# A sensitive performance

In an opening reminiscent of Wilder's "Our Town," Terry O'Quinn introduces "The Glass Menagerie" at Hartford Stage Company with a narration which sets the mood of Tennessee Williams' drama.

Directed by Irene Lewis, who had never seen "Menagerie" staged, the performance is given an interesting embellishment in the form of violin music inconspicuously performed offstage. Paul Bowles composed the original music played by Francesco Sciannameo, who plays the somewhat melancholy melodies in a manner which subtly enhances the nostalgic mood of the play.

Originally called "The Gentleman Caller," the story tells of a young poet surrounded by the illusion-filled world of his mother, a faded southern belle, and his frail sister, who lives in a world of daydreams and glass figurines.

The mother, played by Lois Holmes, continually prepares for the gentleman caller who, she hopes, may come anytime to visit her daughter. The mother frequently recalls her own many gentleman callers, a southern custom that lives on in her memory.

on in her memory.

One day, the son, played by O'Quinn, arranges to bring a co-worker from the shoe factory home

to dinner to meet his sister.

Preparations are made in grand style in the simple apartment situated in an alley in St. Louis.

The table is set with candelabra, the daughter is dressed in her prettiest, and mother finally appears in a frilly gown of yesteryear, one she would have worn for a gentleman caller of another era.

Chip Lucia — as the visitor, arrives not at all suspecting he is the fulfillment of the mother's dreams for her daughter.

Left alone for a while with the daughter, the caller slowly breaks down her sheltered and shy reserve. Their conversation becomes relaxed and casual, even a bit confidential. They discuss her hobby, collecting small glass figurines, "the glass menegerie, my mother calls it," the daughter tells him.

The quick relationship crescendoes to an embrace which the caller breaks from suddenly, suddenly enough to leave the daughter in shock when he adds that he already has a steady girl.

The emotional shock is further modified by the accidental breaking of one her glass animals.

One supposes the family characters go on forever, living in a world of dissipated dreams.

daughter who has retreated to a daily existence in her world of daydreams and figurines, who disappoints her mother because she did not, could not tolerate association outside her cotton cloud world. Miss Crumlish's delicate body and thin high voice, her sweet innocence prompt one's sympathy immediately. One is no less sympathetic toward the mother, who Lois Holmes describes as the author intended, a woman who uses her memory of the past to fend the harsh realities of her family's survival.

While the role of the son does not seem to be as prominent, O'Quinn nevertheless makes it a catalytic one, and one without which the story would have less significance.

Chip Luca as the caller perfectly portrays the outside world and success, and is as recognizable as the unforgettable experience which contains both hope and despair in a hopeless situation.

Whatever new innovations director Irene Lewis has brought to the oft-performed Williams drama, they make for a sensitive performance, one that combines a hint of absurdity with pathos, and the more sensitive, perhaps, because of a woman's direction.

#### An American frontier

The northeast coast remained especially appealing to subsequent generations, and Maine in particular attracted many painters throughout the middle years of the century. The coast was bold and rugged, beautiful, and in places spectacular, isolated, and untouched. It was an essential embodiment of America's concept and reality of the frontier. Alvan Fisher and Thomas Cole were painting in the Mount Desert region during the mid-

came in the next decades, and others followed. They were impressed with the stormy turbulence of the offshore waters, hidden ledges, rising promontories, and the powerful moods of weather. Lane concentrated on capturing the qualities of transient light and atmosphere. This manner of painting (now called luminism) stresses nature's higher spiritual order and tranquility, inviting from the viewer an attitude of poetic reverie and con-

During the 1860s and 1870s, however, deep polarities of mood emerged in American landscape and marine painting. Simultaneously, and almost schizophrenically, artists painted tranquil as well as explosive scenes, quiet coastal panoramas beside violently threatening storms. Almost unconsciously, art bore the dark and brooding strains of national tension during the civil war period and its

By the end of the 1870s a new form of graver, more contemplative realism emerged. Foremost in this style were Winslow Homer and Thomas Eakins, whose work increasingly suggests notes of poignant elegy, thoughtful seriousness, and powerful human drama.

#### Abstraction vs. realism

In contrast to the first half of the 19th century, American painting in the latter half saw the perplexing appearance of a multiplicity of styles, sometimes inconsistent and lacking logical development. This, too, was an index of the age's insecurities. Some artists like Albert Ryder turned inward, seeking the mystery of the inner mind and world of dreams. Others, like James Whistler, turned to forms of personal abstraction and artistic formalism; and yet others like William Morris Hunt or Childe Hassam turned to adaptations of impressionism.

These various currents carried into the new century as the conflicts between realism and abstraction continued to intensify. The coast maintained its hold on the imagination of such major figures as George Bellows, Edward Hooper and Andrew Wyeth. Meanwhile, other American painters struggled to come to terms with European modernism.

#### The new industrialism

During the 20th century New York became a major center for American painters: here was the new industrial and technological landscape. As photographed by Alfred Steiglitz or painted by John Martin, Bellows, and others, it was seen not only as a city but as a port, recalling once again in modern terms America's passage and passengers to and from

During the 1940s and 1950s Milton Avery and Mark Rothko brought painting into almost total abstraction.

