# Carter and Ford exchange barbs

President Ford, in a news conference ridiculed by Jimmy Carter, said now that questions about his personal integrity have been buried he and the Democratic nominee can "elevate the presidential campaign" by discussing issues.

Ford made the comment at the

start of a 30-minute nationally televised news conference, in which he accused Carter of committing slander and making misrepresentations.

Carter, addressing a Liberal Party dinner in New York City, said he had criticized Ford for not having a fullscale news conference since Feb. 19 but now "I'll have to be critical of him for having a press conference and not answering any questions."
"It's remarkable," Carter said.

"He thought he'd have a debate in his congressional elections.

The latest Gallup poll released today showed Carter had returned to a slightly larger lead over the President following their second debate Oct. 6. The survey showed Carter leading Ford 48 to 42 per cent. In the previous survey completed just before that debate, Carter held a two

percentage-point lead, 47 to 45.

A CBS News-New York Times poll reported it detected a similar spread nationally between Carter and Ford

as that in today's Gallup survey. Ford told reporters he was pleased at being given a "clean bill of health" by Watergate Special Prosecutor Charles Ruff, who earlier in the day reported that Ford had not violated the law in his use of campaign funds

"Why should anyone want to give up just when all our efforts are beginning to show results?" he said, proposing continued talks between labor, business and government on economic problems.

At the New York dinner, Carter proposed an agreement with the Soviet Union for a "quick freeze" and eventual mutual reduction in atomic weapons. He said the program should be coupled with a plan to halt the spread of nuclear weapons to countries that don't have

### Sens. Dole and Mondale to debate issues tonight

HOUSTON (UPI) - Walter Mondale and Robert Dole have debated before, but usually with a handful of Senate gallery spectators looking on, Tonight, a nationwide audience will take their measure for 75 minutes in the first-ever debate of candidates for vice president.

The two running mates engaged in bit of psychological warfare upon their arrival in Houston Thursday, with Dole admitting to some nervousness, and Mondale projecting a confident pose.

Dole, the Kansas senator who served for three years as GOP chairman, won the coin toss and will get the opening statement and the first question. Democrat Mondale closes the debate with his summation.

Dole said he was "nervous" about the encounter in Houston's Alley Theater, while Mondale admitted only to a "certain air of anticipation" about the faceoff.

Today both men made final preparations for the debate to start at 9:30 p.m. EDT. Sponsored by the League of Women Voters, the encounter will be televised live on public television and the three commercial networks.

Under the league's format, the candidates will answer questions from three reporters chosen for each

dull," Mondale said of tonight's presidential briefing books available exchanges, "but I don't know how he (Dole) plans to perform." The Minnesota senator said the encounter "will be slightly more lively" than the two previous debates between President Ford and Jimmy Carter.
