More than a million Canadians marched, demonstrated, and hanged the prime minister in effigy in a nationwide one-day general strike against wage and price controls Thursday, but it failed to impress the government.

The president of the 2.2-million strong CLC, Joe Morris, said at a Toronto protest rally of 10,000, "The CLC is prepared to continue its campaign of political protest."
"Let me make it clear, today does not mark the end of our campaign. Today you are carving a place for yourselves in history. We must continue to fight until we have eliminated controls from the scene in Canada."

"I never used his violating or not violating the law as a campaign issue," Carter said. "I just said he ought to hold a press conference to explain these things rather than hide in the White House."
At the New York dinner, Carter proposed an agreement with the Soviet Union for a "quick freeze" and eventual mutual reduction in atomic weapons. He said the program should be coupled with a plan to halt the spread of nuclear weapons to countries that don't have them now.

Sens. Dole and Mondale to debate issues tonight

HOUSTON (UPI) — Walter Mondale and Robert Dole have debated before, but usually with a handful of Senate gallery spectators looking on. Tonight, a nationwide audience will take their measure for 75 minutes in the first-ever debate of candidates for vice president.

"I don't think they're going to be dull," Mondale said of tonight's exchanges, "but I don't know how he (Dole) plans to perform." The Minnesota senator said the encounter "will be slightly more lively" than the two previous debates between President Ford and Jimmy Carter.

Dole said Ford had made his presidential briefing books available to him and "they had a lot of good pointers in them." But he said that was basically the extent of any coaching by the President.

The two running mates engaged in bit of psychological warfare upon their arrival in Houston Thursday, with Dole admitting to some nervousness, and Mondale projecting a confident pose.

For whatever reasons, Dole, known for his biting sarcasm, has spent much of the pre-debate period downplaying its significance. He has repeatedly asked whether more people will be out watching high school football games than inside watching the two candidates.

Moderator for the debate will be Jim Hoge, editor of the Chicago Sun Times. The three questioners are Hal Bruno, political correspondent of Newsweek Magazine; Marilyn Berger, NBC White House correspondent; and Walter Mears, special correspondent of the Associated Press.

Dole, the Kansas senator who served for three years as GOP chairman, won the coin toss and will get the opening statement and the first question. Democrat Mondale closes the debate with his summation.

On the other hand, Mondale's aides say he will stress his serious side, in anticipation of a possibly light-hearted treatment by Dole. That assessment, they said, was based on years of watching both men in Senate debates.

About 650 persons — including 250 news media representatives — will be admitted to the castlelike concrete theater.

Personal income up 0.5% last month

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The personal income of Americans rose 0.5 per cent in September, with most of the increase resulting from strong growth in private industry payrolls, the government said today.

September increase to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$1.39 trillion was attributed to a \$5.7 billion rise in the wages and salaries paid the nation's workers. In August, wages and salaries were up \$4.7 billion.

In its monthly report, the Commerce Department said personal income—which means all income received by all individuals in the economy from all sources—rose at an annual rate of \$6.8 billion in September.

Commodity industry income rose \$1.2 billion last month, after it had declined by \$200 million in August. Government employees picked up an additional \$1 billion in September, while private industry payrolls jumped \$3.5 billion.

Although last month's increase in personal income was smaller than most of the monthly advances recorded this year, it represented an improvement over August's \$4.6 billion increase.

In the manufacturing sector, the Commerce Department said "a decline in motor vehicle industry payrolls, because of the auto workers strike, offset an increase in the rubber industry, where a four-month strike ended."

Income figures for both July and August were revised downward and there is a chance the September numbers may have to be changed later when more data becomes available.

Most nonwage income—dividends, investment, transfer payments—added another \$3.6 billion to September's total. But a steep \$2.9 billion decline in farm income helped wipe out most of the increase in nonwage income.
