## News summary

### State

**HARTFORD** — G. Gordy Liddy is in court again. Liddy, sentenced to up to 20 years in federal prison in Danbury for burglary and wiretapping in the Watergate scandal, appeared in federal court Thursday to argue two motions he filed alleging prisoners rights at the prison are being violated.

**FARMINGTON** — Scientists at the University of Connecticut Medical Center today prepared a new batch of specimens to determine if nickel carbonyl caused 20 deaths among persons attending an American Legion convention in Philadelphia.

### Regional

**BOSTON** — The Rev. James M. Weeks, a La Salette missionary out of Hartford, Conn., spent two weeks in an Argentine jail without being allowed contact with U.S. officials and was then deported, but he wants to go back despite it all. He is visiting his mother, Mrs. Anne Weeks, who lives in Lancaster, Mass.

### National

**MIAMI** — Tropical storm Dotie, building in strength by the hour, sped today toward the southeast coast where a hurricane watch was in effect from Georgia to North Carolina.

**NEW YORK** — Four members of the Jewish Defense League are accused in two shooting incidents at Soviet diplomatic compounds and the attempted bombing of the Iraqi U.N. mission.

**WASHINGTON** — Economic recovery from the recession has slowed in recent months, according to latest reports from the Commerce Department. But the weakening trend has been accompanied by the lowest rate of consumer price increases in three years.

**KANSAS CITY, Mo.** — North Carolina Sen. Jesse Helms, whose conservative forces marches to their own drum through the Republican convention, had one last moment of glory when he was nominated for vice president and could deliver his message one more time before withdrawing in favor of the Ford-Dole ticket.

# Ford opens battle against Democrats

**KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI)** — President Ford entered battle against the Democrats and his own underdog image today, challenging Jimmy Carter to debate and predicting victory in November. His running mate for the difficult fray is Kansas Sen. Robert J. Dole, 53, a fellow Midwest conservative and a slashing partisan fighter, who enjoys wide respect within the Republican party.

Ford accepted his party's hotly contested presidential nomination Thursday night at the final session of a turbulent Republican National Convention, which overwhelmingly

ratified his surprising choice of Dole. After a campaign strategy meeting with GOP party leaders, Ford flew west to Russell, Kan., for a barbecue picnic in Dole's wheatlands hometown, then takes his family to Vail, Colo., for a 10-day vacation to plot campaign strategy. Ford's appearance and speech were enthusiastically greeted, but Ronald Reagan's appearance destroyed the convention timetable again and again, until he finally joined Ford on the rostrum.

"We must go forth from here united, determined that, as a great general said a few years ago, there is

no substitute for victory," Reagan said. The band blared, "California, Here I Come," the crowd roared and danced in the aisles and Reagan turned and grasped Ford's hand, his free hand resting on the shoulder of the man who destroyed his White House dreams. Vice President Nelson Rockefeller reached over to shake Reagan's hand and said one word: "Beautiful." Ford urged the public to oust the "vote-hungry, free-spending" Democratic majority in Congress.

## Both sides sum up for judge

# Buckland fire protection dispute briefs submitted

Town of Manchester violations of its own charter and Eighth Utilities District failure to assert its rights are among the allegations in summary briefs filed in the Buckland fire protection lawsuit.

The briefs have been filed in Hartford County Superior Court by Eighth District Counsel John LaBelle and Town Counsel Victor Moses. Judge Edward Hamill is reviewing the case but hasn't indicated when he might reach a decision.

Both attorneys rely heavily on individual interpretations of Special Act 200 of 1963, most recent state legislation allowing the Eighth District to extend its boundaries.

But Moses also raises the legal issue of "equitable estoppel," claiming that the town should prevail because the Eighth District acquiesced while the town served the Buckland area.

LaBelle maintains that the Eighth District cannot take actions in the Buckland area on its own, and he claimed that town officials violated the Town Charter, enacted in 1974, when they established a Town Fire Department and assumed responsibility for the Buckland area.

