UPI) — Can 28-year-old Laurie Morgan, a delegate pledged to Pennsylvania Gov. Milton Shapp, survive a week at the Democratic National Convention on less money than some delegates blow on a dinner?

"I'll stay at a friend's apartment on the couch or floor, ride the subway and accept any and all invitations to dinner," the attractive Massachusetts delegate said with a smile.

She made no request of state Democratic officials or the Shapp organization for financial assistance to attend the convention.

There were eight major candidates in the March 2 primary and Shapp ran eighth, even behind anti-abortion candidate Ellen McCormack.

Out of work last winter, Miss Morgan signed on as one of three paid staffers in the early stages of Shapp's Massachusetts primary campaign.

She made no request of state Democratic officials or the Shapp organization for financial assistance to attend the convention.

Regular visits to convention hospitality suites bridge gaps between dinner invitations, she says.

"I really thought he was the most substantive on the issues and he had programs," Miss Morgan recalls.

"I was a hired gun," Miss Morgan admits, "eager to get involved in presidential politics. I missed the whole thing, but it's hard to make a living at it."

She made no request of state Democratic officials or the Shapp organization for financial assistance to attend the convention.

### Protesters bomb shops near Garden

NEW YORK (UPI) — With a seemingly impenetrable security net ringing Madison Square Garden, bombers chose instead nearby department stores Monday to plant 10 small incendiary devices in a protest apparently aimed at the Democratic National Convention.

The Puerto Rican nationalist group FALN — the Spanish acronym for Armed Forces for the Liberation of Puerto Rico — claimed responsibility for the explosions in Macy's, Ohrbach's, Lord and Taylor's, Korvettes and Altman's.

Police said two devices planted in Gimbel's did not go off. A police spokesman said there was "very small" damage and no injuries, although the Herald Square area stores were crowded with lunch-hour shoppers.

The first explosion went off on Macy's seventh floor in a fabrics department. Lt. Henry Torres of the police bomb and arson squad said a carpet was scorched and material damaged. Macy's was not evacuated. A communique with the FALN letterhead was found in a telephone booth after an anonymous call to the New York Post directed reporters there.

### Rifleman kills seven in college library

FULLERTON, Calif. (UPI) — A rifleman, apparently firing at random, shot his way through a college library Monday, killing seven persons and wounding two in a five-minute fusillade.

A janitor, Edward Charles Allaway, was arrested. The victims "were just dropped in their tracks with Pepsi cans and papers in their hands," said Paramedic Capt. Carmon Johnson, one of the first on the scene Monday.

Allaway, 37, surrendered after telephoning police from a nearby motel, where his estranged wife, Bonnie, 22, is a part-time waitress. Identifying himself as "the man who did the shooting," he told them "come and get me."

### Taps ruled legal in case involving four area men

HARTFORD (UPI) — The wretaps and bugs used to gather information on four men accused of extortion were legal because they were closely supervised by a federal judge, another federal judge has ruled. U.S. District Court Judge M. Joseph Blumenthal ruled Chief U.S. District Court Judge T. Emmet Clarke kept close track of the taps, planted during a court-approved 1974 entry by FBI agents. John Barone, 29, of East Hartford, Frank J. Rago, 25, of Vernon, Robert Grande of East Hartford and Michael O'Brien, 34, of Hartford, were accused of threatening Joseph Rydel of Manchester if he did not pay an \$8,700 gambling debt. Clarke minimized the surveillance to protect the defendant's rights, according to Blumenthal. He said the prosecution claimed 40 per cent of 1,046 calls monitored during a 15-day period of December 1974 involved illegal activities. During a 15-day period of January 1975, 37 per cent of the calls intercepted dealt with illegal activities, according to the prosecutors, Blumenthal said.

# Count issues challenge to American loop stars

## PHILADELPHIA (UPI) —

Like one of those musketeers from days of yore whose honor has been offended, "The Count" has thrown down the challenge to the American Legion for tonight's 47th All-Star Game.

John Montefusco, the brash right-hander from the San Francisco Giants, who admits to being "embarrassed" by his 7-8 record, has practically dared the American League batters to hit him in tonight's contest at Veterans Stadium, and flatly predicts the National League will win the game for the fifth year in a row.

"Just wait until tomorrow night and you'll see why I'm the best pitcher in the National League," Montefusco said Monday, directing his comments at two of the AL's best hitters—five-time batting champion Rod Carew of Minnesota and current

batting leader George Brett of Kansas City.

Montefusco may have trouble backing up his boast, though. Left-hander Randy Jones of San Diego, the majors' top winner with 15 victories, will start for the NL and Manager Sparky Anderson indicated he would follow Jones with Tom Seaver of the Mets.

