The installment plan, a success story

Installment buying has become such an accepted way of economic life for Americans that many may find it difficult to believe the extent of the controversy that raged over the question in the early decades of the century, especially in the area of automobile financing. The story is told in a recent book, "Full Faith and Credit," by William L. Wilson, a corporate biography of C.I.T. Financial Corp., one of the nation's leading financial services organizations. Installment buying was not a new idea when C.I.T. and its competitors began promoting the time-purchase of private motor cars after World War I. C.I.T. had been founded by Henry Hittleton in 1908 and people had long been accustomed to paying for such things as encyclopedias, furniture and vacuum cleaners on the installment plan. But when it came to automobile, the idea aroused strenuous opposition from a host of adversaries, Wilson notes — from economists, editorial writers, consumer spokesmen and, surprisingly, from the majority of auto manufacturers themselves. "Before I permit one of my automobiles to be sold on installment credit, I will see this company in receivership!" vowed Charles W. Nash, founder of Nash Motors. "Debt has become a national industry," Henry Ford complained in 1928. "That is bad business for the debtor and bad business for the creditor also." His company, he said, would stick to a strictly cash policy. (Only two years later, however, Ford established its own automobile financing subsidiary.) Some car makers foresaw a tidal wave of defaults if "every Tom, Dick and Harry" was allowed to buy a car, which would dump enormous numbers of distressed vehicles on the market to be resold in competition with new cars. Other businessmen feared that with so much consumer in-



Vice presidents are just part of the scenery

WASHINGTON — On this one, I find myself bemused. Clarke Reed, chairman of Mississippi's Republican Legislature, says he has been assured by President Ford that Ford will choose a running mate who is compatible personally and philosophically with him. Given the conservative fuss over Ronald Reagan's choice of the liberal Sen. Richard Schweiker as his vice presidential running mate, Ford's pledge to Reed was hardly news. He couldn't campaign against Reagan's selection if he himself went to the left for a Veep. But for Ford it means a switch. The last vice president he chose was Nelson Rockefeller, one of the most liberal Republicans since Columbus landed. And of course, Rocky got Ford into trouble with the conservative wing of the GOP, thereby unwittingly abetting the Reagan challenge. But the point of this essay is that choosing a VP is mostly a vote-getting ploy, with little lasting significance once a President takes office. Reagan may have blown his chance to win the GOP nomination by choosing Schweiker, but that's because he went too far in seeking Northern liberal votes, not because a vice president is important on Election Day's morning-after. High Rolling Reagan

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Whether his decision to name Sen. Richard Schweiker as his running mate was a howling blunder or stroke of genius, Ronald Reagan now has demonstrated he is conservative only in his philosophy of government. As a political tactician, he is revealed as a hell-for-leather, go-for-broke, boom-or-bust high rolling gambler, willing to risk all on one dramatic move that could transform a close contest into a runaway triumph or a thundering disaster. Even if Reagan had already wrapped up the presidential nomination, his action in disclosing his vice presidential choice before the convention would have been regarded as unorthodox. To have done so when he was locked in the tightest Republican nomination race in decades was downright radical. But to have chosen one of the most liberal senators in the Republican party as his running mate put Reagan into a very exclusive category of political risk takers. In recent memory, only Gerald Ford's pardon of Richard Nixon and John Kennedy's selection of Lyndon Johnson could be said to have carried the political shock value of Reagan's move. Ford's action was a true shocker and may have been a successful gamble. He was able to separate his administration from the former president and discussion of what should be done with him in a single pen stroke, although Democratic campaigners this year will be tempted to resurrect the episode. The Reagan campaign is calling the pardon a soft spot in Ford's re-election chances. The selection of Johnson for vice president caused a brief but loud liberal flap at the time and then was painted as a master stroke of party unification and ticket balancing. More recently, it developed that Kennedy was almost as surprised as the public when Johnson accepted what he had thought would be just a courtesy offer. Harry Truman and Dwight Eisenhower also demonstrated some of the cool gambling spirit. Truman, by ordering Congress back into session during the presidential campaign of 1948, and Eisenhower, by announcing he would personally go to Korea to try to end the war there in 1952, took risks comparable to Reagan's. But even so, neither HST nor Ike bet their entire presidential hopes on those single actions. In searching for comparable precedents for Reagan's move, the tendency has been to look at winners. But there is also the distinct possibility that Reagan has blown whatever chance he had to win the nomination and the election with his action. If that turns out to be the case, the comparison may be with the 1864 campaign of Republican James G. Blaine. Some historians contend that the biggest factor in Blaine's defeat by Grover Cleveland was a single phrase uttered by one of the Republican's most prominent supporters to describe the Democrats as the party of "rum, Romanism and rebellion." It elected the first Democratic president since before the Civil War. Intellectual and social inferior. The Kennedy administration was the loser. Johnson sulled and refused to do more than token arm-twisting for Kennedy legislation on Capitol Hill. And so on and on, back to Nixon under Eisenhower and Alben Barkley under Truman. Presidents traditionally have made it clear that vice presidents are just part of the scenery. The rule was look but don't touch. Curiously, Mississippi's powerful and pragmatic Charlie Reed told reporters that Jimmy Carter had made "an honorable choice" in picking Sen. Walter Mondale as his running mate because Mondale "is of a similar persuasion." Balderdash. Mondale just misses being as incongruous a choice as Richard Schweiker, he's an activist, card-carrying, working liberal, while Carter is instinctively and pragmatically conservative. But if Carter wins in November, that won't matter — to Carter at least. He knows what you do with vice presidents — you forget 'em.

Gardening

Five lovely white blossoms appeared this year on the thorny and rough-looking cactus, shaped like an elongated barrel, that Mrs. Margaret Zanis has kept and cared for at her 354 Center St. home for 18 years. It was more blossoms than the plant ever had before, and they all opened at the same time, which happened also for the first time. The flowers opened at night July 22. The picture was taken the next day. By the second day, Mrs. Zanis said, all of them would be wilting. The flowers last one night and one day. They are pure white, facing up to the light, with sharply pointed petals. In the cup of the flower the pistil and stamens are also visible. There was no fragrance that could be detected. Mrs. Zanis said she had been taking her plant to an Easter cactus. I am sure she is right. I found a picture of a cactus with upright white blossoms, exactly like this, labeled the "Easter-lily cactus," or Echinopsis multiplex. That's close enough. Plant identification is a science to which some men and women devote their lives on the payroll of a university or an arboretum. The people who write the books and take the pictures for them do all the hard work. To give credit, this picture is in the "Exotic Plant Manual" by Alfred Byrd Graf, published by the Roehrs Co. It lists the cactus under the heading "Hedgehogs of the American desert," which indicates that the plant we are talking about is far from its natural home. Mrs. Margaret Zanis has had this cactus 15 years. It bloomed for the first time when it was eight years old but never has had as many blossoms as this year.
