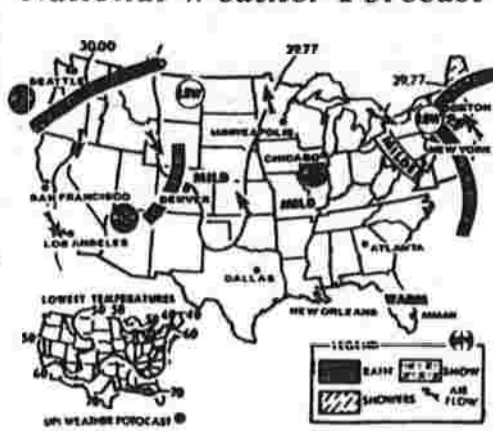


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National Weather Forecast

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Utilities face monthly PUCA review

HARTFORD (UPI)—The financial records of utilities in Connecticut will be looked over every month, according to a Public Utilities Council spokesman, in order to guard against overcharging consumers. The PUCA Thursday agreed to the new review—much more thorough than has ever been done in the past—and modification of the controversial fuel adjustment clause. The PUCA agreed on the substance of the changes, but set an Oct. 1 meeting to define their terms and iron out any problems. The fuel adjustment clause allows utilities to pass on the increased cost of producing electricity to consumers. A spokesman for the PUCA said the decision to monitor the financial records of utilities every month was designed to prevent the overcharging of consumers. The spokesman said it was hoped by reviewing all of the firms' financial records the PUCA could get a better grasp on the financial picture of the firm in question and have a feel for how large its profits should be.

PUCA Chairman Albert J. Kleban said it would have been nice to eliminate the fuel adjustment clause, but because of the instability of the price of oil that was impossible. "But we will review the situation annually in the hopes the situation has stabilized," he said. The legislature had called upon the agency to modify the present fuel adjustment clause, which has sent utility rates skyrocketing, if it could not eliminate it. Kleban said that there would be public hearings on any proposed modification before it could be implemented. He said the problem in changing the clause was more vexing in Connecticut than elsewhere because of the relatively heavy reliance on nuclear fuel over oil by utilities here.

UPS picket lines set up in eight state locations

More than 1,000 Teamsters were on picket lines today at eight locations in Connecticut as part of the 15-state strike against United Parcel Service. The lines were set up Thursday in Hartford, New London, Norwalk, Waterbury, Danbury, Norwich and Stratford after union leaders decided to strike Wednesday following a breakdown in talks on a new contract. A UPS spokesman in Greenwich said the dispute centered on a union demand to keep workers on a regular schedule rather than the current practice of maintaining workers on the job only as long as there is work. The spokesman said the company has offered a 33 per cent increase over the life of a three year contract for the workers who now earn from \$7 to \$8 an hour. No talks involves about 18,000 deliverymen and warehousemen along the east coast from South Carolina to Maine. More than 80,000 shippers use UPS to ship about 1.6 million packages daily through the 15 states. Many of the UPS employees work on a part time basis.

Local leaders of GOP suffer a tough setback

Fred Peck's victory last week in the Republican registrar of voters primary was a tough setback for the local leaders of the GOP.

Dissatisfaction with Peck's recent work as registrar was widespread among those leaders. They felt he was not working as hard at the job as was required to boost a sagging Republican registration rate.

The night Herb Stevenson was renominated by the Democrats for their registrar post, Stevenson spoke of increasing Democratic registration to the point where they would hold a 3,000-member edge over Republicans. The Democrats still have a distance to go, but such a goal is within reach.

Fred Peck cannot be held totally to blame for that. Voter apathy and a thing called Watergate have taken their toll everywhere on the number of people registering Republican in the past few years.

A time to revise

It has now been over a month since Meriden's new Charter Revision Commissioners were appointed, but so far they have not held a formal meeting or even been sworn into office.

August is a tough month in which to schedule anything of a business nature, what with vacations and summer heat. Now that September has come, though, the commission should get to work as soon as possible. The need for a new basic document for Meriden becomes more apparent every time a question is raised about the meaning of a charter section.

