### Schools making strides on sex discrimination

In compliance with a regulation designed to end sex discrimination in education, the Manchester school system has written a policy statement which was presented to the Board of Education Monday night.

A five-member team researched the report which is required by Title IX of the federal Education Amendments of 1972, and examined guidance policy, hiring practices, curriculum tests and extracurricular activities for evidence of sex discrimination.

Assistant School Superintendent Wilson E. Deakin Jr. has been identified as the coordinator for the Town of Manchester. Assisting him on the project study were Ann Deegan, an elementary school teacher; Gilbert Hunt, head of the Manchester High School English department; Josephine Kelleher, junior high school administrative assistant; and Marcia Kenetic, principal at Buckley School.

The committee finds that no discrimination exists between males and females relative to access to courses, programs or activities at the elementary level. Also, both junior high schools operate all classes on a complete coeducational basis. Physical education classes, as per Title IX, are grouped for contact sports by skill and ability.

The team found that on the junior high level, one of the aptitude tests is guilty of severe stereotyping and discrimination of females, and recommends ordering a new form of this test. Some of the examples cited were contained in the language usage section of the test, and on picture pages where, in one instance, two men are shown with a pulley controlled weight with the question, "Which man can lift the weight more easily?" and in another example,

### Independent Man back on capitol

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (UPI) — When the National Guard helicopter tried and failed to lift the newly gilded "Independent Man" statue back atop the Rhode Island State House, someone decided this was a job for Blackie Carney.

"No sweat. It's just a routine gig for us," said Carney of Merck, Pa., before climbing in his heavy-duty, plexi-glass bottomed chopper to do his thing Tuesday evening.

A crowd of 4,000 people gathered to watch the 850-pound state mascot return to his perch on the State House dome. The 12-foot, sparcarrying statue, which has stood atop the dome since 1899, was taken down almost one year ago for a major overhaul and a new protective coat of gold leaf.

Carney, a pilot for the Pennsylvania-based Carson Helicopter Co., lifted the 580 lb. in strong, gusty winds that had thwarted the National Guard helicopter and its crew of volunteers Sunday. "These are pretty strong winds," he said clamping on his helmet before takeoff.

The mission took no more than four minutes to complete. When he landed, the crowd, including Gov. Philip W. Noel, rushed to the helicopter to congratulate Carney.

"Mighty good job, Blackie," said a mechanic standing by as he flicked an A-Okey sign at the pilot. "You're a star," a young, pretty co-ed squealed as she jumped forward to get his autograph.

"Their helicopters specialize in this kind of thing," said Maj. Gen. Leonard Holland, state adjutant general and commander of the guard, who eyed Carney's copter with envy.

"I think we're going to get some of these."

### Gifted student denied ride outside district

The Board of Education heard a request Monday night to provide transportation for a student to attend a school outside his district.

Representing Mr. and Mrs. John Gordon of Tolland Tpk., Joel Janenda, attorney, explained that rather than attend kindergarten at the neighborhood school in the fall, their son was referred to the Green School because it would provide the type of curriculum best suited to his educational advantage.

The recommendation was made by one of the school system's kindergarten screening personnel upon concluding the child is in the gifted category.

The school system provides no special program for gifted students. On occasion, however, special instruction has been provided for gifted students within their own school.

The provision of transportation to the school outside their district is permissive, according to state law, Assistant School Superintendent Wilson E. Deakin said.

In a motion to deny the request for transportation, board members Paul Greenberg and John Yavis voted negative. There was one abstention, and five affirmatives.

The board acknowledges that requests in Manchester may have differing educational philosophies, and since there is a difference in the town elementary schools in how they are organized for instruction, parents may request a transfer to a school outside their neighborhood if space is available. However, the board feels that such transfers should not be a financial burden on taxpayers in the form of transportation.

The state's special education law defines two classes of exceptional children. The first includes children who are mentally retarded, physically handicapped, socially or emotionally maladjusted, or suffering from other learning disabilities.

The second includes those who are gifted or of extraordinary learning ability. The law provides that transportation shall be provided for only those in the first category of students with two-thirds of the added costs of such programs eligible for state reimbursement.

Janenda and the Gordons have 30 days to appeal the board action, if they desire to do so. Janenda said that there appears to be no legal obligation for the board to provide the "best possible education" for every child.

### The Lighter Side True grits

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Now that Jimmy Carter has been duly anointed as the Democratic presidential candidate, political analysts are saying he faces problems reminiscent of those that confronted the late President Kennedy at the outset of the 1960 campaign.

Just as certain voters then had misgivings about Kennedy's Catholicism, certain voters now feel uneasy about Carter's Southernism. Here are some of the fears and suspicions, mostly groundless, that have arisen:

— If Carter is elected, he may turn the White House rose garden into a peanut patch.

— Secret plans have been made to have the Marine Band replace its arrangement of "Hail to the Chief" with a rousing chorus of "Disco."

— Carter might change the U.S. Motto from "E Pluribus Unum" to "The South Shall Rise Again."

— Some pundits have suggested that Carter deal with those qualms at an air-clearing session similar to Kennedy's meeting with Baptist ministers in Houston.

— Fair enough. The question is, what form should such a confrontation take? It has been my experience that misconceptions about the South are largely okrapaholic. Which is to say they are based on an illogical aversion to okra.