The lawsuit, brought by the Eighth District, seeks a determination of who has jurisdiction for fire protection in the Buckland area.

The district claims a Nov. 17 referendum gave it the authority to expand its boundaries and the town claims the district can't expand without town permission.

LaBelle's brief says that Special Act 200 designates Buckland as part of the Eighth District's authorized territory, and the district can extend its boundaries after receiving

applications from a majority of owners of real property in the area.

LaBelle says the Town Charter, itself a special act, acknowledged the Eighth District rights, and town creation of a fire department in 1957 and town assumption of responsibility for the Buckland area violated charter provisions.

For the town to assume responsibility for Buckland, an ordinance would also have to be approved by Eighth District voters, and it wasn't, LaBelle says.

Once Buckland area property owners applied for Eighth District service, the district had no choice but to act on the application, LaBelle says. And once district voters authorized the expansion, the town

can no longer claim the area, he says.

Moses' brief says that Special Act 200 put the Buckland area under the jurisdiction of the Town Fire Department, and even though Buckland is within the district's "authorized territory," the district can't expand there because the town was furnishing services already.

Moses says, therefore, that if the Eighth District is confronted with an expansion application it must first obtain a waiver from the town.

The issue of "equitable estoppel" claimed by Moses maintains that the Town of Manchester is entitled to the Buckland area because the Eighth District did nothing while the town

## Eugene Kelly named to bench

Gov. Ella T. Grasso today appointed the first black Superior Court judge in state history, Robert L. Levister of Stamford, and appointed Eugene T. Kelly of Manchester a judge in the Court of Common Pleas.

Both appointments are effective Sept. 7, when Levister will leave his current Common Pleas Court bench and Kelly will end his 16 years as state court prosecutor.

Levister, 57, replaces Judge Francis McCarthy of Wethersfield, who will join the Travelers Insurance Cos. as general counsel. Kelly, 56, replaces Levister.

Levister was appointed to the former Circuit Court in 1974. He is a graduate of the Boston

University Law School.

Kelly, a Manchester native, is a partner in the law firm of Kelly, Janenda and Gallagher. He is a graduate of Trinity College and the University of Connecticut Law School.

Kelly served the town as a member of the Board of Directors and became Manchester's first Democratic mayor in 1968. He served as a judge in the old Town Court in the late 1960s, and when the Circuit Court was established in 1960 he became chief prosecutor in Circuit 12.

Kelly has held the prosecutor's position since then, through a Circuit Court merger with the Common Pleas Court. No plans have been an-

## Dole choice surprises local Republicans

Although most were surprised by the choice and confessed to a lack of knowledge about the man, members of the Republican Town Committee seemed pleased with the selection of Kansas Sen. Robert Dole as Gerald Ford's running mate.

"Ford kept it pretty well hidden," Wallace Irish Jr. said of the President's choice. "But, I think

Dole is a good acquisition. He brings the Midwest into line, and he's a good campaigner." Irish, candidate for the Third Senatorial District Seat on the Republican State Central Committee, said.

Vivian Ferguson, member of the town Board of Directors, admitted she was surprised and also a bit disappointed in the choice. "I had my heart set on Howard Baker, senator from Tennessee," she said.

She added, however, "I have enough confidence in the President that if he chose Dole, I'm sure he's a good candidate."

Another member of the Board of Directors, Carl A. Zinsser, also wanted to see Baker chosen for the vice-presidential spot. He did think that Dole, a former Republican national chairman, would help bring the party together.

"I think this will be a good ticket. I hope, above all, that it will help unify the party and we can concentrate on the election in November," Zinsser said.

Republican Selectwoman Mildred Schaller said, "I don't really know that much about the man. He sounds very good, though."

M. Adler Dobkin, member of the party's town committee, said he was surprised by the choice. He did remember Dole from his work as national chairman.

He was a hard worker as chairman and will be a hard campaigner," Dobkin said. He felt Dole's aggressive campaigning style would offer a good contrast to Ford's, which he called "low key."