The present edition simply does not respond to the needs of this city in 1976. While the commissioners are at it, they should take a close look at setting up a city manager form of government. In a city of over 50,000, there are countless decisions which must be made every day. Most of them are noncontroversial and nonpolitical, or should be. With a manager, the chances are good that routine work could be accomplished in a more orderly and responsible way than has happened in the past.

Ford seems to have edge in California

WASHINGTON — Shortly after the Democratic Convention nominated Jimmy Carter for President, some reporters were chatting with an aide to Gov. Jerry Brown of California.

"This is not for attribution," said the Brown lieutenant. "I'll deny everything if any of you jokers use my name. But I don't think Jimmy Brown will work himself into nervous exhaustion campaigning for Carter — in California or any other state."

And therein lies Gerald Ford's best chance to make a horse race out of the Presidential campaign. Even if, as this is read, Brown has suppressed his known lack of enthusiasm for Carter and is going all-out for the Georgian, Ford seems to have an edge in the battle for California's 45 electoral votes, the nation's biggest bloc.

The edge is named Ronald Reagan, who has announced he will campaign hard and vigorously for Ford because of the "bug" in the state's constitution.

Reagan's support is important to Ford for another reason: Both Ford and Carter were clobbered in the California primary. Ford by Reagan and Carter by Brown. Both candidates need all the help they can get in that vote-filled state, and Reagan is a superb campaigner whereas Brown's performance on the stump is frequently so low key that it seems absent-minded.

At any rate, the Ford camp views Reagan's support as probably the difference between victory and defeat for their tiger in California. "It's likely to be make or break for us," says Norman Watts, deputy political director for the President Ford Committee. "And if I were Jimmy Carter I'd be wishing Reagan was a Democrat."

Meanwhile, the most recent Harris Poll points up California's importance in the campaign. It is one of the six largest Northern industrial states — also including New York, Illinois,

Pennsylvania, Ohio and Michigan — where Carter holds only 43 to 40 per cent lead over Ford with Sen. Gene McCarthy in the race.

Reagan's enthusiastic support also could help Ford in the South, conceded to Carter by most professional observers. He should win votes for the President in Texas, Arkansas, Florida, Mississippi and Alabama. Meanwhile, with former Texas Gov. John Connally also campaigning for Ford, Carter almost surely will have to spend more time in Dixie than originally planned, and that means fewer appearances in the rest of the country.

Forced to put up his own money, the prudent bettor at this point would have to lay it on Jimmy Carter, if only because of the head start he got. Soviets use student power in Third World

WASHINGTON — The headlines point to the striking Soviet military buildup, and to the energetic supply of Russian arms — as in Libya, Iraq and Angola — to governments and revolutionary factions favored by the Kremlin. Virtually unreported is the sharp rise in the numbers of Russian and Chinese Communist technicians sent to underdeveloped countries.

Even more significant is that growing numbers of young men and women from foreign lands the Russians and Red Chinese have trained in their technical schools and universities these past 20 years are now, through seniority moving into positions of influence in their home countries. This is particularly noticeable in wide sections of Africa.

In the past two decades, 72,000 students from underdeveloped nations have been trained in Russia, East Europe and Communist China at a cost of about \$70 million a year. Their current foreign student population is approximately 27,000, two-thirds in the USSR.

More than half these 27,000 are from Africa. There are, for example, 1,750 from Algeria, 1,140 from Nigeria, 1,575 from the Sudan, 920 from Ethiopia, 885 from the Congo, 600 from Somalia, 585 from Mali, 655 from Tanzania, 415 from Sierra Leone, 425 from the Malagasy Republic and 525 from Zaire.

There are also 1,100 from Bangladesh, 1,000 from Cyprus, 895 from Afghanistan 545 from India, 650 from Jordan and 1,125 from Syria.

The sources of students sent to Communist countries from Latin America are Colombia with 460,

The Soviet Union also has roughly 8,000 military technicians in Africa, the Near East and South Asia, despite the worsening of relations with Egypt. China has more than 1,000 in Africa, almost all in Tanzania. And there are currently more than 20,000 Chinese Communist economic — as distinct from military — technicians in Africa, 6,000 Russian and 10,000 East European.