Being unable to understand why southerners out okra, outsiders come to view southerners themselves with suspicion. Which can hamper the efforts of southern politicians to gain a national following.

It is my belief that if Carter were to appear before a panel of Yankee gourmets and answer their questions fully and forthrightly, it would go a long way toward dispelling such concerns.

Some of the questions he could anticipate are:

Q. Why do southerners speak so slowly?  
A. The so-called Southern Drawl developed because the colonists who settled in that region happened to have slow ears. The average southerner does not hear as fast as people elsewhere do. So the tempo of their speech has slackened accordingly.

Q. What about the insect problem?  
A. The South has some trouble with bowll weevils, an insect that chews up cereal and salad bowls, but otherwise the problem is no worse than anywhere else.

Q. Is cornpone dangerous?  
A. If accidentally dropped on the foot, cornpone can cause external injuries. But if taken internally, it is perfectly harmless.

Q. When someone with a hangover tries to fry country ham, the salty fumes arising from the skillet makes his or her eyes water. Some of the moisture may drop into the pan, creating the phenomenon known as red-eye gravy.

### Buckland Opponents make move to appeal

Opponents to a huge, mixed-use development in Buckland have filed a petition with the state Supreme Court in an appeal to a decision favoring the development.

Atty. Jerome Walsh, who represents property owners in the area opposed to the proposed development, said today that he has "petitioned for certification" to the state Supreme Court. This action is the first step taken in a move to appeal.

M.A.P. Associates, an investment partnership led by developer Arthur M. Fischer of New York City, is the proposed developer of the Buckland tobacco land which would be the site of the development. They now must file papers within ten days to respond to the appeal.

The state Supreme Court will then decide whether to hear the case or not.

Development of the tobacco land for the development was upheld by the Hartford County Court of Common Pleas on June 26.

Judge Rodney Eliason dismissed an appeal brought by Buckland homeowners who opposed the zone changes.

The rezoning was originally approved by the Manchester Planning and Zoning Commission on March 4, 1974, after public hearings on an application by M.A.P. Associates.

With justice for none...

Those critics of the American judicial system who would complain that in our solicitude for the rights of defendants we have forgotten about the rights of victims, and of society, have a growing body of case history to support them. Consider the case of a man who was convicted in 1970 by a Portage County, Ohio, jury on the charge of abducting and raping an 11-year-old girl. That was in 1970. Throughout 1971, 1972, 1973, 1974 and 1975, the case made its slow progress through the appeals system until last November, when the U.S. 6th Circuit Court of Appeals in Cincinnati reversed the conviction on the grounds that a prior conviction of the defendant had been mentioned during the rape trial.

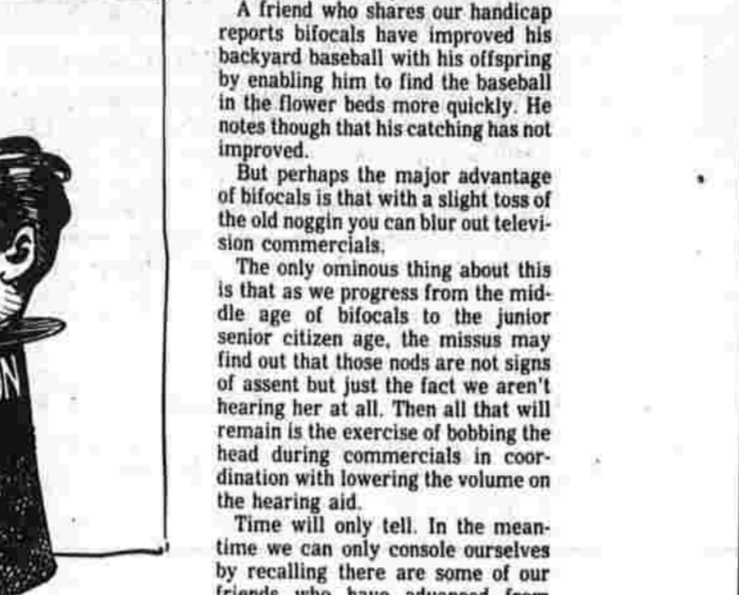

Jobs bill override could help Ford

WASHINGTON - Jim Farley, that craftsman in the art of politics, used to say, "If you're campaigning against something you've got to offer something in its place every time you open your mouth." Well, the Democrats are campaigning against President Ford's economic policies in general and unemployment in particular, so a Democratic Congress has no choice but to override Ford's veto of a \$3.95-billion public works employment bill. It will be the first order of business as the members settle into their seats after the Convention fun. An override would suit Gerald Ford, candidate just fine. He is campaigning against Democratic "spendthrifts," and if Congress kills his veto he'll have added ammunition in his battle to renew his lease on the White House. Moreover, it is not necessarily true that Ford's veto was bad politics in an election year. Accepting an unemployment bill of 7.5 percent means 92.5 percent of the working force has jobs. It seems cold-blooded to say so, but that also means 92.5 percent of the electorate is not all that upset by the unemployment situation. At any rate, Ford is appealing to those with jobs. Defending his veto, he took the unusual step of denouncing Congress in a statement read to the media. "The signs are un-

mistakable," he said. "Four months before a national election, Congress is moving full speed ahead down the road to bigger and bigger giveaway programs. To that 92.5 per cent with jobs, Ford offered his own alternative: 'If just American people want to hold down federal spending and have the additional tax cuts that I have proposed, now is the time to say so - loud and clear.' That was a campaign of policy, it was a campaign speech. Ford's own proposal is, naturally, more modest. Besides tax cuts, he would provide more limited aid to state and local governments in time of high unemployment. 'It's not dramatic, or glamorous, or a Ford aide,' but it's what we believe the tax-paying people of this country can afford. In any event, the squabbling will continue right up to Election Day because the swords have been drawn. It is a contest to determine where the most votes reside - among those citizens who are up in arms over 'wasteful' Big Government, or those who espouse the New Deal commitment that the way to cure economic distress is to throw money at it. Both parties are living dangerously.