Republican Town Chairman Thomas F. Ferguson was one of the few who did not express surprise at the selection of the Kansas senator.

Sen. Dole has been one of the leading political theorists in the party in recent years," he said. "I'm pleased the ticket is as strong as it is."

## Town officials criticize utility's performance

Despite an assurance by Town Manager Robert B. Weiss that "this isn't the pick-on-HELCO hour," three representatives from the Hart-

ford Electric Light Co. (HELCO) said on Tuesday that they listened to 1 1/2 hours of criticism about their company's performance during and after last week's hurricane.

Town officials and the HELCO representatives met Thursday afternoon in the Municipal Building to review the town's procedures during Hurricane Belle. Most of the session was spent questioning the three men from the power utility.

Weiss told the men that during the storm he was sometimes given inaccurate information from HELCO. He said he was told on the afternoon following the storm that there were 1,300 customers in Manchester without power. The actual total was about twice that figure, he said.

Frank Delaney, HELCO area representative, said the number of outages are estimated by the number of customers served by each feeder system that is out of service.

"Adding up these figures, it (inaccurate counting) happens," he said. Delaney pointed out that the number of outages in town dropped from about 2,600 Tuesday night to 268 Wednesday morning.

"The work crews did a real fine job," he said.

Weiss also said he was told that on Tuesday night there would be five

HELCO crews in Manchester. He said only three were sent.

HELCO Field Supervisor Joe Hyland said that there were as many as five crews in town at certain times the night after Belle hit.

Police Chief Robert D. Lannan and Disaster Control Director James F. "Dutch" Fogarty were both critical of HELCO's speed in repairing downed power lines.

"We just get the feeling you'll get to us when you get to us," Fogarty said.

Lannan said HELCO foreman at Pitkin and Porter Sts. became infuriated when he was unable to signal a repair crew to the site. The chief said the repair was made only after police officer flagged down a crew.

Hyland pointed out that while there may have been four or five lines that were not repaired quickly, there were many that were taken care of immediately, even before the town police or fire departments were notified.

Weiss also asked if it wouldn't be possible for the power company to give customers estimates on how long they will be out of power.

## Belle cost town \$22,000 in overtime, prep costs

Hurricane Belle cost Manchester about \$22,000 in overtime salaries and preparation expenses, Town Controller Thomas S. Moore reported Thursday.

The cost of preparing and cleaning up was divided into two categories, diverted and direct costs, Moore said.

Direct costs represent the amount actually spent on overtime salaries, equipment, and preparations.

Diverted costs are not additional cash expenditures. Instead, this category represents the amount of working time spent during regular work hours to prepare for the storm.

The cost factor comes in because people who were preparing for the storm during their regular work hours were diverted from doing their normal jobs.

Moore said the diverted costs equaled \$11,625. Regular hours spent by firemen and policemen were not counted in the category, because

their work is normally that of an emergency nature, Moore said.

Direct costs were \$10,375. Most of the direct cost, \$8,865 was for overtime pay. The remainder was the cost of equipment operation and meal provisions. Moore said an agreement between the town and the union representing the public works employees requires that \$2 for meal money be provided to workers when they have to work certain hours.

Breakdown of expenditures by category is as follows: General Fund \$17,895; water fund, \$2,670; sewer fund, \$1,190; and fire fund, \$255.

The Park and Highway Departments were responsible for about half the cost of storm expenses.

The Highway Department spent \$6,600; \$3,670 in diverted costs and \$2,930 in direct costs. The Park Department spent \$4,165; \$2,500 in diverted expenses and \$1,665 in direct expenses.

The crew previously worked out of headquarters on Charter Oak St. that also housed Water Dept. workers. The water maintenance workers will remain at the Charter Oak St. location.

The reason for the move was to separate the operations of the two crews, Frank T. Jodanis, water and sewer administrator, said.

