No gold medals for 1976 Olympics

About the best that can be said for the modern Olympic games, whose founder, French educator Pierre de Coubertin, hoped would foster international understanding and friendship, is that they are a better place for the expression of nationalistic or ideological rivalries than the field of battle.

In Munich in 1972, of course, the Olympics did become a bloody battlefield. But while there has thankfully been no repetition in Montreal of that tragedy of the 18th Summer Olympics, the purpose and meaning of the games has again been sullied, blurred and degraded.

First was Canada's barring of the athletes of Taiwan under the flag of the Republic of China, over feeble protests from the International Olympic Committee. Next came the withdrawal of more than a score of African, Arab and Caribbean nations, who went home in a hypocritical huff because New Zealand had sent a rugby team to South Africa (that Olympics ousted) and the IOC refused to expel New Zealand from the games.

This was a tragedy not only for the spirit of the Olympics; it was a personal tragedy for

One man's dream: \$750 annually for you

WASHINGTON — About a decade ago, John Perry went to the mountaintop and came down with a dream. Ever since then, the Florida industrialist has been trying to sell it to America.

into reality. Perry sees a halt to major new federal spending for at least five years. He sees a calling of 50 per cent on corporate income taxes. And — most important — he sees all such corporate tax revenues being divided out, evenly and tax-free, to every registered voter in the country, totaling each of as about \$750 annually.

The name of Perry's dream is the National Dividend Plan (NDP). "The question is whether or not we want to hand our children an economic system with more government or an economic system with more freedom in it," Perry said earlier this year in explaining his plan to a college audience.

"And while the prospect of the socialization of the American economy appears inevitable to many, I feel we can and should insure succeeding generations an economic system that is based upon economic freedom and a free market guaranteeing the economic success history shows us that such a system is capable of."

Perry and his converts, who tend to be Republican and/or conservative — though his lieutenants are trying mightily to widen the circle — believe the NDP would help ensure the future of capitalism in America simply by making capitalists of us all.

Ronald Reagan is a convert, say Perry's aides. Other public figures they say have or are giving it serious look include John Connally, George Wallace, Treasury Secretary William Simon and Alan Greenspan, chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisers.

Perry's economic braintrust, including Martin Gainsburgh who is chief economist for the highly respected Conference Board for more than 30 years, believe they now see the NDP as a ceiling on corporate income taxes, and an end to double taxation of corporate dividends by eliminating personal taxes on them.

At the same time, however, it is questionable whether all registered voters deserve an equal slice of the money pie when some have sweated profusely to make it while others have contributed little or nothing to its ingredients.

Despite such reservations, John Perry deserves much credit for having shown us that there are other ways of doing things. His program that would lead to its political ingredients, explained Gainsburgh. The hunt of that job for the past eight or nine years has fallen on Hal E. Short, a Washington public relations consultant whose office VIP gallery includes autographed

photos of Gerald Ford both when and after he had hair. "Early next year we plan to have legislation introduced," Short told Scripps League Newspapers. "In preparation for that acid test of NDP's acceptability, he said that Perry's group has given presentations before 100 to 150 university audiences and has testified on Capitol Hill, as recently as last spring before the Senate Finance Committee."

Short and others also have tried to win points with a fellow named Jimmy Carter. "I testified before the Democratic platform committee and we will have several witnesses before three or four of the Republican platform subcommittees in Kansas City," said Short.

"This is more a public movement than a Hill movement," he continued. "I think Mr. Carter would see the merits of it. We've had a couple of meetings with (Carter aide Charles) Kirbo in Atlanta, and they went fine. We're doing everything we can to see that we don't alienate anyone. We don't want to make it a partisan issue on either a political or ideological basis."

Despite the careful groundwork, however, even sympathetic members of Congress give NDP little chance for passage into law, given the current political makeup of Capitol Hill. Utah Republican Sen. Jake Garn, for example, who spoke at a recent NDP symposium, says the plan has "great merit" but at this time there is "no possibility of getting legislation like this passed."

In an interview with Scripps League Newspapers, he claimed that "this is probably the most anti-business Congress in the history of the country," and said "you first have to change the horses in government" before legislation such as NDP would be enacted.

The dubious chance of early enactment aside, Perry's plan has obvious appeal to those of us who believe in the private enterprise system. In one swoop, it would put a moratorium on federal spending, a ceiling on corporate income taxes, and an end to double taxation of corporate dividends by eliminating personal taxes on them.

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Synergy to remain in portables

Monday to continue housing Synergy in the portable units at Penney High School. Synergy is the alternate high school.

Because two elementary schools, Second North and South Grammar, might be closed after the coming school year and as this space would be available for Synergy, LeBeau feels more than one move in the next two years would be detrimental.

"An unsettled situation in the school would be more harmful to program planning, staff and student morale, school image and the overall organization than living with the present problems with the portables," LeBeau said.

Dr. Diggs based his recommendation on LeBeau's statement and the information made available by the investigation conducted by LeBeau, Sam Leone, assistant superintendent, and the Health Department.

Olympics just memory

MONTREAL (UPI) — The Olympic flame has gone out, the Village is deserted and the tourists have gone home.

Outside of a few posters no one would know Montreal had played host to the 1976 Games. Already they are a memory, and maybe it's just as well, because for many the games held here always will be remembered as the ones that nearly ended the Olympic movement.

Lord Killanin, the stately Irishman whose demeanor and speech seems from another era, saved these games for Montreal, but before leaving for home Monday he put the next hosts—the Russians—on notice the International Olympic Committee will pull the rug, even at the last minute, if politics are introduced.

Up until now only the Canadian government knows how close Killanin came to calling off these games over the Taiwan issue and the only reason he didn't was because of the inconvenience it would have cost a lot of countries and their athletes.

Before returning to Dublin, Killanin said there is serious concern about the staggering costs of staging the games (it cost Canada \$1.5 billion with two thirds of that figure expected to be a loss) and a change might be made.

Presumably, the subject will next be taken up when the executive board meets in October in Barcelona, Spain.

Montreal is now part of Olympic history.

Defections few, effects powerful

MONTREAL (UPI) — Defections by Eastern Bloc athletes at the Summer Olympics were few in number but powerful in effect.

Soviet officials have warned sport relations with Canada may be cut entirely amid allegations of kidnapping and brainwashing.

The final defection in the political-hockey tournament, despite Canadian assurances that terrorism, kidnapping, drugs and brainwashing were not involved in the defection of teenage diver Sergei Nentsanov.

There were five defections at the Montreal Games—four from the Romanian team—compared with 117 at the previous Olympics in Munich.

Nentsanov's coach, Gerdt Barov, said the young athlete had "an extremely pale face, a blank stare, red spots on his cheeks and dilated pupils."

But an Immigration Department spokesman present at the meeting said he "seemed very relaxed and in very good form, his good health seemed undeniable."

The defection of the four Romanians of whom have not been identified, caused no stir.