Jobs bill override could help Ford

WASHINGTON - Jim Farley, that craftsman in the art of politics, used to say, "If you're campaigning against something you've got to offer something in its place every time you open your mouth." Well, the Democrats are campaigning against President Ford's economic policies in general and unemployment in particular, so a Democratic Congress has no choice but to override Ford's veto of a \$3.95-billion public works employment bill. It will be the first order of business as the members settle into their seats after the Convention fun. An override would suit Gerald Ford, candidate just fine. No-show voters tip scales

In other words, more than two-thirds of the registered voters in the states holding presidential primaries chose not to have a voice in the sifting and winning process of finding an occupant for the White House. Even more troublesome is the outlook for November, when the big dice are rolled. Since 1928, the number of eligible voters who have failed to go to the polls in a presidential election has consistently exceeded the number who actually voted for the winner. That's not a very praiseworthy record and it indicates that the problem has been around awhile. But what has happened in recent years makes the past prodigious. The number of registered voters grew only slightly from 87 million to 88 million from 1968 to 1974. Yet the number of registered non-voters soared from 8 million in 1968 to 29 million in 1974. Community colleges seek \$28.5 million

NEW HAVEN (UPI) - The state Community Colleges board has voted to seek a 1977-78 budget of \$28.5 million, a 34 per cent increase, to insure continued accreditation of the 12 schools in the system. The board met at South Central Community College Monday to vote on the budget, which also calls for a 3,000-student enrollment increase, to 20,000. The New England Association of Schools and Colleges warned the trustees accreditation was in jeopardy unless the state granted a large budget. The new budget would increase per-pupil spending by \$200, to \$1,423.

## News analysis O'Neill victory called reaction to long domination by Hartford

HARTFORD (UPI) — William O'Neill's re-election as Democratic state chairman apparently was a reaction against Hartford's traditional control of state politics, party officials said.

They said Gov. Ella T. Grasso no doubt took her lumps by backing the loser in Monday's election, Hartford Town Chairman Peter Kelly, but they stressed many anti-Kelly votes were anti-Hartford rather than anti-Grasso.

While Mrs. Grasso remained publicly neutral in the battle between O'Neill and Kelly, behind the scenes she pressured members of the State Central Committee — the party's body of directors — to vote for Kelly.

The committee Monday elected O'Neill of East Hampton to a new two-year term, giving him 40 votes to Kelly's 28. New Haven County Sheriff Henry Healy got four votes.

"An anti-Kelly vote wasn't

necessarily an anti-Grasso vote," said one committeeman. "A lot of it was because Kelly is from Hartford, Carbone is from Hartford, and the party's been run from Hartford for many years."

Nicholas A. Carbone is Kelly's close friend and political ally. As Hartford town chairman before Kelly, he started a controversial suit, opposed by many small-town officials, against Hartford's suburbs.

"The loyalty to the governor is still there. Definitely it's got a lot to do with Hartford," said another committee member and ranking party official. Neither wanted to be identified.

State Democrats were ruled with an iron hand for more than 20 years by John M. Bailey, a Hartford attorney who also served as national party chief under Presidents Kennedy and Johnson. Bailey died last year.

Hartford also is the state's capital and, with its many state office buildings, the city exerts an influence

disproportionate to its population, the second-largest in the state. After Bailey died, Mrs. Grasso recommended O'Neill, manager of her 1974 campaign for governor, to take over. But O'Neill later fell in disfavor when he failed to muster enough legislative support for some of the governor's controversial budget-balancing programs — eliminating a \$29 million veteran's fund and putting state employees on a longer work week.

He sought re-election despite Mrs. Grasso's charges he should not be party chief and at the same time lead the Democratic majority in the Connecticut House.

Carbone and other Hartford officials fell into disfavor with state lawmakers last year by introducing a bill giving cities broader powers to float bond issues to attract more businesses and industries.

Lawmakers approved the bill, and then were embarrassed when Mrs. Grasso vetoed it after several charges that it would have opened municipal treasuries to raids by unscrupulous politicians.

Hartford won its suit against suburbs for failing to provide adequate housing for poor families, and a federal judge ordered federal grants withheld until the situation was remedied.

The decision, regarded as a landmark case, could have an impact in the rest of the state which is predominantly suburban.

Members of the subcommittee questioned Williams after the testimony. Although they could see and hear him, Williams could only hear the congressmen.

A cable TV spokesman said the satellite rental cost about \$625.

Senate extends income tax cuts

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Senate has agreed to extend current income tax cuts at least through 1977, turning back all efforts to cut popular deductions for state and local gasoline taxes.

Both actions were reverses of the Finance Committee's massive tax revision bill, which has run into increasing criticism for dozens of amendments added for special interests.