"We used to have water people doing sewer work, and sewer people doing water work," he said. "Now they will be segregated and can concentrate on aspects of their respective trades."

Also moved were five water treatment operators. They were shifted from the Charter Oak St. building to the water treatment plant on Cooper Hill St.

# Rabineau resigns

HARTFORD (UPI) — Chancery Louis Rabineau of the Commission for Higher Education Thursday announced his resignation to take a job with the Education Commission of the States in Denver, Colo.

Rabineau, 52, who has served in the \$44,200-a-year state post the past two years, will be director of the national commission's in-service education program. The post was held by Warren G. Hill until he took over as executive director of the Higher Education Thursday.

Rabineau served five years as vice chancellor under Hill before Hill left to join the Colorado-based organization.

The higher education commission oversees the state's higher education bureaucracy, has not yet started a search for a successor program.

### Business profits? No, only costs

One business magazine recently observed that as much of the public sees it, there are three kinds of corporate profits: Excessive, windfall and obscene.

In one famous public opinion survey, most people guessed that the average manufacturer makes 30 cents on each dollar of sales. The actual figure, in 1975, was 4.4 cents on each sales dollar.

Even at the college level, there is a similarly distorted idea about profits. A poll taken at 57 U.S. colleges last year found that students estimated the profit margin of large corporations to be an average of 45 per cent and that they regarded a profit of 25 per cent as fair. Most companies would be thrilled to earn half that lower figure.

In view of these misconceptions, it is interesting to see what a large corporation actually does with its revenues and what better example than one that is a member of an industry everybody knows is enjoying "obscene" profits.

Continental Oil Company (Conoco), the nation's ninth largest oil firm, reported revenues of slightly over \$7.6 billion in 1975 — more than the total budgets of many countries. In a recent article in a company publication, it broke down precisely what happened to all that money.

By far the greatest amount, a whopping \$5.3 billion, went for operating expenses, including \$715.3 million for employee wages, salaries and benefits. \$1.5 billion went for taxes; \$285.5 million for depreciation, depletion and amortization; \$94.3 million for interest and debt expenses; \$74.4 million for dry holes (unsuccessful wells), and \$63.7 million for other expenses.

What was left after all costs and taxes was the company's net income or profit — \$330.9 million, or 4.3 cents of each revenue dollar. Expressed another way, it took more than 23 revenue dollars to produce each dollar of net income (profit) in 1975.

### Are Carter's tactics sly and cunning?

WASHINGTON — There's nothing new in Jimmy Carter's campaign against the Nixon pardon. Andrew Jackson's opponents used to insist piously that they didn't believe Mrs. Jackson played around. Carter's approach is different and yet gets the job done. He keeps telling reporters he won't make an issue of the pardon. In some quarters, that's totally effective in making it an issue.

And, of course, President Ford's forgiveness of Richard Nixon has its place in the campaign, simply because a lot of people believe Ford should have let Nixon to the mercy of the same official system that deals with embezzlers and muggers. That is to say, anything that has provoked controversy is, per se, an issue.

Meanwhile, Carter has a legitimate issue in Watergate. He's telling the truth when he says the Republican administration "was afflicted by the worst scandal we've ever had." He likes to call it the "Nixon-Ford administration" because he believes he's weak on Ford, and therefore must do his best to picture Ford as Richard Nixon's creature.

That could backfire. Like most plain citizens, Jimmy Carter considers Ford a decent citizen. He talks about the "openness, honesty and integrity" of Ford's White House stewardship. It won't wash. Carter can and should hammer away at Watergate, but he'll have a tough time persuading voters that "honest" Gerald Ford played in that mud. The voters may reject Ford because they believe he is weak on leadership or is wrong on major issues, but I can't see them deciding he's a crook.

### What's happening in Plains?

EDITOR'S NOTE: A correspondent from Plains, Ga. recently visited Plains, Ga. Here is his report.

