

Grasso says income tax not only way to fund schools HARTFORD (PI) - Enactment of a state income tax

is not the only way Connecticut can meet a court ruling on local education funding that could cost millions of dollars, according to Gov. Ella T. Grasso. "There are other ways," she said when asked if she shared Education Commissioner Mark R. Shedd's belief an income levy is the only solution to the state's education funding troubles.

The Connecticut Supreme Court is considering th state's appeal of a lower court ruling that declared the existing system of funding education - primarily through local property taxes - was unconstitutional. The lower court ruled the heavy reliance on propert taxes allow wealthier towns to operate better schools and therefore violate a state constitutional mandate for

equal educational opportunities.

A similar ruling in New Jersey forced that state earlier this year to adopt an income tax as a more fair way of collecting funds to be used for local education funding. Shedd Tuesday predicted the high court will rule against the state and said Connecticut will be forced to enact a state income tax. Mrs. Grasso Wednesday declined detailed comment of

the case, saying only her administration would respond when the Supreme Court issues its ruling.