With committee Chairman Russell Long, D-La., saying it probably will take another two to three weeks to complete the bill, the Senate next turns its attention to a series of "people" provisions including expanded tax breaks for child care and retirement income.

The bill, including the tax cuts, must go back to the House, which passed a similar bill earlier. Some action must be taken by Sept. 1 to guarantee that the income tax withholding rate will not rise when a temporary freeze on the rates expires.

The 66 to 26 vote to extend the tax cuts through 1977 overturned the Finance Committee's recommendation that one major element of the tax cut - the 35 per cent tax credit - be ended next June 30 as a way to hold down the revenue loss in the bill.

However, opponents said this was merely a ploy to give additional tax breaks to special interests, and it was obvious that the tax cuts would be extended next year.

The vote came on an amendment by Sen. James Allen, D-La.

In two votes, the Senate affirmed its intention to leave the popular deduction for state and local gasoline taxes as it is. It voted 50 to 42 to reverse the Finance Committee's decision to allow deductions only over the first 50¢ of tax, then voted 54 to 38 against an amendment by Sen. Adlai Stevenson, D-Ill., to kill the deduction.

Ford and Reagan in war of nerves

Both sides agree there's a war of nerves being waged between President Ford's camp and Ronald Reagan's strategists.

Jim Baker, in charge of lining up delegates for Ford, dismissed Tuesday as "psychological warfare" claims by Reagan's camp that his candidate had 1,140 GOP national convention delegates - 10 more than needed for the presidential nomination.

Baker said Ford has 1,119 delegates and hopes to reach 1,139 by the end of this week.

Meanwhile, the Federal Election Commission approved giving nearly \$22 million to Jimmy Carter's campaign. An equal amount will go to the GOP nominee. This is the first presidential election to be financed by federal funds.

The Reagan strategist said the battle in the next several days would be "a psychological one" with each side revealing new delegate pledges in hopes of showing the other side it had momentum.

The latest UPI tally shows 1,113 delegates in Ford's column and 1,061 pledged or leaning to Reagan with 85 delegates uncommitted.

The new addition to Reagan's column is Sen. Strom Thurmond, the South Carolina conservative who headed the Dixiecrat ticket of 1948. John Sears, Reagan's campaign manager, said Thurmond's support will be "of great value in the South."

Democratic nominee Jimmy Carter told a news conference at Plains, Ga., he wouldn't make a political issue of Ford's pardon of Richard Nixon.

"The American people know who pardoned President Nixon," Carter said. "They decided it raised by a candidate for political advantage. I think they would resist it if it was."

But what he would have done in Ford's place, Carter said he wouldn't have proclaimed a pardon "until after the trial and, I think, the inevitable conviction of President Nixon."

Carter said he will campaign against Ford's record if the President gets the GOP nomination, and if Reagan is nominated, Carter said, he will point out Reagan's "inclination to get militarily involved" in foreign trouble spots.

Hog herds quarantined

BOSTON (UPI) - The U.S. Agriculture Department Tuesday quarantined all hog herds in Massachusetts and Rhode Island as well as Cheshire, Hillsborough and Rockingham counties in New Hampshire.

Kathy Ellis, spokeswoman for the department's Hog Cholera Task Force, said the herds involved had also declared quarantines. The combined state and federal rulings will stop the movement of hogs within or between the two states and three New Hampshire counties, she said.

A case of hog cholera was confirmed Saturday in a herd of 400 hogs in Holden, Mass.

Me. Ellis said the entire herd of 400 were destroyed Tuesday. The owner of the herd will be paid a fair market value for the destroyed animals.

No outbreaks other than the Holden one have been reported, Me. Ellis said. However, 27 herds in the region are being tested and the task force has reason to believe these herds may contain virus. The disease affects only hogs and is not a danger to humans or other animals.

The first case of hog cholera in the area was discovered in Tiverton, R.I., Feb. 28 in a herd of 1,500. The government was forced to destroy 4,200 hogs in 30 herds in Rhode Island, Massachusetts and New Hampshire.

# Time for RSox fresh start and some positive thinking

NEW YORK (UPI) — For the Boston Red Sox, in a disappointing fifth place in the American League East, it is a time for fresh starts and positive thinking.

"I'm not even concerned about the pennant race," said Boston's interim manager Don Zimmer, who acquired his first victory at the helm Tuesday night, with a 4-2 win over the Texas Rangers.

"I just want to catch the clubs above us. We need to get ahead 500 before we can even begin to think about the Yankees," said Zimmer, who replaced the fired Darrell Johnson Monday afternoon.

Even with the win, the Red Sox stayed 14 games behind New York, a 14-9 winner over Chicago in a rain-shortened game. Elsewhere in the Baltimore whipped Kansas City, 10-3, Detroit, behind rookie sensation Mark "Bird" Fidrych, beat Minnesota, 8-3, Milwaukee, 4-2, California, 6-2, and Oakland downed Cleveland, 7-4.

"They (the Yankees) are sitting pretty good right now," said Boston designated hitter Cecil Cooper, who drove in two runs. "But maybe we

can apply a little pressure to them. It's happened before. Who knows? They may fall apart."

Rookie left-hander Rick Jones ran his record to 4-4 with relief help from Reggie Cleveland, Tom House and Jim Willoughby, who snuffed out a bases-loaded Texas rally in the ninth. Nelson Briles, 7-4, started and lost for the Rangers.