PLAINS, Ga. — No particular reason appears for anybody to stop in Plains. It is so small and undistinguished that it is easier to drive right through it. It is not especially old, not in the least picturesque, and no different from hundreds of other small southern towns. There is not even a hamburger stand.

But every day they come by the hundreds — a thousand a day in local estimate — to park their air-conditioned cars and stroll in the 100 degree heat along the single block of stores that is downtown Plains, taking photographs, buying souvenirs and hoping above all for just a glimpse of "Jimmy."

Plains, population 683, is the home of Jimmy Carter, the Democratic presidential candidate. Anyone unaware of that would probably not come, but an amnesiac wanderer would be reminded by the red, white and blue sign, affixed to the last building on Main Street. "Plains Georgia, home of Jimmy Carter our next president."

That is on the converted shop that houses the magnificently named "Carter-Mondale press office," furnished with telephones. Next door is another shop being converted hurriedly into a delicatessen, next along the covered sidewalk is Turner's hardware and department store, which sells Wolverines work shoes, hats against the near tropical sun and other oddments.

Then comes the Carter world farm office, owned by Uncle Hugh Carter; the windows are the sort used by fishermen, and supplying them is apparently a thriving business.

Uncle Hugh also owns the alleged antique store next door, which offers almost nothing that could even remotely be called antique, and many splendid examples of what is usually called sharp Yankee trading. A middle-aged tuff-tie, for example, containing two broken mousetraps and some bits of obscure hardware, is priced at \$5. A pressed-glass celery dish goes for \$19. The paperback edition of Carter's own book "Why Not the Best?" is marked at 50 cents above the publisher's price.

It is an ordinary small town railroad station, ornamented with a green-and-white sign proclaiming it Carter's headquarters. His mother, 77-year-old Mrs. Lillian Carter — known in southern style as "Miss Tor

people know who pardoned Nixon. They have their doubts about what Ford did."  
It is hard to blame Carter. He is, after all, running in a hardball league, and keeping any questionable act of the Republican administration alive is imperative. And he does have his own position on the question. He does not denounce the pardon out of hand but says he would have let the judicial process run its course with Nixon before considering a pardon.

Are his tactics sly and cunning? Of course they are. But they are also legitimate in a Presidential campaign. You use the weapons at hand, even if — in some cases — they must be used in a furtive fashion.

And don't kid yourself. Carter won't let the pardon issue die. He says it would be politically unwise to let the issue be there. The American

various members of it own much of what is worst owing — the worm farm, the chicken, the warehouses and even the town's license to sell beer, held by Carter's convoluted brother Billy, who runs one of the town's two service stations.

Plains lies in southwestern Georgia, 130 miles from Atlanta, the state capital, surrounded by fields of peanuts, soybeans, and corn grown for seed and livestock. The earth is the deep-red clay immortalized by generations of southern novelists, and there are water moccasins in the still, brown ponds. The nearest town of any size is Americus and beyond that Albany, both the scenes of bitter racial disturbances in the early 1960s.

The tourists that seem likely to change sleepy Plains into a day-tripper's delight are mostly white, mostly middle-class and proudly "middle-American." For them, Plains seems to be an affirmation of their faith in themselves and their belief that this — not the perils and pleasures of the big cities — represents reality.

For Carter, this dozing hamlet is the perfect background for a man who wants very badly to go there.

### Town may get grants under public jobs act

Manchester stands a good chance of getting federal grants under the recently approved Public Works Employment Act, and town officials are filing a "letter of intent" to apply for the money. Town Public Works Director Jay Giles said.

Giles said preliminary planning for the grant application has included talk about several projects, including reconstruction of Main St., a new Public Works Department garage, water system improvements, rebuilding of the Adams St. bridge over the Hookamum River, the White Brook storm drainage project, and a new cellblock for the town police station.

Giles said the projects under consideration were being selected on the basis of community enhancement, creating new jobs, and rapid action starting work.

One of the keys to the federal legislation is a requirement of rapid government action in putting people to work. Giles said once a town's application is filed, federal ad-

ministrators have 45 days to act on it and the town has just 90 days to begin work.

