## Intruder killed at White House

WASHINGTON (UPI) - A cab driver climbed a fence at the White House Sunday night and was shot to death by a police guard as he ran toward the executive mansion with a

steel pipe in his hand. President and Mrs. Ford were in the family quarters of the White House at the time and were informed of the incident shortly after it occurred.

The intruder, identifed as Chester Plummer Jr., 30, was shot shortly after 9:30 p.m., EDT. He died in emergency surgery at George Washington University Hospital an hour and a half later at 11:05.

Officials said the man climbed over the spiked six-foot-high iron fence at the northeast corner of the White House grounds on Pennsylvania Avenue and moved some 60 feet toward the residence, carrying a steel pipe three or four feet long.

It was the first time an intruder had been shot, although sources said "jumpers," as the Secret Service

refers to them, attempt to scale the fence at least once a week

Secret Service spokesman Jack Warner said the intruder approached Executive Protective Service officer Pvt. Charles A. Garland, who repeatedly ordered him to halt.

'I understand he had the pipe over his head as he advanced toward the officer. The officer was between the man and the White House," Warner

He said Garland fired one shot, hitting him in the chest.

EPS guards saw Plummer earlier in the evening on the sidewalk in front of the White House, but a Secret Service spokesman said he "did not make any overt attempt at that time" to enter the grounds.

He returned later and scaled the black wrought iron fence.

The pipe was examined for explosives but, Warner said, "I understand it was just a plain pipe." Warner, asked if there was any in-dication of motive, replied "none."

A police investigator said Plummer, who was not married, had shown his family "no signs of animosity against the President."

Sgt. Robert Sharkey of the D.C. police gave this account of the in-

"At 9:34 p.m. Chester M. Plummer Jr., black male, 30, no fixed address, climbed over north fence of the White House, entered the grounds with a pipe in his hand. He was ordered to stop ... He refused to do so. When the police officer attempted to stop him, he attempted to assault the police officer and the officer fired one shot, which took effect."

He said Garland, 25, had been a member of the EPS since January, and now is on administrative leave pending investigation.

Plummer was identified at the hospital by his father, Chester Plummer. The intruder's last-known address was 5031 H St. S.E., but police described him as a drifter. There was no money in his wallet.

analyzer. Engineers had to wait until afternoon before pictures came back from the spacecraft confirming that it indeed had been repaired. It showed not only that it had been done, but one shot showed the pin half buried in the Martian soil where it had fallen.

'We all are very pleased," Martin said. "The boom appears to be working just exactly as it should. I'm very happy."

Three separate biology experiments will search the Martian soil for evidence of metabolic and photosynthetic processes of microorganisms.

One instrument introduces carbon dioxide and carbon monoxide and incubates the sample under artificial sunlight. Another will add a nutrientrich "chicken soup" solution. The third uses a simpler nutrient to see if anything releases carbon dioxide.