Jones kept the Ranger's scoreless for six innings until they got four hits to chase him in the seventh. Before that, he and the Red Sox defense cut down several Ranger threats. Texas got 14 hits, but stranded 14 runners off Jones and relievers Reggie Cleveland, Tom House and Jim Willoughby.

Jones has some impressive minor league credentials. The Jacksonville, Fla., native was 13-3 in Class A ball and 7-4 in AA and was the only 20-game winner in the minors last season.

"It's different pitching in the big leagues," he said. "There are some things you can't get away with in the minors."

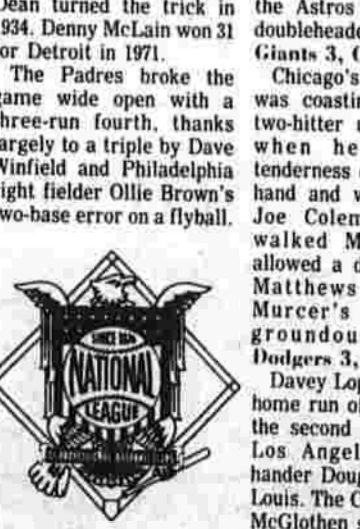

Washington Window South Africa's Mental Hospitals

DAVID E. ANDERSON WASHINGTON (UPI) — Dictatorships have always used a variety of methods to keep potential dissenters and troublemakers under control and often, when a regime worries about its world image, it seeks to disguise those methods with humanitarian overtones.

From the Soviet Union in recent years, for example, there have appeared reports of the use of mental institutions as detention centers and possibly even as torture chambers.

Now, Reps. Walter Fauntroy, the moving congressional delegate from the District of Columbia, and Harold Ford, D-Tenn., both members of the Congressional Black Caucus, want an investigation of South Africa's mental hospitals — particularly to see if there is any connection between U.S. companies with investments in the minority-white ruled country and the institutions, used primarily to incarcerate blacks.

The question of the South African mental institutions, where at least 8,000 blacks are being held, first came to light in the Swedish publication Dagens Nyheter. According to this publication, the institutions, run by a private company which turned a hefty \$13.7 million in profits in 1973, are virtually "slave camps."

"When one policeman and one doctor, after a hasty examination, decide that a particular black person seems imbalanced, this is sufficient evidence to send him away to a camp," Dagens Nyheter said. Rarely, it added, does anyone come back.

The details of life in the camp, as reported by the Swedish newspaper, are grisly at a minimum — jammed, unsanitary conditions, raw food, forced labor, with electric shock treatment for discipline and the inmates are forced to sleep on the floor.

At one of the 10 camps, the newspaper said, the mortality rate is at least one a day. "Some of the people who, according to internal statistics, are reported as discharged, actually turn out to be dead," it said.

Following the Dagens Nyheter report, the American branch of the Church of Scientology also became involved because their South African church also published an account, resulting in attempts by the government to silence the church's newspaper.

Flight from Lebanon

Mesnil family finds haven

By BETTY RYDER Family/Travel Editor The hustle and bustle of Manchester may seem disconcerting to some of us at times, but to Nadia Mesnil it personalities all that is peaceful and safe. To her and her family, it's a haven. Nadia and her three children, Gilbert, 21, Andre, 17, and Jeanine, 13, left their native Lebanon which now is in the midst of a civil war and arrived in the United States on June 27.

They were delayed in Damascus, then went to Paris and finally by Air France to Boston," he said. With Fred as her interpreter, Nadia told of the conflict in Lebanon. "Our villa (summer home) which is located in the mountains in Rachine was shelled continually with rockets and grenades for six hours one day," she said. "No one was hurt but the villa was badly damaged," Fred said. In Tripoli, Nadia was employed in a co-op stock company where she was in charge of buying and selling cosmetics. The Mesnil family did not have

too much trouble getting out of Lebanon, but Nadia said it is difficult now to get the necessary papers. "With the American consulate closed, it is hard to find anyone to document and certify immigrants," Fred explained. "They have lived under rough conditions," he said, looking fondly at Nadia and her youngsters. "Most of the difficulty is due to the fact that there is no official armed convoy or escort; those leaving the country run into enclaves after enclaves," he said. "Lebanon is really a paradise. Rugged mountains, the blue Mediterranean Sea and gracious people." The country is about the size of New Hampshire and has a population of approximately 2.5 million people," he said. Fred, who says he is a Yankee, married his wife in Tripoli in 1967. "It has sub-tropical climate, extensive mountains. You can swim in the warm sea or go skiing in the mountains just 20 minutes away," he said.

The newcomers are adjusting well to their new surroundings. "We had to take it easy on the Fourth of July," Fred said. "We didn't want the noise of the fireworks to upset them. "Things are quite different here. They are fascinated with our stores. In Lebanon, most goods are sold in open markets. The children are enjoying the beaches, but were especially impressed with the Hartford Civic Center," he said. Gilbert, the older of the two boys, speaks fairly good English. He is hoping to continue his schooling and wants to enroll in a commercial business course. Andre is interested in a technical school and Jeanine hasn't quite made up her mind. "The first thing we have to do is get them a tutor this summer so they can learn English. With the children, it should be no problem. But with Nadia, I'm not so sure," he said good-naturedly. "While things are looking brighter for the Mesnil family, their hearts are still in Lebanon. "Nadia's 67-year-old father remained here as did her brother. Her father is well known in the area and often serves as a mediator in disputes. It's his home and he refuses to leave. Her brother is a banker and he also chose to remain. "I hope the United States will do something to help the people of Lebanon. Nadia and her children came here with only the belongings they could carry. There is great suffering there," Fred said. "We are grateful they are safe now."

