### Manchester dropping 17 from school faculties

By SUSAN VAUGHN Herald Reporter

The Manchester Board of Education voted Monday night in executive session not to renew the contracts of 17 nontenured teachers.

Most of the teachers are completing their first year in the Manchester school system. Of the 17, 12 are elementary teachers and five are junior high school teachers.

In reading the press release after the board's vote prior to Monday's regular meeting, School Supt. James P. Kennedy said the action was taken because of the reduction of elementary classroom teaching staff, based on declining enrollment, and to accommodate a number of tenured staff returning from leaves of

Dr. Kennedy stressed that the action was not because of unsatisfactory evaluations of performance by any of the teachers.

This is the largest number of teachers in recent years that have not had contracts renewed because of a need to eliminate positions, but it may be the beginning of fairly major reductions, Dr. Kennedy said today.

No teacher layoffs were made last year for these reasons and about eight contracts were not renewed in 1975 on the junior high level in a similar effort to reduce staff. Most of those contracts were eventually renewed, because of attrition,

Kennedy said. Dr. Kennedy also said it is an-ticipated that "some, if not all," of the teachers will be called back as resignations, requests for leaves and possible retirements make positions available later in the year. The action taken Monday night,

## Amin frees Yanks

NAIROBI, Kenya (UPI) - In a dramatic turnabout, Uganda President Idi Amin said today all Americans were free to leave his country - a move apparently aimed at improving strained relations with Washington.

"Americans are now free to travel anywhere in Uganda or leave the country if they wish," Radio Uganda quoted Amin as saying.

It also quoted a "presidential spokesman" — interpreted to mean Amin himself — as saying Uganda wished to "improve relations with the United States" but gave no further reason for his change of

In Washington, the White House had no immediate comment, but said 'that sounds pretty good.'

Radio Uganda said a scheduled meeting Wednesday between Amin and the approximately 240 Americans in Uganda had been postponed indefinitely.

Amin earlier had barred the Americans from leaving the East

African country until they appeared before him

Last Friday Amin ordered the Americans, mostly missionaries, to bring "a listing of their possessions" to a meeting with him Monday in Kamapala. The meeting was later delayed until Wednesday and rescheduled for Entebbe. That second meeting then was postponed in-

Radio Uganda said Amin met informally at Entebbe Airport Monday with a group of white Americans and assured them he had "nothing againt

The broadcast said Amin told them them the world press had "misunderstood" his orders.

"Ugandans are your brothers and sisters ... enjoy yourselves," Amin told the group, which included mainly American employes of Uganda Airlines.

Radio Uganda also announced that Zaire's President Mobutu Sese-Seko had cabled Amin seeking assurances

for the safety of Americans. The radio said Amin has replied, "There is no cause for alarm."

A Kenyan newspaper, the Daily Nation, reported Monday that Americans already had begun gathering in the capital and were under "strict security surveillance."

But the newspaper said the Americans rode around the city and shopped in stores without interference.

Amin's original demand for a meeting coincided with a cable he sent to President Carter Friday in which he accused the President of falsifying events in Uganda.

Carter told a news conference two weeks ago that recent disturbances in Uganda — particularly the mysterious death of Ugandan Archbishop Janani Luwum -

"disgusted the civilized world." On Sunday, Amin warned Ugandans to remain on alert for a possible "invasion" by U.S. Marines. There has been no further mention of the