Those requirements effectively limit eligible projects to those which have already been designed, like the local water system and storm drainage improvements, or those which can be designed very quickly, like the police station cellblock, Giles said.

Giles said renovations-additions proposals for Bentley and Washington Schools and the West Side Rec might qualify for the public works grants, but there would be no time to get construction under way to meet the legislative deadlines.

The federal Economic Development Administration, which is administering the \$3.9 billion worth of grants throughout the country, has yet written guidelines on awarding grants, but the town will file a "letter of intent" anyway, Giles said.

problems as well as hear with us while we improve the riding quality of the roadway surface."

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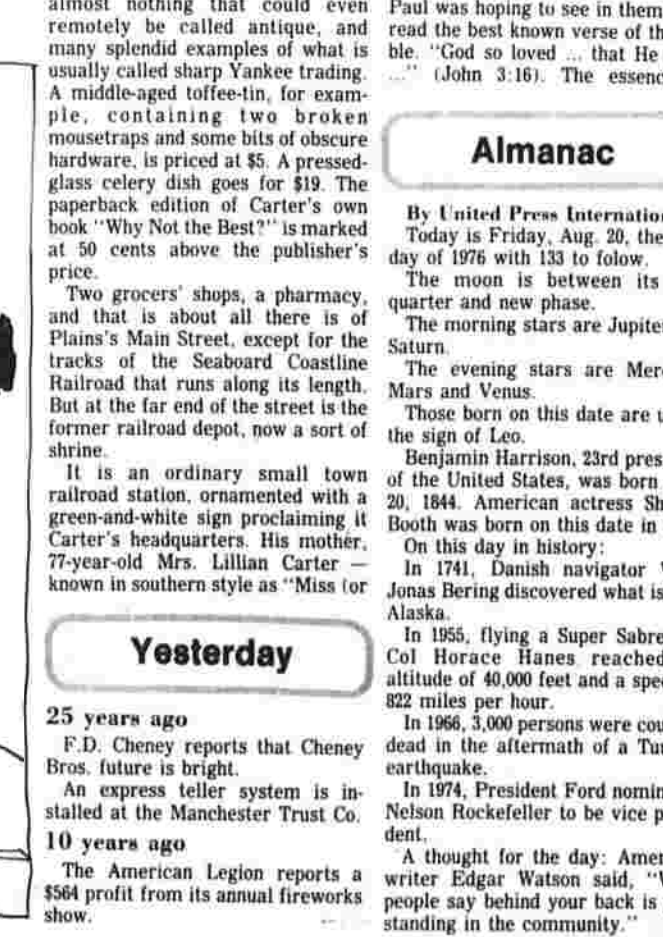
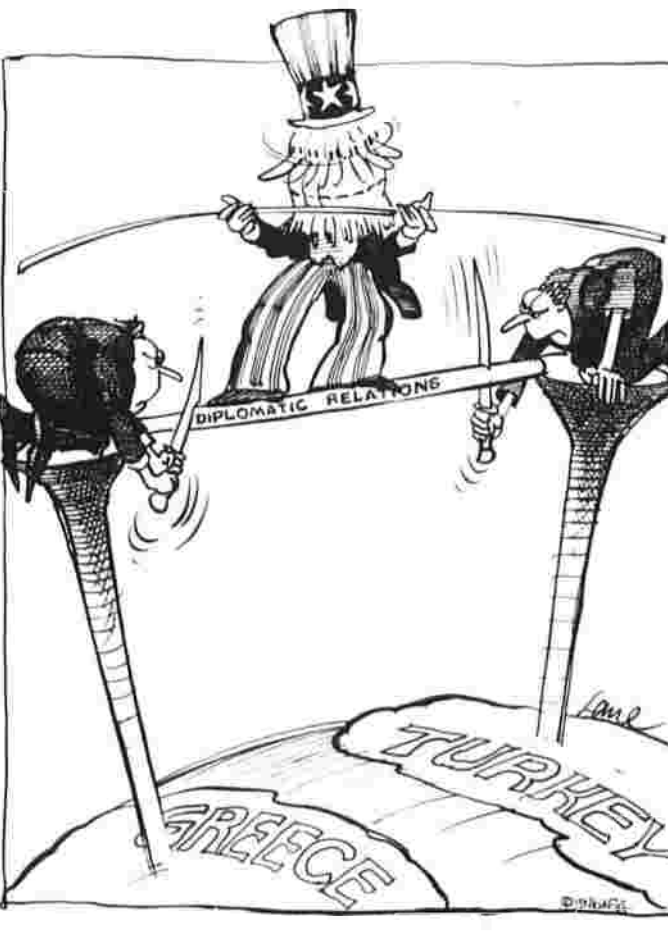