There are in excess of 11,000 Russian, 3,000 East European and 2,000 Chinese Communist economic technicians in the Near East and South Asia.

The number of Communist military technicians in underdeveloped countries rose by 20 per cent and the number of economic technicians by 15 per cent last year alone.

In its military assistance, the Soviet Union seems to be striking at targets of opportunity — as in its assistance to one clique in Angola, its strong aid to Syria and its lefty shipments to Libya, which that country regularly uses for training and supply of dissident groups in a range of countries. Or in what seem to be payoffs in return for bases and other military favors — as in the case of Somalia, which has offered Russia the use of the port at Berbera, and Guinea, which has given Moscow the use of air and naval facilities for Soviet reconnaissance units.

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Legality of 'bug' being challenged

HARTFORD (UPI) — Defense attorneys have challenged the legality of a court-ordered FBI "bug" and telephone tap at a local business which led to the arrest of 25 persons on racketeering charges.

The FBI duplicated keys to enter a basement next door to the office to be tapped and wired the devices to be transmitted, under court order, through Southern New England Telephone Co. lines.

Attorneys Thursday asked U.S. District Court Judge T. Emmet Clarke to suppress the evidence gathered by the tap and listening device at the O'Brien-Sullivan Home Improvement Co. on New Britain Avenue.

Clarke, who approved the electronic eavesdropping in 1974 and ordered the telephone company to assist the FBI, rejected a defense motion to disqualify himself from the case.

The "bug" was believed the first court-ordered one used in state history. State police wiretapped the same office in 1972 and authorities raided the suspected headquarters for bookmakers three times in 1972 and 1973 but failed to gather enough evidence for prosecution.

Attorney Hubert J. Santos, representing Anthony D. Volpe of West Hartford, said the FBI entrance into the next door basement was not specified in Clarke's order and the landlord was not notified.

Volpe was among the 25 persons arrested on charges that included gambling, racketeering, extortion and perjury.

Santos also said listening devices can only be used legally if all other investigative means fail.

FBI special agent Dewey Santacrose testified earlier the FBI did not use undercover agents to infiltrate the business office or a next door bar owned by Volpe's family.

Edward Tikel, an FBI locksmith, said he came to Hartford to make duplicate keys for the business office and an adjoining building on Julius Street. He testified he kept no detailed records of trips to

HARTFORD (UPI) — A Hartford driveway contractor was arrested Thursday on charges he victimized area residents, mostly elderly persons, by selling them overpriced trap rock. Patrick W. Bonee, 35, was charged with larceny, violation of the home solicitation act and using a fictitious trade name. Police said Bonee's company allegedly sold trap rock, which costs about \$5.25 a ton, as blue stone, which sells for about \$45 a ton.

Nicklaus in 50th place

Unknowns in lead

KINGS MILLS, Ohio (UPI) — Jack Nicklaus was in 50th place. Lee Trevino was way back in 92nd position. So who were the leaders after the opening round of the \$150,000 Ohio Kings Island Open?

Don Pooley and Danny Edwards, a couple of 25-year-olds unaccustomed to the PGA Tour limelight, led the "charge of the unknowns" Thursday with scintillating four-under-par 66s to share the lead in the chase for the \$30,000 first prize.

"People are going to read about me leading this tournament and they're going to wonder who I am," said Pooley, who is from Riverside, Calif., a graduate of the University of Arizona, and about dead last in the PGA money winners list with \$720 this year.

Transportation said key to special rec program

The Manchester Recreation Department is planning to move gradually to establish programs for the handicapped, but not until a federally financed bus for the handicapped gets rolling, Rec Director Mel Siebold said Thursday night.

Handicapped persons don't take advantage of department programs now, Siebold told the Advisory Recreation and Park Commission, largely because of transportation problems.

"The bus is the key to the whole thing," he said.