## Never too young

What could be more fun than wading in a clear, cool stream on a hot summer's day? Or watching a colorful butterfly as it darts among the summer wildflowers? Or relaxing in the shade of a maple tree watching a family of turtles sunning themselves on a log in the pond?

All of these things and more are possible at the Oak Grove Nature Center, a 53-acre tract owned by the Town of Manchester. The museum helps maintain this land and also owns a building on the property that is jointly used by the museum and the Board of Education (during the school year) for educational purposes.

The trails at the Nature Center are open to the public from sunrise to sunset and printed trail guides can be obtained at the museum. Summer is an exciting time to visit the Nature Center. There are so many interesting things to see, hear, smell and touch — but not pick, of course. One's senses cannot help but be stimulated.

Among the intriguing plants to be discovered are sassafras (*Sassafras albidum*) and Indian pipes (*Monotropa uniflora*). Another pleasant sight one can observe at the

tree in that a single tree may produce three differently shaped, aromatic leaves — oval, mitten-shaped and three-lobed. Its roots and bark can be used to brew sassafras tea, a popular beverage among the colonialists who considered it a medicinal, spring tonic that could "thin the blood and purify the system." Oil of sassafras is also distilled from the bark of the roots to perfume soaps and flavor medicines.

An unusual wildflower, the Indian pipes lack chlorophyll, the green substance plants use to manufacture food. Consequently, this plant, which can be found in damp woods from mid-summer until October, has a ghostly pale appearance. Since it cannot make its own food as most other plants do, Indian pipes grow upon thick leaf mold from which they obtain nourishment. Scientists call such plants saprophytes, meaning those that live on dead organic matter.

These are just a very few of the plants and animals one can discover in the various habitats — deciduous forest, old field, pond, hemlock grove — of the Nature Center. In addition to maintaining trails for the public, the museum also offers nature study classes for children entering Grades 1 through 6. These four-day sessions

strive to stimulate a young person's interest in the outdoors and how it works. Taught by Susan Craig and Gary Kania, participants study the flora and fauna and their interaction with the environment as well as take part in nature crafts such as mobiles, puppets and papier mache caterpillars.

There are openings in several of the sessions which run through Aug. 13. For more information, or to register, contact the museum at 643-0949. One is never too young to appreciate nature.

### I'd never make it with the jet set

I make a point of reading only positive stories about airplane travel.

I concentrate on the gourmet meals with wine and beef stroganoff, the Paul Newman feature films, the individual stereo headphones, and the stewardess' new Ann Fogarty uniforms. I ferret out happy statistics that prove you are as safe in an airplane as you are in your own home. And I love to read profiles of pilots who lead exemplary lives and drink nothing stronger than ginger ale.

I refuse, particularly just before going on a trip myself, to read anything about the negative aspects of air travel such as crashes, bombs or hijacking.

Despite my efforts, which you can see are extensive, every time I board an airplane I get a sick, heavy, anxious feeling in my stomach and it doesn't go away until the trip is over. The reason for my anxiety is simple and has nothing to do with the

aerodynamic theory of lift or anything scientific like that. I'm worried about three things. How is the big hulking piece of steel going to get up in the air? How is it going to stay there? And how is it going to get down again?

The last time my husband and I took an airplane trip, I thought positively the entire week before. On the way to the airport I hummed with abandon, "We Go Into the Wild Blue Yonder." But as we boarded the plane that sick, heavy, anxious feeling covered me like a gray blanket.

"I barely had a chance to say goodbye to the kids," I said to my husband.

"Relax. This is 1976. Everyone is traveling by plane. Look at the little boy," he said pointing to the two-

year-old in the seat in front of us, "he's having a great time."

"That little boy doesn't know any better," I said.

"This certainly is a beautiful airplane," my husband continued, keeping the conversation going. "It's one of the best built planes in the world and those engines purring away in there are our own Hartford engine. Doesn't that give you a confidence feeling?"

When the plane started to lift off the ground, my husband reached for my hand and squeezed it compassionately.