**MMH officials defend budget at CHHC hearing**

Several officials of Manchester Memorial Hospital were attending a budget hearing today at the Capitol in Hartford.

Last week, MMH was among the state's 35 voluntary general hospitals to be notified by the Commission on Hospitals and Health Care (CHHC) of drastic cuts in their proposed budgets.

Manchester hospital's proposed budget of \$16 million was cut by \$1.1 million. If the hospital must operate under severe budget cuts, some services could either be stopped entirely, or continued at a lower performance level, a hospital spokesman said.

The spokesman said the CHHC didn't indicate what areas would be affected by the budget cut.

In a written testimony required by the CHHC 24 hours before the hearing, the hospital completely rejustified its entire

proposed budget, the spokesman said. At the hearing, the budget was being reviewed item by item.

Kenney, administrator; George Roy, comptroller; Andre Marmen, development director; Ms. Ingrid Cremisi, chief inhalation therapist; Mrs. Mary Sterud, director of nursing; Dr. Charles Hamilton, medical director for inhalation therapy; Dr. Howard Lockward, chairman of the department of medicine; Dr. Robert K. Butterfield, chairman of the emergency department; Dr. Philip Sumner, chief of obstetrics; Dr. J. Robert Galvin, associate in emergency department; and Robert H. Smith, president of the Board of Trustees.

The full commission must vote on this and all hospital budgets by Sept. 15.

**Swine flu clinic plans under way**

Manchester and some area towns will join in mass flu immunization clinics probably early in October.

Town health department officials met Thursday with Ms. Carroll Schilling, a regional coordinator for the flu program, and mapped out a tentative schedule of clinics that would go into December. The clinics will be held at different days and times in order to accommodate as many people as possible.

There are two types of vaccine that will be administered — monovalent (MONO-valent) and bivalent (BI-valent).

Monovalent vaccine is for the swine, or New Jersey type flu, and is for the general population. Bivalent vaccine is for prevention of the swine flu and the Type A Victoria flu which affected so many people last year, and will be given mostly to the elderly and high risk persons, those who are particularly susceptible.

The first clinic will be for that group.

Most of the inoculations will be by means of a jet injector gun. Some syringes and needles will be needed for a backup supply.

Health administrator Ronald Kraatz said that the town health department has never handled anything of this magnitude.

"Probably there has never been anything of this magnitude anywhere in the world," he added, referring to the nationwide program.

The local project which includes Bolton, South Windsor and Glastonbury in this area, will involve many volunteers just to handle the paper

work, the Police Department to handle parking, and interpreters to help with communication with non-English speaking persons.

Training classes will be scheduled about a week before the first clinic for all those who will work on the immunization program.

Michael Gallagher, Manchester Memorial Hospital comptroller, said he hopes the hospital staff can be inoculated with the bivalent vaccine as soon as it is available. Last year, the staff was severely stricken with the Victoria flu, and as a safety precaution, Gallagher thinks the staff should be inoculated against both flu strains to avoid another similar situation. The bivalent vaccine, however, is supposed to be reserved for high risk and the elderly persons.