They suggest vast environments of mood and feeling, possessing vague allusions to bands of earth, sea, or sky, suffused in light and colors more expressive of inner sensations than outer

The voyage and the frontier persist as a vital experience today in American art as in American life.

For some, it is a voyage inward to the self, for others a journey outward to the oceans of space.

# Madagascar stamps scarce

These British Madagascar stamps, seen towering over our Whooping Crane, are scarcer than hen's teeth.

Or at least when I was into my two-year search for onefrom-everycountry, they were the last ones to be cap-

tured You always see the much more costly Graf Zepps being recycled everywhere, but these 1884-86 Consular Mails were not in anybody's stock and never seen (by me) in an auction catalog. Finally a dealer on New York's Nassau St. talked a friend into letting go of this pair.

The "Antananarivo" on the stamps is the name of Madagascar's capital (It means "town of a thousand villages"), usually called just Tana.

Madagascar is the fourth largest island in the world (behind Greenland, New Guinea, and Borneo.) If it were laid carefully on eastern America, it would reach from Ottawa to Savannah. The population is about eight million, mostly bilingual - French and native. The government since 1958 has been called the Republic of Malagasy.

They were among the first women's libbers as they were ruled by a series of queens prior to the French takeover in 1896. Some time ago a writer had it that while the women ran the show, the chief oc-cupation of the menfolk was tending and stealing cattle. The rustling ranked with football in this country as a sport - just jolly good fun and no offense.

The island was sometimes called "Lemuria" because of the lovable googly-eyed lemurs that are native only here on the nearby Comoros. The name means ghost, from their habit of haunting the night. There are more than 20 kinds. One, the scarce and tiny aye-aye, is protected as a living fossil.

Their cattle are the hump-backed zebus, much cherished as are the yaks by the people of Tibet. The main dish is rice, and a "rice-cooking" is taken as a measure of time - 20 minutes.

The largest of all birdlife was thriving on this island perhaps as late

as 1600. It was the Aepvornis, once considered to be the roc that flew away with Sindbad the Sailor. A fatal flaw in the story - they had no wings, only little flippers. Biologists have found many of their eggs - over a foot long and with a capacity of two gallons, eight times as an ostrich egg. The bird weighed half a ton.

Madagascar has a treasure called the ravenala or traveler's tree. It can be made to furnish chairs. tablecloths, mats, spoons, and whatever. Besides this, it can supply emergency water; it is always good pint of condensed dew if you know just where to mak the puncture

There is an unexplained sterility rate of 30 per cent on the island and women who have already had children are in demand as mates. So if we are to believe our sources, a country boy in Madagascar dreams of a bride with baby, a stand of ravenala trees, a few stolen zebus, a pet ring-tailed lemur - and thus, a

## CBing north and south of the borders

Your CB could be your best good buddy when you're at home. But if you plan to travel in Mexico, you better find a resting place for the CB. And if you're going to Canada,

Many of us CBers have gotten so attached to our little buddies that we don't like the idea of leaving them at home, especially when we're going on vacation.

However, we're finding that we need a permit with us if our CB goes with us to Canada. And, in Mexico, forget it.

Several stories came out in midsummer saying CB could be taken into Mexico by writing a certain official for a permit. What the stories were not saying was that CBers who wrote for the permit simply got a "request denied" answer.

New stories soon followed saying that not only could Americans not take their CBs into Mexico, but there was no permit they could obtain to do so.

Mexican officials say there was never an official plan for CBing visitors to carry their units into Mexico.

Now the word is that a bilateral agreement will have to be negotiated by the U.S. State Department and the Mexican government before Americans can legally take CRs across the border

Until recently Mexican border authorities simply sealed CB units when owners failed to have valid Mexican Permits (which no one ever seemed to have). The units were covered with tape rendering them temporarily inoperative. If the seal was broken, a heavy penalty would be imposed on re-entry into the United

Richard Everett, an FCC official, is saying that CBers shouldn't take the chance on having their units seized or sealed. He said that simply not taking them into Mexico was his best advice.

Everett says there is a treaty in negotiation with Mexico, but he doesn't seem to know when we can legally modulate south of the border.

But if your desire is up Canada way, then there's little problem except time. There is a reciprocal agreement between the United States and Canada which states that any American licensed CBer can obtain a permit to operate a CB in Canada.

That means the CBer must obtain a permit application through any of the Canadian Department of Communications regional offices. Fill it out and return it with a photostated copy of your American FCC permit to the regional office nearest your planned point of entry.

Canadian officials are advising that it may take as much as 60 days for processing, so plan ahead. If you get to the Canada border minus a permit then you simply will have to declare the equipment. You are asked not to use it in Canada. But, it will not be seized.

CB may be one of the most popular American pastimes, but unlike American baseball — its use is applied differently in other countries.

### CB convention slated

The United States Citizen Band-Radio Association is planning its first CB Convention and Northeast Jamboree next weekend, Oct. 9 and 10, at the Stafford Springs Fairgrounds in Stafford Springs.

The producers, Northeast Promotions of Hartford, are offering a full day of activities and entertainment, including skydiving, a midway, radio-controlled airplaning. Bluegrass music, and displays of vans and trucks.

The association also plans educational workshops, an anti-theft registration and engraving program, hospitality booths and awards for the largest CB club attending, the farthest-traveling club, the oldest CBer, youngest CBer and best-dressed club.