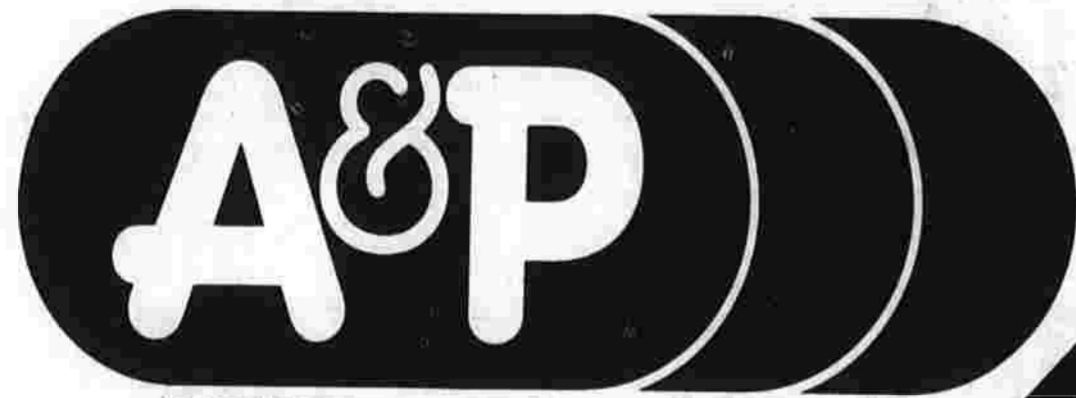

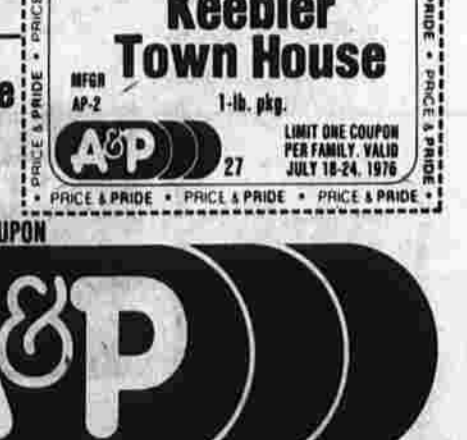

**Social Security**

Q. When I attempted to my neighbor's day worker to work two days a week for me, she said OK, but that she would rather I did not deduct Social Security from her pay. I know that I'm supposed to. What should I do?

A. You should remind her that the Social Security protection she will get from her contributions can mean an income when she is too old to work, and can mean a difference for her family if she is unable to work because of a severe disability, or if she dies. Tell her, too, that you are required by law to report the wages you pay people to work for you, so whatever arrangements you make should be based on this obligation.

Q. My mother recently died at 69 after a long illness. If I pay our family doctor, who is treating her, can I apply for the Medicare medical insurance payment?

A. When someone who has Medicare dies, special rules apply to the medical insurance payment. If your doctor accepts assignment, Medicare will pay him, and he won't accept assignment. The payment can be made to whoever pays the bill. You will need to file two forms and proof of payment. The forms are "Request for Medicare Payment" and "Statement Regarding Medicare Payment for Medical Services to Deceased Patient." You can get both these forms at any Social Security office.

Q. My sister's vision has gradually gotten worse because of advanced diabetes. She worked steadily until 1965. Social Security up until about a year ago. Can she qualify for disability benefits?

A. People whose vision is not better than 20/200 even with glasses, or whose visual field is limited to 20 degrees or less, are considered disabled on the basis of blindness under the Social Security law. Your sister should apply for benefits at any Social Security office. To get benefits, she must be severely disabled and not expected to work for a year or more.

Q. The other day I took my mother to the Social Security office to help her apply for benefits. My father had just died. While we were sitting there, I noticed that there were quite a few workers not helping anybody. Why couldn't they take her application?

A. The only people authorized and trained to take your claim are the claims representatives in the office. The claims representative then gives the application to the claims development clerk when he or she has completed the application. Later a data review technician checks it and forwards it for payment. The workers you saw are trained to do different things to your claim. All of their jobs are important for correct and speedy processing of your claim.

**GNP expansion slows**

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The nation's economy expanded only 4.4 per cent in the second quarter, less than half the growth rate of the first quarter, the government reported today.

The Commerce Department said the "real" Gross National Product — the nation's total output of goods and services stripped of inflation — rose \$12.4 billion between April and June. According to a revised estimate, the GNP soared 9.2 per cent in the first quarter.

At the same time, the department reported that the inflation rate, as measured by the GNP implicit price deflator, grew from 4.3 per cent in the first quarter to 5 per cent in the second.

The department also said personal income — all income received by all Americans — advanced only 0.4 per cent in June, the smallest one-month increase in the past five months.

The moderate second quarter rise marks the fifth consecutive quarterly rise in the "real" GNP since the nation began pulling out of the recession last spring.

The Commerce Department said the real GNP now stands at \$1,259 trillion, 1.4 per cent above the \$1,243 trillion mark which was recorded in the fourth quarter of 1973 before the economic downturn began.

Government economists did not find the slowdown in the nation's growth rate particularly distressing. Today's report is just a preliminary GNP assessment and most feel that the revised figures will look much better when more data is available.

Retail sales, which make up roughly two-thirds of the real GNP, have picked up again and business investment is expected to pick up in the months ahead.

**VA news**

If your last name is Johnson and you plan to check with the Veterans Administration about possible benefits, better be specific. So says Joseph M. Card Jr., director of the Veterans Administration Regional Office at Hartford.

The old "name, rank and military serial number" bit will come in handy — especially the service serial number — because the Veterans Administration has about 203,000 ex-GI's named Johnson on its rolls. You'll run into the same sort of problem if your name is Smith (there are about 305,000 Smiths in Veterans Administration files), or Williams (there are about 150,000 of them).

Card said that's why the Veterans Administration urges you and your dependents to use your serviceman's serial number or — if you have had previous contact with the agency — the Veterans Administration "C" number shown in your return correspondence. Disclosure of this information is voluntary and will have no effect on your entitlement to benefits; however, failure to furnish it may result in a delay in processing the claim for benefits.

With 34 million veterans names in Veterans Administration files, the job of matching an inquiry with records showing eligibility is almost impossible unless you supply the essential basic data, Card added.

