





subsidize 90 units in Manchester Ray Leger has another problem. He says he can afford an apartment at up to \$220 a month, including heat and appliances, but no one will take a chance on him because he is now considered a bad credit risk.

Forced to leave Leger was forced out of his apartment in the Manchester Parkade Tuesday because he was not able to pay his rent for January. Leger has been disabled for the past two years and has been trying to get his disability payments and social security for all that time. Leger said the social security office lost his records twice and the state welfare department lost them three times and each time he had to start all over. He has had to leave two other apartments in the past owo years because of nopayment of rent. His wife works, but it is not always

enough to pay all the bills. Last Sunday Leger and his wife moved their furniture to a new apartment, were given the keys and then told by the landlord 15 minutes later that they could not have the apartment. He then had to move his furniture back to his old apartment. He was told Tuesday morning that he would have to leave there, ad despite advice from legal aid to remain in the apartment, he left at his own expense and moved into a motel. The state welfare department agreed to pay his bill there for two weeks. Most of the money that he was going to use for a security deposit and rent has been used up in the two moves, Leger said. Leger cannot go out on his own to look for an apartment because he is confined to a wheelchair

Good tenant, but...

Leger said his most recent landlord told him he wished all his tenants were as good as him, but he did not think Leger would be able to pay the rent, so he was asked to

Leger said he has received a lot of help from the Organization for the Handicapped and MACC as have the other families, but they are all fighting the fact that rents in Manchester are higher than in most of the other towns

The Manchester Housing Authority recently was given approval by the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for an increase in the rent subsidies to enable more persons to find housing that will

qualify for the program. About 150 non-elderly and 90

elderly have applied for the program, Mrs. Hunter said.

At least five to seven families are in need of immediate housing because of emergency situations, according to Nancy Carr, executive director of MACC.

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This Albee is exciting

Edward Albee has done something very exciting for the theater with his newest play, "Counting The Ways," which is receiving its American stage premiere at the Hartford Stage Company along with another Albee premiere, "Listening.

Called a curtain raiser, "Counting The Ways" is a fast moving, entertaining series of blackouts, some very brief and others several

Unlike the majority of Albee's plays, which are inclined to be ponderous, this one is witty. humorous, clever to the point of surprise - surprise that Albee writes

Taken from Elizabeth Barrett Browning's "Let Me Count The Ways," the one-act performance is about a middle-aged man and wife who reminisce about the joys and disappointments of their marriage. Some of their recollections are not without barbs, some not without poignancy. A couple of instances

border on the pleasantly ridiculous. Angela Lansbury and William Prince share a very tailored setting of a round table and two chairs for their repartee - Lansbury and Prince fencing with their verbal at-

tacks and ploys - always complementing each other.

After an intermission and a set change, the evening continues with quite another cup of tea. Albee's "Listening" reverts to his

familiar style of delving deeply into personal makeups, accentuating the sombre natures. A three-character, one-act play,

'Listaning' features Maureen Anderman along with Lansbury and Prince.

Miss Anderman is outstanding as a mentally disturbed girl who accuses Miss Lansbury of never really listening to the meaning of what she

Set in the courtyard of a mental institution in front of a deteriorating fountain, the man, the woman and the girl meet and carry on a disjointed conversation. The characters are nameless in the play. Miss Lansbury is obviously the attendant for the psychotic Miss Anderman. Prince is probably an employe of the institution. Whether he and the woman ever knew each other before

Miss Anderman as the girl is most effective with her sporadic emotional interruptions and accusations. She cowers, she is infantile, she is beguiling, she is pathetic. It is Miss Anderman who captures the audience with her startlingly sensitive portrayal.

However, Albee has bogged down his new play with vagaries and allusions which make it a boring piece, even if there are portions of rhetoric by both Prince and Lansbury that are pure poetry.

and Slick Chick. Thomas "Top Cat" Fuller and Victoria "Slick Chick" Seaton Hollywood, Fla., were married in a July wedding con-

The survival of any form of human society depends on two things, the production of the necessities of life and the reproduction of the labor force itself.

Reproduction includes not merely the propagation of the species but the care and nurture of the young - education, training, discipline, and cultural

In the early days of capitalism, the work of socialization took place largely in the family. The patriarchal family, in which the father's authority was unquestioned, was responsible not only for imparting ethical norms - standards of right and wrong - but also for instructing the child in the prevailing social rules. It was thus the primary agency for shaping the child's

The capitalist made little effort to interfere with this central position of the family. He attempted to supervise his workers' lives on the job, but his control ended when the workers left the factory at closing time. Only a handful of employers in the early 20th Century understood the success of the mass production economy now required not only the capitalistic organization of production but the organization of consumption and leisure

One of the first business leaders to recognize the need for a new kind of social education for the young was Edward A. Filene, the Boston department store magnate. "Mass production," he said in 1919, "demands the education of the masses; the masses must learn to behave like human beings in a mass production world. ..." In other words, the mass production of commodities in everincreasing abundance demands a mass market to absorb them.

In the course of bringing Filene's bargain-basement "culture" to the consumers of it, the advertising industry, the school, and the mental health and welfare services have taken over many of the socializing functions of the home.

While glorifying domestic life as the last haven of intimacy, these agencies of mass tuition have propagated the view that the

It is too late, however, to call for a revival of the patriarchal family or even of the less authoritarian family that replaced it. The socialization of reproduction has fatally weakened not only the father's authority but that of the mother as well

At first glance, the decline of conscience might appear to make it more difficult for the authorities to impose themselves on the rest of the population. Not only parents, but all those who wield established authority - teachers, magistrates, priests - have suffered a loss of "credibility."

Unable to inspire loyalty or even to command obedience, they therefore attempt to impose their will through psychological manipulation. Government becomes the art of personnel management, which treats social unrest as a kind of sickness, curable by means of therapeutic intervention

Yet, in many ways the new forms of authoritarianism and social control work more effectively than the old ones. As religion gives way to the new anti-religion of mental health, authority identifies itself not with what ought to be but with what actually is, not with principles but with reality

Political authority no longer rests on the family, which formerly mediated between the state and the individual. Indeed, the state has accommodated itself so well to the weakening of parental authority that efforts to strengthen the family are likely to be perceived as threats to politica

Through the proliferating apparatus of mass socialization, the state now controls the individual more effectively than it controlled him though appeals to his con-science. Even though the new methods of social control might exact a mounting economic, social, and psychological price, those methods will be discarded only when the price threatens to become altogether



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
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
