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Convention ends tonight

Carter picks Mondale

NEW YORK (UPI) — Jimmy Carter today picked a vice presidential running mate, received a congratulatory phone call from President Ford and prepared to address the Democratic National Convention which nominated him for president.

Carter, who won the Democratic presidential nomination Wednesday night, announced his choice to run with him in November was Sen. Walter Mondale of Minnesota "if the delegates will approve." They were sure to.

A convention which had been going so well in the way Carter's forces wanted it to go was prepared to ratify Mondale — who will be the "liberal" figure on the national ticket for the November election — later on this closing day of the convention.

After Mondale's name — and others — was placed in nomination and Carter's choice was ratified, both men then would address the 37th Democratic National Convention,

which nominated Carter Wednesday night.

Earlier, the White House announced Ford telephoned Carter from Washington, congratulated him on winning the nomination and told

him he hoped the fall campaign can be kept "at a high level." The President himself faces a tough battle for nomination at the Republican National Convention Aug. 16-20.

After a mid-morning news conference at which he announced Mondale was the one out of a final list of six U.S. Senators, Carter continued final preparations for tonight's finale to what was regarded as a convention lively but without the heavier drama of "issues."

Carter's speech — his first appearance at the convention — was anticipated as an indication of how he would lead Democrats against the Republicans and, further, of what manner of president he would be if he won in November.

Carter, 51, former Georgia governor, came from the small town of Plains and what early scoffers called "nowhere" to take the nomination. He said it had been a full-time job for 19 months, though he began building a base in 1972.

After Mondale is voted as his running mate, Carter will appear in Madison Square Garden to sound the call by which Democrats will try to chase Republicans out of the White House after eight years of GOP occupancy.

Wednesday night, Carter watched from his 21st floor suite at the Americana Hotel, 20 blocks south of Madison Square Garden, as the convention nominated him. He wore shirtsleeves and smiled as delegates shouted themselves hoarse. At 11:15 p.m. EDT Wednesday, 28 minutes after the roll call began, the 152-member Ohio delegation put him over.

Her voice quavering with excitement, Christine Gitlin of Berea, Ohio, the delegation chairman, said: "I am proud and happy to join ... in the spirit of unity and victory in November by casting 132 votes"

She could go no further. Pandemonium exploded. The band struck up "Happy Days Are Here Again," and more than 5,000 delegates and alternates went wild.

That gave Carter 1,559 votes — 54 more than he needed. When the roll call was finished, a beaming Georgia Gov. George Busbee moved to give Carter the nomination by acclamation, and the delegates shouted their approval at 11:38 p.m.

The final tally gave Carter 2,238 1/2 of the 3,008 delegate votes; Rep. Morris Udall of Arizona, 329 1/2; Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr. of California, 300 1/2; Gov. George C. Wallace of Alabama, 57, and Ellen McCormack, the antiabortion candidate from New York, 22.

Sen. Muskie disappointed

NEW YORK (UPI) — Sen. Edmund Muskie of Maine, bypassed today by Jimmy Carter for the Democratic vice presidential nomination, said he was disappointed but had a feeling that he would not be the nominee.

Carter, in perhaps the best kept secret of recent political history, tapped Minnesota Sen. Walter Mondale as his running mate from a list of six potential candidates.

"Of course I feel some disappointment but to tell the truth I had a feeling of relief about it, too." "When I got up this morning I sort of had the feeling (he would not be the nominee)," he said.

"I didn't have anything specific to go on, but I started thinking we ought to get the Senate campaign going," he said.

Muskie, who faces a re-election in November, got the call from Carter at about 8:45 a.m. shortly after finishing breakfast.

He then called in his top political associates, including former Gov. Kenneth Curtis, who was widely expected to replace him as the Senate candidate if Muskie had gotten the vice presidential nomination, to relay the bad news.

Carter clearly kept this as close to his vest as I've ever seen," he said. "It's a mixed feeling there's always

the excitement of trying something new, especially in the national scene," said Muskie, who added he thought this was the end of his chance of being part of a national ticket.

Muskie praised the choice of Mondale. He's from a political point of view an ideal choice," Muskie said. Muskie gave high marks to Carter method of publicly narrowing the nomination to six candidates and letting them wait a week before finding out who would be chosen.

"Aside from the frustration it creates, I think he handled it with dignity and without embarrassing any of us."

Town health agency terms Meadows care satisfactory

The Town Health Department found patient care continuing satisfactorily Wednesday during a visit to the Meadows Convalescent Home on Bidwell St.

As a result of staff resignations and a shift in patient care to substitutes from a state employ pool, the town health officials made an unscheduled visit to the facility to check on the quality of patient care.

Mrs. Lynn Gustafson, nurse consultant, with two patient advocates visited patients and found that they were being given good care.

Dr. Alice Turek, town health director, said the patient advocates are working with the patients to inform them of their rights. "We should take a position that the patients' rights are taken care of," she said.