For example, if Thomas Brown were to ask the Veterans Administration about his eligibility for GI Bill educational benefits, but neglected to provide the agency with his service serial number or VA claim number, the Veterans Administration would be faced with identifying him from among the 2,700 Thomas Browns in Veterans Administration files.

Veterans with less common names than Smith, Jones or Brown are nonetheless well represented in the Veterans Administration files, Card said.

There are approximately 24,000 Sanders, over 27,000 Myers, about 36,000 Rogers, nearly 47,000 Wrights, around 42,000 Murphys and over 23,000 Schmidts in the Veterans Administration files, to name only a few.

With more names being added daily, it's easy to see why the Veterans Administration needs as much specific information as possible about a veteran's service record so that his or her claim for benefits can be processed and completed as rapidly as possible.

Q — I bought my first home with a GI Loan, and am now considering purchase of a new house. Should I obtain a release from the VA before negotiating for my new home?

A — Veterans are urged to obtain a "release of liability" from VA if the purchaser of a house bought with a GI Loan assumes the loan. Otherwise, the seller (veteran) could be held financially liable should the purchaser default on mortgage payments.

Q — How were veterans' benefits affected by President Ford's proclamation ending the Vietnam Era on May 7, 1975?

A — Potential eligibility for persons entering service after May 7, 1975, was terminated for such wartime benefits as non-service-connected disability pensions for veterans, burial allowances and non-service-connected death pensions for widows and surviving children of veterans. Unaffected was GI Bill educational training, for which eligibility is linked to service dates established by Congress. GI home loan benefits also were unaffected.

**Almanac** **Of consumer concern**

noticed the new symbol on cans and boxes at the supermarket — a series of closely spaced lines and bars. These lines and bars may look alike to you but each product has a unique group of its own which is its symbol for the Universal Product Code (UPC). Part of a new system that's being tested by several supermarkets in selected metropolitan areas of the country.

**Computerized supermarket checkout**

Under the UPC system, when you reach the checkout stand, the clerk would slide the product, with the UPC side down, over a scanning device that uses a laser beam. As the product passes over the scanner, a message is sent to the store's computer. The computer identifies the item, "rings" it up on the computer terminal at the checkout counter, and prints a description of the item and the price on your receipt. In addition to identifying the product, the UPC, used with a computer, acts as automated inventory system. The type of receipt you'll get will depend on the kind of computer the store uses. One system shows you a brand name and price flashed on an electronic screen as it is rung up at the checkout counter with the brand name and price printed on the receipt. Not all the systems will show the name of the product on the receipt.

There has been controversy concerning the use of UPC nationwide, although the supermarket industry sees the system as increasing checkout speed and reducing checkout errors. The industry claims UPC will ultimately result in savings to consumers. The major problem concerned with the system on a national basis has concerned itself with item pricing. Many in the industry want to place the price on the shelf under the product, but eliminate the price on each item.

The Connecticut Legislature, recognizing a problem with contemplated use of UPC, last year passed Public Act 75-391, Section 2 of the Act says: "Any person, firm, partnership, association or corporation which utilizes universal product coding in totalling a retail customer's purchases shall mark or cause to be marked each consumer commodity which bears a Universal Product Code with its retail price."

#### Mysterious Disappearance

Without warning, a seemingly happy husband (or wife) drops out of sight. Inquiries lead nowhere. Years pass with no clues to the missing man's whereabouts. In these circumstances, can his spouse collect on his life insurance?

Usually she can after seven years have gone by. At that point, most courts are willing to make a "presumption of death." Their logic, in the words of one judge: "Implanted in the human breast is an instinct to return home.



When the absence and silence (have) no reasonable explanation short of assuming that the individual must have died, seven years (point) to death as the most probable explanation."

In one case a man vanished immediately after a severe emotional episode. His car was found near a deep, swift river, with footprints leading to the water's edge. His dog lingered at the scene for almost four days.

These facts, a court ruled afterward, justified a presumption of death by drowning. The wife was able to collect insurance without a seven-year wait.

On the other hand, logic may point in the opposite direction as well. Another man had been away for eight years when his wife put in her claim. But additional facts came out in court.

First, he had been a fugitive from justice.

Second, he had abandoned his wife and family on an earlier occasion.

Third, his girl friend had disappeared at just about the same time.

Denying the wife's claim, the court said the chances were too good that her missing mate was not dead but had simply gone prudently AWOL.

#### Women learn union roles

STORRS (UPI) — About 60 women from around the country are spending this week at a University of Connecticut summer school learning the skills they need for leadership roles in unions.

Some of the group, representing 15 unions, said working women face very real problems with both the company and their fellow unionists.

The higher women rise in the union hierarchy, the more belligerent male leaders get, according to Joy Hipp, a secretary for the United Jewish Appeal in New York.

She said, "Women have been brainwashed for so many years they are afraid to break out of their mold" and assert themselves in their unions.

Being a woman and a union activist is a double bar to advancement, and has kept Grace Baker, a machinist at Pratt and Whitney Aircraft Group in East Hartford, from being promoted to a supervisory position, she said.

Women work for less pay in her shop, although some headway is being made, she said.

Unions have had their consciousness raised and many leaders are aware they must have women on their boards, according to the summer school's head Barbara Wertheimer, director of Cornell University's trade union women's studies.

The school will educate women unionists about their legal rights so they won't be afraid to file grievances about such things as pay discrimination and unadvertised jobs, she said.
