FOI rules Heffernan erred in not answering queries

By GREG PEARSON

Herald Reporter The state Freedom of Information (FOI) Commission voted unanimously Wednesday that state Tax Com-missioner Gerald J. Heffernan should have answered questions pertaining to his discussions with the J.C. Penney Co.

Heffernan indicated this morning that he is willing to go to court to settle the matter.

The three-member FOI Commission supported a report submitted by Chairman Herbert Brucker, who heard the case involving Heffernan.

Heffernan, at a hearing Friday before Brucker, refused to answer questions pertaining to discussions between his department and the J.C. Penney Co., which would be the largest tenant in Manchester's proposed industrial park.
The complaint against Heffernan

was filed by Attys. Bruce Beck and Anthony Pagano, who have since filed an appeal against a zone change needed for the industrial park.

Brucker ruled that Heffernan's

Atty. F.D. Neusner, an assistant attorney general, told the commission that the matter will now be referred to the attorney general's of-

They get free medical benefits, including annual physicals with all necessary tests, or themselves and their families. (No going into debt for Susie's appendectomy.) They can save or otherwise spend travel funds not used for travel and stationery funds not used for stationery. They are given \$5,000 a year for newsletters, none of which are employed for self-Then there are the "honoraria."

That's a polite name for the fees up to \$2,000 (maximum \$25,000 a year) Congressmen pocket for making comforting speeches to special in terest groups to which they have given legislative comfort. On Main Street, they call that legal bribery. Doing better That's Congress. A study by Jim

Davidson, president of the National Taxpayers Union, shows that the average Congressman made \$700 less year in private life.