The state health department has threatened to either close down or

minimize the patient load unless the former patient care personnel is restored to health code standard.

Although Dr. Turek said there would be places for patients to go if they had to be moved out, it would be "an intolerable situation" because most of the 118 patients involved are between the ages of 75 and 108 and have been there since the facility was opened about 10 years ago.

Almost all of the patients need total care, she said.

Mrs. Gustafson said many of the nurses who had submitted resignations have already returned to work and there are now only about 10 licensed practical nurses and registered nurses whose resignations are pending.

The morale of the patients is generally good, Mrs. Gustafson said. Some were singing to a guitar ac-

companiment when she was there. But not knowing for sure whether they can stay there or whether they will have to be moved elsewhere bothers them, she said.

"They have a right to as much dignity as the rest of us and that is what we're here to protect," Mrs. Gustafson said.

Representatives from the state Health Department's Division of Hospitals and Medical Care and Geri-Care Nursing Centers of America in Springfield, Mass., will meet Friday morning with officials at the Meadows to reach an agreement on the employment standards for the convalescent home.

According to Roland Simmons, executive director of the state Health Department, the convalescent home could not be closed without a three-week advance notice.

In state chairmanship contest

Kelly election may be cinched by delaying delegate selection

NEW YORK (UPI) — The decision by Connecticut's Democratic National Convention delegates to postpone selection of national committee members is a tactic to insure election of Peter Kelly as state chairman, sources said.

The state's national convention delegation Wednesday also, as expected, split its vote for president, giving nominee Jimmy Carter 35 votes and Morris Udall 16.

But the real story was the behind-the-scenes maneuvering aimed at guaranteeing Kelly, Hartford's Democratic chairman, victory in his fight to unseat incumbent Chairman William O'Neill.

Kelly was an early supporter of Carter in Connecticut and has picked up the backing of Gov. Ella T. Grasso, although she has refused to publicly endorse him.

Both Kelly and O'Neill, once a close political ally of Mrs. Grasso, say they have enough of the 72 state committee votes to be confident of victory.

The state committee elects a chairman on Monday night in Hartford and by postponing the national committee vote the Carter forces are keeping in reserve bargaining power to insure Kelly's election.

Sources said that if Kelly did not have the votes to put him over the top the Carter forces, expected to get two of three spots on the national panel, would barter away one of them in exchange for supporting Kelly for state chairman.

In essence it would not cost the Carter forces any representation on the national committee because the state chairman and vice chairman are also members of the prestigious panel.

Sources also said that if Kelly was still lacking support the vice chairmanship of the state party would also be offered in exchange for supporting Kelly.

The move appears to add to the feeling among insiders that Kelly will be able to oust O'Neill. If Kelly has the votes without

needing the exchange it appeared possible the remaining national committee spot might be offered to those persons supporting O'Neill as a peace offering.

Anthony DeLorenzo, 61, of Bristol, is the choice of Connecticut's labor delegates and will get one of the three spots when the selection is made.

DeLorenzo, an original supporter of Jimmy Carter is the regional director for New England and part of New York for the United Auto Workers.

The Udall supporters are expected to either name Bernard Sorokin of West Hartford or Amy Brennan of Southington.

Miss Brennan ran Udall's campaign in Connecticut where he finished a strong second to Carter, while Sorokin is national co-chairman of the liberal New Democratic Coalition.

Traditionally the national committee posts are filled at the national convention.

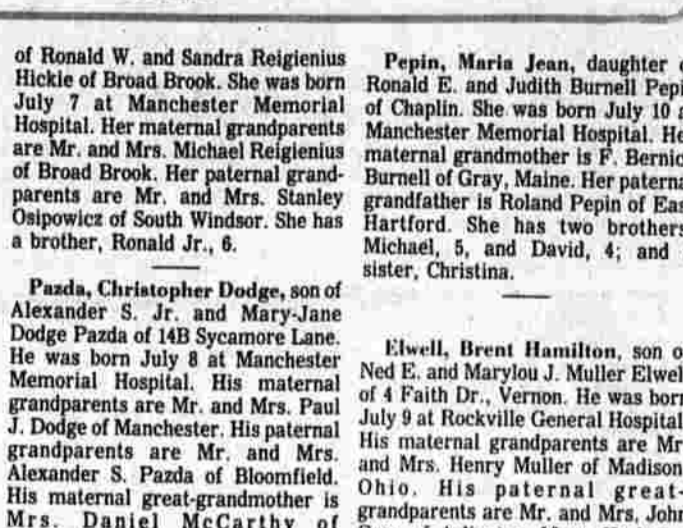

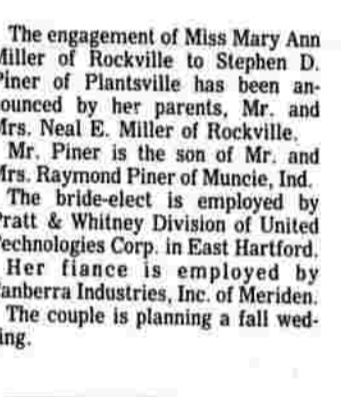

Boudreau told Hutchinson the state Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) told him not to cover the overflow until they had completed tests, Hutchinson said. However, Hutchinson said the DEP has nothing to say about it in his jurisdiction. Hutchinson said he will be checking the situation daily.