The bus, specially designed to accommodate wheelchairs, will be financed with money from Manchester's entitlement under the federal Community Development Act, Siebold said.

At the same time, federal funds will be used to make renovations to the Nike Site recreation center, to install ramps, wider doors and adjust bathroom fixtures, Siebold said.

No special programs for the handicapped are planned at first, Siebold said, because handicapped persons seeking access to programs have indicated they don't want special treatment.

"We'll begin by including the handicapped in our regular programs," Siebold said.

"Then we'll train some handicapped people so we can hire them to run their own program," he said.

Recreation facilities for the handicapped will be expanded gradually, Siebold said, to avoid any sudden, big expenses.

The commission also discussed the possibility of scheduling special hours for handicapped persons' use of the recently renovated Verplanck Pool when it opens next year.

Again, Siebold said the handicapped probably don't want special treatment, but he suggested that the Verplanck Pool be readied for use early next year for "preview" use by the handicapped before the regular swimming season.

The pool was recently upgraded and now permits access by ramps for the handicapped.

In other commission business Thursday night, Siebold reported that the summer rec programs were highly successful and participation was up, although there was a drop in pool attendance because the Verplanck facility was closed for part of the summer.

Mr. Ferguson's letter, which went to Town Manager Robert Weiss, alleged that one of the Trudon players was actually a Canton resident and the roster falsely listed his address as the same as the team coach.

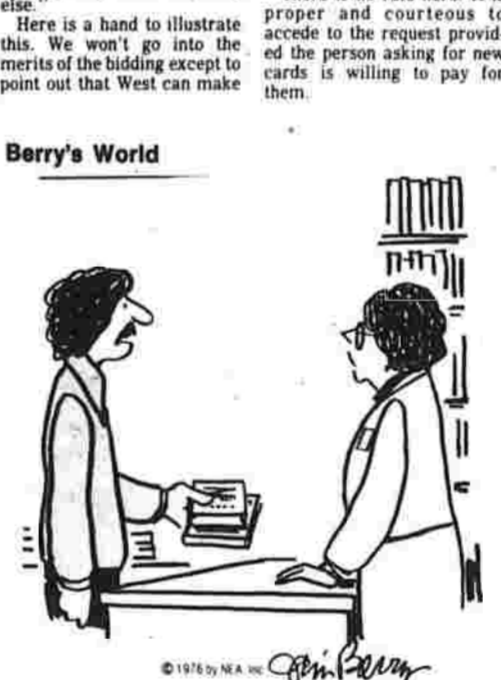

Conflict of interest problem solved by town

Due to a recent conflict of interest ruling and the installation of a new diesel fuel tank, the town will no longer purchase diesel fuel from Mayor Matthew Moriarty's firm.

Moriarty, in a letter delivered Thursday to Town Manager Robert B. Weiss, requested that the town no longer buy diesel fuel from Moriarty Brothers. The mayor is vice-president of the company.

A recent decision by Town Counsel

Victor Moses said that town elected officials and town employees should refrain from doing business with the town to prevent "the appearance of a conflict of interest." Moses' ruling was requested by Carl A. Zinsser, a member of the Board of Directors whose real estate firm had been contacted by the Town Parking Authority about the possible purchase of land.

Moriarty's memo instructed the town manager to tell all department heads not to do any town business with Moriarty Brothers while Moriarty is serving on the Board of Directors.

The only continuing transaction that will be affected is the purchase of diesel fuel, which Moriarty said did not amount to much business over the course of a year.

The fuel was purchased from Moriarty for a couple of diesel town fire trucks. It was the only area firm that supplied the higher-grade diesel fuel needed for the fire vehicles.

With the newly installed fuel tank at the town highway garage, however, Manchester will be able to provide diesel fuel for all town vehicles, according to Maurice Pass, director of general services.

The new 10,000 gallon tank has been installed and needs only to be inspected and tested. The town has had a 4,000 gallon tank for many years, but this held a lower-grade fuel, good for highway diesel vehicles, but not for fire trucks, Pass said.

Pass said the increased number of vehicles using diesel fuel made it economical to install the new tank.