Mark Fidrych, the rookie hotshot from Detroit, who leads the majors in earned run average with 1.78, has been named to start for the American League but Manager Darrell Johnson says he is not sure who will follow the 21-year-old right-hander. "We'll just have to wait and see how the game develops," said Johnson, who's pitching staff includes three relievers and six starters.

Both managers announced their starting lineups Monday, and it came as no surprise that Anderson stacked the top of his lineup heavily with his own Cincinnati Reds. Pete Rose will lead off followed in order by Steve Garvey of Los Angeles, Joe Morgan of Cincinnati, Greg Luzinski of Philadelphia, Johnny Bench of Cincinnati, Dave Kingman of New York, Dave Concepcion of Cincinnati and Jeff Jones.

Ron LeFlore of Detroit will lead off for the AL followed in order by Carew, Brett, Thurman Munson of New York, Fred Lynn of Boston, Toby Harrah of Texas, Rusty Staub of Detroit, Bobby Grich of Baltimore and Fidrych.

The highlight of the game, which is expected to draw more than 60,000 fans, including walkout Ford, is supposed to be the pitching duel between Jones and Fidrych. Under All-Star rules, no starting pitcher is allowed to go more than three innings, but if both are on the top of their lineups, there may not be a ball hit out of the infield during that time.

After his television program of 22 years ended in 1970, Mack kept up his talent searches on the American college circuit. He was scheduled to host an amateur talent show at the New York State Fair on Labor Day, Early said.

**MHA reports 30 okayed for rent assistance**

The Manchester Housing Authority will notify 30 applicants this week of their acceptance into Section 8 Housing, a program that offers federal financial assistance to help low-income families pay their rent.  
The Housing Authority will issue the first 15 "certificates of family participation" for Section 8 Housing on Wednesday. Fifteen more of the certificates will be distributed Thursday. An additional 15 will be issued later.  
Under the Section 8 program the certificate holders apply 15 to 25 per cent of their monthly income towards rent. The remaining amount of the rent is paid by funds provided by the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).  
There have been 71 applications for the 45 units available through the

program. To qualify for the program, a family of four cannot make more than \$12,800 per year. Under the program, a landlord cannot charge Section 8 participants any more than he charges other tenants for the same type of housing.

**State asks nursing home to cease admissions**

The Meadows Convalescent Home on Bidwell St. has been asked by the state Department of Health to admit no more patients until it can resolve what state officials regard as a problem in understaffing.  
The move came about as the result of an inspection Saturday, according to Roland Simmons, director of the medical care division of the health department.  
Geri-Care of Springfield, Mass. owner of Meadows and three other convalescent homes, has temporarily suspended admissions to the

Meadows convalescent home facilities but the rest home portion is still admitting patients, according to Fred Joslin, vice-president of Geri-Care.  
Joslin denied reports that about 40 employees had submitted resignations recently and said employees who had resigned would be replaced by July 21, the effective date of resignations.  
Officials of Geri-Care were in conference today at the Meadows where union negotiations are also in progress.

**McDonald's robbed**

Police still have no suspects in connection with an armed robbery at McDonald's, 46 W. Center St., early Monday morning.  
A total of \$3,200 was taken in the theft, which occurred at 2:30 a.m. Police said a heavy-set, black male, wearing a ski cap over his face and a

knee-length brown raincoat, entered the restaurant through an unlocked back door. He carried a 38-snubnose handgun, according to police reports.  
Three people were cleaning up the restaurant at the time of the break, police said.

**PZC clarifies regulation on liquor sales permits**

The Planning and Zoning Commission Monday night adopted an amendment that clarifies liquor regulations for Manchester.  
Two persons, Thomas Wall of the Sportsman's Cafe and Mike Massaro of the West Side Italian Kitchen, were present for the hearing on the amendment. Both requested an explanation of the amendment, but neither expressed strong opposition to it.  
Commission Vice Chairman John J. Hutchinson Sr. told the two men, "This amendment makes the regulation a little easier to understand and interpret. It will not change any present regulations."  
Chairman Alfred Sieffert said the amendment was written to clear up misinterpretations that have occurred in the past. Both the Sportsman's Cafe and the West Side Italian Kitchen have recently expanded from beer and wine permits to liquor permits, meaning they can sell hard liquor as well as beer and wine.  
Such expansion occurred because of a misinterpretation of the regulation as it stood before the amendment was added Monday night. "We're trying to make it clearer for zoning enforcement officers," Sieffert said.

The new addition to zoning liquor regulations reads, "No provisions shall be interpreted as allowing a nonconforming use to intensify the sale of alcoholic liquors or to qualify for a liquor permit different from the class of liquor permit existing at the time of adoption of these regulations."  
Zoning Enforcement Officer Ernest R. Machell Jr. said this amendment simply "locks in" establishments serving liquor to their present permit.  
In other action, the commission canceled its scheduled July 26 business meeting.