Gardening

Neal Landers has been called "the dean" by other teachers of vocational agriculture because of his 23 years as teacher of agriculture at Rockville High School. Now they must choose a new "dean," a completely unofficial title, because Mr. Landers has retired. As to every man or woman who retires in good health, the next question is "What are you going to do now?" Mr. Landers and his wife, Esther, have some definite answers. Their first project, one they have had in mind for several years, is to find a new home. They would be happy to stay in Manchester, where they have a pleasant home on Broad St. but the house they select must have a little more space around it. They have trees, many shrubs, perennial flowers and ground cover plants and some of these will go with them wherever they move, but they also want a vegetable garden. They do not have space for one now. They also intend to travel and will limit their trips to the United States. They have no desire to visit foreign countries but they have friends and relatives around this country they expect to visit. One of their daughters lives in Colorado and one in Pennsylvania, so there are two stopping places to start with. Their third daughter lives nearby in Ellington. Just getting through the retirement festivities was more of a process than Neal could have anticipated. He has been honored at seven functions, one tea and six dinners arranged by officials of the Vernon school system, his fellow teachers, his students and by a surprise dinner attended by 200 associates and friends at the Hamada Inn in East Hartford. At dinner he was told that the new wing of the vocational agriculture building which he helped to open for a teacher of agriculture and for many years its only one. The school then had 48 students. Now it has 120. Instead of one teacher, it has four, and as a regional agricultural department

has students from eight towns. At first the students were all boys and most of them were farmers' sons. Now a majority of the students from urban or suburban backgrounds and 25 per cent of them are girls. They all take basic courses in animal science, plant science and mechanics, but they specialize. Courses are planned so that those with the ability and desire may go on to college. A few ambitious students set veterinary medicine as their goal. A few decided they would like to be teachers of agriculture although this means they must earn a master's degree. The crown-of-thorns shown on this page was given to Mr. Landers as a small slip cut from a plant he admired in an Ohio motel. He put it in a bottle of water in the trunk of his car, brought it home and moved it to a rooting medium. Dozens of other slips have since been cut from the same plant. His orchids, of several kinds, were gifts from a clergyman of Japanese ancestry, who served for a time in Talcottville. The English ivy, which at one time nearly overran the greenhouse, was once a slip from Avon Old Farms. Rare plants He likes to grow plants that are considered rare or difficult including night-blooming cereus, hibiscus, gardenias, clerodendron and fuchsias of many kinds. English boxwood plants, now set outdoors near the entrance to the agriculture school, were started from a slip purchased as a souvenir at George Washington's Mt. Vernon home. The only plants grown in anything like commercial quantities are tomatoes, the seedlings going to students who take them home to grow tomatoes for their families to eat or to be sold at roadside stands. Two thousand tomato plants were started this year. "Dean" Landers brought home two of the 2,000 tomato plants for his own use. PASADENA, Calif. (UPI)—After 25 days of searching and two postponements, Viking 1 scientists figure they have found a safe landing spot on Mars for the spacecraft's \$500 million robot laboratory—by coincidence on the anniversary of a space exploration milestone. The Viking landing, which missed its original date of July 4, now is planned for July 20—seven years to the day since astronaut Neil Armstrong became the first man on the moon. The two landing sites chosen previously were abandoned as too rough after closer-inspection by Viking 1, which has been orbiting the red planet since late last month. The new site is about 460 miles northwest of the original landing ground and 150 miles west of the second choice.

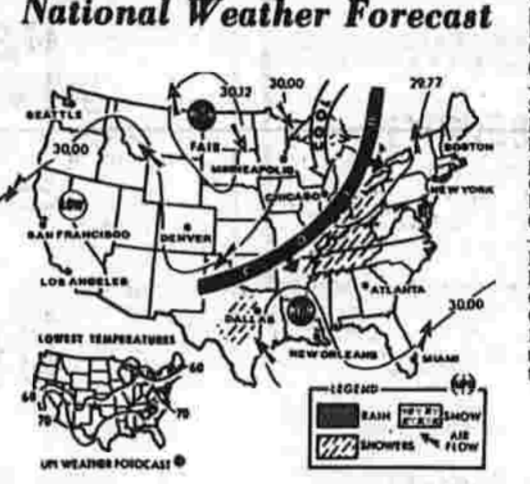