"Previously a 10,000 gallon tank load of fuel would have been out there until doomsday," he said.

The larger tank means that the town will be able to buy fuel in larger quantities at a time and, thus, take advantage of discount prices for larger purchases, Pass said.

Hartford firm low bidder on new town dump truck

A Hartford firm is the apparent low bidder for a dump truck to be used by the town Highway Department.

Airport Truck Center of Hartford entered a \$28,686 bid for the vehicle, which will have a gross weight of 45,000 pounds. The firm, a division of GMC, submitted the lowest of three bids received.

There were also two other bids opened Thursday by Maurice Pass, director of general services.

A Meriden company, Unified Data Products Corp., submitted the apparent low bid for supplying Manchester with data processing forms for the 1976-77 fiscal year. The company bid \$6,000 for 500,000 of the forms, which will be used at the town's data center at 1146 Main St. Eight other firms bid for the data processing forms service.

Cardinal Pump Sales of Glastonbury was the apparent low bidder for supplying Manchester with two centrifugal pumps to be used at the Upper Glastonbury pump station.

The Glastonbury company's bid of \$1,298 was apparently the lowest of four received.

State liquor commission cites local restaurant for visibility violation

The state Liquor Control Commission has given Cavey's Restaurant seven days to submit a plan to comply with a law which requires street visibility of liquor drawing and preparation.

A commission spokesman said today that no decision on the alleged violation was reached in a Thursday hearing. Action was delayed, the spokesman said, to see what the Manchester restaurant will do about the problem.

The law requires that the drawing or preparation of alcoholic beverages be done in an area visible from the street or main entrance.

The restaurant allegedly refused to cooperate with a commission inspector who called attention to the violation, the spokesman said.

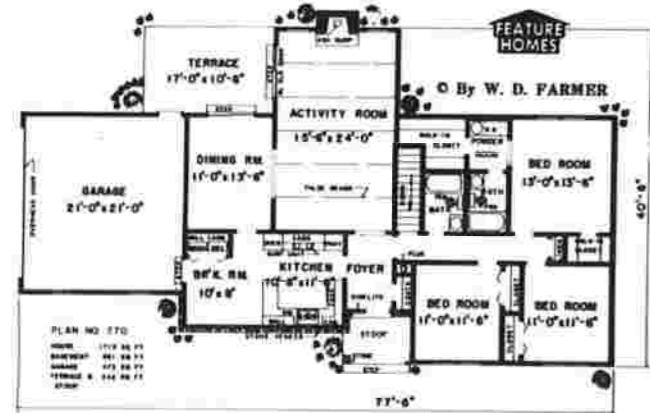
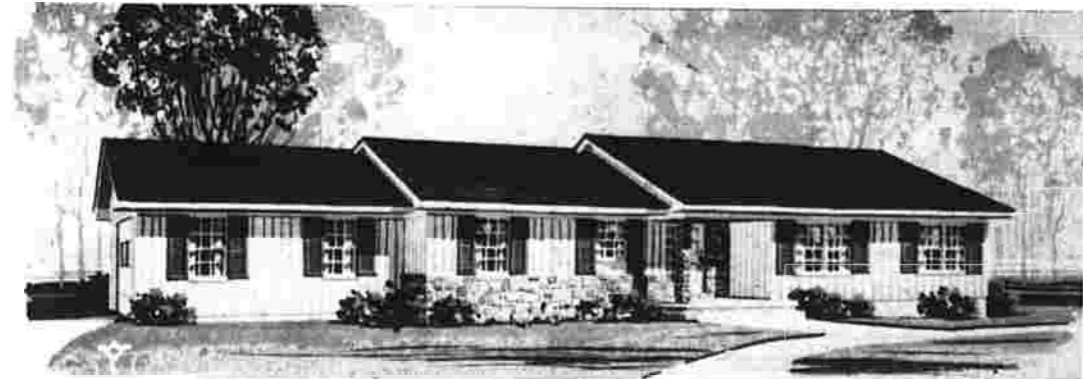
